## IMPORTANT FARM MEETING AT PLAINVIEW, 31ST WILL EXPLORE VEGETABLE FARMING POSSIBILITY

In the first formal step toward possible organization of a huge commercial vegetable marketing enterprise on the Texas High Plains, farmers, businessmen and individuals will assemble in Plainview Tuesday, January 31st for an advisory board meeting.

It will be at this time that the projected development will be examined from the practical viewpoint of organization, production and marketing.

To lead a discussion on the technicalities of such an operation, will be two men who are specialists in their fields. J. F. Rosenborough, Extension Horticulture Marketing specialist of Tyler will

examine the marketing aspects, Dr. George Elle, Asst. Dean of Agriculture at Texas Tech will study production problems.

Ronald Davis, from the Lasbuddie Community in Southwestern Farmer County, with whom the plan for big-scale vegetable marketing and production has originated, reports that "from 25 to 30 Plains communities will be represented" at the meeting.

From each of these communities will be one person who has volunteered to serve on an advisory board. It will be this board that will listen to and weigh the information which will be presented at Plainview in the light of what is

learned at the meeting and other known butane dealer and farmer asked about advice about further procedure.

Advisory Board member for Morton will be J. W. McDermott, well known butane dealer and farmer who has long been an experimenter in various crops and grasses and types of farming in Cochran County.

"We are fortunate enough to have secured men who are the very best in their fields," says Davis, "and they will tell us the facts on whether our plan appears to be feasible."

Beside members of the advisory board representatives of the press, businessmen, farmers, chambers of commerce men, agricultural officials and others have been invited to sit in on the discussion. It is possible that as many as 150 persons will attend the meeting.

The Plainview auditorium will be the setting for the meeting, set to get underway at 2 p.m.

## School Bond Issue Set February 4th

By a unanimous vote Monday night, the Morton Independent School district Board of Trustees called for a \$222,000 school construction bond election to help alleviate crowded conditions which already exist and which could get completely out of hand in a year or so.

It was no new issue. The problem of needed space has been discussed for many months. The trustees have checked proposed plans at five separate meetings, have had the engineers, Atcheson and Atkinson, revamp their plans time after time to get the most out of the dollar. But the sad fact remains. It's going to be almost impossible to build all that urgently needs to be built.

The same meeting brought the date of the proposed election, on the 4th of February, that's a week from Saturday, and also found the Board binding themselves with a contract to sell the bonds at an average interest rate of 3.217 per cent in case the bond issue does carry. The rate of interest was the best ever received on local school bonds, though the district is not in as good financial shape as it has been in previous years when the bonds were passed. This is a fact no one could explain, except to agree that the local district has been paying a high interest rate on a lot of bonds.

Purchaser of the Bonds was Bob Davis, representative of Columbian Securities of Texas. The same company had purchased City of Morton bonds last year.

The proposed construction, which started out several months ago as a plan which would relieve the high school and elementary school of crowded conditions, has now centered around the construction of one eight classroom, elementary building with a cafeteria included. The Board figured this would relieve present conditions the most per dollar in this manner. The new building to set where the old cafeteria and band hall now sets, is to contain eight classrooms which will enable the 1st through fourth grade to add new sections and to cut down on the size of two years.

The cafeteria would play a key role in the project in that it would allow more seating and thus do a great deal toward getting the necessary lunch hours better staggered. Right now the cafeteria is hard pressed to serve the entire school.

The "cafeterium", as the cafeteria is called, will also provide another valuable service in that it will double up as an auditorium, large enough to accommodate many elementary school programs.

The old building would not be scrapped, either. Moved to a new location, it would be used as a band and music hall and by remodeling, would provide more room than the band and choral departments now have.

The Board emphasized that it is possible that they can get the job done at a lower figure and that a few of the bonds may not be issued even if voted, until some time in the future. But they threw out the cold fact for the Cochran County public, Morton public and any others who are interested to study — this is no local problem that is faced by the Morton district alone. All over the nation, a higher birth rate of some 5 - 12 years ago, has sent increasingly large 1st year classes into the schools. The Board, backed up by statements of the national top educators warned that we'll be needing more construction again in another two years if not sooner and that it'll take a lot of construction bonds to put the local district in shape to carry the next five years.

Bound by law to a 10 percent deficit, the board voted to issue all the bonds possible — the situation is that serious.

### Funeral Services To Be Friday for Sam J. Johnson

Funeral services will be held on Friday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. at the First Baptist Church in Smyer for Sam J. Johnson 63-year-old Cochran County Farmer who died at the Cochran County hospital Wednesday morning at 10:30.

Mr. Johnson, who was moving back to the Smyer area, is survived by his wife, Elizabeth—eight sons, three daughters, one brother, two sisters, and nine grandchildren. Living here were two children, Peggy and Doyle.

Mr. Johnson had been farming eight miles southwest of Morton.

### MARCH OF DIMES PROJECTS ARE SUCCESSFUL

Latest successful reports, all of which were pleasant surprises to the sponsoring groups and the chairman of the projects went like this:

Elwood Harris, in charge of the High School fund drive organized the classes in a competitive manner with a half day vacation as a bonus and produced these startling results: Junior Class \$78.35, Sophomores, \$64.15, Freshmen, \$40.79 and Seniors \$15.28 for a grand total of \$198.57. Not to be outdone, the grade school under Mr. Acker raised \$80.19 and the Junior High under Elmo Smith came up with \$50.70. When the final school's tabulation was complete it showed a total of \$339.92.

Mrs. Wilson also assisted Elwood Harris in the High School drive.

partake of the meal and to all who did buy meals. And she thanked all who helped pass the word about the supper.

### Four Youth To Pay For Wild Night of Window Breaking

Four Morton boys, who went on a window breaking rampage week ago Thursday night, will pay \$25 fines each and will pay for the damage City Judge Alvin O'Pry decreed this week.

In a hearing Wednesday morning, the judge heard the boys admit the damages while on a wild spree.

Judge O'Pry ordered the boys to bring him the money for the damages so he could be sure it was paid and he will turn it over to the persons whose windows were broken.

Here's a list of what they broke: a plate glass window at West End Grocery run by Lonnie Mings; 12 house sized windows at the Ford agency here; a pane of glass at Merritt Butane Co., a plate glass window at Banks Ross; the front window in a home belonging to Mrs. Powell; plus tipping over a group of highway signs.

Sheriff Hancock said it was the worst bit of vandalism here in a long time. The boys could give no reason for their actions.

The judge declined to give the boys names out but three of the four were not juveniles and their names are a matter of record.

They are Clarence Baker, Lewis Perkins and Gerald Perkins, brothers and the fourth was a minor, 15 years old. The others are 17 & 19 years old.

### 58 from County Attend Lubbock Cotton Meeting

One of the Cochran County representatives at the important cotton meeting in Lubbock Tuesday, who along with a fellow Countian was named a member of the new organization's directors, said Wednesday, "I didn't want the job of serving on the board, but ILL say this — it makes you feel a lot better to know that Cochran County had 42 farmers and 16 businessmen interested enough in the future of the cotton market to attend the meeting."

Gene Benham was the man speaking here, along with J. R. Kaykendall was asked by fellow Cochran Countians to represent this county on the board of the new organization — not yet named — to help gain a voice for the high Plains in the cotton farming picture.

Almost all the 1700 who attended the meeting were in accord with the idea that if the High Plains is producer of 10 percent of the entire output of cotton in the USA they sure should have a voice in plans for the future of cotton.

The meeting which grew out of the indignation of area farmers at the loss of acreage because of recent lobbying and the declining price on cotton and possibility of a one inch staple basic price support was very successful in that it showed farmers and businessmen getting together on the realization of a crisp economic impending crises for the High Plains if we don't do something.

Willard Cox who was elected as county chairman, said a county-wide meeting would be called with in the near future, and that funds will be needed to push forward.

### Drennan Named To School Faculty

Harold Drennan, president of the Morton Jaycees and local salesman for a department store, was elected to the Morton Independent School District Board as a junior high social studies instructor.

Drennan, who has had a number of years experience in the teaching and coaching field, is currently associated with St. Clair's Department Store.

He will assume his duties at the school on Monday, according to Supt. H. A. Owens. He replaces Mrs. Elmo Smith who submitted her resignation at an earlier date.

### Farmers Urged to Order Seed Soon

Farmers were urged this week by Soil Conservationists to buy grass seeds acceptable to their needs, while the seeds are available.

According to local soil conservationists the stocks of all native grass seeds are being rapidly absorbed. And there are many questions regarding the proposed soil bank program and the effect its provisions in the main will have on the demand for grass and legume seeds.

They say the stocks of native grass seeds are already far below the amounts necessary for normal planting requirements by the soil conservation districts alone; with the soil bank requirements added, stocks may soon be exhausted, they advise.

### 'Wesley' Film Next Wednesday

The Methodist Men's organization will sponsor the showing of next Wednesday night of the film "John Wesley," a feature length production in Eastman color produced by the Radio and Film Commission of the Methodist Church in cooperation with J. Arthur Rank.

The film showing will start at 7:30 p.m. according to Rev. S. Frank Weir, pastor of the church. It brings to the screen for the first time the dynamic and colorful 15 century evangelist and educator.

John Wesley's miraculous rescue from a burning house at the age of five at the beginning of the film forecasts the dramatic and eventful life which unfolds in this story of a man of slight stature but of impelling influence upon his contemporaries and upon history.

The English clergyman thought his venture in America as a missionary to the Indians in the Georgia colony was a failure, but it was the kind of failure which opened the door to the discovery of a religious certainty he had been seeking.

Furthermore, this discovery, in which John Wesley found his heart strangely warmed, led him to face mobs unafraid, and to ride 250,000 miles on horseback, changing the masses of English people from a low state of moral degradation to sturdy and happy uprightness.

While the film is being released only to Methodist churches during the initial period, the public has a special invitation to attend according to Rev. Weir.

Rep. Mahon Fights Lower Support on Cotton of Less than One Inch Staple

WASHINGTON (Jan. 22) — Representative George Mahon warned in Washington, last Thursday, on the eve of scheduled Senate hearings on a new farm law that steps should be taken to prevent the adoption of a plan for lower supports on cotton of less than one inch staple.

"The present law requires that cotton loans be based on 7/8 inch staple. There is considerable sentiment in the U.S. Senate to raise the 7/8 inch basis to one inch. This would tend to reduce the support on all cotton on an average of about 2 1/2 cents per pound," Mahon declared.

He said Senator Ellender, chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, has indicated his committee might favor raising the basis from 7/8 inch to one inch.

"One proposal would require 90 percent of parity support of one inch staple, but a support level of less than 90 per cent for cotton having less than one inch staple," Mahon said.

For example, the support level on one inch cotton might be 90 per cent of parity; and the support for 7/8 inch staple might be 75 per cent of parity.

This would not only be discriminatory, according to Mahon, but would deal a disastrous blow to West Texas cotton producers.

Since his return to Washington, Mahon has discussed the problem with officials of the Department of Agriculture and members of the Senate and House agriculture committees.

The Senate Committee is expected to open brief hearings on the new farm bill immediately, Mahon has asked to be allowed to testify before the committee before final action is taken.

Briefly, here is the legislative outlook in Congress on the farm program. The House last year passed a bill providing for the restoration of 90 per cent of parity supports for the basic crops.

The next move is up to the Senate and it is expected that the Senate will modify the House Bill to include many additional provisions before the House will again have a chance to vote on the new farm legislation.

Senator Ellender expects to have a bill on the President's desk by February 15.

"We are interested in getting something done reasonably soon, but we are more interested in getting the right kind of legislation and most anxious to safeguard ourselves against discrimination in the new law as applied to West Texas," Mahon concluded.





Yet, the idea some have of God is just as unthinkable! They think God approves of ten ways to be saved. If He does, why would He not approve of one man preaching ten ways? The man who reads the Bible cannot get this picture of God. IT DOES MAKE A DIFFERENCE what we believe and what we preach. The New Testament says, "There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism" (Eph. 4:5).


