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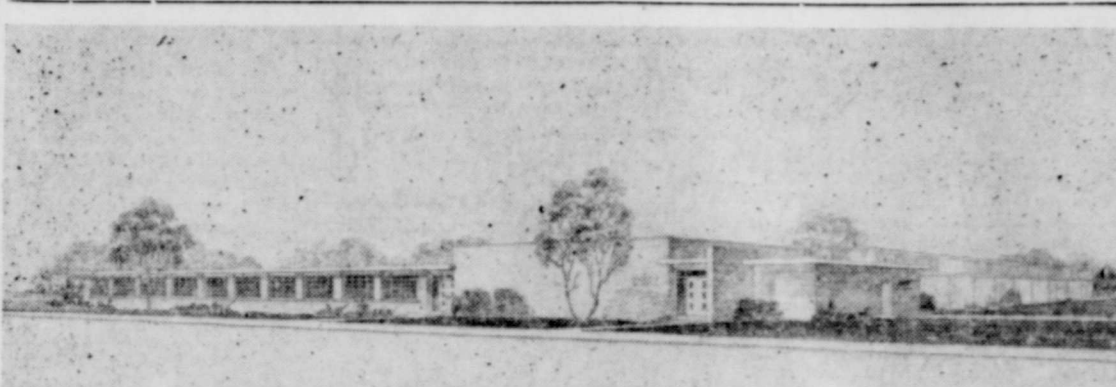

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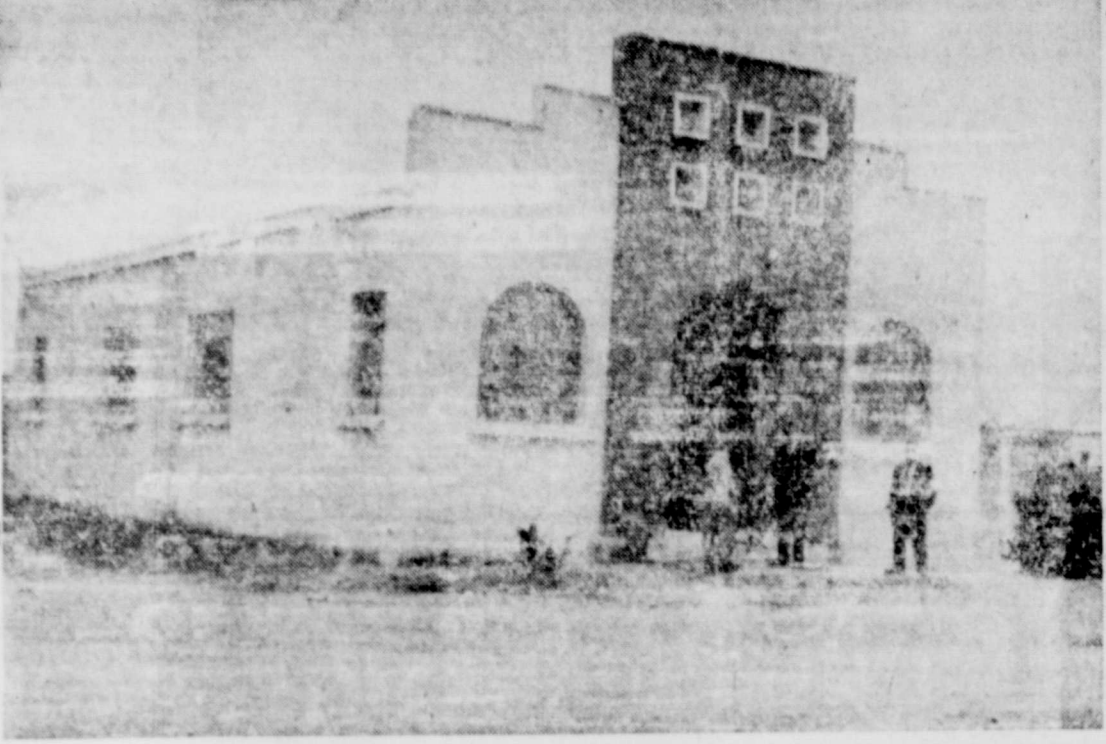

### Church of Christ Complete's Bldg. South of Border

Five years of support to a Church of Christ minister in Delicious, Old Mexico has culminated in a new brick building, stuccoed on the outside, and opened for services last November. Jesse Brookshire, local Church of Christ minister reports.

The Church, located some 270 miles south of El Paso in a rich irrigated farmland district, and in a town of some 25,000 people, is pastored by Juan Garcia and now boasts some 40 members. It has room for approximately 175 regular members before expansion will be necessary.

The local Church has supported Garcia as pastor for about five years and for the past two years has been working on the planning and construction of the church. Until its completion, the church met in various homes.

Nearly all the money that went into the construction of the church came from local offerings though money from an estate helped and the Hamilton Church gave \$100 for which the local Church was extremely grateful. The members of the church there did most of the construction work.

The building, of brick structure covered with stucco, has a mosaic tile floor throughout, four classrooms, a bath and two modern

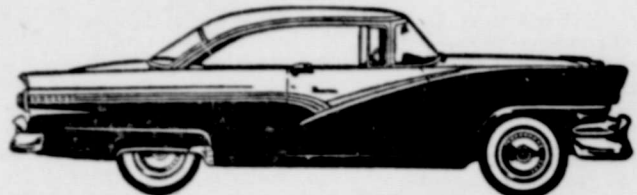

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**AUTHORITY**

Jesus delegated authority to the apostles and commissioned them to "preach the gospel to every creature" (Matt. 28:18-20). They were given authority to "bind on earth and it shall be bound in heaven" and to "loose on earth and it shall be loosed in heaven" (Matt. 16:14-19). In using this power to "remit sins," they declared the terms of pardon. Those who accepted Heaven's offer of remission of sins were forgiven and added to them.

There are those who insist that Peter had that authority because it was to him that Jesus spoke in Matt. 16:14. However, a further study reveals the he was not



alone in power to "remit and retain sins." In John 20:23, unto the twelve, he said, "Whoever sins ye forgive, they are forgiven unto them; whosever sins ye retain, they are retained." Paul said that he was not "one whit behind the chiefest of the apostles." Jesus said, "Their great ones exercise authority over them: Not so shall it be among you: (that is to

exercise authority over one another)—Matt. (20:25-26)

Each of the apostles had the power to "bind and loose sins." Peter's special privilege reached only to opening the doors of faith to both Jew and Gentile, and this he did in preaching the first gospel sermon to representative of each group. (See Acts ch. 2 & 10).

Get This Thought: Whenever the apostles went forth to work for the Lord after they received power (Acts 1:2-8), they were busy with their task of "forgiving sins." What they told men to do to be saved is precisely the same thing men must do today. If not, why not?

A person who tells you differently is telling you something for which he has no authority. No church has the approval of heaven to authorize any thing differently. There are no successors to Peter or any of the other apostles.

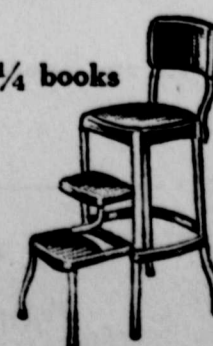

If they are on their toes, armed with a poll tax list, they can campaign in earnest without running into a lot of needless effort wasted on the thousand or more adults who just weren't interested enough pay the poll tax.
