When considering what grasse to plant for seed production, w should also consider the problem encountered in harvesting as we expected markets

Harvesting of clean, hard-seed ed grasses such as weeping love sand love, switch grass, or Klein mass, may be combined direct by adjusting the cylindar spacing, sp eed, and closing off all air intake Rough grass seed such as Indian side oats gramma, and Blue stem may also be combined direct; bu under irrigation in most cases it will be better to bundle, then com bine. By bundling, for example Indian grass, this allows immature seed to draw on the stalk to make

fuller and more mature seed In marketing, the buyer want a clean grass, free of foreign seed such as weed or other grass seed This is purity. He also wants seed that when planted will come up or germinate well.

Your Soil Conservation technician will help you in determining what type of soil you have and also what species of grass to plant cies for seed production, we urge that you plant at least three diff-

MISLEADING VERSE

A person once said, "Explain Acts 2:38. Why is a verse so misleading placed in the Bible?"

The passage reads: "Repent, and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins ... " It means that for one to enjoy the blessings of forgiven sins he must turn from error and be baptized



in the name of Christ-The verse is not misleading as is supposed. Rather the doctrine that man can be saved before and without baptism makes harmony with the plain statement of Acts 2:38 impossible-

Many religionists do not want to admit that baptism is of vital connection with salvation. They try to explain away

those verses, as the above, that declare such a connection-Some say that "for" in this instance means "because of." Yet, whatever men may say to explain away baptism

in order to "the remission of sins" they are wrong. Suppose they should succeed and prove that baptism is "because of remission." In order to escape from one difficulty they run head-on into another.

The same word is used in Matt. 26:28; "For this is my blood of the New Testament, which is shed for many for the remisssion of sins-" If "for" in Acts 2:38 means "because of" then it means the same thing in Matt. 26:28 & thus you have Jesus saying his blood was shed BECAUSE their sins had already been remitted-

The sentence in Acts 2:38 has a compound predicate made up of the terms "repent" and "be baptized" joined by the coordinate conjunction "and." Both are modified by the phrase "for the remission of sins." What is said of one must be true of the other. If baptism is "because of the remission of sins" then so also is repentance. One is to repent because his sins are remitted! Nonsence! It is evident that one must repent in order to have remittance of sins, and baptism is for the same purpose - in order to the remission of sins.
