

The political season was accentuated in Friona on Monday by the appearance of Preston Smith of Lubbock, candidate for governor.

A large delegation turned out to hear Smith, which might indicate a lot of voter interest in the upcoming elections. Smith is the first candidate for governor to campaign in Friona in quite some time, but community leaders are hoping to get others before primary election time.

If planners of a big openhouse for Missouri Beef Packers have any luck at all, then there may be more politicians in Friona around April 20 than you can shake a stick at.

Every politician connected with Friona in any way, from President Johnson on down, has been invited to attend the opening of the world's biggest packing plant, and those making the invitation to the president are hoping against hope that the nation's chief executive might actually attend the function.

It would be quite a feather in Friona's cap if it could happen -- and would be an appropriate "encore" for the city which landed the mammoth packing plant.

Other officials, such as senators John Tower and Ralph Yarborough, Representative Bob Price, state representative Bill Clayton and Jack Hightower are also being invited, and many of these are sure to be on hand.

Construction foreman Doyle Elliott said the other day that it is looking more and more like Missouri Beef will be able to open by early April. Most of the big construction phases have been completed, and work is now centering on the "finishing" stages.

The cement work which has gone on all winter, with the big mixer trucks driving right into the plant, has now been completed. Roofers were putting the finishing touches on the roof last week, and the two huge cooler rooms were practically finished.

Friona got another "growth factor" this week with the addition of the Texas Employment Commission office. Two men are employed in this office full time, and a clerk-secretary may be added if the demand is great enough.

While the processing of employment forms for Missouri Beef Packers is to be the prime concern of the office, it is imperative that employers and employees take full advantage of the office and use its facilities to the fullest.

It has been indicated that the office has been placed in Friona on a "probationary" basis. This means that its activity will determine its future, a spokesman said. So it behooves those of us needing employees, or employees needing jobs to take advantage of the new office.

In our "Things you wouldn't believe if you hadn't seen it", department this week, we submit the following:

Employment Office Opens In Friona

The Texas Employment opened a full-time office in Friona on Tuesday of this week. The office is located in the front part of the old Plains Publishers building, at 111 Sixth Street.

The office will be staffed by two full-time employees at present, and the staff hopes to eventually expand to include a clerk-secretary. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Managing the office is Fred Jackson, a Friona native, and the other employee is Ted Swindle, a native of Pampa. Jackson will be primarily concerned with farm labor, and Swindle will concern himself with business employment, in particular assisting Missouri Beef Packers in securing employees.

It is pointed out that all prospective employees of the new packing plant need to apply through the employment office. "The fact that the office has been located in Friona recognizes that Friona is the center of business and agricultural activities in this area. It was a demand for such an office that brought it here, so it is imperative that employers and employees make use of the office to justify this confidence," stated Swindle.

Swindle pointed out that the Texas Employment Commission had taken a "new image" throughout the state. "We feel we're doing a better job, offering more service, and exhibiting an attitude of cooperation," he stated.

Jackson attended Friona schools, spent four years in the U.S. Navy, and then attended West Texas State University. He has spent training periods in TEC offices in Muleshoe and Hereford, and also attended a training school in Amarillo.

His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Fred W. Jackson, now of Fort Worth. Swindle is living in Hereford, where he has lived the past four years. He taught in high school for a year and one-half. Swindle is a graduate of West Texas State University and is presently working on his master's degree during night classes at WTSU.

His wife teaches in elementary school at Hereford.

'Learn Candidates' Smith Advises

"The government of the state of Texas is the biggest business in the state, and the people of Texas need to investigate the qualifications of those who seek the highest office," gubernatorial candidate Preston Smith told a standing-room-only crowd in Friona Monday morning.

Smith, with 18 years of experience in government says he believes he is the best qualified candidate. "I think it's important that the governor know the legislative process of government," Smith said. He has spent six years as state representative, six as senator and six as lieutenant governor.

He pointed out that no other

candidate could approach his record of 18 years service -- and not only that, but no combination of candidates could match it.

"Find out the qualifications of those running for the office. Don't vote for me just because I'm your West Texas neighbor -- I'd like to think you're voting for me because I'm the most qualified candidate," Smith told the group.

Smith stated that he is tied to no special interest or pressure group.

"I didn't wait to see who might or might not run, nor who might endorse me," said the lieutenant governor, who has been campaigning since last

August. "I'm a conservative, to the point of believing in freedom of the individual, individual responsibility, and the right of the individual to have an account of his tax dollars," Smith added.

"We're going to run this race on our own qualifications, and not on the demerits of others," said the man who has acted as governor for 235 days during the past six years.

Smith touched on education, industrial development, job training, law enforcement, safety spending, highways and safety and tourism in his fast-moving 30-minute speech.

IT'S SCOUT WEEK

Girl Scouts To Host Open House Sunday

Plans have been completed for formal opening of the new Girl Scout House, which is located on Ashland Avenue from 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday, March 10. Completion of this building, which has been a long time dream of Girl Scout leaders and their friends, represents combined effort of many residents of Friona.

From a small beginning in 1935, Girl Scouting has grown into one of the largest community projects in the city. At the present time 26 adult leaders and 194 registered Girl Scouts make up ten troops.

Girl Scouting started in Friona when Mrs. J.E. Stover, the wife of one of Friona's earlier doctors encouraged adults and girls to begin the first troop. Mrs. Stover had worked with Girl Scouts before she moved to Friona and directed organization of the first troop. The organizational meeting was held in the basement of the home of Mr. and Mrs. R.H. Kinsley.

Mrs. Stove and Mrs. J.C. Wilkison were the first troop leaders. Members of the troop were June and Shirley Maurer, Jacqueline Wilkison, Carolyn and Doris Ann Lange, Nancy Shackelford, Jane Ann Warren, Loris Jean McFarland and Mary Emma Stover. Friona Woman's Club was the sponsoring organization.

Through the efforts of these leaders with the cooperation of those interested in Friona's youth, a small log Girl Scout Hut was built in City Park. The fireplace, which was donated by Mr. and Mrs. Kinsley, still stands.

This hut served as a meeting place for scout troops until about 1948. By that time the Park was used and abused by so many people that it was impossible to keep windows in the building and consequently it deteriorated beyond use and became an eye sore to the town. It was eventually razed, but the fireplace, which was very well constructed, still stands.

For almost 20 years it was necessary for troops to meet in Federated Club House, American Legion Hall, the educational buildings of the various churches or any where suitable meeting places could be found.

Several years ago Mrs. Kinsley, after seeing the need of a home for Girl Scouts which they could call their own, donated lots for a building and \$1000 to begin a building fund for the new and modern Scout House.

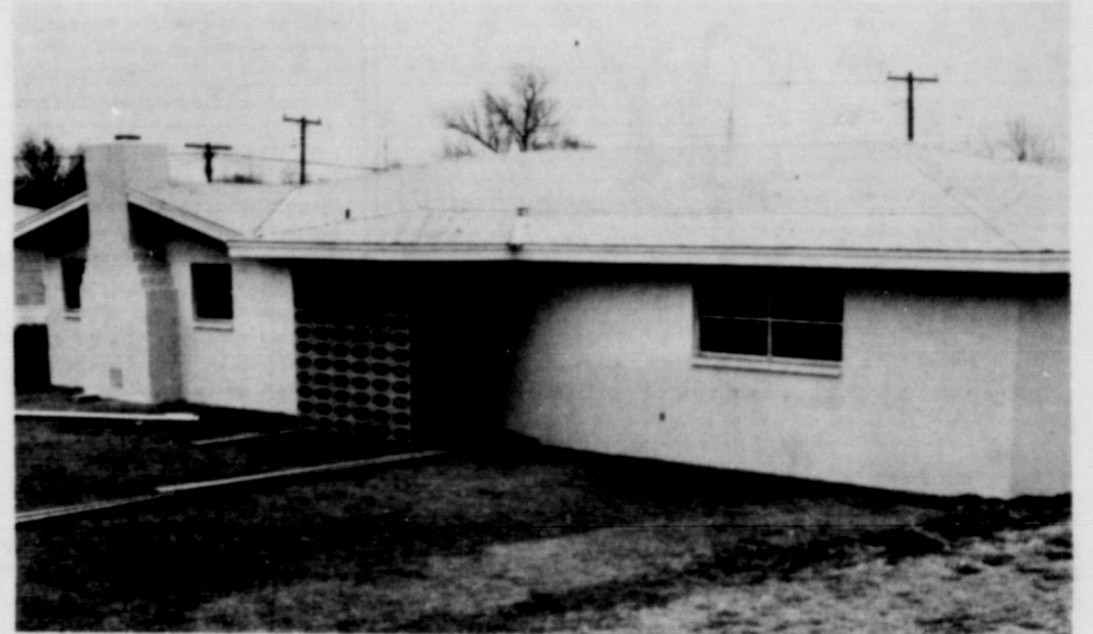
Since that time many hours have been spent planning and a large number of persons have contributed generously of their time, money, labor and materials.

Almost any afternoon passers-by can see Girl Scouts-from Brownies to Senior Scouts - coming and going at Friona's Girl Scout House. From the one troop, organized in Mrs. Kinsley's basement thirty-three years ago, Girl Scouting has grown numerically into 10

troops with 220 registered Girl Scouts.

At the present time Mrs. J.E. Stover resides at Crowell, Texas; Mrs. Kinsley is at Retirement Ranch, Clovis, and Mrs. Wilkison lives at Clifton, Texas.

Mrs. Billy Dean Baxter, neighborhood chairman, joins leaders and members of the ten troops in inviting all persons in the Friona area, who are interested in Girl Scouting, to attend the Open House.

TOTALS GIVEN

Construction Continues At Increased Tempo

Construction in Friona continued at a rapid pace during February, as indicated by building permits issued by the City of Friona, it was indicated this

week by the City Manager's office.

Five new building permits were issued, all for new residence buildings, for construction valued at an estimated \$91,200.

In addition, ten new water services were made during the month, to bring the total number of active services to 1091 as of February 29.

February's building permit total, when added to the \$158,700 figure for the month of January, brings the building total for the first two months of 1968 to \$249,900--or almost half of the total issued by the city for all of 1967.

A total of 9,178,400 gallons of water were pumped, or about 316,496 gallons per day, up a little from the previous month.

Other records released by the city manager showed that 300 feet of two and one-quarter inch water main was laid in the 400 block of Woodland Avenue to facilitate changes in existing services and supply a new residence being built at 406 Woodland.

Nine new sewer taps were made during February, to bring the total number of active services in this department to 1032. W.R. Dinges and Millard Bruce of the State Health Department visited the sewer plant on February 6 and recommended minor changes in the operation of the plant.

Fire Department records revealed that individual equipment lockers were installed at the station the first part of the month. Also, overhead water pipes were fixed, to facilitate refilling of the pumper trucks.

Only three alarms were sounded during February, all outside the city limits, for a total estimated loss of only \$110.

Police department records showed 41 arrests; 34 for traffic violations, three for drunkenness, two traffic warrants, and one each for DWI and vagrancy. Eight complaints were investigated-- four for thefts and two each for vandalism and prowlers.

Six new park bench settes arrived February 28.

Area Boy Killed In Vietnam

A former resident of the Friona area, Sgt. William C. (Bill) Marsh of Amarillo, was killed in action last Sunday at Hue, South Vietnam, it was revealed this week.

The Marsh family are former residents of the Lakeview area, and young Marsh worked for Otho Whitefield in summer months in recent years.

Marsh, 28, was a 1958 graduate of Amarillo High School, and was in the Marines. He had been in Vietnam since September of 1966. An Amarillo resident since 1952, Marsh was a member of the Tascosa Baptist Church.

Survivors include his father, William of San Antonio, brothers, Jerry and David, both of the home, and Tony of Arlington, a son Billy and a daughter Kelley of 4003 Clearwell, Amarillo.

County tax assessor-collector Hugh Moseley will be at the City Hall with deputies from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each day.

Council Authorizes Budget Adjustments

The Friona City Council confirmed the authorization expenditure of \$1,800 annually for the employment of the two school crossing attendants recently hired by the city.

The council also confirmed the budget authorization of approximately \$4,200 for the employment of an additional patrolman, Billy C. Lucas.

Another budget adjustment which was confirmed was the adjustment of the city librarian's salary from \$1500 to \$1700 annually, to qualify for a \$1,000 grant from the state.

Mrs. John Fred White appeared before the group, and thanked the council and Chief of Police Bill Morgan for their help in solving the problem of the school crossings.

In other business, the council adopted a resolution authorizing the city and school board election to be held jointly at the City Hall Saturday, April 6.

The council also passed ordinance 407, establishing a "no parking" zone in the 200 block of West 11th Street, adjacent to the junior high school.

It adopted a resolution adopting summer water rates to begin March 30 through September 20.

A final resolution adopted the annual spring clean-up week for April 8-13.



ORDINANCE # 407

AN ORDINANCE IMPLEMENTING AND EXTENDING THE SCOPE OF ARTICLE V, ORDINANCE #391, CITY TRAFFIC REGULATIONS, CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS: MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO PARK IN A SPECIFIC BLOCK OF A STREET AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any vehicle; automobile, truck or trailer, to park in the following designated block of street during the specified times and conditions:

200 Block, West Eleventh Street on U.S. Highway #60, within the City of Friona, Texas; A block of street that is posted "School Zone" located between Euclid and Cleveland Avenues.

Section 2. Said area is immediately north of Friona Junior High School and south of the old athletic field. The street block is marked with signs "NO PARKING 8:00 A.M. -5:00 P.M., SCHOOL DAYS;" and it shall be illegal to park on either side of the street during said hours when school is in session.

Section 3. The penalties provided in Article V, Ordinance #391, shall be assessed in event of any violations of this Ordinance.

Section 4. The necessity of the immediate enactment of this Ordinance is hereby declared by the City Council of Friona, Texas, to be an emergency; and it is hereby declared that upon the affixing of his signature by the Mayor of Friona, Texas, approving said ordinance, all provisions of said ordinance shall be immediately in full force and effect without further acts on the part of the said city council or anyone else whomsoever.

On The Farm In Parmer County

Wheat should be closely observed the next two months (March and April) for greenbug buildup and damage.

Greenbugs cause more damage when small grain crops are suffering from deficient moisture in mild winters and cool springs. The greenbug reproduces rapidly at temperatures between 55 and 75 degrees.

The need for applying insecticides depends on the number of greenbugs present, size and vigor, temperature, time of year, moisture conditions and state of growth. Results of experimental tests over the past ten years indicate that insecticidal applications made on wheat in March and April are the most beneficial. The following information may serve as a guide in determining the need for treatment:

The month, plant height and number of bugs/linear foot are in order respectively.

March, 4-8 inches, 200-400.
April, 6-16 inches, 300-800.
Insecticides recommended for control are: Methyl parathion, parathion and malathion. These are insecticides recommended by Texas A&M University. Malation is less effective than methyl parathion and parathion.

Morris Daniels, Entomologist at Bushland Experiment Station, recommends using at least one-half pound per acre if methyl parathion is used.

Just recently Di-Syston (Liquid Concentrate) received

clearance from the Texas Department of Agriculture for use on wheat to control greenbugs. However no USDA or Federal Drug Administration label clearance has been granted to date.

Since Di-Syston has no federal label clearance for use on wheat as a foliar application, agricultural products entering interstate commerce are susceptible to confiscation where residue levels exceed permissible tolerance.

The major reason for pointing out the possible problem with confiscation, where wheat enters interstate commerce, is because all wheat going into the government loan program is classified as being in interstate commerce. It does not matter whether it actually crosses a state line or not.

Although Di-Syston does not have Federal approval, control tests in Texas and Oklahoma have been conducted. Results indicate that one-half pound of Di-Syston performed as well as methyl parathion and parathion. The label clearance approved by the Texas De-

partment of Agriculture permits application up to 45 days before harvest. No grazing is permitted following application. Di-Syston is a phosphate insecticide having a LD50 in the same range as parathion and should be handled with the same care and respect.

New All-Risk Insurance Features Improvements

Improvements in the All-Risk Federal Crop Insurance program on irrigated grain sorghum in Parmer County for 1968 were announced today.

George W. Clark, FCIC representative from the District Office at Lubbock, says the program has been readjusted to more adequately reflect the demands of farmers and the insurance experience here.

On a 33-county basis where the changes have been made, readjustment for grain sorghum has resulted in an eight per cent average increase in the hundred-weight guarantee while premium rates have been decreased 7.6 per cent on the average.

Clark is now in the county for a limited time explaining provisions of the FCIC insurance programs to farmers and taking applications. Insurance also is available on irrigated cotton and wheat.

"About 85 insured farmers in the county shared during 1967 in more than \$2 million in Federal Crop Insurance payments made in Texas for losses on cotton, grain sorghum and wheat crops due mostly to drought, flood, excessive moisture and wind."

"This added an estimated \$83,000,00 to the county farm economy and helped to offset financial losses due to poor crops," Clark says.

The All-Risk FCIC insurance plans guarantee farmers an established amount of good quality production based on yield history of the land, amount of risk involved and estimated costs of production. FCIC by Congressional Act is allowed to insure only production costs or the farmers' investment in his crop.

When crop production falls short of the guarantee due to drought, excess, heat, flood, too much moisture, insects, disease or any other natural cause, Federal Crop Insurance picks up the tab paying a cash loss sufficient to meet the guarantee.

Some additional benefits gained by Parmer County farmers through the insurance, Clark says, include premium discounts for good experience, use of the protection as additional collateral to assist in securing the credit financing so vital in today's farming and added stability to individual farming operations.

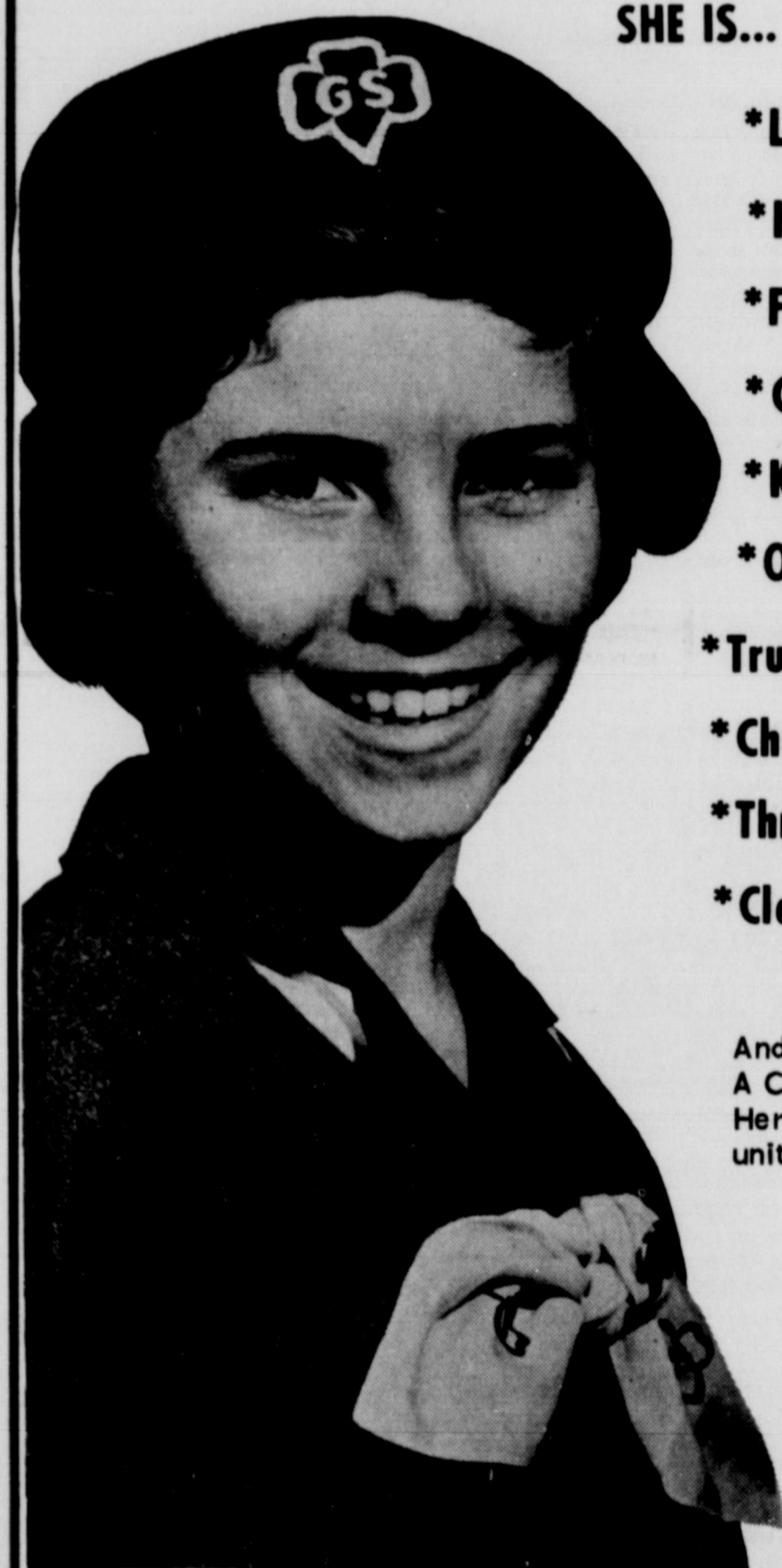

Murphree, who owns or shares four Wayland records, clocked off a 48.3 quarter, fastest time in that event in any division Saturday.

A Pioneer co-captain, Murphree set or helped set four records last year in the 220 (21.3), the 440 (48.1) and the Mile and 440 relay teams which posted 3:17.3 and 42.3 times, respectively.

Market Pressure Blamed On Lumber Price Hike

Lumber prices can be expected to continue their upward trend in the foreseeable future because of a triple pressure on the market, Joe Butler, Executive Vice-President of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas has advised the association's members. He stated that the three pressures causing the trend are:

1. Increasing demand for timber in the world market, especially in Japan where the economy is booming and building is far behind demand.

2. The strong recovery of housing construction in the U.S.,

increasing domestic demand, 3. The fact that many lumber mills have never recovered from shortages of logs caused by the closure of the forests last summer due to fire hazards.

"The export of logs from our Pacific Northwest has risen tremendously," Butler said. According to an industry reporting paper, Random Lengths, Pacific Northwest exports for November, 1967 were up 74% over November, 1966. Japan is responsible for most of the increase.

"Prices for dimension lumber in grades and species commonly used in construction are up 15% to 30% over a year ago," the lumber official reported. "This is one of the most rapid increases we have seen in lumber demand price. There is nothing on the horizon to indicate a leveling off of price or demand."

Butler said he has advised Texas lumber firms who are members of the Association of the situation so they can warn customers of the existing conditions.

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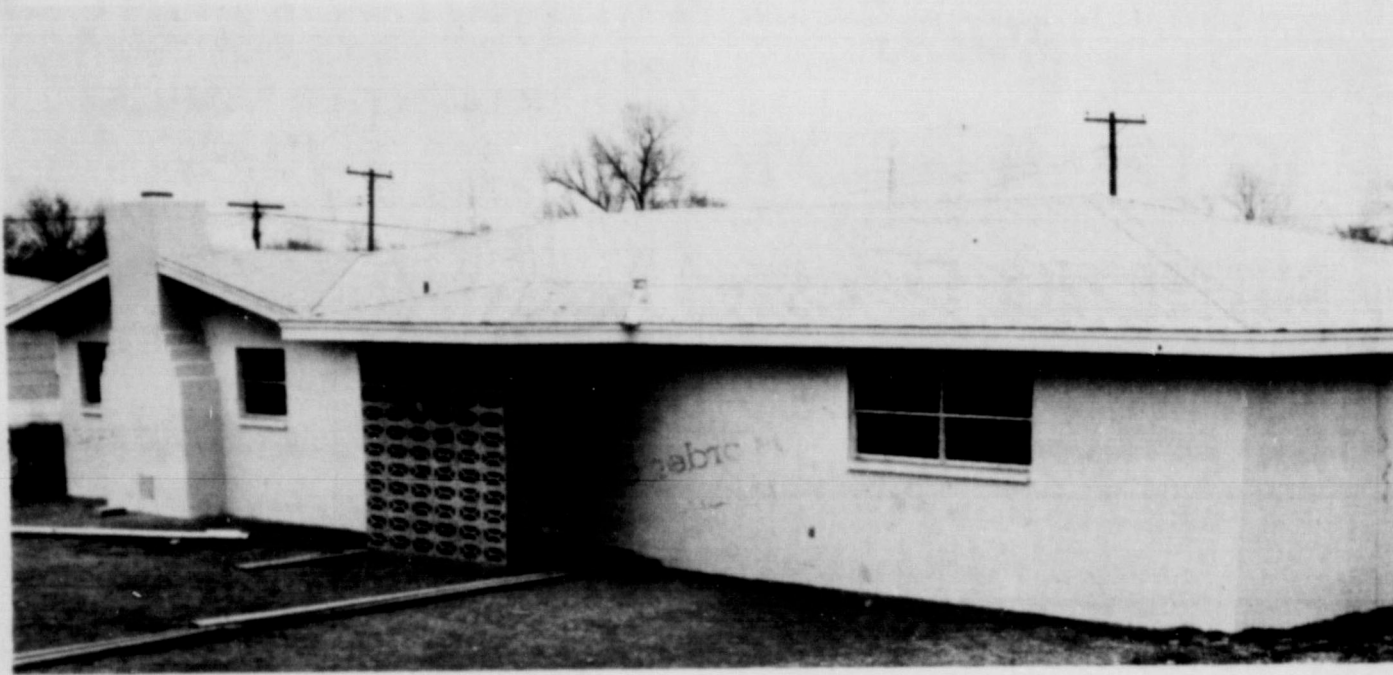

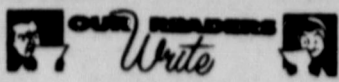

Two qualified speakers from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will discuss these two subjects. Lyndon Almond, Area Entomologist with TAES, will discuss the insect phase. Both of these men are headquartered at the Lubbock Experiment Station where they work closely with the Experiment Station personnel.

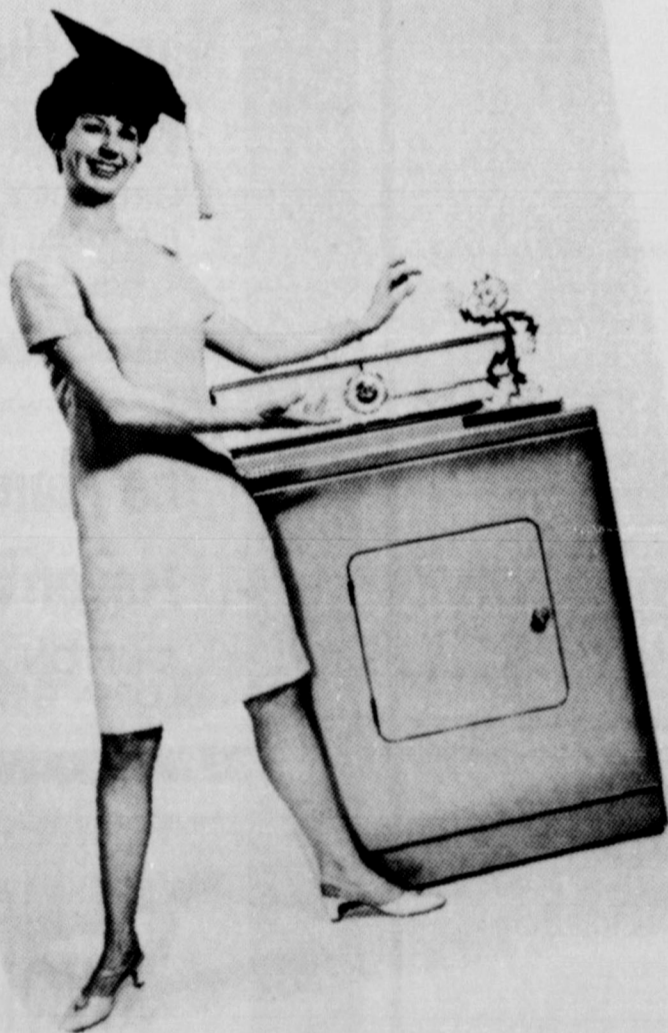

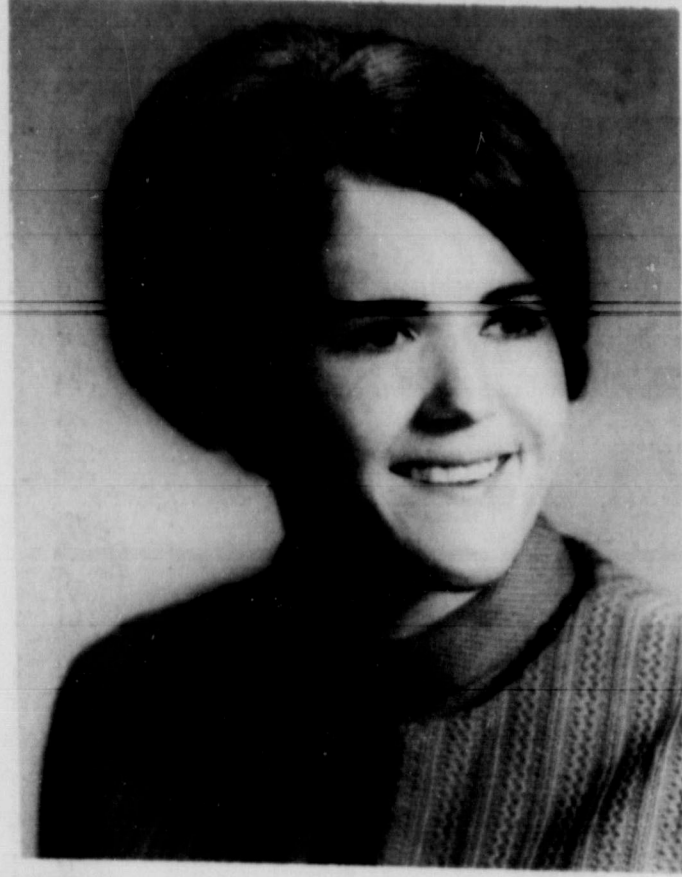

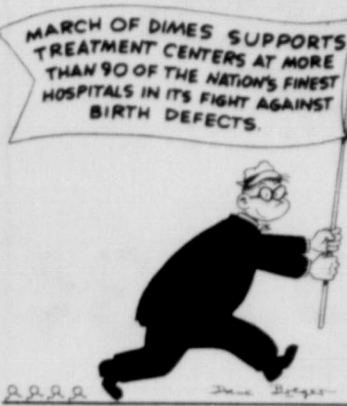
Club To Sponsor Children's Play

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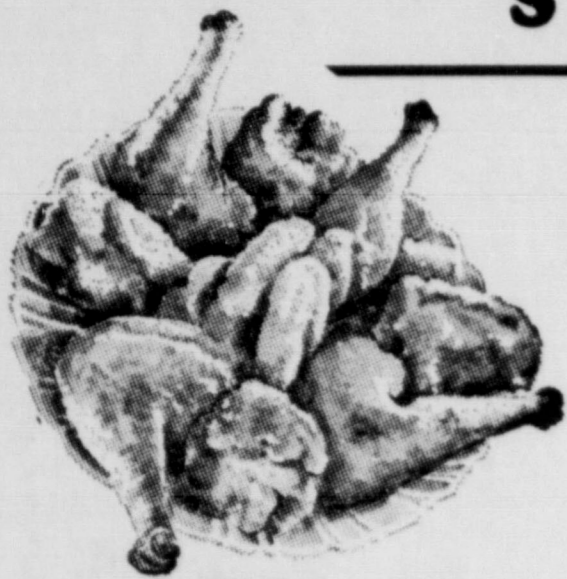

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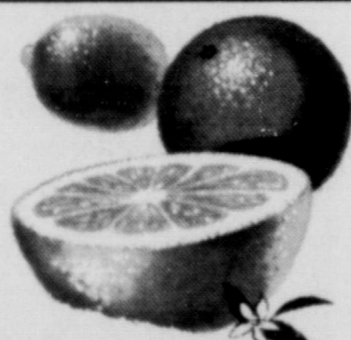
