WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

During every political season, there is a lot of catch phrasing thrown about. Thus, there is talk about the reactionary wing of one party, the moderate wing, the liberal wing, and so on.

Perhaps it is a good time to examine what is meant by these phrases in con-

phrases in con-temporary po-litical jargon. It very much appears that anyone who be-lieves in being lieves in being liberal with other peoples money automatically be in the socio

political sense. On the reverse side of the coin, anybody who A case in point is Sen. Wm. Jenner, (R., Ind.), who has perhaps never been called a liberal;

Yet the recently published address by Sen. Jenner entitled "Re-examination of Our Farm Policies" could rank with some of the writings of Thomas Jefferson as pure exposition of the true

liberal thought.

Condemning American farm policies that have existed over the past 25 years, Sen. Jenner says, "The Purpose of the American form pulpose of the ican farm policy is not to get so-called parity for farmers with some mythical competing class. That is the Marxian class con-That is the Marxian class conflict. Our purpose is to save the American family farm. The family farm is the social basis for our free enterprise, our political liberty, our biological heritage, and our military strength. It should not be the purpose of Congress to help Congress to help corporation farming. It should not be our purpose to help the city owner who buys farmland to help him avoid taxes. Nearly all the so-called remedies for farmers ben-

in land, and penalize the farmerproducer."

The Senator points out that farmers, along with their cus-tomers, are saddled with heavy taxes for foreign aid making it possible for super controls to manipulate American agriculworldwide boondoggling.

"We hear," he said, "the Sec retary of Agricuture complain about the surplus of cotton in the U. S. What is done about it? It has been made possible, through U. S. money for Mexico to double its cotton production, India increase its production by 50%. Egypt to add 2,000,000 acres. All this cotton growing is being encouraged by the State Dept. when production has al-ready increased by more than 5,000,000 bales, all of which com-5,000,000 bales, all of which competes with U. S. cotton. As a result, U. S. cotton exports dropped near 40% in 3 years, while exports by other cotton growing countries rose 46%."

He goes on to point out that agricultural production over the world is being encouraged with

world is being encouraged with gifts of seed, fertilizers and farm machinery for which the tax-paying American farmer must pay a part.

He then says, "Our govern-ment is like Penelope of Greek Legend. Penelope knit by day, unraveled by night. What little is knit by our agricultural offi-cials is quickly unraveled in the stealth of the night through the State Department."

So, during this election season it is important to keep a level keel as charges of "reactionary" and "liberal" fly through the air. There is a wide gulf be-tween the true liberal and many so-called liberals on the political scene today. Too often the term liberal only denotes a politician eager to be liberal with other people's money.






