Report from... YOUR COUNTY AGENT

Twelve farmers in Cochran County were given 10 to 25 lbs. each of hybrid grain sorghum seed to try on their farms in 1956 tests. Unfortunately, two lost their plantings due to wind erosion, one failed to plant, and six tests looked good, until a million dollar hail hit Cochran County the night of October 15.

Others came through with flying colors. Four of the reports received to date are most encouraging, but are not final.

M. A. Tanner planted 10 lbs. of Texas Hybrid 601; 10 lbs. of Paymaster hybrid 4510 and 50 lbs. of Texas Hybrid 590. He reported verbally yesterday that all the hybrids tested far exceeded his Martin Milo. He did not have his written report, but reported: Two hybrids made about 2200 lbs. of grain per acre and one hybrid made 3300 lbs. per acre. All hybrids were planted May 20, 1956. The Martin Milo made 2000 lbs. per acre and was planted June 14.

All of the grain sorghams were watered once after planting the latter part of July and the first part of August. This is a 40 percent increase in production. Cochran County has been planting 150,000 acres to grain sorghum. To exceed this figure and say 500 lbs. increase on hybrid and 1200 lbs. increase on dryland. Ten net of the 36,200 is irrigated (16,000) & 90 net is dryland. Figuring 1200 increase per acre on irrigated at \$1.50 per 100 you get 720.00 net acre or a total of \$345,000. The dryland figured at \$1.50 per hundred is \$7.20 per acre increase or \$1,036,800. So the total increase in income of hybrid grain sorghum yields over regular grain sorghum yield would be \$1,381,800 for Cochran County.

Ken Coffman reported close to 200 lbs. increase per acre on dryland on his hybrid grain sorghum, Martin Milo 1250 lbs. per acre and hybrid 611 yielded 1620 lbs. per acre. Bill Martin reporting on dryland hybrid yields told the following story: Texas hybrid 601 yielded 1420 lbs. per acre and Texas hybrid 620 yielded 1800 lbs. per acre.

Leroy Johnson reported Texas hybrid 650 yielded 2076 lbs. per acre, compared to 1500 lbs. for Martin Milo. Another check on Martin Milo when irrigated twice, once pre-watering and one post watering yielded only 2200 lbs., barely topping the dryland 650 hybrid.

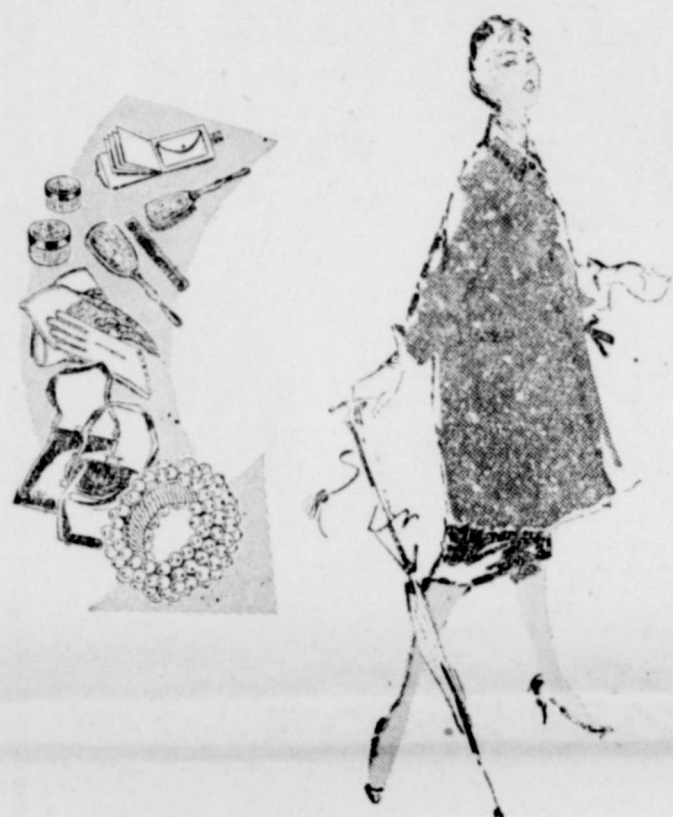

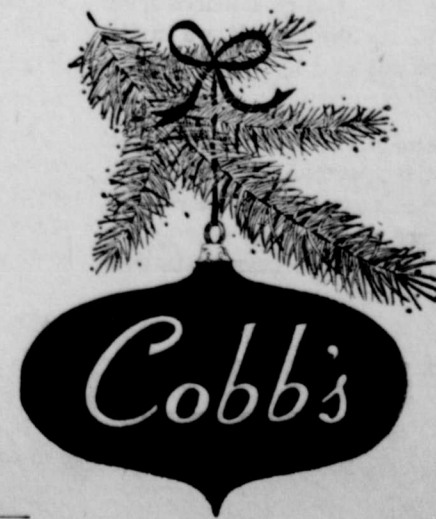

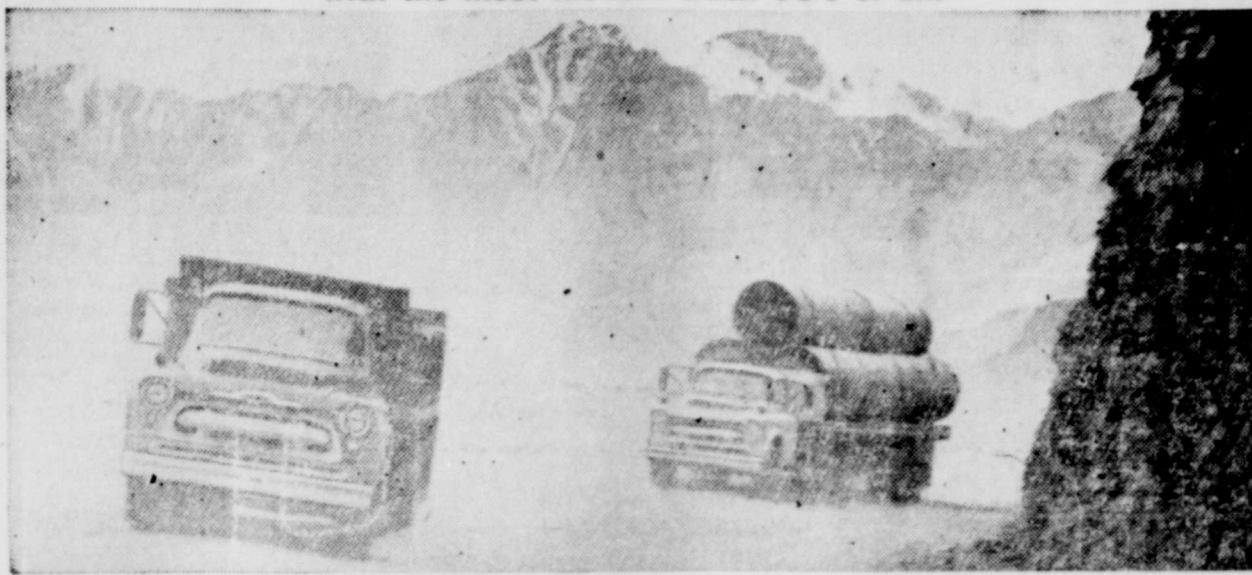

Brucella Vaccine To Be Distributed To Cattle Producers by U. S. D. A.

The Department of Agriculture will distribute Brucella Vaccine to cattle producers who are participating on plans A, B, or C for control of Brucellosis, known as Bangs Disease to most ranchers, on a first come, first served basis. In order to qualify for this vaccine a cattleman should contact his veterinarian and complete the agreement forms necessary to enroll his herd in one of the three approved plans. When these agreements are approved by the Commission, the producer may then request, through his veterinarian, vaccine for all female calves in the herd.

The only cost to be borne by the producer is that for services of the accredited veterinarian administering the vaccine. The fee will cover the cost of the veterinarian's professional service, necessary forms and certificates, and mailing costs. Following is the fee schedule that has been recognized for official brucellosis vaccination in herds participating in Plans A, B or C. \$2.00 for the first calf, 75c a head thereafter up to 50 head; 65c a head over 50 up to 100 head; 50c a head for more than 100 head. In brief the main points in the program are as follows:
