A Dental Career Can Be Rewarding

All of us are familiar with the fictional movie version of the frontier dentist, a rough and tough character who advertised with the word "painless", and who was as adept with the six-gun as he was with the pliers. Fortunately, such characters are found only

The young man of today who on dentistry as a pro fession will be a highly-respected, well-paid and vital member of the nation's health team.
There are about 90,000 licensed dentists in the United States. More than 80,000 of these

are in private practice; the others are in research, teaching, Government service and public If you are thinking of dentistry as a career, here are some things you should know: The education requirements are very tough. The course covers a period of at least six years beyond high school, and in many

instances up to eight years.
But the rewards can be great.
Aside from being a respected community leader, the dentist can anticipate an income upward of \$21,000 a year, or even more.
(Many of course earn less.)
There are 47 dental schools in
the United States, all of which are seeking students whose scho-lastic records are better than average. To enter one of these schools you must have at least two years of pre-professional ed-

college or college. It is surprising to many to learn that in a dental education the student takes many of the same courses required of student doctors.
