## Farm Safety Week Proclaimed Here

The controversy continues concerning changing of the name of Texas Technological College, our alma mater.

We don't know how long this discussion has been going on among those connected with the college, but we have been more aware of it in recent years, especially as many of our institutions of higher learning have joined the name-change trend.

This has been an especially meaty topic for the college newspaper to fall back upon in recent years -- and the undergraduate aspiring newsmen have done themselves proud in expounding the reasons why Texas Tech should change its name.

We haven't joined the name-change bandwagon as yet; preferring to believe that it isn't so much the content of a name as it is the makeup of the college (or university), which is important.

It was Tech football coach Berl Huffman, referring to the name change proposal, who said while speaking in Friona: "I don't know what the college would gain. Every place which teaches as much as long division already has tacked 'University' onto their name."

Places and things related to the college have decided in recent years to make a change in their name, even if the college does not. This is well and good; because we do not deny that Texas Tech is a university in every sense of the word -- probably in every possible way except in its name.

For example, when the aforementioned student newspaper became a daily publication a year or so ago, it changed its name to the "University Daily."

And only this week we read where the city of Lubbock, in action by its city council, has voted to change the name of College Avenue to University Avenue.

We checked with Lubbock's telephone directory, and find that there are already no less than ten listings in the city which begin with the word "University".

These include the University Arms Apartments, the University Baptist Church, University Barber Shop, University Convalescent Center, University Hospital and Clinic, University Garden Apartments, University Lutheran Church, University Medical and Surgical Clinic, University Typing Service, and University Village Apartments.

With the changing of the name of College Avenue, there will undoubtedly be several other businesses who will, of necessity, be changing their names.

At least these places will be "one up" if and when the college gets around to officially changing its name.

### Mary Kaye Everitt To C-C Institute

Mary Kaye Everitt, Friona Chamber of Commerce manager, will attend annual Chamber of Commerce Institute, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, July 24-29.

The Friona Chamber manager will attend classes every day, plus night classes two nights. She is enrolled in "first year course". There are various levels of studies. The course will be held at the University of Houston. Mrs. Everitt will accompany Mr. and Mrs. Bill Thompson of Hereford to the meeting. Thompson is manager of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce.

County Judge Loyde A. Brewer has officially proclaimed July 23-29, 1967 as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Parmer County, according to Harry Hamilton, President of the county Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities for the special farm safety campaign.

President Johnson and Governor Connally have previously

designated that week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and death.

The county farm leader said that the accidental death rate for farm residents has increased since 1961. "If this trend is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us

must have a renewed effort," Hamilton continued. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today. He also said that farm and ranch families can reduce these costly farm accidents by using some of the tools of safety, such as seat belt, fire extinguishers and SMV emblems.

In its official proclamation, Judge Brewer said: "All citizens of Parmer County are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities."

"Farm and ranch accidents reap a grim harvest of approximately 150 fatalities and thousands of injuries each year."

## School Tax Rate Set, No Increase Needed

The Friona Independent School District's board of trustees, meeting following the district's annual board of equalization hearing Saturday, July 8, set the tax rate for the school district for the 1967-68 tax roll. The tax rate was set at \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. The tax rate is unchanged from the previous year. The tax roll for the 1967-68 school year is based on \$26,556,447, according to Porter Roberts, tax assessor-collector.

The school's budget for 1967-68 is tentatively set at \$778,090 as compared to \$748,256 last school year. The increase is largely due to the teacher salary increase. Eighty per cent of the teacher salary increase is to be paid by the state. The school district pays 20 per cent.

The minimum salary for Friona teacher (no experience), is \$500, above the state minimum, at \$5234.00 annually. The state's minimum salary requirements, for a bachelor of arts degree, no experience, is \$4734.00.

In other business, the board accepted the resignation of one teacher and announced the hiring of three others. Resigning was Joe Elvens, who has been a junior high school history instructor and associated with the physical education department. He has taken a position with the Levelland school system.

Those who have been hired are John Morgan, high school commercial instructor, Mrs. Bob Crozier, half-time commercial instructor, and Juanee Green, special education instructor in junior high school.

The board voted to participate in the media center for Region 16, to be located in Amarillo. The purpose of the center is to distribute films, records, tapes recordings, slides and other visual aids material on a loan basis. Cost will be \$1 per child based on average daily attendance.

## S.D. Baize Back From Vietnam

S.D. Baize, Army Specialist Fourth Class, who has spent the past 11 months in Vietnam, is in the midst of a 30-day

pass which he is enjoying at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Duane Baize, 507 W. Fifth.

Baize, who received the Army Commendation Medal for meritorious service in connection with his duties in Vietnam, will be in Friona until July 27. After that, he will report to Fort Hood, where he will spend the remaining six months of his Army duty.

A 1964 graduate of Friona High School, Baize was commended for his outstanding work in Vietnam as a supply clerk and later as a tank loader. His commanding officer said of Baize "He enthusiastically performed his duties with little or no supervision, always doing a fine job. On combat operations, Baize, always on the alert, was a valuable crew member in spotting Viet Cong tunnels and mines. His responsible attitude and drive earned him the respect of his fellow soldiers. SP4 Baize's outstanding service and devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army."

Biggest portion of the revenue on the 1967 fiscal year report comes from stamp sales which produced \$36,288 of the total. Meter settings added \$9,513.85 to the total. Post office box rents brought in \$5,375.63, and bulk mailings added \$2,696.45.

## Postal Receipts Show Increase In Friona

Postal receipts at the Friona post office showed an increase for the fiscal year which ended June 30, according to Postmaster Wright Williams.

Receipts for the 12 months ending June 30 totaled \$57,383.11, Williams reported. The total for the 1966 fiscal year had been \$56,672.48. This is an increase of \$710.63. The totals are very near the receipts for the calendar year 1966, which stood at \$56,960.92.

For the six-month period of January through June, the receipts stood at \$23,527.99, which compared to \$23,098.89 for the same period of 1966, Williams pointed out.

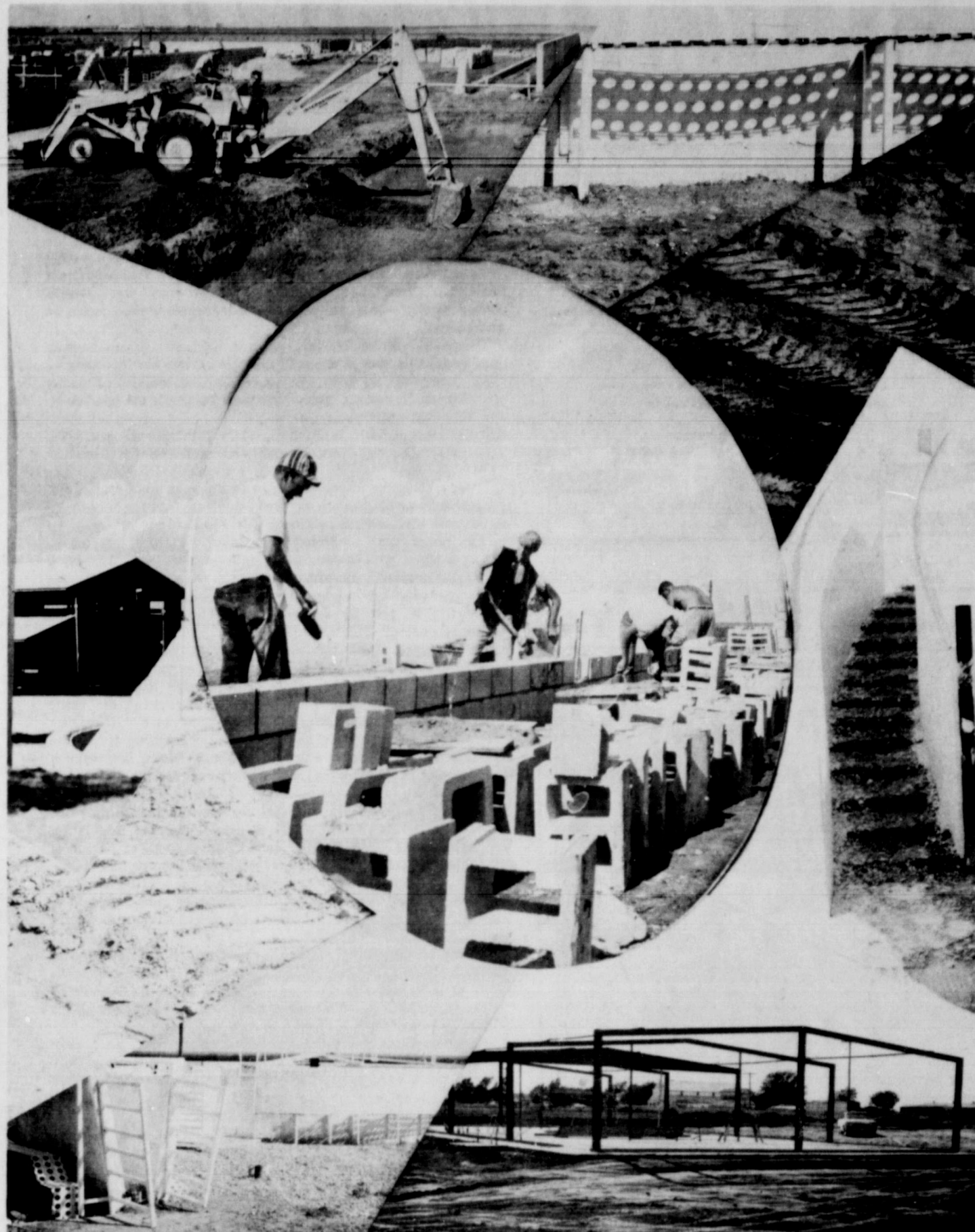
By quarters, the receipts stacked up like this: quarter ending October 7: \$15,309.72; quarter ending December 30: \$18,555.01; quarter ending March 24: \$9,861.11; and quarter ending June 30: \$13,331.82, ter ending June 30: \$13,657.27.

Comparatively, the figures for corresponding quarters in 1966 were as follows: \$17,025.96, first; \$16,550.33, second; \$9,764.37, third and \$17,331.82, fourth.

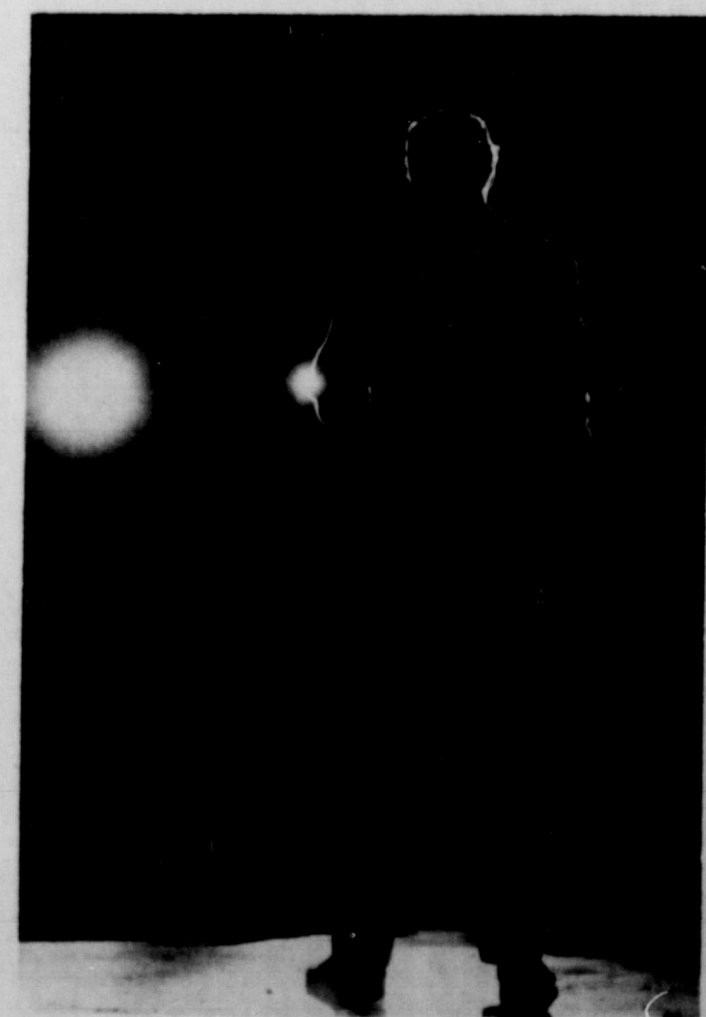
## City Mail Delivery Discussed For Friona

City mail delivery for the city of Friona was discussed this week by Postmaster Wright Williams.

"Our postal receipts meet the necessary requirements. The main thing we need is hard-surface (sidewalks) areas in places around town, and numbered houses," Williams said.

The Friona postmaster indicated that the Friona Chamber of Commerce was undertaking the matter as a project.

"City mail delivery is getting to be more needed all the time," Williams indicated. He pointed out that virtually all boxes are rented in the post office at the present time, and that the office has no room to expand.

### AN EDITORIAL

## Chamber Opposes Cotton Importation

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has taken a firm stand against the importation of Egyptian type cotton to the United States. George Hall of Abilene, member of the Board of Directors of the W.T.C.C., appeared at the hearing of the House Agriculture Committee in Washington and presented the regional chamber's position.

Hall pointed out to the House committee that the U.S. has been purchasing over 50% of its extra-long staple cotton from Egypt, which recently broke diplomatic relations with the U.S. He stated, "It seems absurd to continue spending good currency for commodities we can produce in this country."

Extra long staple cotton is grown in West Texas but acreage is restricted severely, according to Hall. This area could produce much more of the desired cotton if restrictions were removed and importations from Egypt eliminated, he told the committee.

The five reasons for recommendation of the elimination of quotas for Egyptian cotton were:

- (1) It will help agricultural economy in this country;
- (2) It will not hurt or compete with upland cotton;
- (3) It will improve our balance of payment problem;
- (4) It will encourage a better seed-breeding and quality improvement in extra-long staple cotton;
- (5) There is no more logic for importing over 50% of extra-long staple cotton than there is for other agricultural commodities.

Hall said that the House Agricultural Committee is expected to report the bill out favorably so that the entire House can vote on it within a few days. It is expected that the House will vote favorably on the bill, but Senate action is questionable, according to experts on the subject in the House Agricultural Committee.

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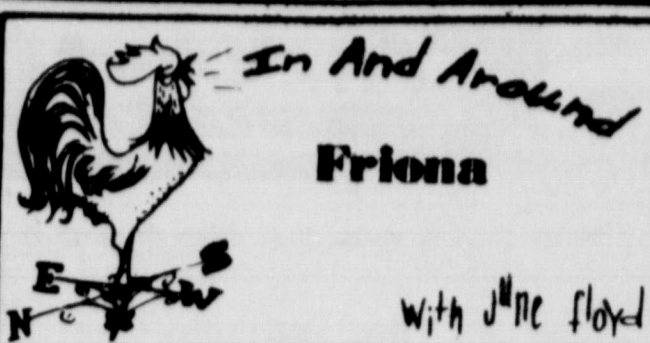

A recent news release from West Texas Chamber of Commerce, with headquarters in Abilene, contained some interesting information. Attractive three color signs are being erected near the city limits of many area towns. Each sign bears a distinctive symbol signifying "This is West Texas." Listed are special tourist attractions in the city, as well as the local chamber of commerce telephone number, which can be called for further details.

Towns listed as having the signs erected or ordered included Alpine, Baird, Breckenridge, Cisco, Farwell, Fort Stockton, Jacksboro, Marathon Mason, Miami, Olney, Pecos, Post, Quanah, San Saba, Seymour, Stephenville, Sonora and Wellington. After reading this list and then noticing that the signs are to be erected throughout an area which includes 132 counties, I decided West Texas must really cover a larger territory. 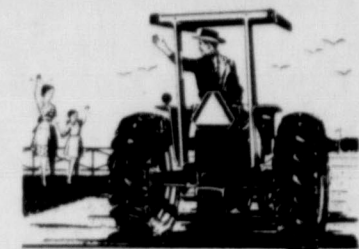

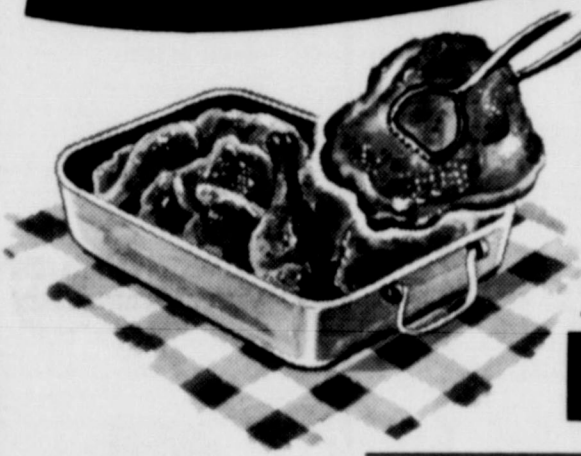

### At Home In Parmer County

If you've been buying the "extra big pound" or the "Giant sized quart," you may have been falling for a clever advertising gimmick.

Since July 1, however, no adjectives which mislead the consumer may be used, due to the Fair Packaging and Labeling Act passed by Congress last November. Meat and chicken are already covered by existing laws.

Here are some of the key provisions of the new law. Contents must be double labeled. A label which now says "One pound, 12 ounces," must also say "28 ounces."

The number of ounces in a package must be prominently exhibited on the display side, easy to read and stated in simple terms.

When a package promises to serve four, its label must give the weight of each serving in ounces. This information, according to the Food and Drug Administration, will enable a consumer to determine if she's buying enough for her family.

"Bargain price" promotion will be regulated, too. For example, a manufacturer may label his products so many "cents off" only if he is offering it at a price lower than the regular retail price. In other words,

A new bacon made with a special curing process is on the market. The manufacturer says it gives less shrinkage and spattering and slices separate easily, even when the bacon is first taken from the refrigerator.

Trousers will retain shape best if hung from cuff hangers. The weight of the trousers, suspended from the cuffs, can stretch out most wrinkles. If shirt collars and cuffs are badly soiled, try rubbing in some plain chalk and allow to stay for a few hours. When brushed off, most or all of the imbedded dirt may come with it. Around now, collars of outer-coats stand a going over with a cloth dampened in cleaning fluid. This will help keep shirt collars clean.

To prevent knits from shagging or stretching during machine washing, first put each garment into a mesh bag or pillow case.

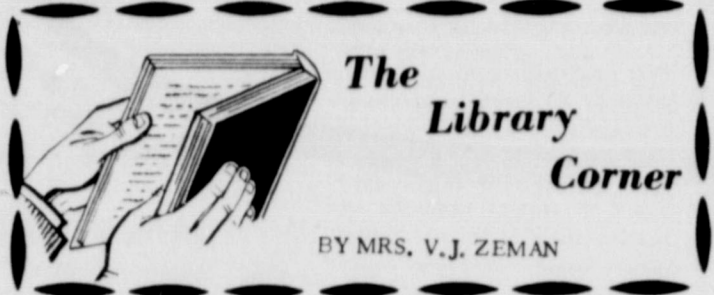
### Club Members Plan Outing In Mountains

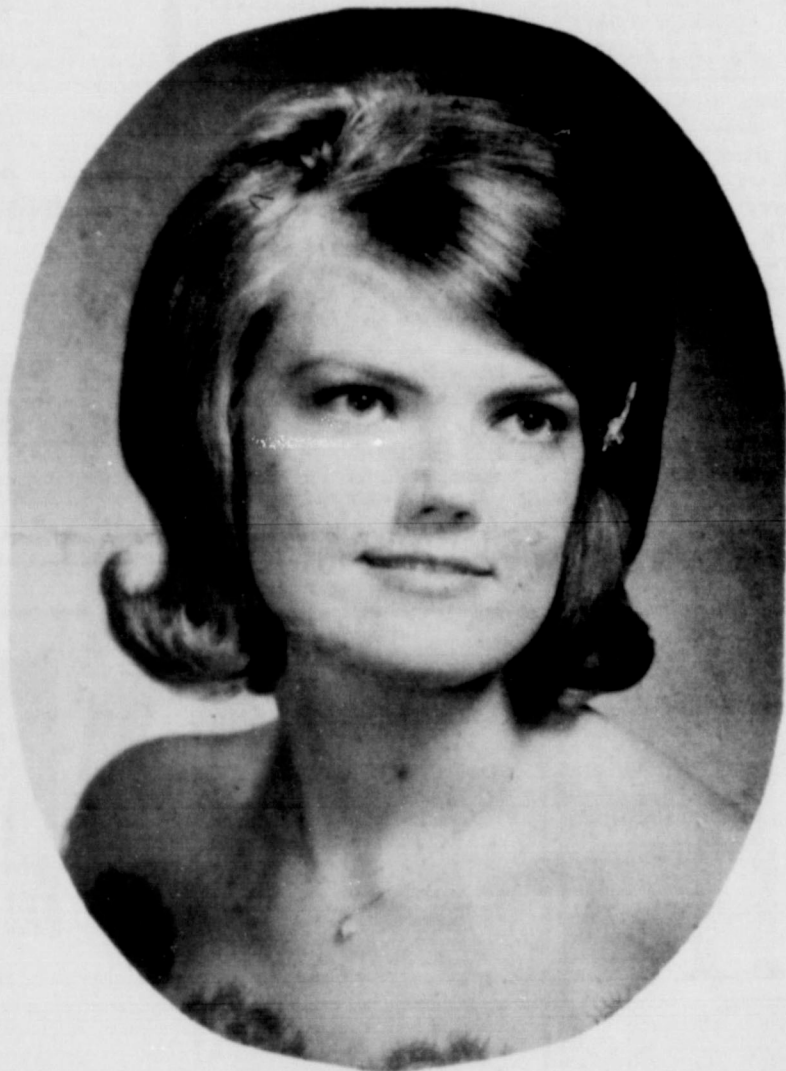

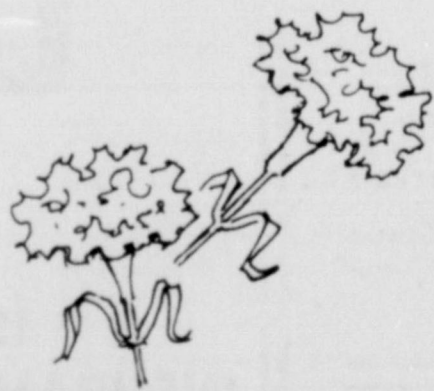

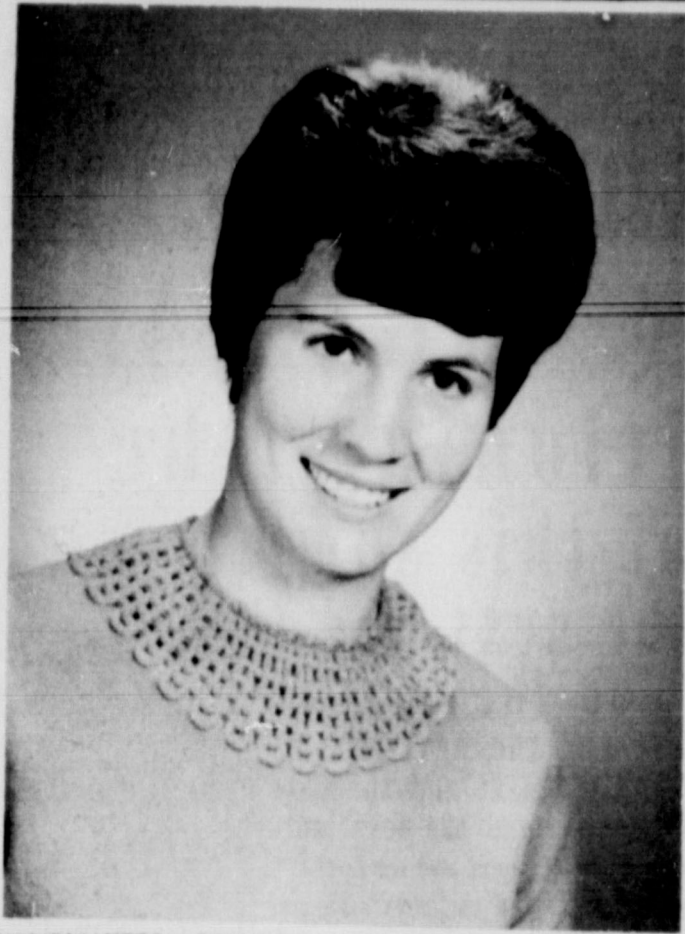

# Local Rancher Unique In Breeding Circles

The Friona area is becoming known as a big-cattle-feeding area of late, but one area farmer-rancher has quite a record in another area—sheep raising. Otho Whitefield, who operates a sheep breeding ranch eight miles southeast of Friona, has been in the business since his father became interested in sheep ranching 39 years ago. Since that time, "Whitefield has rapidly advanced in popularity in sheep breeding circles throughout the mid-West. He presently holds the position of State president of the Columbia Breeders Association, and was recently re-elected as National president of the Association for a third term. He is of course, a pure Columbia breeder.

The Columbia sheep breed was developed by the United States Department of Agriculture as a pure breeding type to replace cross breeding on the range. In 1912 rams of the long wool breeds were crossed with high quality Rambouillet ewes to produce large ewes yielding more pounds of wool and more pounds of lamb.

The outstanding record made by Columbias on the Western ranges has created an interest among sheep men of other areas. "Sheep do good in this country and there's a place for more lamb feeding," noted the longtime breeder.

Whitefield is the only suppli-

er of Columbia breeding sheep in 500 miles of this area. "I guess San Angelo is the closest competitor I have." The local rancher is responsible for the formation of Columbia sheep herds at West Texas State University and Oklahoma Panhandle State College. "We think that having these herds at the two colleges will help advertise the Columbia breed in this area."

Columbia is a dual purpose breed, especially adapted to suit the market lamb producer. Columbias are successfully used in cross breeding and producing cross bred lambs that are placing well on foot and on the rail. They are also high producers of both fat lambs and wool.

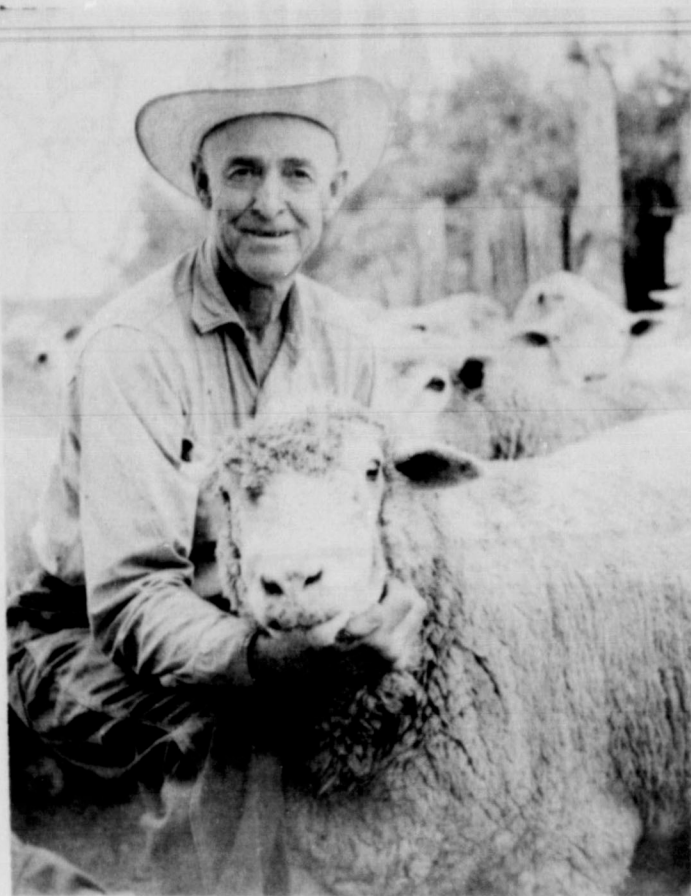
"Most of the bigger ranches are set up for mutton and wool production, and the only breeding program they have is for their own stock," he says. Whitefield also noted that one New Mexico rancher runs a flock of 3000 straight Columbia sheep.

The Columbia breed is one of the eight major breeds in the United States. The Association of which Whitefield is president now boasts a membership of 2000 ranchers, and is headquartered in Ft. Collins in Colorado.

Participation in livestock shows and sheep judging events is a good way to advertise breeding animals," says Whitefield adding, "We've had our share of the winnings, too!" Whitefield has shown several champion ewes and also several Grand champion rams. His closest show is held at Albuquerque, New Mexico State fair, and he also shows in San Antonio, Houston, San Angelo, and the Texas State Fair. Several of his lambs have also won top fleece honors.

"In the carcass division at the New Mexico state fair we have always shown in the top ten places and we are about the only pure breed entry competing with the cross bred animals," Whitefield says.

"Last year we sold some of our better rams on the average of \$150, but this year a person will be lucky to get \$70

for his animals."

The Association's annual livestock sale in Del Rio is in the not-too-distant future. "We had a real good sale last year, but this year we aren't too excited about the prospects," Whitefield pointed to drought as the major cause of falling prices in the sheep market. "Less imported sheep are available this year, but the effect has not yet reached the average sheep rancher."

On his 180 acre sheep ranch, Whitefield has 125 breeding ewes, 50 rams and the rest are lambs, making a total of 400 head. The local rancher feeds a grain mixture twice a day, including Alfalfa hay. "I always feed by hand so I can keep an eye on them," says Whitefield.

Whitefield was awarded the Honorary Lone Star Farmer degree of the Future Farmers

of America in 1966 for his outstanding work in helping the FFA and Vocational Agriculture.

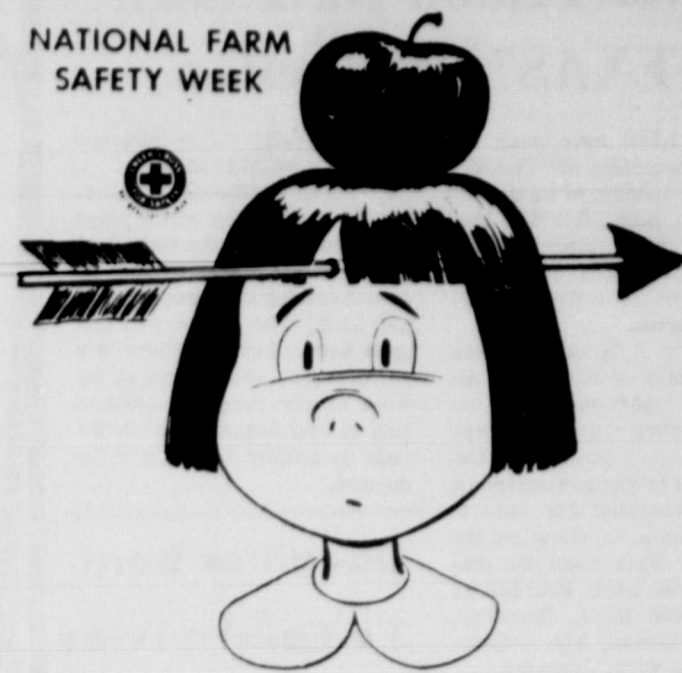
THE SO-CALLED "holding power" of a school system is a popular gauge of school effectiveness. "Holding power" is a kind of polite euphemism for the dropout rate.

Again, Texas is far down in the rankings in this category. The measurement is made by comparing the number of high school graduates in 1964-65 with the enrollment in the ninth grade in 1961-62.

For Texas the rate is 69.5 percent. This gives the state the dubious distinction of faring better than only 15 other states and Texas falls below the national dropout average of 75.9 percent.

The important area of teacher salaries is a direct reflection of a state school system's effectiveness in the classroom and reflects a state's ability to retain experienced teachers.

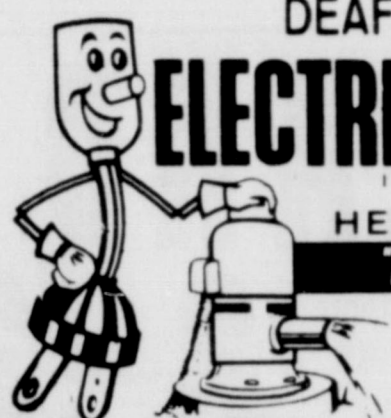

## Over 11,000 Have Seen "TEXAS" Production
