## Bank advertising for two inches of precip

"Wanted: Any kind of two-inch rain." This urgent request, prominently displayed on the front of section two of the Tribune, is a public service announcement by First State Bank. It's easy to read. The "wanted" is in letters two inches high — biggest in The Tribune shop. The two-inch rain wording is almost as big. "Anytime in the next two weeks," the ad reads. Gene Benham, bank president, accepted some unusual terms in placing the advertisement. Publisher Gene Snyder told him, "Our motto here at the paper is 'Advertising doesn't cost, it pays.' If the ad doesn't get you a two-inch rain in two weeks, you won't get a bill. If it gets you a one-inch rain, you'll be billed at only half the regular charge. But if a two-inch rain responds, you pay in full." "Fair enough," Benham said, "I hope we pay." The two weeks will expire at high noon Thursday, April 23.

## Council okays street paving

Seventy-two and one half blocks of Morton streets were approved for paving - and less than one block paved almost four years ago was "released" at a special council meeting Wednesday afternoon. A. A. Fralin, represented by Jim Walker, attorney, met with the council. Fralin and Walker explained curbing and guttering was installed during the paving program of 1960. The local druggist explained he paid cash for the improvements to his property, thinking the entire street would be curbed and guttered at the time. Fralin explained his curbing and guttering was installed according to specifications outlined by the city engineer. Later, other property owners decided to add curbing and guttering. Fralin, he explained, was told his existing curbing would have to be moved. He also explained he was informed there would be no cost to him, the property owner.

# Town, schools balloting attracts Morton voters

## Victors in school bid are named

Two new school board trustees E. E. (Bud) Thomas and Steve Bracken, were elected to the Morton School Board Saturday.

Thomas polled 89 votes with Bracken collecting 70. Running a close third on the ballot was Byron Willis with a total of 45 votes.

The total election vote was 124. T. K. Williamson collected five votes.

In the balloting for county trustee O. L. Tilger was selected with 114 votes. Elmer Seaneay and Ern Polvado each garnered one vote. Presiding judge for the election was Dean Weatherly. Clerks were Wilton Green, Wanda Leagan and Dot Irwin.

At Whiteface incumbent Omar Sims, board secretary, and newcomer, Charles Cumpton won seats in light balloting. Each was opposed and received 39 votes. Board president, M. L. Collins did not seek re-election.

Three trustees of the Three Way school system at Maple were elected in record balloting Saturday. A total of 140 votes were cast.

Rayford Masten, the only incumbent seeking re-election, received 91 votes. Others elected were Carl Pollard, 110 votes, and Jack Hutcheson who polled 81.

Other candidates in the field of seven were Ted Simpson, 43. Jake Burkett, 37. Harold Toombs, 41, and Paul Powell, 11.

One incumbent and two newcomers took spots on the Bledsoe School Board. Ernest Trull led the ballot with 31 votes. Incumbent B. E. Sutton had 26 votes and Wayne Coffman polled 28.

Incumbent Clide McCormack received 13 votes and Velton Funk, Sr., got 25.

Superintendent Otis Parr reported a total of 41 ballots cast. Parr also noted that the organizational meeting for the board would be Thursday, 8 p.m., in the school cafeteria.

## Weatherly elected to mayor job

Dean Weatherly was elected Morton's new mayor in brisk polling Tuesday. New council members selected were Wayne (Tom) Rowden and Kenneth Thompson.

The total of 269 votes cast was sprinkled with write-ins, but the unopposed slate of candidates won by comfortable margins.

In the race for mayor, Weatherly collected 141 votes. His closest opposition was Jack Wallace, a write-in choice, with 53. Wallace, the present mayor, did not seek re-election.

Others receiving an appreciable number of votes for mayor were Amos Taylor with 19 and James McClure who polled 17.

Thompson and Rowden won easy victories garnering 211 and 241 votes respectively. A total of 19 write-in candidates were placed on the ballot by the voters. Paul Baker topped the write-in list with 16 votes.

Following his victory, Weatherly said, "I am mighty proud of the work the present city council and mayor has done, and I only hope we can do as well in the next two years."

Weatherly is the co-owner of radio station KRAN in Morton. A graduate of Carey High School in Childress County, he worked at radio stations in Childress, Vernon, Big Spring and Seminole before coming to Morton in 1961.

The newly-elected mayor is the Tail Twister of the Lions Club, secretary of the Morton Area Chamber of Commerce and a member of the Toastmasters Club. His family, including his wife, Fern, and their two children, Kim 4, and Kevin, 1, attend the East Side Church of Christ.

Unopposed incumbents got all 19 votes cast in the municipal election at Whiteface Tuesday. Winning re-election were Mayor J. C. Summerlin, and commissioners T. A. Washington and L. S. Saiser.

Write-in candidates for alderman receiving votes in the Morton election included: Alex Cox, 12; R. C. Strickland, 3; Tokie Doty, Elma Seaneay, Henry Bedwell, Hume Russell, W. M. Butler, Jr., Orville Tilger, and W. C. Benham, two; and Dean Weatherly, Keith Kennedy, S. Butler, Charles Talley, Amos Taylor, Effie Atkins, J. T. Atkins, Joe Erley and Raymond Ross, one each.

In the race for mayor a total of 14 names were written in. Those not previously mentioned were: Hume Russell, 11; R. C. Strickland, five; Henry Bedwell and Truitt McCuiston, four; Roy Hill, three; and Orville Tilger, Millard Townsend, R. W. Hill, Alex Cox, Erwin Hudson and Joe Seagler, one each.

W. M. Butler, Jr., was the presiding judge for the Morton election. Clerks included Vivian Nebhut, Peggy Cook, E. O. Willingham, Rita Willingham, Wanda Gunnels, Mildred McDermott and Mr. and Mrs. Roy Hill.

The total vote of 269 was regarded as an average turnout.

## Greene club's candidate for district League post

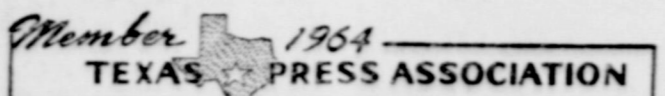

## Senate candidate speaks out about domestic issues

Gordon McLendon gave special attention to civil rights and other domestic issues this week in his fast-moving campaign for the Democratic U. S. Senatorial nomination in the May 2 Primary.

The Dallas radio executive emphasized his support of equal voting and educational rights for all but elaborated on his opposition to provisions of the pending civil rights bill which he contends would deprive members of all ethnic groups of the rights of trial by jury, private property and civil liberties.

"In its present form the so-called civil rights bill poses the greatest threat to our constitutional liberties since the Supreme Court overthrew an almost identical act in 1883," McLendon declared.

He asserted that increased job opportunities, a problem which figures in both the civil rights debate and the administration's "war on poverty," can be assured only by freeing business from bureaucratic restraints to promote business expansion.

McLendon said Texas has found a satisfactory solution to the problem of medical care for the aged by implementing the Kerr-Mills law and the Texas-65 program, both based on the principle of voluntary health insurance.

Reiterating his opposition to federal aid to and control over schools, McLendon advocated encouragement of a "realistic tax exemption for families supporting students in higher education."

McLendon pointed out that his opponent, incumbent Senator Ralph Yarborough, helped defeat an amendment which would have written a \$1200 college exemption into the new tax bill.

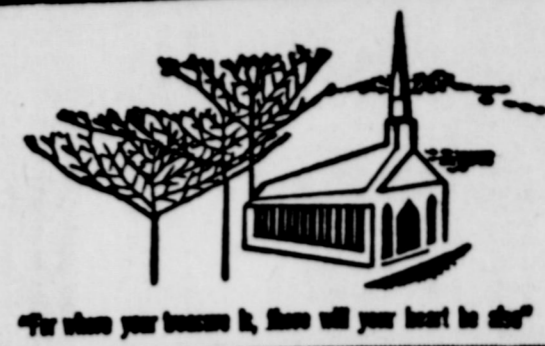

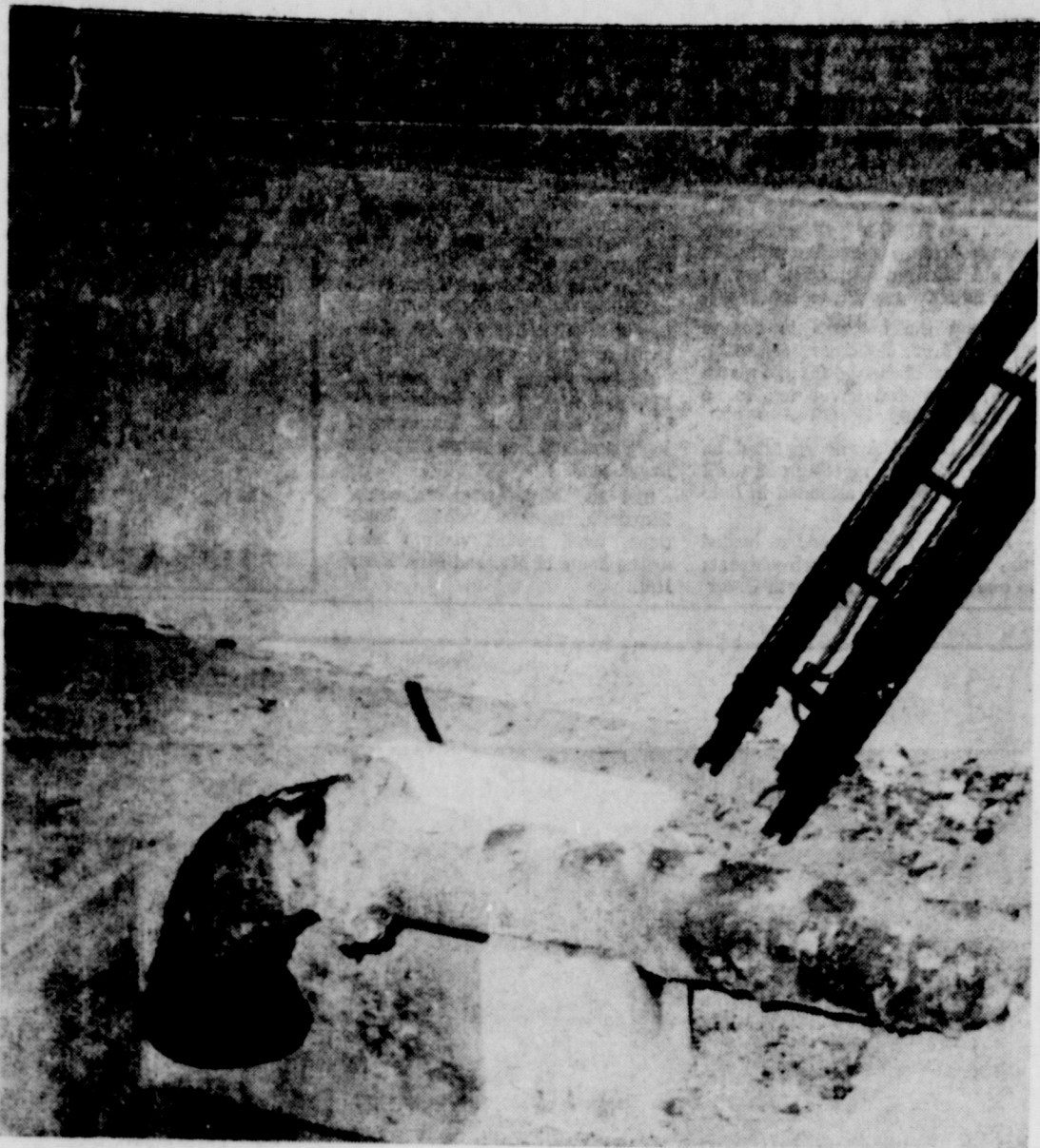

### Orchid culture Garden Club topic

Mrs. Bobby Travis discussed orchid culture at a meeting Monday night of Cochran County Garden Club.

"Orchids are easily grown even from seed as well as bulbs," Mrs. Travis told the group. She showed pictures identifying varieties.

Among named orchids were Cattleya, described as among the most hardy, blooming once a year with six or more blossoms to stem. Lady Slipper blooms twice a year and the Butterfly blooms continuously.

Others named, Swan, a late winter blossoming plant with up to a dozen flowers to stem. The Lady of the Night, unusual fragrance; Tiger, Moth and miniature orchids, "this latter one", Mrs. Travis said, "can be grown on a window sill since it only grows about a foot in height, bearing 15 to 20 blossoms."

"Orchids require high humidity, simple culture. East or West exposure; if a Southern exposure is used, the plant should be protected from direct sunlight. Minimum temperature of 55 to 60 degrees, yellow foliage indicates too much light while dark green would mean too little, a yellowish-green foliage denotes a healthy plant, an orchid blossom will often last as long as six weeks," she concluded.
