Council okays street paving

Seventy-two and one half blocks of Morton streets were approved for paving - and less than one block paved almost four years ago was "released" at a special council meeting Wednesday afternoon.

A. A. Fralin, represented by Jim Walker, attorney, met with the council. Fralin and Walker explained property owned by Fralin on Grant Street was curbed and guttered during the paving program The local druggist explained he

paid cash for the improvements to his property, thinking the entire street would be curbed and guttered at the time. Fralin explained his curbing and guttering was installed according to specifications outlined by the city engineer.

Later, other property owners decided to add curbing and guttering. Fralin, he explained, was told his existing curbing would have to be moved. He also explained he was informed there would be no cost to him, the property owner.

The curbing was moved and most of Grant Street curbed, guttered and paved. About a week ago Fralin was

notified there was a lien against his property, for the cost of the paving done in 1960. Walker asked the city to release

the lien, in as much as Fralin had already paid for the improvements and had been told the city would bear the cost of moving and replacing the curbing when the other blocks were included.

The council voted unanimously to 'release" the lien on the Fralin

A representative of a Lubbock roofing company submitted the bid to treat the storage tank east of City Hall. The roofing representative explained the tank was filled with "tiny hairline cracks" and required a complete relining. One councilman remarked, "\$6,-500 is quite a bit for a little dab

The council decided to solicit additional bids on the repairs to the
