All That Glitters Is Not Gold Research at the University of Iowa has shown that there was no difference in the stability, or keeping quality, of Vitamin C, in real orange juice and instant orange-flavored drinks containing synthetic vitamin C. It was emphasized that storage in covered glass or plastic containers permits little loss of ascorbic acid due to oxidation.

Orange juice, however, contains significant amounts of the important nutrient, potassium, while the synthetic orange-drinks do not. The consumer should be aware of what she is buying and knows that all that says "orange" is not real orange juice and may not have the same nutritional value as orange juice.

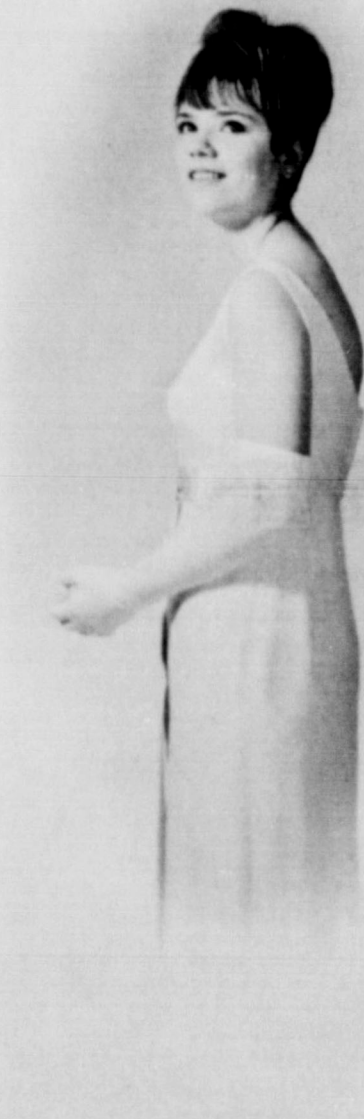

The Morton Indians didn't have all of their offensive "hoses," but the Friona Chiefs were hale and hearty here last Friday. The result was a 26-0 victory for Friona the second win in as many tries for the Chiefs.

Star halfback Donnie Harvey, who was Morton's leading rusher and scored their touchdown in the 12-8 loss to Friona last season, watched the game from the pressbox, due to a knee injury which has kept him out of action so far this season.

Friona, meanwhile, got stellar performances from two backfield men, Larry Graves and Tony Perea, who between them accounted for 272 yards on offense, including 206 yards rushing and five pass receptions for 66 more yards.

Graves scored twice in the second quarter to spark the Chiefs to a 13-0 halftime lead, and Perea sparkled in the second half, with a kickoff return for a touchdown and a 43-yard scoring jaunt from scrimmage.

By winning, Friona trimmed Morton's lead in the all-time series between the two schools to 6-5. Coach Don Light has never lost to Morton and now is 3-0 personally against the Indians.

The second time Friona had the ball, the team drove 84 yards to score, in a drive that started in the first quarter and reached paydirt in the second stanza. Morton's punt had set the Chiefs back to their own 16-yard line.

The third-down runs by Lowery Harper and Graves kept the drive going. Graves' run, a delayed off-tackle thrust, was good for 14 big yards on a third, and eight situation, on the last play of the opening quarter.

A 15-yard penalty against the visitors helped the drive along, with Graves getting the last 24 yards for the TD, which came with 8:50 left in the half. Sahara Gonzales booted the point for a 7-0 Friona lead.

Friona's defensive strength was tested following the kickoff. Friona held, and on fourth down, Morton punted. Johnny Barker fumbled the kick, and Morton recovered at the Friona 15.

However, the Chieftain line girded up, and took over the ball four plays later, at the same line of scrimmage.

Inspired by the defense showing, the Chieftain offensive machine again drove 84 yards for a score. Graves gained 33 of the steps on three carries, and a Barker to Perea pass clicked for 32 yards to set up the score.

With 1:35 left on the clock, Barker went back to pass. He was rushed, as he was most of the night, but fired a spiral on which Graves made a fine leaping catch at the goal-line. Gonzales' kick was wide for a 13-0 score.

Fans were just settling into their seats following the halftime break when Perea electrified them with a 78-yard kickoff return to boost Fri-

ona's lead. The Chieftain speedster gathered in the kick at his own 22. He played a couple of blocks nicely at about the 40, was in the clear at mid-field, and side-armed the last would-be tackler enroute to the goal-line.

Gonzales kicked true, and it was 20-0.

Morton took the ball and drove to its only penetration under its own steam. Aided by a 15-yard penalty, the Indians drove to the Friona 19, before running out of downs.

Neither team got much of a drive underway the remainder of the quarter.

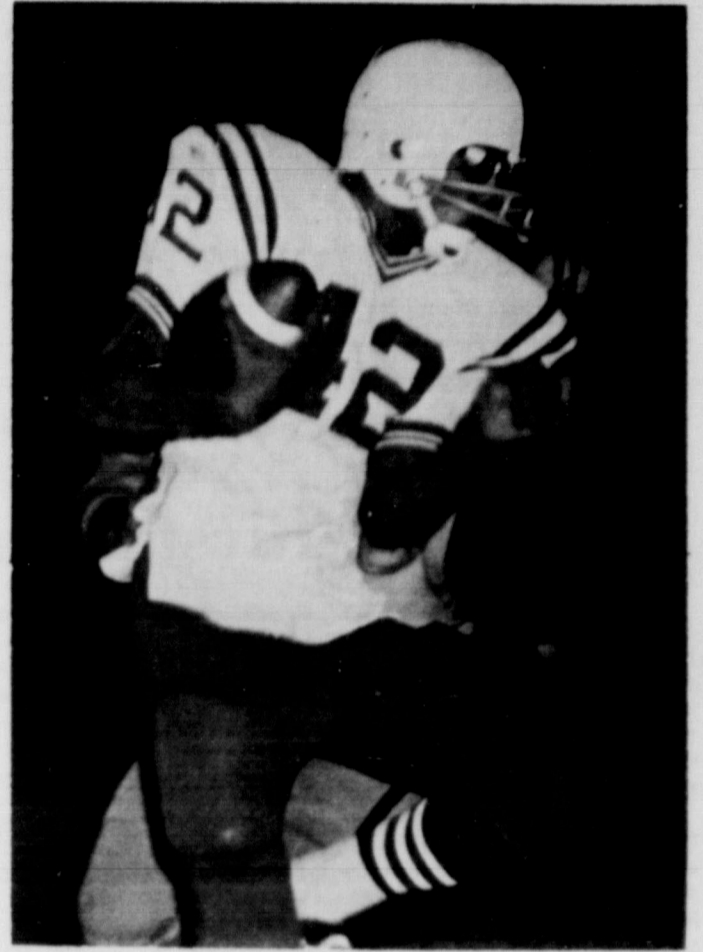
Early in the final stanza, Friona recovered a Morton fumble at the Indian 34, but was unable to capitalize on the break. A fourth-down desperation pass was caught by Perea to keep the drive going, but four plays later the Indians took over.

A few minutes later, Friona was given the ball back when Isidore Cordova intercepted his second pass of the night at the Morton 46.

Johnny Barker kept for three yards, and then called Perea's number. Running with speed and power, the 165-pound junior slanted left, got into the secondary, and beat his pursuers to the red corner flag for the score, a nice 43-yard run. Gonzales' kick was wide but Friona led 26-0 with 2:57 left in the game.

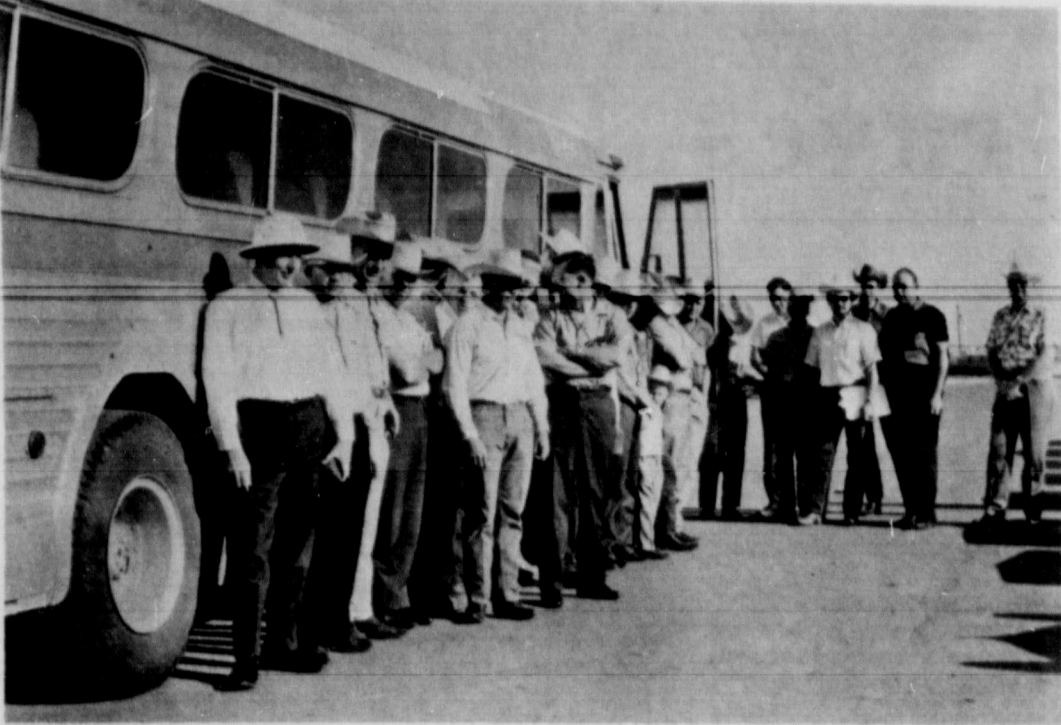

Morton never quit trying, driving to Friona's 25 yard line as the game reached its final stages. The Indians lost the ball on downs, however.

For the second week in a row, it was one player who did the most damage for the visiting team, Charles Joyce, speedy halfback, netted 101 of Morton's total of 113 yards rushing. He was the team's workhorse, carrying 26 times.

The shutout win was the first for Friona since the 13-0 win over Bovina here Sept. 23. It was the first shutout win over Morton since the 1952 team turned the trick 7-0.

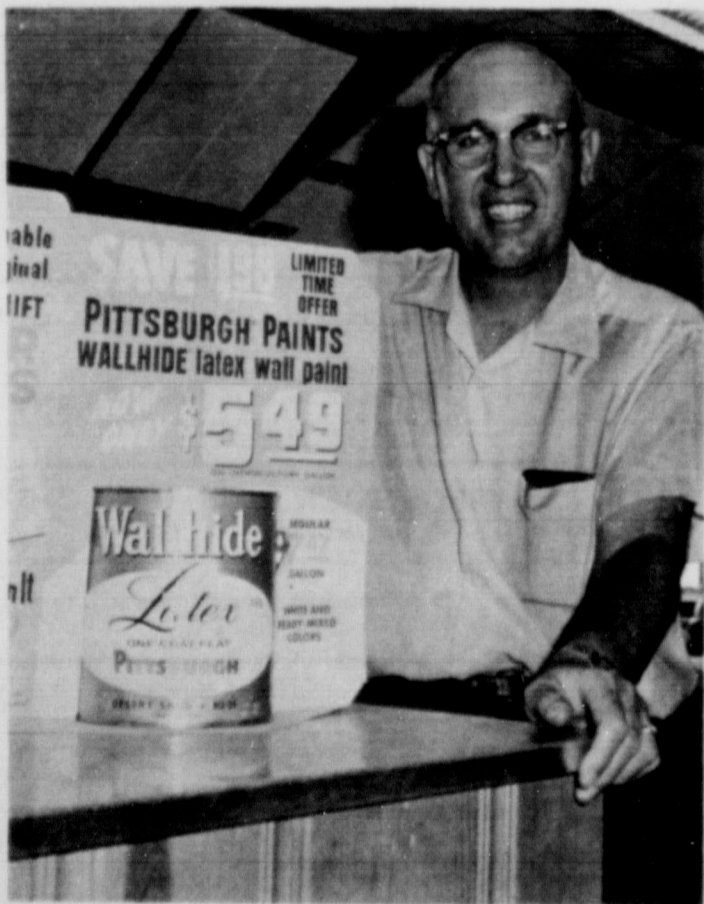

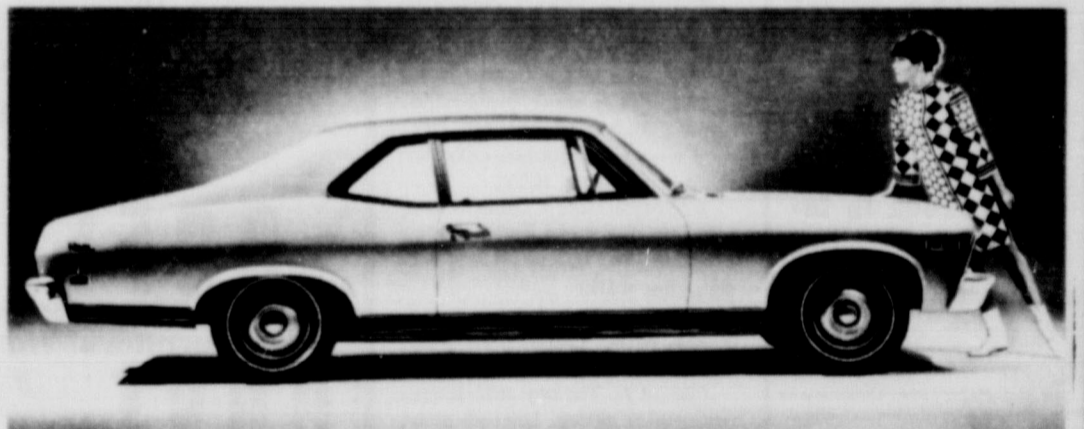
