Other records showed that a total of 11,527,100 gallons of water were pumped during the month, an average of 371,842 gallons per day and up slightly from the previous month.

# Bank Deposits Top

## All-Time Record

Deposits at Friona State Bank hit an alltime high of \$9,771,722.85 as of December 31,1968, it was revealed this week. This was a net gain of 16.7 per cent over the deposit figures of the same time a year ear-

Total assets at the bank stood at \$10. -539,841.96 on December 31. This is a gain of \$1,691,435.58 over the statement of December 30, 1967, and marks the first time for the assets at Friona State Bank to reach the \$10 million mark.

Other figures showed that loans were up from \$5,309,048.18 a year ago to \$7,198,-754.65 this year.

A bank officer stated that several fac tors were responsible for the large figures. For one, it was a good year for cattle, and Frionans are getting more and

more into the cattle business. Also, Friona's agricultural economy is well-diversified, so that although some farmers did not do too well, others did.

Also, it was theorized that the national inflationary trend, which is constantly upward, had something to do with the upward slant in the statement.

Breaking the deposit figure down, it was shown that \$2,316,216.96 of the total was in time and savings deposits. This com pared to \$1,997,801.73 as of the year's end in 1967.

The promising bank report comes on the heels of an announcement last week that building in the city of Friona, as reflected in building permits issued by the city of fice, topped \$1,000,000 for only the sec ond time in the history of the city.



" 'Tis education forms the common mind: Just as the twig is bent the tree's inclined."

(Alexander Pope) For fifty years I have enjoyed the privilege of reading. During this half century plus an endless parade of books, magazines, and newspapers have been presented to my optics. Writers of every description have either burst upon the scene like Fourth of July fireworks or have arisen as quietly

as a summer moon. The products of their labors have in some instances been heralded as the fruits of genius and remain today as in spring, thrilling, educational or humorous parts of our literature. In other instances they and their brainchildren were found to be unworthy and are no longer around to clutter the literary

landscape. In either case it must be remembered that the majority of writers are highly skilled professionals, trained to influence the thinking processes of the reader.

They are not necessarily authorities concerning the subjects they write about; and that is where Mr. Average Reader can ob-

tain a headful of wrong impressions. I am not referring to pornography and the new rash of "underground" newspapers.

My complaint is against the publishers of national magazines who in order to increase circulation will print biased articles and lurid photographs; anything that will justify a shocking headline and keep the pot of confusion boiling.

And this they do in the guise of humanitarianism!

It is a saddening experience to witness the death of a great newspaper or a good magazine -- but it is far more discouraging to watch over the years as a good publication becomes cheap and dawdling.

Fortunately not all the popular periodicals are falling into this pattern -- but you had better start taking a close look at the contents before you throw it down in the midst of your family.

Perhaps a little "brainwashing" goes along in our modern society -- but the least we can do is start the job with clean





### **Article Encourages Local Newspaper Advertising**

sue of Farm and Power Equipment magazine in St. Louis encourages manufacturers and suppliers to advertise in local newspapers.

The article, written by J.W. Beatty, notes that in most communities "your local newspaper advertising does about the most effective job. . " of selling and "usually produces more prospects per dollar invested than any other advertising medium."

Beatty adds that farmers read the local newspaper at their leisure time.

"Since newspapers are picked up several times during their stay in the farm home," Beatty continues, "often you triple your chances of getting advertising message

"Newspapers create vital local intimacy. . . a favorable attitude and effectively carry your sales story into the homes

of potential customers. . .", Beatty says in the article.

The article suggest that dealers plan advertising on a regular basis and use pictures of local farmers in their ads.

"By selling farmers in your area through newspaper advertising, there is an implicit endorsement of the lines you

The article concluded that dealers should make hometown newspaper advertising "an important part of your selling pro-gram."







He planted twin 10-inch rows on 40-inch beds at a seeding rate of nine pounds per acre, His fertilizer application included 220 pounds of nitrogen and 108 pounds of phosphate. Weeds were controlled with Propazine.

Experts say the old method-"one car length for every 10 m.p.h."—is inadequate, because it does not provide enough room to stop at highway speeds. Also, it is difficult to accurately judge straight-ahead distance in terms of "car lengths"

The new "timed interval" works at any speed. It's based on the distance cars travel in a given length of time. A car traveling 40 m.p.h. covers 120 feet in two seconds. At 60 m.p.h. it covers 180 feet in two seconds. Each distance is what the ex-perts recommend for safe folwing distance at that particu-

second interval from the car ahead he will be following safely. Here's how you can use the "timed interval": (1) Notice the car ahead as it reaches some fixed object (a sign, tree, etc.) on the roadside. (2) At that moment, count at a medium pace —1,000 and 1, 1,000 and 2, etc., until your vehicle reaches the object. (Each count approximates a second.) If your vehicle passes the object before the too closely. Ideally, at the count of two your car should reach the object. 



Did you know that Texas spends \$5,700 to educate each citizen for 12 years in its public schools? In Friona alone that is nearly \$8,000,000 based on a school enrollment of 1,400 students for 12 years. This figure of \$5,700 dollars is used for children in very poor counties as well as those who live in counties with a lot of taxable assets. After investing \$5,700 in each citizen the state then spends \$62 during the next 50 years to help him fully utilize and extend this

Coffee, hot spiced tea and Texas city and county governments spend an average of \$1.24 for each person during a year on public library service. Many states spend three or four times this amount. Ten per cent of the people who live in Texas have no library service. Texas libraries would have to add more than one and a half MILLION books to have just one book for each person that lives in this state.

After a long period of neglect and delay each person in Friona and in the state has an opportunity to change this sitnation. A very large effort is being made to place before the legislature the "TEXAS LI-BR ARY SYSTEMS ACT." It is impossible to make any change without first making a big effort to inform people of the need for change and then inspiring them to WRITE THEIR REP-RESENTATIVE.

It is impossible for Friona to have a library as big as the Bivins Library in Amarillo or as large and comprehensive as the library on the campus of Texas Tech or The University of Texas. Indeed it is somewhat foolish to have several hundred very large libararies. It is a much better use of material and money to have the large libraries help the medium sized libraries and they in turn to help the smaller libraries. None of the state libraries have a lot of extra monev and that is where state aid will come in. This proposed state aid is not just a giveaway. It comes in the form of grants.

By using the Major Resource Libraries and by giving them operation grants they will be able to provide special services to Texas Library Systems members. Incentive grants will encourage libraries to join together into larger units in order to meet requirements for System membership. Establishment grants will help establish libraries which qualify for membership in communities without library service. Equalization grants will help libraries in tax-poor communities to qualify for membership. State aid will be awarded on a matching basis, that is, the state will match the money which a community will raise. This will provide local

incentive and support. Being a member of the Texas Library System can mean many things to a small library such as the Friona Public Library. Reference materials and information can be obtained at our library from any of 10 large libraries or hundreds of medium sized libraries in the state. In effect it will increase the size of our library more than 1,000 times. We would also be eligible to have specialists train and advise local library workers and volunteers. ### Auxiliary Presents Furniture


The Friona Hospital Auxiliary presented Parmer County Community Hospital with new furniture for the hospital's two maternity rooms this week.

### Sewing For The Bazaar?

Every woman needs a little something to carry a lot of things in, and a roomy cotton

tote bag is the answer.

Make one for yourself to find out how easy it is, and then stitch up several for Christmas gifts or bazaar

All it takes is a yard-length of any bright, colorful cotton fabric; some cotton cording for a drawstring; and bits of fringe, fabric scraps, and buttons for trimming.

Cut a 15x36 rectangle for the bag. Fold fabric in half, right sides together, and seam on each side. To give the bag a squared-off base, make an inverted tuck at the bottom. Do this by turning the bag inside out, folding the bottom up one inch, and stitching in

Make a casing for the drawstring by turning the open end of the bag under about two inches and hemming. Then

tangled in a submarine cable.

make another row of stitching an inch higher to slip the cord through.

There are dozens of ways to decorate the carry-all bags. For example, add a simple flower design to a bright yellow cotton duck bag by appliquing on red petals and green leaves cut from fabric scraps. Sew on a big white button for the flower center.

Or applique the bag with a design appropriate to its use. Mark a shoe tote, for instance, with a shoe applique cut from contrasting cloth. Appliques are easy to add with a zigzag machine stitch.

On printed cotton totes, keep trims simple. Circle the bag with a single row of thick cotton fringe, flat braid, or jumbo rick-rack

Choose washable cotton trims so the bag can be popped into the washer with other household cottons to keep it looking fresh and bright.
