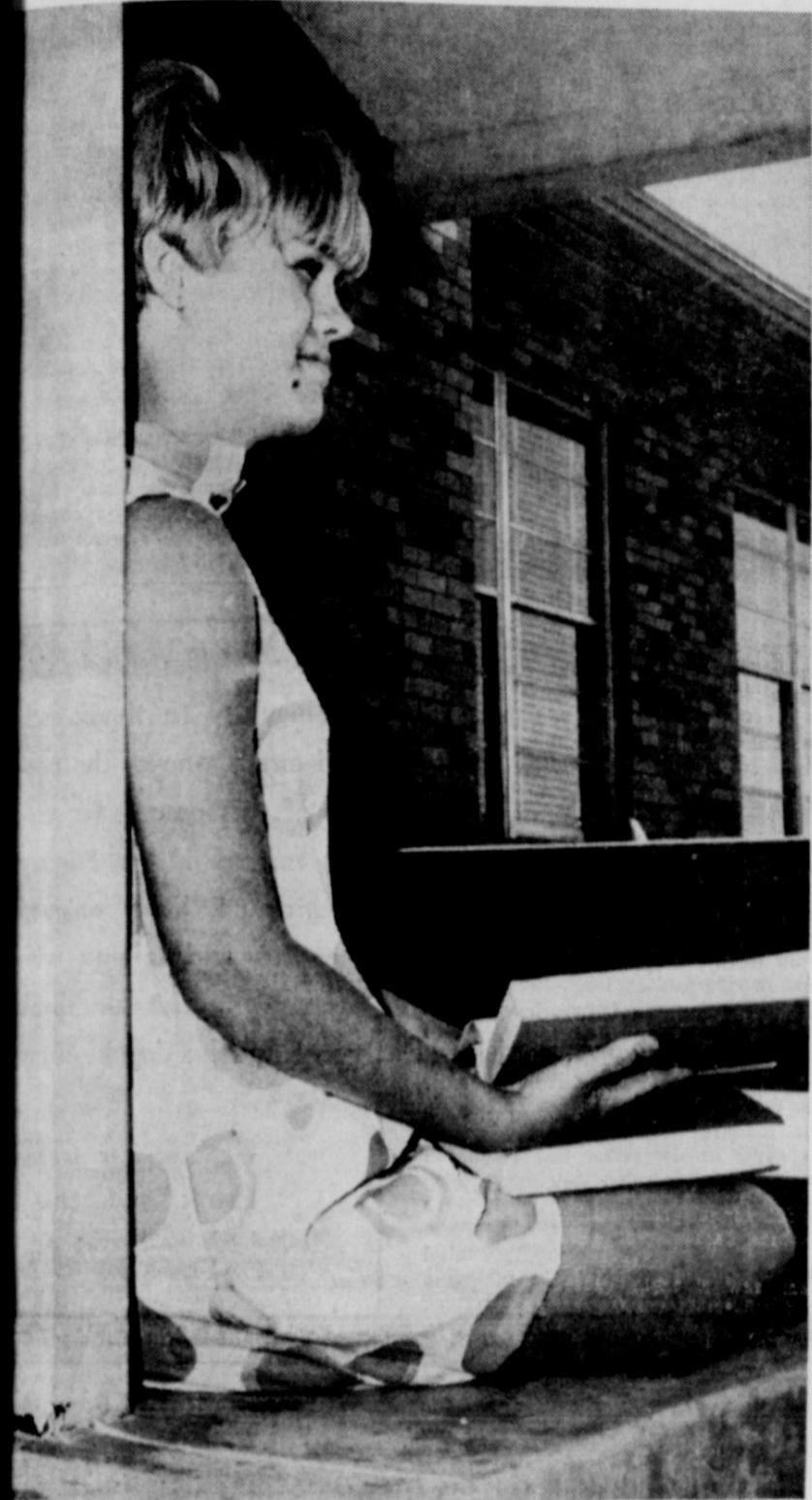

Kessler, Sublett lead in Junior Salesman Contest

With the Morton Tribune Junior Salesman Contest moving into its last week, Jack Sublett and David Kessler were in a virtual tie for the first place prize of a personal television set, each with over 87,000 points.

Because of the closeness of the contest and the manner in which the new subscriptions are coming in the contest has been extended one week, with Saturday May 18 now being the final day for the contestants to get their points in a qualify for the many prizes being offered.

As of Tuesday afternoon David Kessler was the contest leader with a total of 87,800 points. Jack Sublett, who has led most of the way is only 200 points behind with a total of 87,600 points. In third place is Becky Goodman with 23,100 points.

Hancock wins sheriff's contest; run-off set for commissioners

Cochran County voters, turning out a heavy vote returned County Sheriff Hazel Hancock to office for another four years and gave the nod to incumbent Leonard Groves in the tax assessor-collector race.

The only local races not decided in the Saturday primary were the two positions for County Commissioner where incumbent Leonard Coleman was pitted against four challengers for Precinct 1 and in Precinct 3 where Harral Rawls was opposed by two hopefuls.

Coleman polled 328 votes in the Precinct 1 race to lead the balloting, but failed to get a majority vote and will face H. L. Coon in the June 1 primary run-off. Coon received 251 votes, Weldon Newsom was third with 194 while L. T. "Short" Lemons had 180 ballots and Buddy Franks picked up 91.

In the race for commissioner of precinct 3 Harral Rawls, the incumbent polled 90 ballots but will face a run off with M. C. "Lefty" Hall, who picked up 54 votes. The third candidate, Benton C. Davis had 44 votes. In the only other contested

race, Tax Assessor-Collector Leonard Groves defeated former tax collector, Mrs. Otha Denny by a 1093 to 517 count. A breakdown in the sheriff's race showed Hancock with 888 votes to 558 for Frank Davidson and 164 for Don Lamar.

In other races on the ballot voters gave the nod to Preston Smith as their choice for governor of the state by a 2 to 1 count over Waggoner Carr. Smith had 964 votes compared to 322 for Carr.

The three propositions on the ballot were also defeated by county voters as they stated their opposition to the liquor-by-the-drink proposal, 999 to 386, pari-mutuel wagering 945 to 443 and price fixing for milk 1075 to 251.

With all of the primary action in the county now over the attention will switch to the June 1 run-off election when voters will have an opportunity to cast ballots for Governor, and the court of civil appeals. In the governor's race it will be Preston Smith facing Don Yarborough and in the Court of Civil Appeals race it will

TB Mobile Unit is due in Morton Monday

The Christmas Seal Mobile Detection Unit of the West Texas Tuberculosis Association will be in Morton on Monday, May 13, 1968. The Unit will be located at the Doss Thirtway Food Store parking lot between the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. The X-ray Unit is being sponsored by the Morton Area Chamber of Commerce as a community health project. Mr. Leon Kessler is in charge of arrangements.

Many other abnormalities besides TB

are detected by this means. On the last trip to Morton, a total of 367 X-rays were taken. One TB suspect, one cardiovascular abnormality and 17 other chest problems were found. There is a charge of \$1.00 which pays for the film and the developing. The West Texas Tuberculosis Association bears the cost of having the film read and reported to each one in the survey.

A post card is mailed to those having a normal chest film. The ones who have an abnormal reading are notified by a first-class letter which urges them to contact their private physician or the local health officer for further information and examination.

Everyone is urged to keep the card with the number of their X-ray film and the date taken. These films are stored at the office of the Association and can be made available to physicians on request. An old film can be valuable for comparison purposes if some trouble develops in later years. Children under 12 years of age are too small to be X-rayed on this type unit, but every adult is urged to take advantage of this opportunity.

Jaycees contract for Britches Rodeo stock

Members of the Morton Jaycees, meeting Tuesday night, contracted Mounce Stephenson, of Levelland to provide the stock for the third annual Little Britches Rodeo, to be held May 31 and June 1.

Bill Gray, who made the announcement said that the Jaycees voted to make a few changes in the previously announced rules, changing the age for queen and contestants to 0 to 17.

Gray said the queen contest would open Friday May 10 and continue through until 5 p.m. May 31. Any young lady interested in participating in the queen contest can contact the Jaycees and arrangements for a sponsor will be made.

Gray said that there will be a parade at 5 May 1 just prior to the opening performance of the rodeo. Deadline for contestants to enter the events will be noon Friday May 31.

Cards, Cubs take LL baseball openers

The Cards and Cubs got the infant Morton Little League season off on the right foot Monday night as they took wins over their opponents.

In the first game of the new season it was the Cards downing the Colts by a 6 to 5 count, with Jerry Silhan getting credit for the win.

The Cards jumped off to a fast start scoring three runs in the first inning and holding off a late surge by the Cubs who came back with three in the third inning and single runs in the fourth and fifth to pull close. Chuck Duper, who yielded 11 hits was tagged with the loss.

In the night cap the Cubs thumped the Giants 16-0 as Jimmy Hargis shut out the Giants on one hit, as his team mates combined 15 hits to score 16 runs.

The most productive inning for the Cubs was the first when they pushed across 11 tallies to jump ahead.

In action Tuesday night it was the Pirates taking the measure of the Sox by

a 12-1 count as winning pitcher Mike Gilliam limited the Sox batters to only two hits. The Pirates collected 7 hits off loser James Smtker.

In the second game Tuesday night the Cubs gave a repeat performance of the power as they picked up their second straight win. Larry Thompson limited the Colts to six hits while he led the Cub attack with three hits including the first home run of the season.

The Cubs tagged losing hurler Ronny Bedwell with 16 hits, including the round-tripper by Thompson.

Games tonight pits the Giants vs. Pirates and Sox vs. Cards.

Morton merchants to sponsor city-wide bingo promotion

Leon Kessler, manager of the Morton Area Chamber of Commerce, announced Wednesday morning that the merchants of the city, in cooperation with the Chamber of Commerce would sponsor a daily "Radio Bingo" promotion, beginning Monday May 13.

Bill Gray chairman of the retail promotion committee of the chamber and Orville Tilger, president of the Chamber said the promotion is being sponsored by members of the chamber who are interested in promoting Morton as a trade center and as an appreciation for the continued patronage of the customers.

The radio show, which will feature a daily cash prize of at least \$10.00 will be aired Monday through Friday at 5:45 p.m. over KRAN radio, with players playing blackout bingo on cards secured from participating merchants.

In the event there is no winner on any given day the prize money will be added to the next days' game and will continue to be added until there is a winner.

Outstanding rating to band at festival

The Morton High School band moved one step closer to permanent possession of the Enid Oklahoma Tri-State Band Festival traveling plaque last week as the band under the direction of John Stocktake took its second successive outstanding rating.

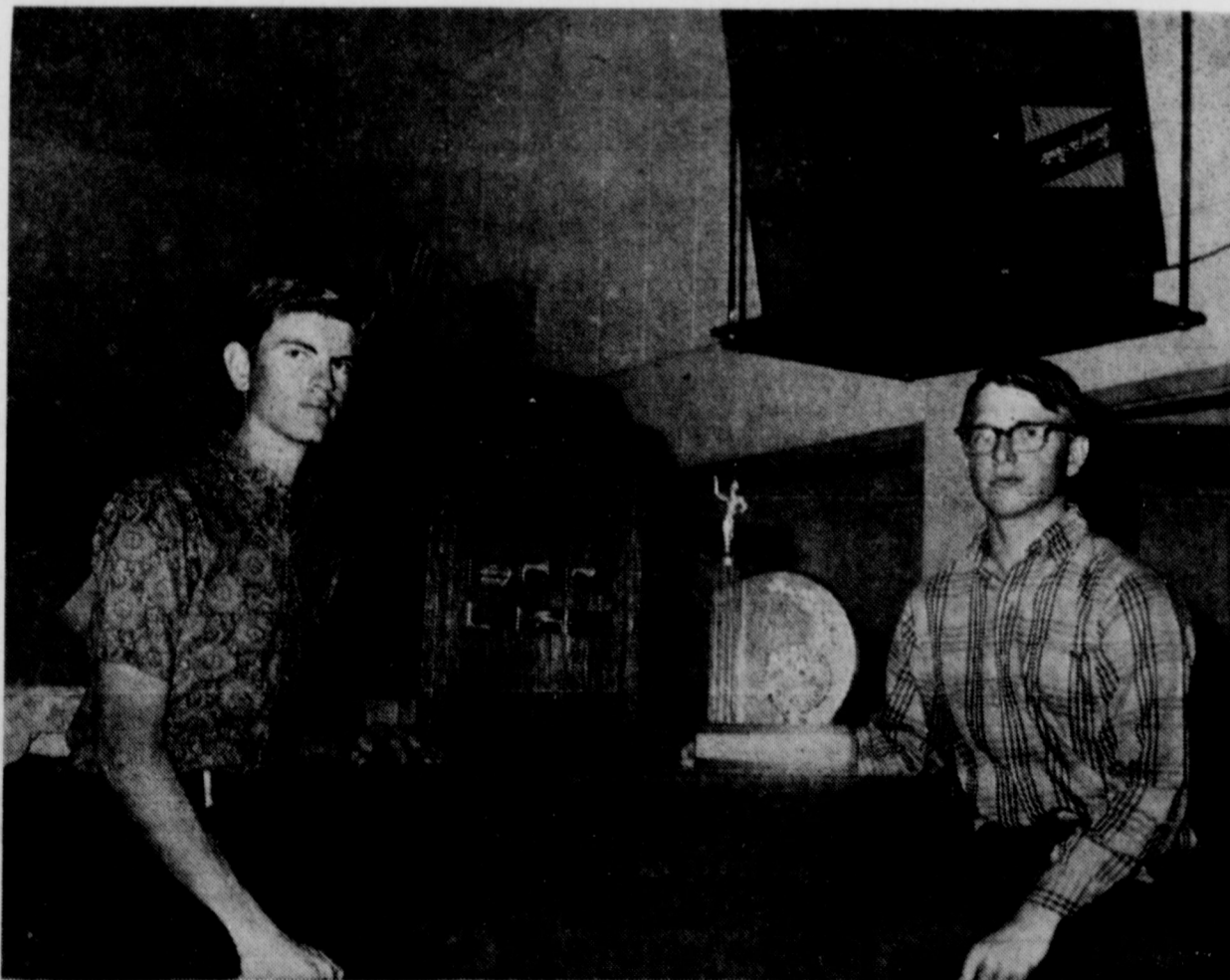
Participating in one class higher than they should have been the band took first place in the marching competition and then took a first place in the concert contest to gain the coveted plaque.

With over 14,000 bandmen from five states participating in the musical events the MHS band was thrown into the CCC division, which is for schools with larger enrollments than Morton, and still copped the top prize.

The reason for the higher classification, according to band master Stockdale stems from last year, when the records were mixed up and Morton participated in the high class, the mix-up made it necessary that Morton continue to compete with the larger schools, at least until a decision is reached on the permanent possession of the trophy.

To gain the plaque on a permanent basis a school must win the outstanding rating three times. Morton has now only to win it one more time before it finds a place in the trophy case of the school.

Judges for the contest were Raymond Dvorak, University of Wisconsin, Dr. Marx Pales, University of Arkansas and Dr. Nelson Patrick, University of Texas.

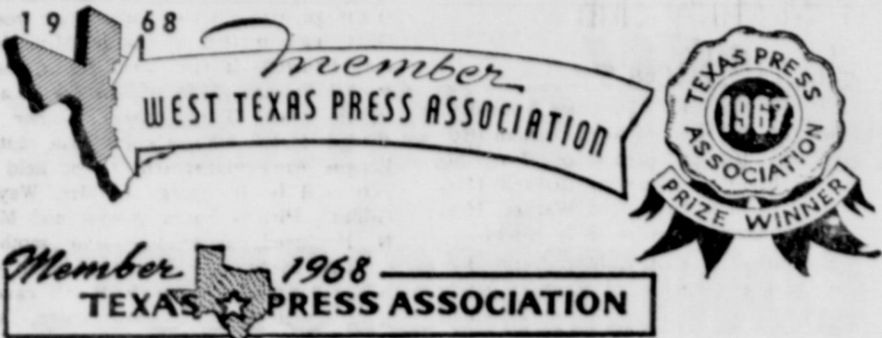

1936 Study Club program on drugs held May 1

The 1936 Study Club met in the home of Mrs. Glenn Thompson on Wednesday, May 1.

Mrs. Joe Gipson presided over a short business meeting. The next regular meeting of the club was changed to 4 p.m. Wednesday, May 15. The club will meet at that time in the home of Mrs. Neal Rose for the installation of officers of next year.

Mrs. Harold Reynolds gave an interesting and informative program on "Drugs—Miracle or Menace". In reviewing the history of the use of drugs she told of the evidence of their use found in Chinese writing of fifteen centuries before Christ. They were widely used before the time of Columbus and the American Indian had drugs made of cactus and varieties of mushrooms. In modern times, drugs are more readily available so there has been an upsurge in their abuse.

The most alarming, the newest and most powerful is the drug known as LSD. It was discovered in 1938 by a Swiss chemist seeking a treatment for migraine. At first, its hallucinative property was thought to be promising but it did not prove so. Some drugs are good if used properly but there is nothing LSD is good for. Among its advocations are young people who are naturally curious and who have the idea that its use helps them to understand themselves and makes them more creative. Both ideas have been proven false. LSD may come in the form of a small white pill, a liquid, or a powder and one pound of it in the water supply of New York City would be sufficient to incapacitate the eight million inhabitants. The use of the drug causes a wide variance of behavior but most users experience the same pattern—first apathetic then inarticulate and depressed. The depression turns to either elation or anxiety but always to a state when the user is divorced from reality; not knowing such facts as that fire burns!

It has been proven in experimental medicine that LSD can damage chromosomes and prove a real threat to a developing child or taken during pregnancy. Its psychological effects are all bad in that it causes distorted sensations leading to panic or depression that results in suicides or homicides. Any abnormality in personality is accentuated and may recur as late as 18 months after use of the drug.

Present legislation seeking to control the use of LSD needs to be re-worked and the educational program concerning

its vastly increased. Those people who have quit using the drug report it was because of the knowledge of its danger, not from fear of the law nor moralization.

In closing, Mrs. Reynolds spoke of the more optimistic discoveries in the field of drugs; the progress made in their use for relief of pain, hypertension, and epilepsy. There are new drugs to relieve pain that do not cause addiction — a great step forward in the medical field.

Drugs are emerging as the prime of learning and there is no doubt that in years there will be drugs that can enhance learning and help memory.

Twelve of the world's leading biochemists took part in a seminar recently on the subject of the chemistry of learning and will publish its findings this year.

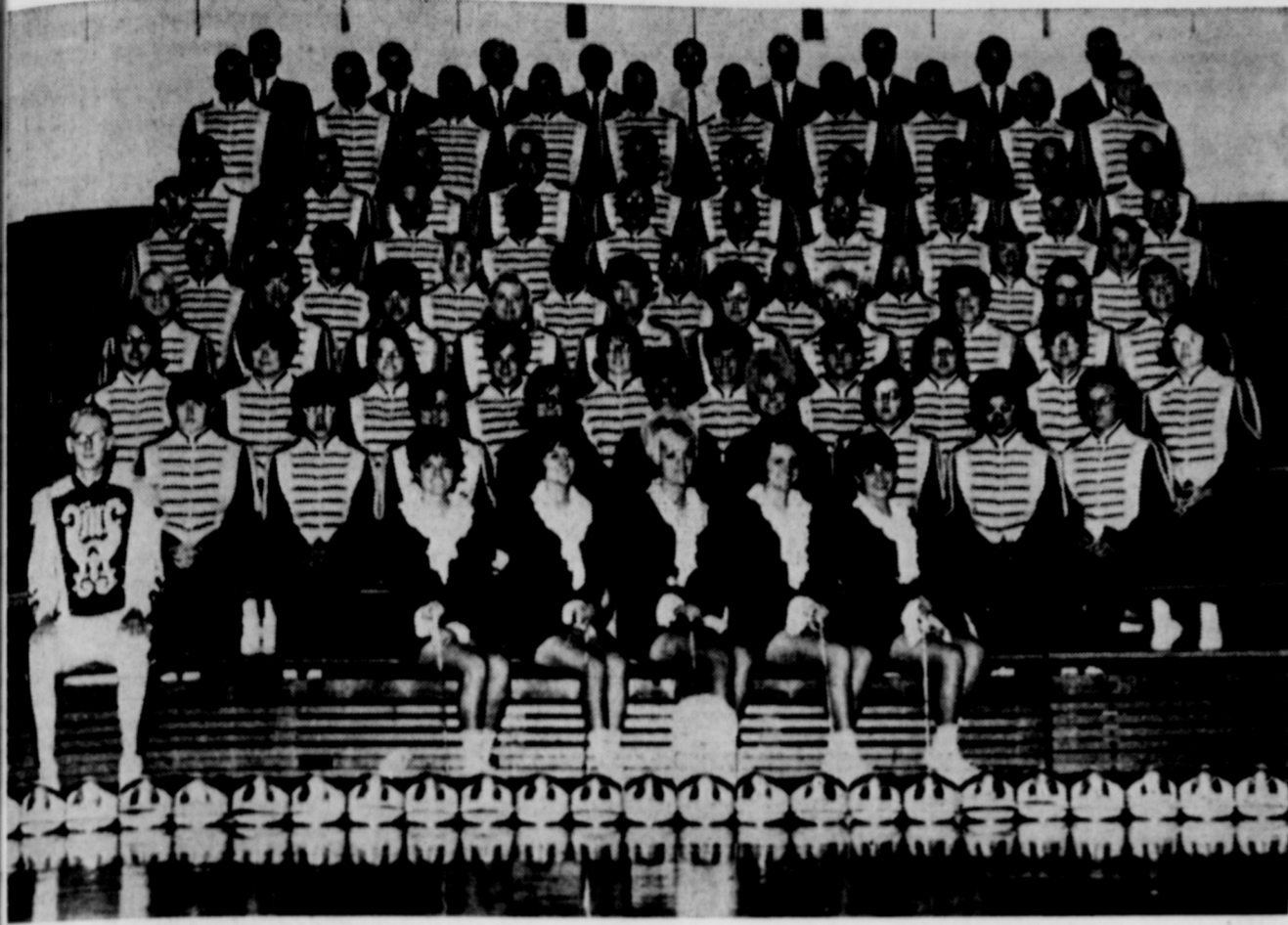

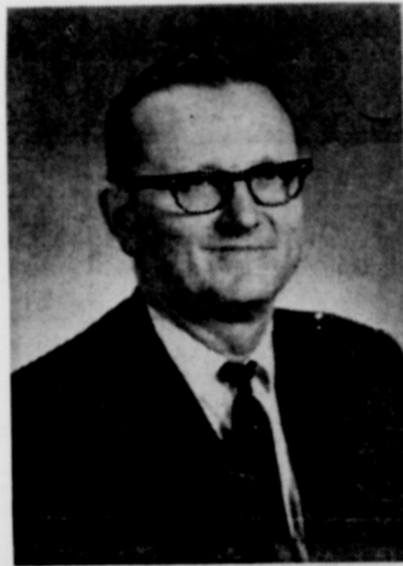
Republican voters gave a favorite son designation to Senator John Tower and he will represent the state in the Republican convention.

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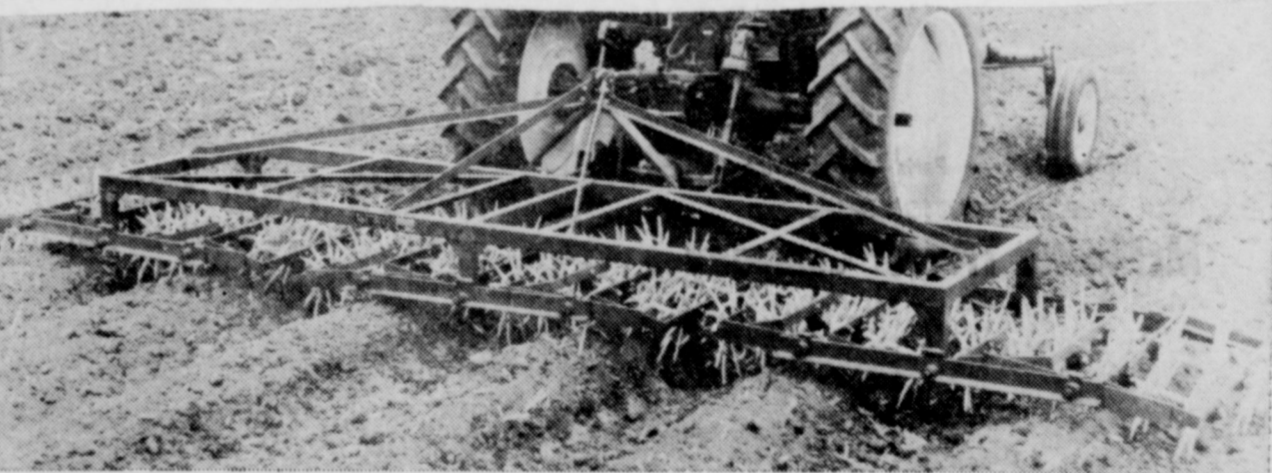

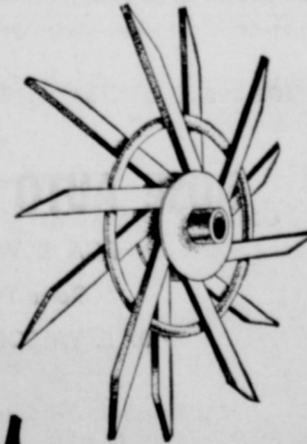

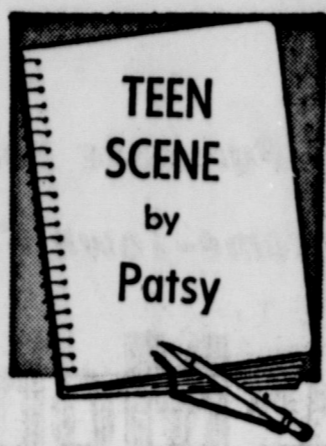
