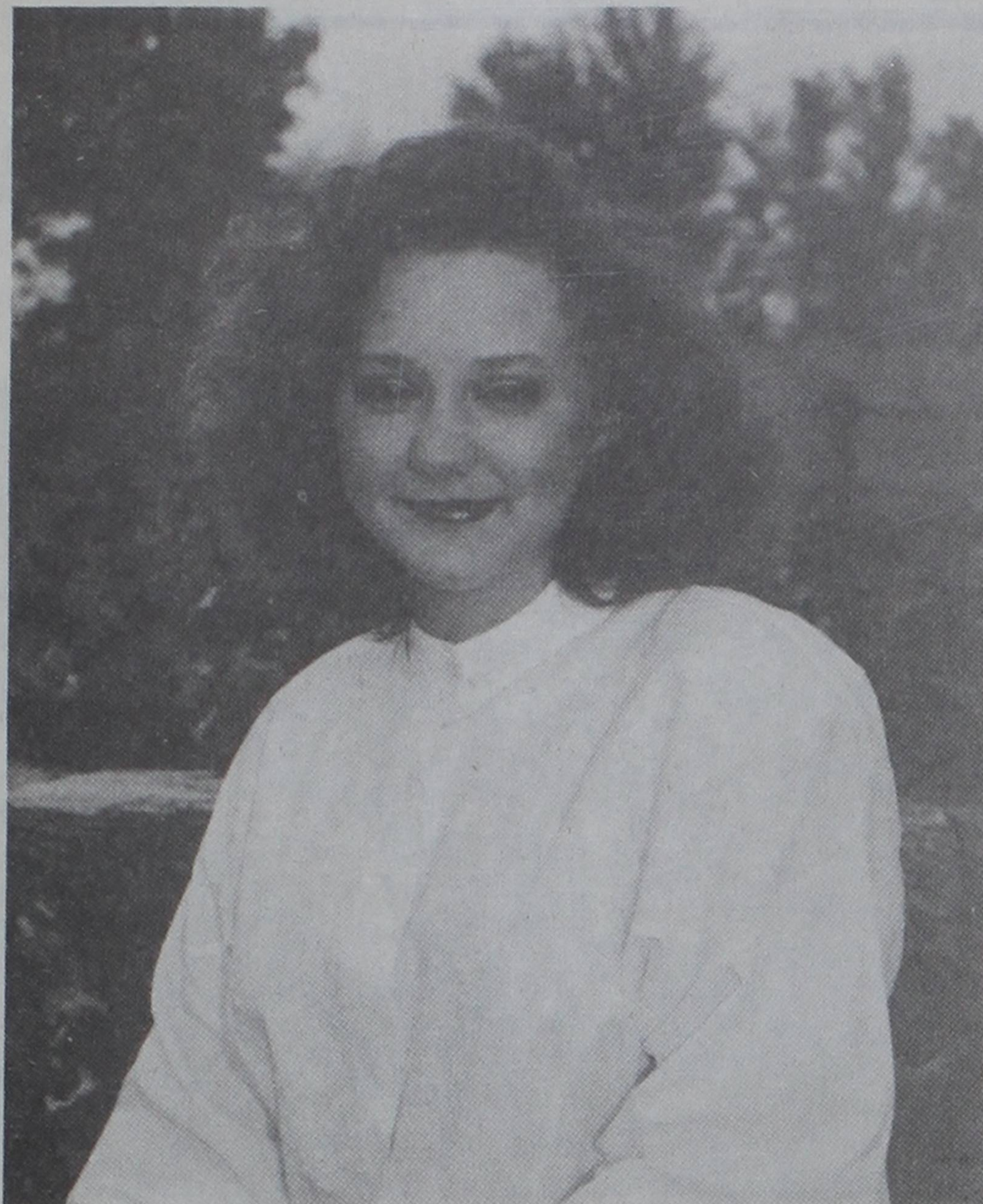

Module XXII: America is Back!
Some years ago, a publisher started a small newspaper. His plan was to fill the front page with only positive news. Unfortunately, he never accomplished his dream—I suppose too many readers wanted negatives. Although we live in the most productive, innovative nation in the world, we spend a lot of time complaining about how bad things are.

On this Independence Day, 1989, let's look at some of the positive things about our nation that we often overlook.

In 1988, earnings for Standard & Poor's 500 were up more than 35 per cent over 1987 and are expected to rise again this year. Dividends in 1988 grew about ten per cent. Interest rates, now in the ten per cent range, are down from 18 to 19 per cent in the early 1980s.

Inflation hit alarming highs in 1980 when the Consumer Price Index rose to 13.6 per cent. We now look at a reasonable inflation rate of four per cent to five per cent, while real gross business and personal investment have risen more than 30 per cent since 1981.

The federal budget deficit, which we hear so much about, was \$150 billion in fiscal year 1988,

down from \$215 billion in 1985. We saw a trade deficit in 1988 to shrink to roughly \$140 billion, down from \$170 billion the previous year. The price of oil has stabilized at about \$16 a barrel, down from nearly \$34 in early 1981.

The current unemployment rate, which is between five per cent and six per cent, is the lowest since 1974, and in the past decade, more than 16 million new jobs have been created. That's because industrial America is on the rebound.

American industry is running at more than 80 per cent capacity utilization, a level not seen since March 1980. The "Rust Belt" has become the site of economic revitalization. The steel industry, once the favorite target of foreign imports, meets its challenge by cutting operating costs 35 per cent and boosting labor productivity 38 per cent since 1982.

America's competitiveness has been renewed. The results show in the export markets that have led to a healthy upswing in nearly every sector of manufacturing.

When you take time to read all the news, it's clear that the United States is a great place to live. Happy birthday, America!

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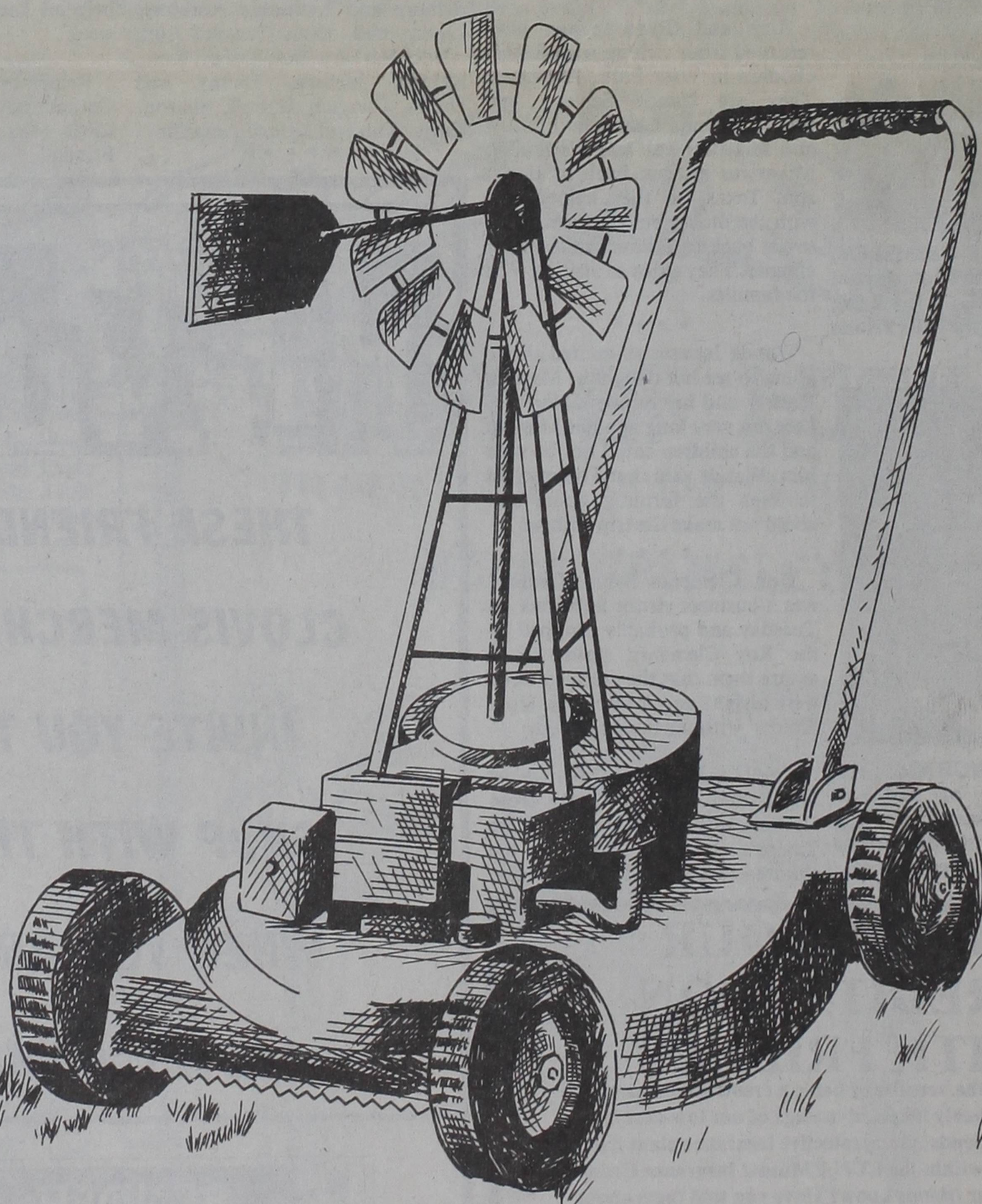

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Accidental Discovery May End Obesity

WASHINGTON - Obesity may be controlled naturally with a new type of pill, discovered by accident, a research scientist confirmed recently.

In studies, scientists noted an unusual side effect. Patients receiving an ingredient in what is now being called FS-1 all lost weight, while body weight in control groups remained constant.

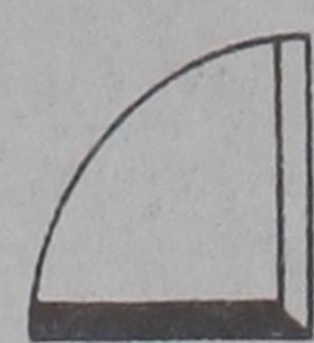

Funeral services were held Saturday, August 12 in Hereford for Dr. L.B. Barnett of Fabens.

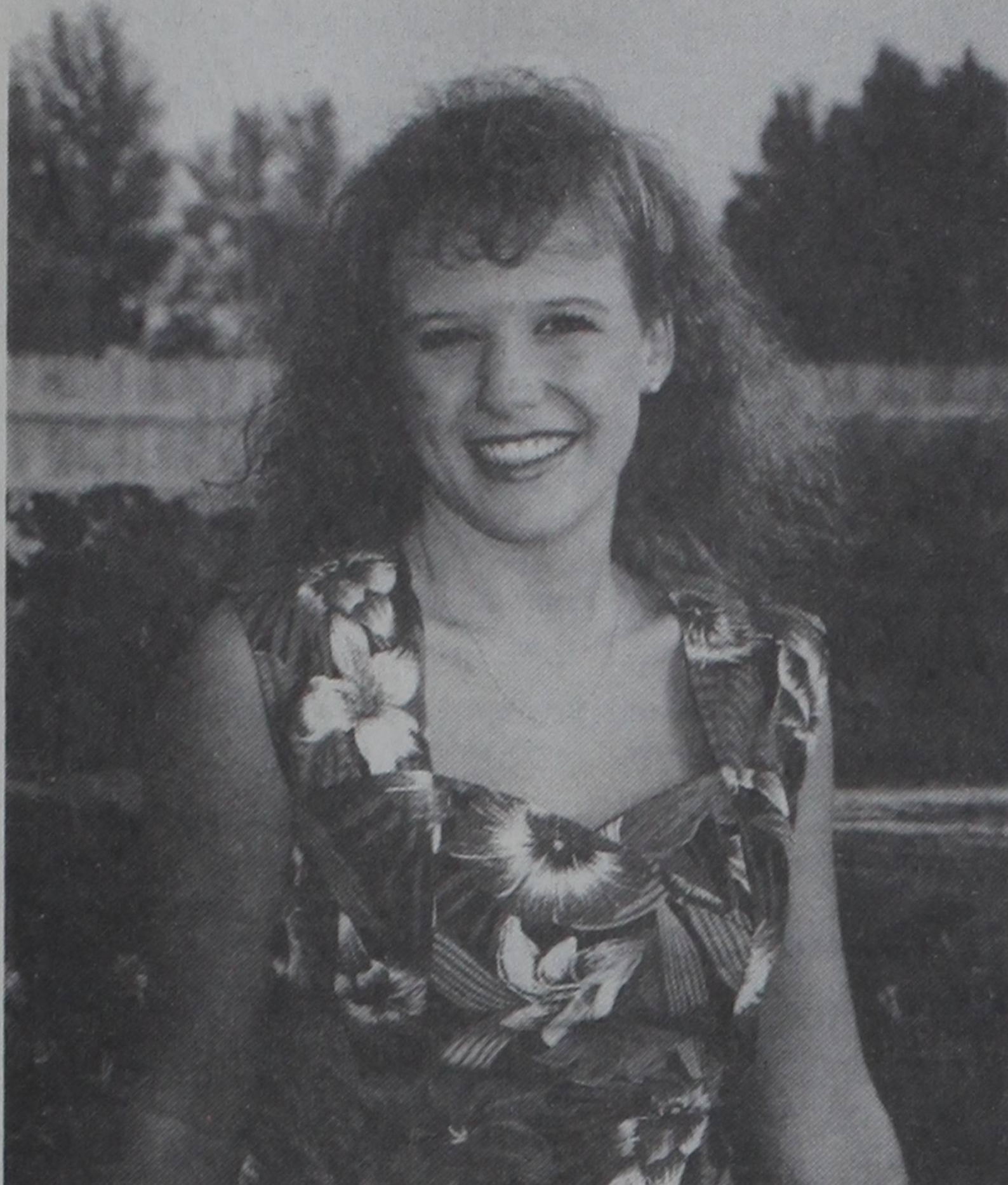
Dr. Barnett died Wednesday, August 9 at his home following a lengthy illness.

Dr. Ron Cook, pastor of First Baptist Church, officiated. Burial was in West Park Cemetery.

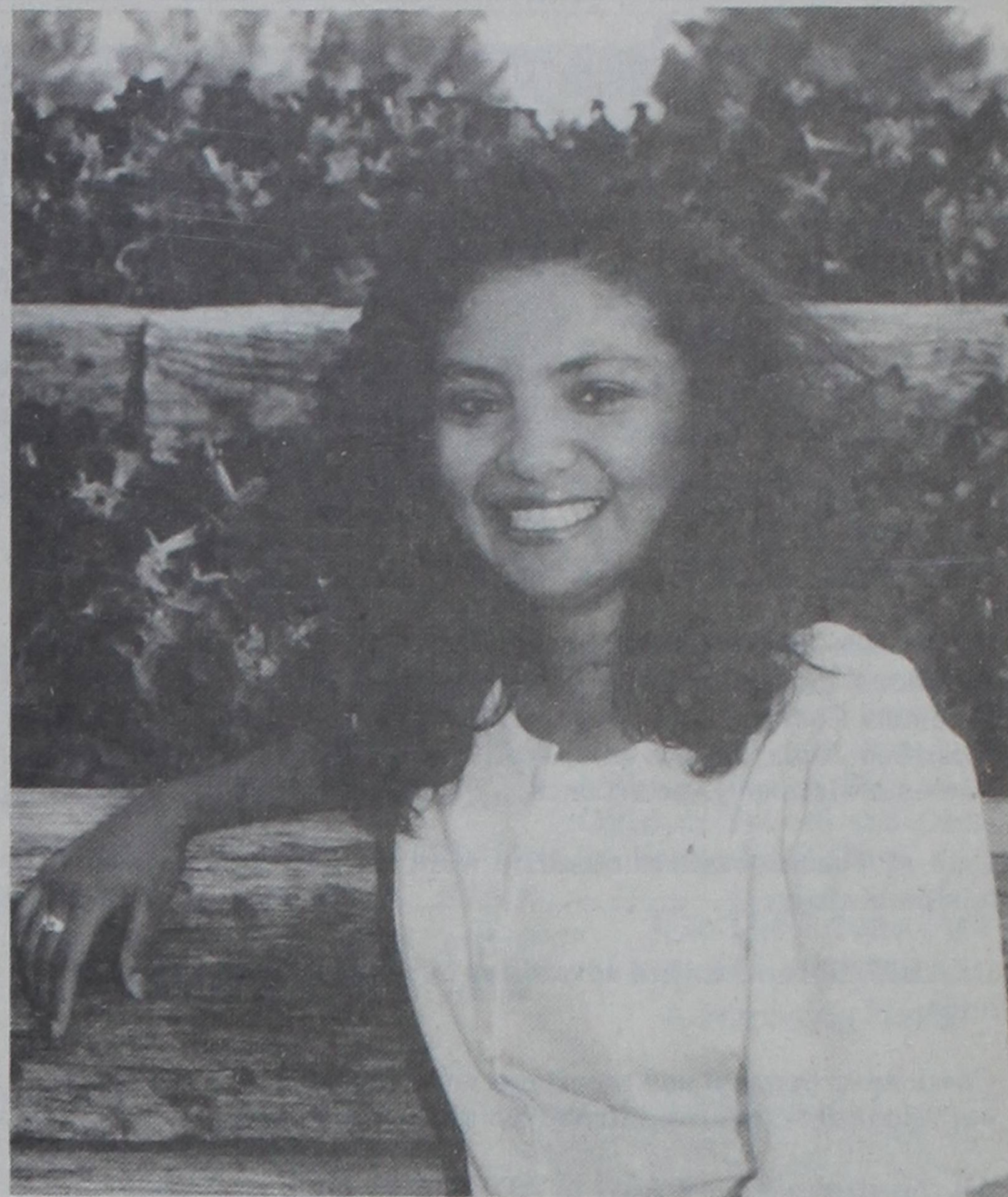

Board Okays Shorts For Young Students

The Friona School Board made a policy change at its regular meeting Tuesday, August 8, to allow students in primary and elementary schools only to wear walking shorts to school.

The board heard a group of school patrons who asked the board about adding baseball to the athletic program. A committee was appointed by board president Kathryn Goddard to study the proposal and report back to the board.

Members of the committee are Butch Preston, chairman, Hal Ratcliff, Cliff Stephens, Tommy Moss, Terry Wilkerson, Charles Hamilton and Sam Houston.

In other business, the board

accepted and awarded bids on milk, bread and gasoline for the 1989-90 school year. The milk bid was awarded to the Borden Company; bread to Mrs. Baird's and gasoline to Houlette Petroleum, all on the low dollar bid.

Cafeteria prices for the 1989-90 school year will remain the same as they have been the last few years. They are: (lunch) primary and elementary school, \$1.10; junior high school, \$1.15; high school, \$1.25; (breakfast) 50 cents for all three levels.

The board conducted a work session on the 1989-90 school budget.

Tax Receipts Are Noted

The City of Friona received a check for \$12,382.29 as its share of the one per cent city sales tax rebate from the Comptroller of Public Accounts in August.

The payment compared to a check for \$12,679.18 that the city had received at the same time a year earlier, a two per cent decrease.

For the calendar year, the city has now received a total of \$72,799.41 in sales tax rebates. This amounts to a gain of \$5,427 over the total of \$67,372.62 it had received at the same point in 1988, an increase of eight per cent.

Bob Bullock, state comptroller, noted that year-to-date payments to Texas cities were up by an

average of 9.7 per cent over the same period last year.

"We've predicted that the steady growth trend will continue, although it remains spotty in some areas of the state," Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$121.9 million were sent to 1,046 cities which have a local sales tax rate of either one or one and one-half per cent.

Another \$11.3 million was allocated to 92 counties that collect the one-half per cent county sales tax.

August's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in June and by quarterly filers in April, May and June and reported to the comptroller's office by July 20, Bullock said.

JTPA Has Funds For Residents

Need a job? Need classroom training? Need your G.E.D. or vocational training? You need not look any further. All these services are available to disadvantaged people, ages 16-55 right here in Friona, free of charge.

The Job Training Partnership Act Program offers jobs, vocational training, college classes and basic classes for qualified participants. The office is located at 703 Main, Friona, phone 247-2037.

Intake counselors are in Friona every Wednesday to take new applications from 1:30-3:30 p.m. The primary goal of the On The Job Training Program is to place participants into gainful employment. The program has job developers on staff who are in constant contact with the Friona business community, to place participants into jobs or on the job training.

The On The Job Training Program is administered by Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission has been servicing disadvantaged people in the Panhandle area for more than 20 years.

The On The Job Training Program has more than \$200,000 available this fiscal year to help its participants with numerous supportive services. The O.J.T. Program funds classroom training at local institutions such as: Clarendon College, Amarillo College, Frank Phillips, T.S.T.I. and South Plains College.

Through the J.T.P.A. Program, expenses such as fees, books, tuition, supplies, materials, uniforms and tools can be paid by the J.T.P.A. Program. In order to be an eligible applicant for J.T.P.A., applicants must meet federal income guidelines similar to those for food stamps.

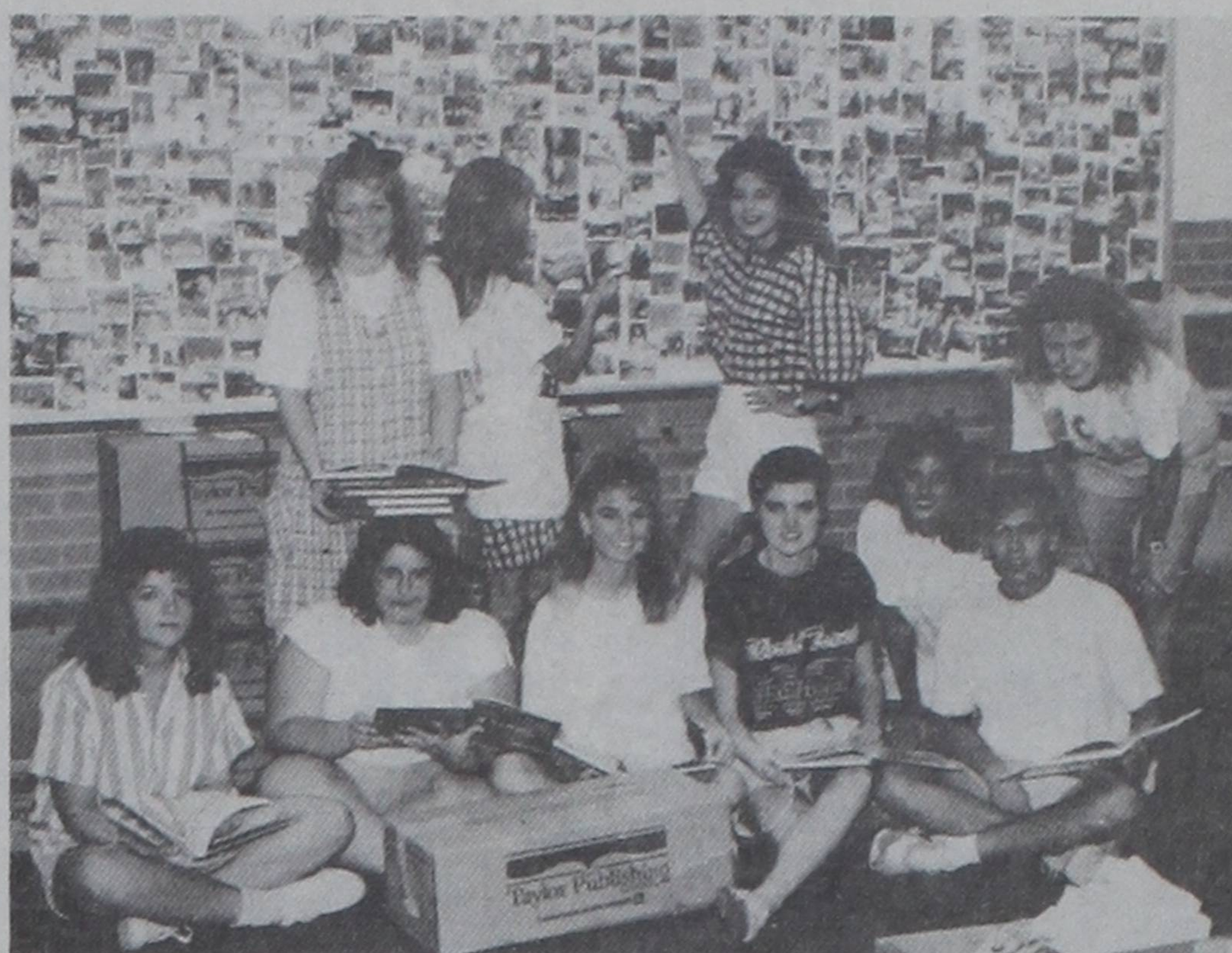

The testing results will be discussed with you confidentially with the programs' professional counselors. The results of these tests are mere indicators of the participants' interests, aptitudes and achievements.

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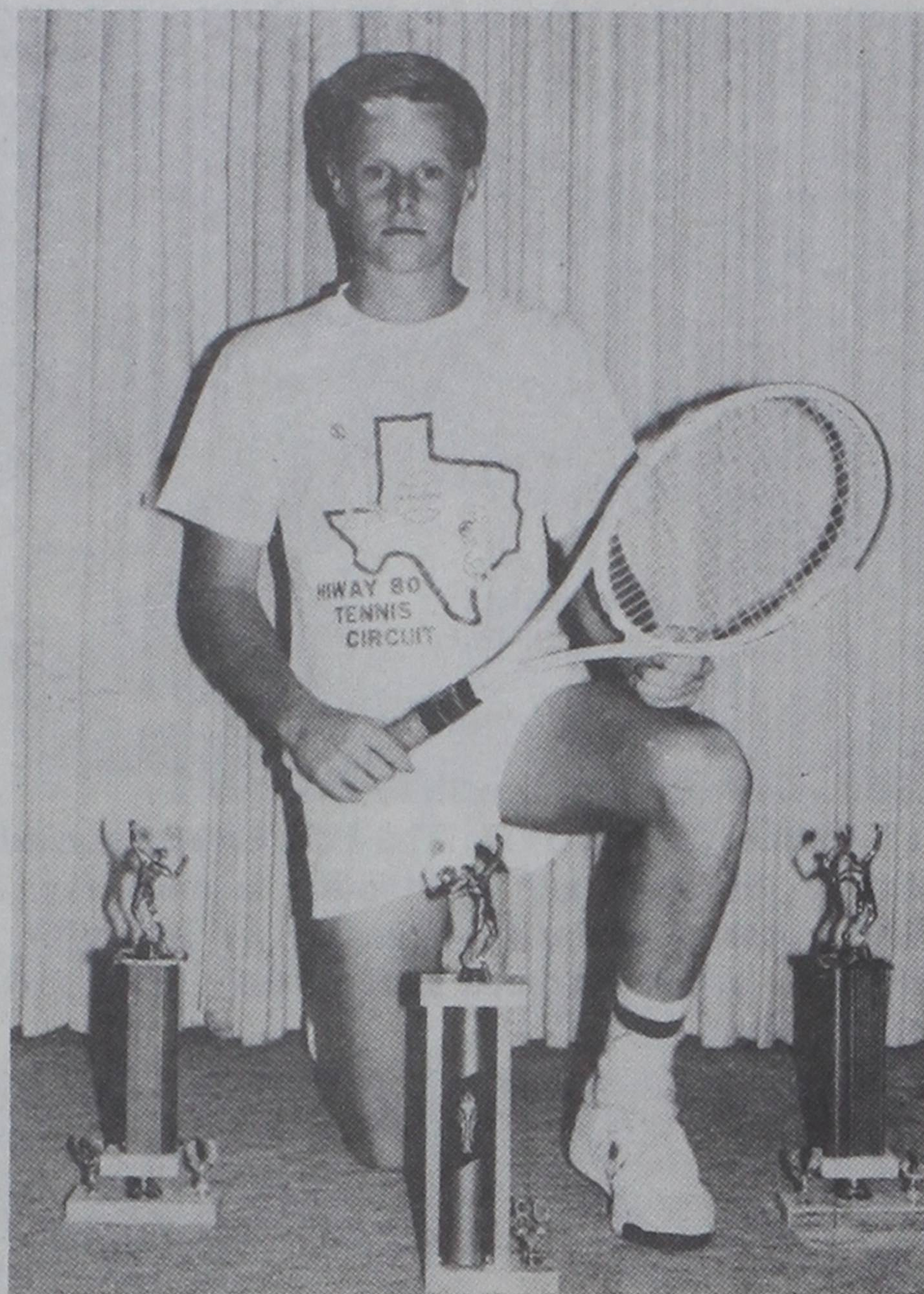
MD Photo Show Set

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Karim Moshrefi Says Friona Residents "Very Caring"

In August of 1975, a young man set foot on America's soil with a dream in mind. Little did he know that his new life in this country would bring him an education, a precious wife, two very special sons, and, in a few months, a new baby.

Karim Moshrefi, a medical technologist employed by the Parmer County Community Hospital, was that young man. Born on April 10, 1950, in Shiraz, Iran, to Ghasem and Akhtar Moshrefi, Karim was one of four children. When he left in 1975, not only did he leave his home country, but he also left this close family.

Since he's been in the United States, Karim Moshrefi has accomplished a great deal. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) in Portales. While attending ENMU, Moshrefi served as a senator for the ENMU Student Government Program for two years. He was also a member of Phi Kappa Phi, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Eta Sigma, and Blue Key.

Soon after completing his degree, Moshrefi received his student teacher training at Portales High School as a teacher of general science and chemistry. He then returned to ENMU to complete his Master's degree and decided to finish his Medical Technology degree at Chicago's Holy Cross Hospital. "After I graduated, I received a call from Friona that I was needed. Fortunately, I came here and had the chance to work for the people in Friona and meet them," said Moshrefi. Although he has plans to become a specialist in hematology sometime in the future, Moshrefi is busy and happy in Friona for the time being.

This summer Moshrefi was married to a woman from Fayetteville, Arkansas. "I always wanted to have a family, but I

never had the chance." Several months ago, a friend introduced Karim to Parivash (his new wife), and on a weekend when he had some time off, Moshrefi went to Fayetteville, was married and returned to work in Friona the next day. Not only did he gain a wife, but now he also has two sons who will be attending Friona High School this fall. They are Homan, 16, and Farzin, 15. "I love them so much," said Moshrefi.

Parivash was a teacher in Iran before coming to the United States. She has taught science and English, has received her Bachelor of Science degree in education, and has begun working on her Master's degree.

Moshrefi has a deep concern for his home country. His family is still there, and he misses them a great deal for he has not seen them since 1978 when he returned to Iran after the death of his father.

"Several years before the great revolution, Iran was like a mountain of dry wood and all it needed was a light," said Moshrefi. "That spark came when a popular movie theater burned to the ground while about 650 people were purposely locked inside, and firefighters were kept away from the scene. There were voices of mourning from different corners of the country, and people demanded severe punishment for those who were responsible for that horrible calamity."

The establishment of the Islamic Republic was a drastic change for many people. Moshrefi says that the Islamic Ideology was completely opposed to the literature and educational system which existed before it became the ruling force. The new government felt that the world and the Islamic World, especially, was "suffering from a deadly disease and for the survival, they needed emergency surgery."

"Therefore," said Moshrefi, "it was extremely hard for many people to adapt themselves to the

new system and the lifestyle which wasn't the same at all."

Moshrefi says that the revolution and Iran's war with Iraq made a tremendous impact on the Iranian people, especially the children. "The one million young and innocent Iranian lives which were one of the products of war had so much effect on the Iranian revolution and history. One could see the fruits of war and the smoke of guns in even the children's drawing and writing, unlike the drawing of many American children which are flowers, dolls, trees, sun and rainbow. Many Iranian kids draw machine guns and the world of martyrdom (to die in the name of God)," said Moshrefi. Karim Moshrefi came to America with a dream, and that dream is this: "I love people very much. Before I die I'd like to leave something behind myself...leave something for people that I love. I just don't want to come into this world then go."

"I want to bring life for a person not destroy life," said Moshrefi. "If you can bring a smile to somebody's face, you've accomplished a great deal."

His dream may come true if Moshrefi continues to pursue the goals he has set for himself. "One of the things I would like to do in Friona is to do speeches, starting here and going to other places, mainly on AIDS and drugs, which at the present time are the most destructive factors in the U.S."

Moshrefi is concerned, too, about children, for he sees them as much more than just the future. He hopes for them to be a strong, bright and healthy future for the world. "Children are very special," said Moshrefi, "It is as if the United States is the body, kids are the cells, and the educational system is the blood stream. If the blood isn't good enough, the cells aren't good enough either, and they cannot perform their assigned and specific functions. Hence a destruction will occur. If the blood and cells are strong, then the body

is strong, and the country is strong, and will be able to stand strong and powerful in the course of life and human civilization."

Karim Moshrefi says he likes Friona because the people are not just friendly, but they are also cooperative. "They care so much about each other, and that is very respectable. It makes life in Friona different," said Moshrefi.

That young man who came to America in 1975 has come a long way. His home country is in turmoil, but he still views life in a way that many people should admire. He has enriched the community of Friona with his hard work, his knowledge and his friendly smile. "Why?" someone might ask, "because," he answers, "this is true America."

Agriculture Census Data Is Revealed

Early data from the 1987 Census of Agriculture shows that the state had 188,788 farms, 68,792 of which had annual product sales of \$10,000 or more. Land in farms totaled 130,502,792 acres, 85% of them in farms with \$10,000 or more in sales, the Commerce Department's Census Bureau reported.

The census showed that the state's farmers and ranchers sold \$10.54 billion in agricultural products and that farms with \$10,000 or more in sales averaged \$147,748 per farm.

Other findings: \$2.96 billion or 28% of total agricultural sales were for crops, while \$7.58 billion or 72% came from the sale of livestock, poultry and their products.

The agriculture census obtains information on all identified farm and ranch operations in the United States. The Census Bureau defines a farm as any place where \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were produced and sold or normally would have been sold during the census year. Sampling is used to collect data for selected items and to account for non-responding farm operations.

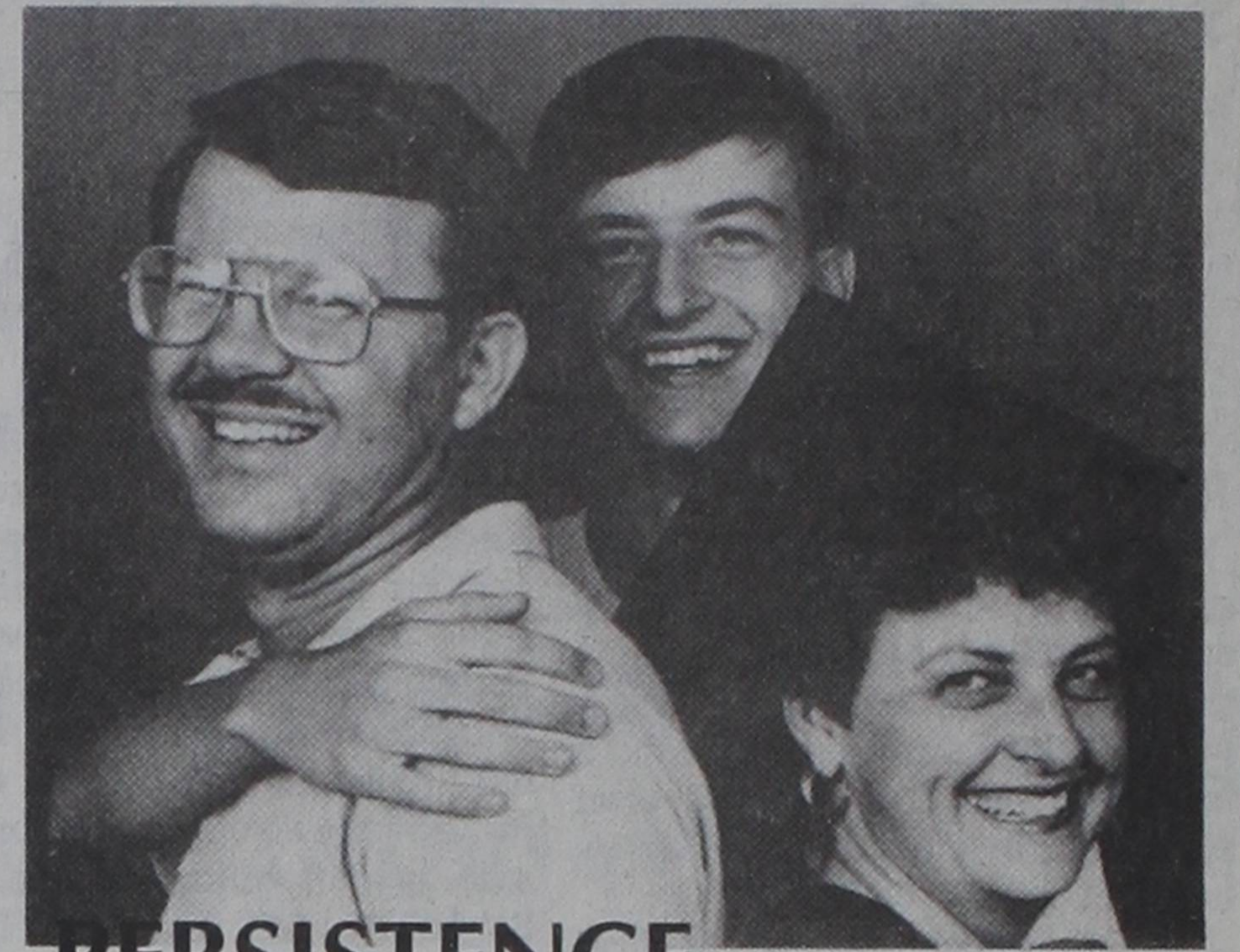

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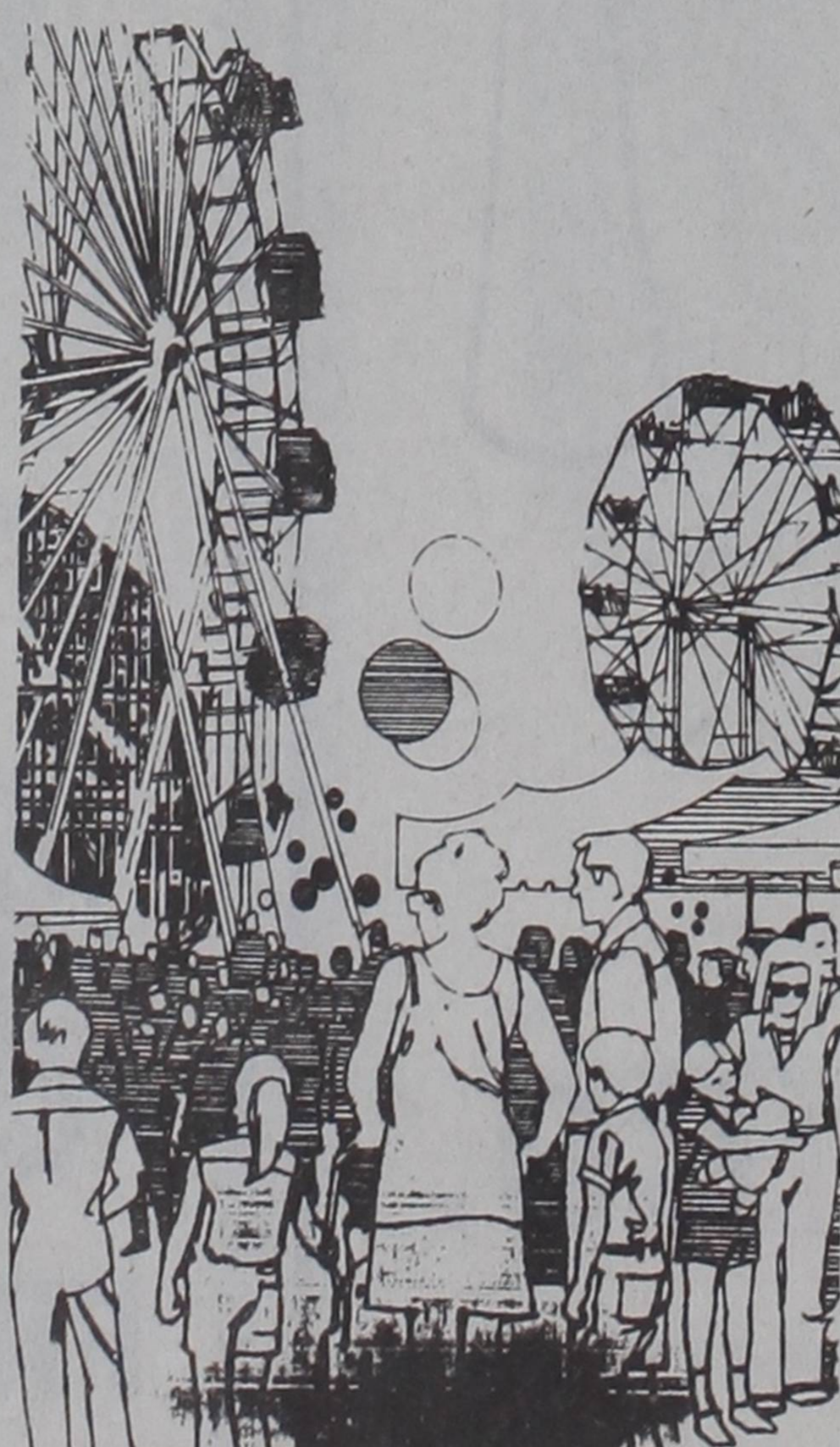

"Give ear to my words, O Lord, consider my meditation. Harken unto the voice of my cry, my King, and my God: for unto thee will I pray."

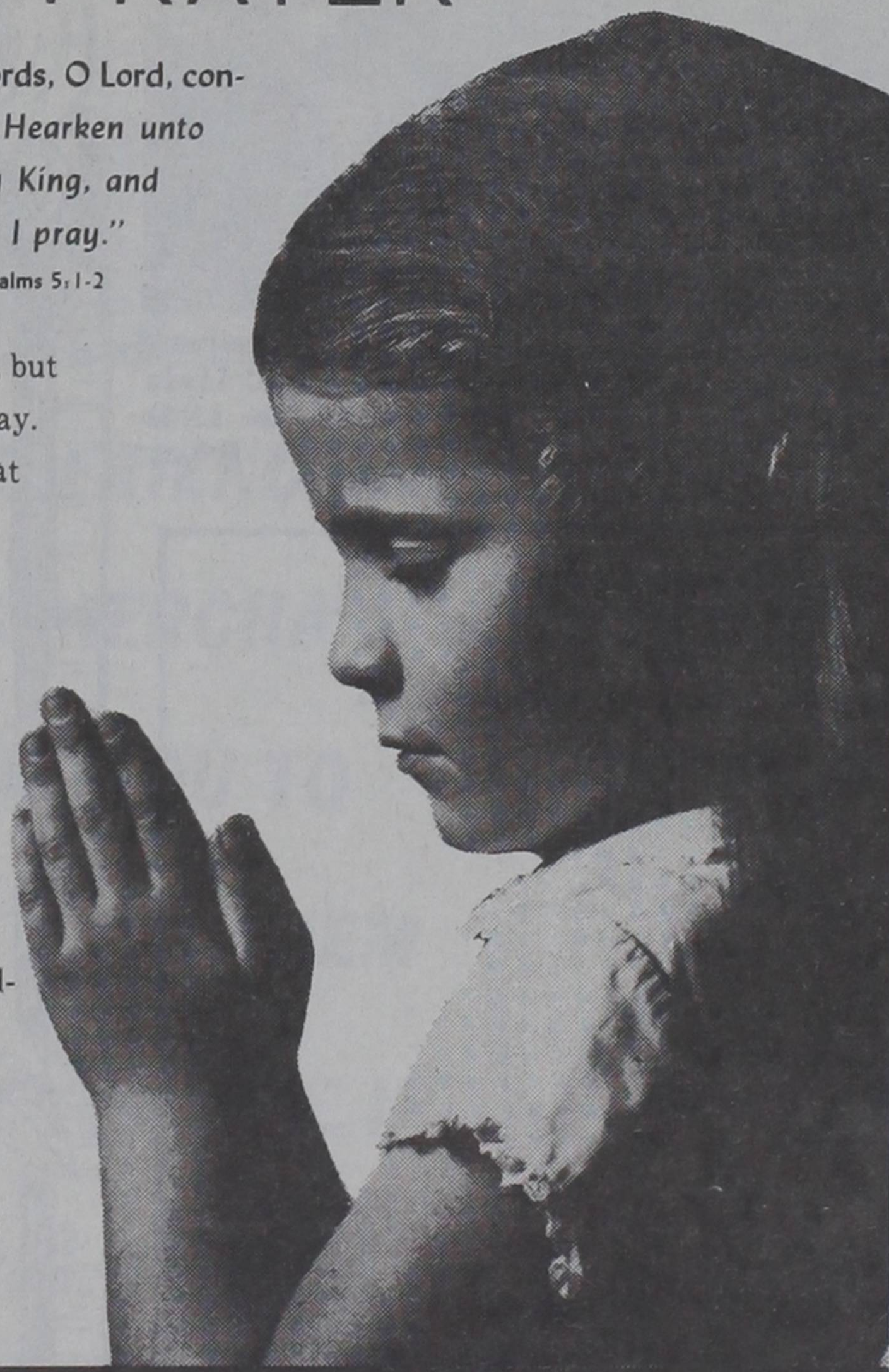
Psalms 5:1-2
