exit level Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) administration to provide another opportunity for graduating seniors to pass the exit level test prior to graduation in May 1994. In addition to graduating seniors, outof-school individuals who have met all graduation requirements must, by law, have the opportunity to participate in the May exit level administration.

The exit level writing, reading and mathematics tests will be administered on May 5, 6 and 9, respectively. The writing test must be administered on the morning of Thursday, May 5.

Districts and out-of-school examinees will receive exit level results for the March administration by April 29. The test contractor will provide precoded answer documents and test booklets for graduating seniors and out-of-school individuals who tested in March but still need to re-test in May, 1994.

While out-of-school examinees will not be required to register for the May administration, they will be required to contact their school district or education service center by April 22, 1994, to reserve




## Letters To The Editor

A recent poll by the U. of Cincinnati shows that 84 percent of the people are happy with the quality of medical treatment they get and 80 percent are satisfied with its availablity.

With this in mind, it appears that we have an insurance problem rather than a "health care crisis" as Clinton is fond of calling it. According to the Joint Economic Committee, there may be 5.8 million uninsurable folks out of the 250 million who live in this country. This is a relatively small percentage. It would seem this problem could be faced without destroying the entire health system. Under the Clinton health plan, employer mandates will close down small businesses and will leave between three to six million people jobless and uninsured. The economy will be burdened with over 151 billion dollars in new taxes and growing deficits, according to Dan Mitchell of the Seniors Coalition. Senator Phil Gramm says "If Clinton's health care plan is passed in its present form, it will bankrupt the country."





## **District Measurements Show Decline** In County's Underground Water Levels

Parmer County ground water levels declined an average of 2.66 feet in 1993 in 97 privately owned wells in the observation well network maintained by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in its 546,400 acre service area within the county. This represents a decrease of 218,013 acre-feet of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in the portion of Parmer County within the Water District service area. during 1993 across most of the Water District service area caused irrigators to apply heavier and more frequent irrigations than usual to replenish soil moisture for the 1993 growing season. This significantly contributed to the decline in ground water levels," said Don McReynolds, High Plains Water District technical division director. Ground water levels within the Water District's Parmer County service area decreased 1.39 feet during the ten year period from 1984 to 1994. An average annual increase of 1.98 feet was recorded during the five year period from 1989 to 1994.

feet from January 1993 to January 1994. This is a net decrease of about 1,467,300 acre feet of ground water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the Water District service area.

A zero average annual change in ground water levels was recorded for the first time in the Water depth-to-water levels in 1993 were District's history in 1985. Depthto-water measurements revealed an average ground water level rise of 0.50 of a foot in 1986; an average rise of 0.90 of a foot in 1987; an "Below average precipitation average decline of 0.51 of a foot in 1988; an average decline of one foot in 1989; an average decline of 1.06 feet in 1990; an average decline of 0.73 of a foot in 1991; and an average rise of 0.14 of a foot in

changes have occurred in the ground water levels.

Of the 15 counties or portions of counties making up the High Plains Water District, only Cochran County recorded an average rise in depth-to-water levels in 1993. The counties with average declines in Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Parmer, Potter and Randall counties. Maps showing the location and well number of observation wells in each county or portion of a county served by the Water District will be published in the April issue of The Cross Section. Tables listing observation wells in each county within the District and the depth-to-water levels at one, five and ten year intervals are also printed.

# **Irrigators Are Reminded: Tailwater Violates Rules**

Many High Plains producers are busy applying a last-minute preplant irrigation to wet the soil profile for 1994 planting. Unfortunately, some of this precious irrigation water is escaping from fields, and that is against both State Law and High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 rules.

Water District rules define tailwater as "ground water pumped for irrigation that escapes...onto land other than that of the owner of the well unless permission has been granted by the occupant of the land receiving the discharge."

"This permission must be in the form of an agreement signed between the parties on a form acceptable to the Water District. Potential parties to such an agreement are warned that it may obligate the provider to provide a specified supply of water into perpetuity and/or the recipient to accept runoff in whatever quantities at whatever time the provider chooses. Provisions of any agreement entered into must comply with Rule 1(h)(5)."

Rule 1(h)(5) defines water waste as "Wilfully or negligently causing, suffering, or permitting underground water to escape into any river, creek, natural watercourse, depression, lake, reservoir, drain, sewer, street, highway, road or road ditch, or onto land other than the owner of the well."

Allowing this water to escape


water waste has been halted.

"We prefer to work with the farmer and address the problem; and in most cases, that works," says Ken Carver, High Plains Water District Assistant Manager. "If the waste doesn't stop, then we have no choice but to seek an injunction from the courts."

Under an injunction, continued tailwater waste is considered Contempt of Court and carries a maximum penalty of a \$500 fine and/or a six-month jail sentence per occurrence. If violations continue under the injunction, the District Court may also order the County Sheriff to padlock the water well to prevent further waste. Violators can also be held liable for damages resulting from their water waste, such as accidents on flooded roadways, property damages or crop damage.

"There are many physical methods available to help control or prevent tailwater waste, but the individual operator is the key to whether or not water is wasted. Careful management of irrigation water eliminates tailwater waste," says Carver.

Tailwater control methods include reducing row lengths, 79405-1499, or call (806) 762terracing, and cutting borders at the



Surge irrigation systems, which alternate water flow between two sets of furrows in timed cycles, can be set to automatically cut back irrigation set times at the time the water is expected to reach the end of the field. Use of these valves has proven to be very effective in tailwater management.

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
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Tailwater return pits or modified playas have been used in the past to collect the runoff water. Water collected in the pits can be pumped to irrigate crops for about one-fifth of the cost of pumping ground water to the land surface from irrigation wells.

Use of a center pivot sprinkler system is a particularly good tailwater management practice, because the movement speed of the center pivot can be adjusted to match the water application rate to the soil's infiltration rate. Use of furrow dikes under the pivot to collect the water and hold it in place can increase application rates.

A network of 1,174 privately owned observation wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the High Plains Water District. The depthto-water measurements are taken in January and February of each year in order to allow water levels to stabilize from the pumping during the previous growing season.

By comparing the current Ground water levels in the depth-to-water measurements with those taken the previous year, McReynolds says technical division staff members can determine what

not only contributes to unnecessary depletion of the ground water stored in the Ogallala Aquifer, but it also erodes topsoil and causes safety hazards.

When a tailwater report is received, Water District personnel investigate the water waste and document it with written memorandums and photographs. In addition, they contact the landowners and/or operators and ask these parties to stop the water waste. What about investing in the U.S. economy? Templeton views the national debt as a problem, because debt spawns inflation, and inflation causes cash to lose its value. Cash has lost purchasing power due to inflation in each of the past 37 years. Therefore, Templeton recommends purchasing equities instead of owning only

Templeton also advises not to count on a continuation of the stock market's performance of the 1980s, when returns averaged approximately 18 per cent. Expect the stock market to perform more closely to its sixty year average, with returns of 9.5 per cent to 10 per cent.

Templeton follows two other common-sense ideas: Don't invest in only one place, and don't buy stocks fully priced. Buy them when they are priced low in relation to book value and potential earnings. The best place to find stocks like this is where investors are selling.

Templeton's philosophy is one of simplicity: Use common sense, and keep your values balanced. Above all, remember that there is no reward without risk.
