






Health Agencies Prepare

For 'No R Friona's health care system is working together in complying with a new state law and in educating the medical community about provisions of a patient's directive, Out-of-Hospital: "Do Not Resuscitate" Order (DNR). Those involved in this effort are Brenda Martinez, RN, director of PCCH Home Care; Dana Hendricks, paramedic for Friona EMS; Larry Mitchell, paramedic for Bovina EMS; Dr. Robert Alexander, Dr. Felipe Jubay and Suzanne Bunker, PA. In 1995, under chapter 674 of the Texas Health and Safety Code, a state law was passed creating the DNR advance directive. Martinez points out that federal regulations require that Medicare/Medicaid providers must inform beneficiaries under their care and new admissions of the availability of this new advance directive. Simply stated, the DNR provides terminally ill persons

admissions of the availability of this new advance directive. Simply stated, the DNR provides terminally ill persons with the option of declining some processes of resuscitation, when the person is unable to speak for themselves. The forms may be executed by a competent, conscious person who has been diagnosed by a physician as having a terminal condition. The order applies to only six processes of resuscitation: cardiac compression, tracheal intubation, artificial ventilation, defibrillation, cardiac pacing and the administration of cardiac resuscitation medications. Martinez said the DNR is

administration of cardiac resuscitation medications. Martinez said the DNR is foot designed to cover the power of Attorney for Health Care, or a directive to physician. That is, it will not name an agent to make health care decisions or prevent the administration of life sustaining procedures on the DNR form. This form cannot be used by anyone when is pregnar. The original DNR form bound is witnessed by the individuals who are not person wherever he/she goes, and the person may also

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identification bracelet or necklace. The form and ID bracelet are currently being provided by the home health agency to their clients. Contact your primary physician for information on how to receive the form and ID bracelet. It is the form or ID braclet or necklace that will quickly alert the EMS, home health agency, hospice and ER personnel that the resuscitation efforts usually required by practice standards are nor required. Physicians and health care workers are required by law to honor an advance directive if they know it exists. For that reason, it is wise to have multiple copies made of the directives and give them to all health care agencies involved with the patient's care. Texas law allows Texans to use three different advance directives: (1) Out-of-Hospital DNR order; (2) Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care (DPOA); and (3) Directive to Physician (also known as a Living Will). Anyone over the age of 18 and not pregnant may obtain and fill out any of the advance directives. The easiest way to obtain advance directives forms, with more information on the requirements and regulations governing them, is to ask your physician, health care provider, home health agency, or hospice. Mendricks (with Friona EMS) slated that it is their policy to honor the patient or family's wishes. She also pointed out that it is State law that the EMS must be presented with the advance directive at the door. Hendricks said that she keeps a file in her office of copies for those in the community that want the EMS to know they are a DNR. Anyone in the community With a DNR may take a copy by her office. 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

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Out Here

Warning: The following column contains bits of violence and humor which may cause you to think. In certain circumstances even the slightest bit of thinking could cause serious damage. If a discussion about willing people makes you squeamish, you might want to skip Out Here this week. Another of those "ironies" which I am so fond of took place the last few days. No sooner had I written about John Kennedy Barefield being executed in Texas when the state of Florida "fried" a guy in their electric chair, touching off yet another debate about the death penalty. Seems an inmate in

debate about the death penalty. Seems an inmate in Florida was finally scheduled to die in the electric chair after 15 years on death row. Let's call him Ruiz. Ruiz was accused of stabbing a 52-year-old-woman to death. The woman to death. The woman was stabbed 10-15 times in the brutal slaying. There were appeals, which did not work and cost a lot of taxpayer money.

did not work and cost a lot of taxpayer money. Ruiz had been "mentally challenged" all his life. Many testified that he could not possibly have done the crime because his IQ was not high enough to make him smart enough to make him smart enough to commit a crime like that. In the beginning, the victim's husband (her second) was a suspect. In the end, the victim's own daughter, who had suspected her stepfather all along, said she did not believe Ruiz was guilty and that the state of Florida was about to kill the wong man.

Florida was about to fill the wrong man. The state of Florida said enough already. After fifteen years of appeals, they strapped him in the electric chair, threw the switch, and

killed him. That would have been the end of it except that the leather mask they put over

the end of it except that the leather mask they put over his head burst into flames, which made national news. Officials said not to worry, he was already dead when the fire broke out. Besides it only burned for a few seconds. Opponents seized the opportunity to once again point out the cruelty of the death penalty, asking the state of Florida to do away with the electric chair and find a more humane way to kill people. On Larry King Live, the former district attorney of Los Angeles waxed eloquent about how the guillotine was invented as a more merciful device to kill people. He said the blade instantly severed the nerves of the neck and spine, creating no pain. I'm not sure how we know that since the people whose heads were sliced off weren't around to verify the pain level. The irony to me is that here we are preparing to "cross the bridge to the 21st century" (I hate that saying) and we are still trying to get this death penalty killing thing right. In biblical times, there

and we are still trying to get this death penalty killing thing right. In biblical times, there was stoning to kill offenders until someone said "..let him who is without sin cast the first stone". That ended that. Everyone knows about crucifixion, which was another inhumane but dramatic method of punishment. Hanging, firing squad, gas chamber (remember that?), and electric chair seemed to be just too grizzly. After all, we are decent human beings and when we kill someone, let us do it with dignity. Setting a mentally deficient, maybe innocent, convicted murderer's head

and face on fire just doesn't jive with our "human side". While the talk shows were debating the cruel aspects of execution, across the country in California, 39 folks met an apparently peaceful death by killing themselves with pudding, phenobarbytol, and vodka.

They each used a plastic bag over the head to finish the job, wore brand-new Nike "Just Do It" sneakers, and had \$5 bucks in their pocket. I think we may be on to something. This should work to kill others too. I really wonder why we make such a big, ceremonial event out of killing some sleazeball that has killed some other people. We invite the press, the families, and others to watch the killing. They lead them in, strap them down, and allow them some last words, most of whom say, "I love you, mom", or "I'm sorry." Some even say we should kill a killer the same way the killer killed the victim. Bubbas seem to prefer this method "He stabbed them he ought to get stabbed. If he shot them twelve times and ran over them with a car, then by god that is the way he ought to die too." Others have even advocated that executions be done in public or shown on television. If that happens, you can have my seat. I ain't watching. I don't mean to diminish the pain and the role of the victim and the role of the victim and the victim's families. The point is that with all our knowledge and to doey, we should be able to devise a way to kill killers in such a humane way they. Like many of you, I've had some surgery before.





About Color Blindness Dogs are color-blind; they see things in black and white. But most people we call color-blind are really only color deficient, less able to distinguish between certain shades. Males are more likely to be color-deficient, and the most common deficiency is an inability to tell the difference between red and green

most common deficiency is an inability to tell the difference between red and green. A child who has difficulty learning colors should be tested early. Color deficiencies can cause problems in the lower grades of elementary school, when so many materials are color-coded. The simple test usually consists of multi-colored dots in which numbers or letter in red dots are hidden among green ones. There is no cure for color deficiencies, but most people can adapt to them once they are alerted.
