Merchandise fair set Saturday

Something new has been added to the "Crazy Day" celebration that takes place in Morton the fourth Saturday of each month. A Fall Merchant's Fair has been added for the September Crazy Day, which will take place inside and outside the county activities building from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m., Saturday, September 25.

Heavy participation by the merchants and businessmen of Morton is anticipated with a large majority of the business places in the city having been confirmed. The Chamber of Commerce-sponsored event consists of both indoor and outdoor display of new fall lines of merchandise and will feature everything from new 1972 automobiles and farm machinery to clothing, hardware, furniture and sundries from the various stores in Morton.

The automobile and farm implement displays will be in designated areas in the parking areas outside the building, while those goods requiring shelter will be displayed in the banquet room of the activities building.

One highlight of the event will be the display by Gwatney-Wells Chevrolet-Oldsmobile of a large variety of their new car models, giving many persons in the area their first opportunity to look over the 1972 models.

In addition to receiving a "peek" at many new fall lines of a large variety of fall merchandise, those lucky enough to hold a winning ticket will win one of several valuable door prizes to be given away at a drawing to be held at 5 p.m. Each participating merchant is donating a valuable prize and some businessmen who don't handle smaller merchandise are making a cash prize donation. The cash prizes will be drawn for in the same manner as the merchandise prizes.

School disruption policy adopted

The hiring of two teachers and the adoption of a policy for prevention of disruption of normal school operations were highlights of the MISD Board of Education meeting Monday night.

Added to the faculty were Miss Sandra K. Knox, to teach fourth grade and Mrs. Alice Stockdale to teach in the migrant program.

The disruption policy adopted by the board is intended to serve as a guideline for actions to be taken in the event that a person or persons with disruptive intent should seek to cause a disturbance at any one of the Morton schools. The action was taken as a forestalling measure in efforts to insure that the same type disruptions taking place in other parts of the United States, do not take place in Morton.

The policy, which was added to the

school district policy handbook reads as follows:

If the Morton Independent School District intends to maintain a high quality educational system, it cannot allow persons with disruptive intent to endanger the safety of students or school personnel, to damage property, to interfere with the educational process, or to attempt to close the schools.

In view of the events which have occurred in our nation recently, it is imperative that all necessary steps be taken to protect students, district personnel and property, and our effective educational atmosphere.

Therefore, it must be understood that disorder and disruption of the school process will not be countenanced, and per-

sons attempting such actions will be held accountable. Further, if it becomes necessary in our efforts to protect students and staff and to effectively operate the schools, we fully intend to ensure the enforcement of all laws and to seek prosecution of those who would violate the laws. We cannot relinquish our responsibilities for the maintenance of a positive educational program to the special interest of any particular group or organization.

A disruption shall be defined as any attempt by any means to disturb the normal tranquility of the school. This shall include, but is not limited to: inciting, encouraging, promoting, or participating in a protest, demonstration, riot, sit-in, walkout, or blockage of entrance.

Indians hope to resume victory trail Friday night

The Morton Indians attempt to get back on the winning track this Friday night when they travel to Farwell and try to corral a herd of Farwell Steers.

The Tribe's last non-conference game will get underway at 8:00 p.m.

The Steers will also be trying to break a two game losing streak to the Indians and a two game losing skid during the current season. The Toby Booth-coached squad was beaten by Friona 25-8 in its season opener, and then suffered a 26-0 loss last week to Dimmitt. Both of those teams are district foes of the Indians.

The basic offensive set for Farwell will be a tandem with the fullback and tailback behind the quarterback. This type of offense is geared for a hard running tailback and the Steers have one in 170-lb. senior Larry Irwin.

Coach Booth's teams in the past have been known for their explosive aerial offense, and this year's squad could also fit in that category. The trigger man in the attack is junior Brett Hargrove, who Booth has said may be the best quarterback he has ever had.

The Farwell defense is similar to the

one run by the University of Texas. The leader of this group is linebacker Irwin who is strong and tough against the run.

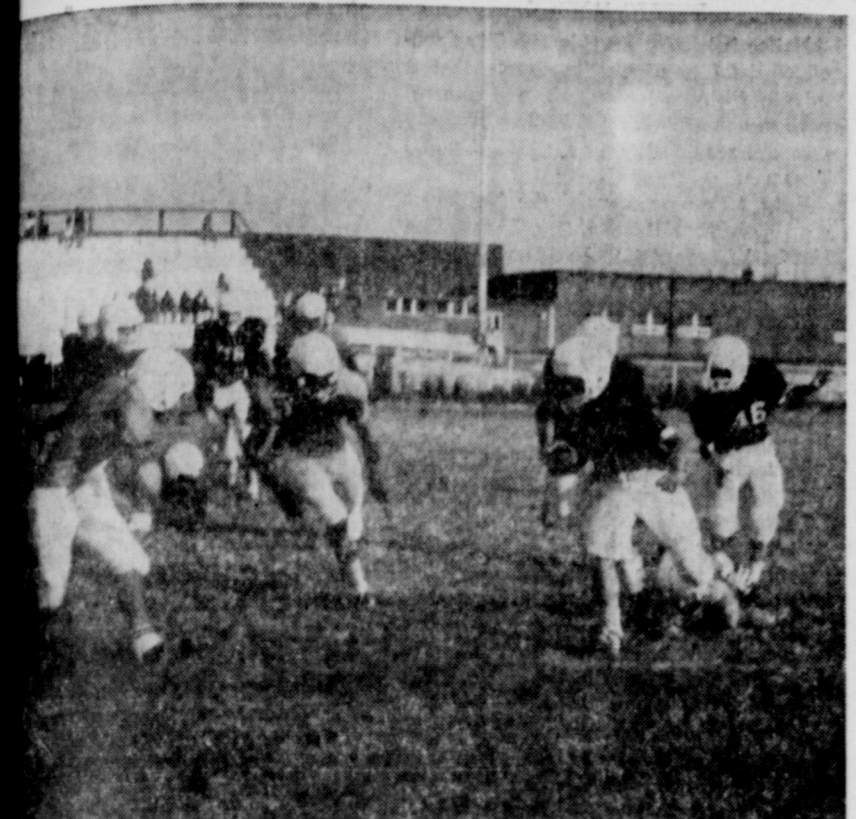
Coach Doug Reed says that the Steers are about the same size as the Indians and are a tough, scrappy team. The Tribe leader feels that it will take a total team effort to attain a victory, and that the Morton footballers have developed the right

The eighth grade continued their winning ways by racking up a 7-6 victory over their counterpart Frenship Tigers in Indian Stadium Tuesday.

Only the brave' see Tribe take 12-0 loss to Frenship

Only the heartiest football fans braved the elements last Friday night to watch the fourth quarter spurt by the Frenship Tigers which carried them to a 12-0 victory over the Morton Indians.

Two costly mistakes led to the Tribe's defeat. The first of these was a faulty change between Keith Embry and Keith Kuehler. The ensuing fumble was intercepted by the Tigers on the Indian 48-yard line and led to Frenship's first touchdown, but only after a strong goal line block by the Tribe.

The score came on a fourth down effort on the one-foot line with the ball in the hands of the big Tiger fullback, Joe Roberts. The point after try was no good. The second error came on a punt by the Indians as they were guilty of having a fake hand-off the Tiger halfback kicked down the sidelines for 80 yards in the final tally of the night. The pass attempt for the extra point was incomplete.

The Indians' wide open offense was never really able to break loose as it was hampered by the weather and a Tiger defense that was stacked to stop the run. However, the Tribe did make one serious play during the game.

After a fumble recovery by Ted Thompson on the Frenship 48, the Indians marched down the field until they had a first

and goal from the 7-yard line, but the Tribe received a five yard penalty for being offside and could not push the ball across for the TD.

Coach Reed praised the Indian squad for a fine team effort, and said that if the game had been played on a dry field the outcome of the game would have been much different.

The Indians only had 169 total yards

Rep. Bill Clayton submits resolution

Representative Bill Clayton, of the 72nd Texas Legislative District which includes Cochran county, has released a statement concerning a resolution that he submitted to a National Legislative Conference held in Minneapolis, Minnesota in August.

The resolution, which deals with the vital question of student busing in Texas schools to obtain racial balance, is as follows:

"In Minneapolis, Minnesota, last month I presented a resolution to the Resolutions Committee of the National Legislative Conference which would be a resolution putting the Conference, if adopted, on record as opposed to busing to achieve racial balance in our schools, and requesting that the states take action in preparing and adopting a constitutional amendment to the federal constitution to so state that the concept of neighborhood schools is constitutional.

This resolution received favorable consideration by the Resolutions Committee and was referred to the Inter-Governmental Relations Committee. This committee of the National Legislative Conference will consider the resolution, and I believe will report favorably to the entire body at its next annual meeting; however, since returning to Texas and seeing the many problems associated with forced busing students, I would like to take this opportunity to express to the people of Texas that I have taken the initiative and will introduce in the Texas Legislature a Joint Resolution calling for

Local youth injured in auto-motorcycle accident Wednesday

Monte Tanner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hershall Tanner of Route 3, Levelland, was recovering in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock Wednesday from injuries suffered in a car-motorcycle accident in Morton Wednesday morning.

Tanner was first taken from the accident scene by Frontier ambulance to Cochran Memorial Hospital, but was transferred to Methodist almost immediately where he was to receive treatment by an orthopedic specialist.

He received what is believed to be a compound fracture of the ankle when his 1967 Yamaha motorcycle was involved in a collision with an Opel station wagon driven by Phieffer Ramby of Morton at 8:10 a.m. at the southwest corner of the courthouse square.

Police reports the accident occurred when Tanner was traveling west on Highway 116 and Ramby was proceeding east on the highway and attempting a left turn onto N.E. First Street.

No other injuries were reported in the accident.

District court has heavy criminal case docket this week

NOTICE —

AN ACT

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act, relating to the recording and re-recording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

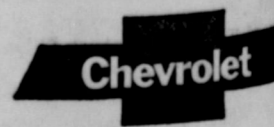

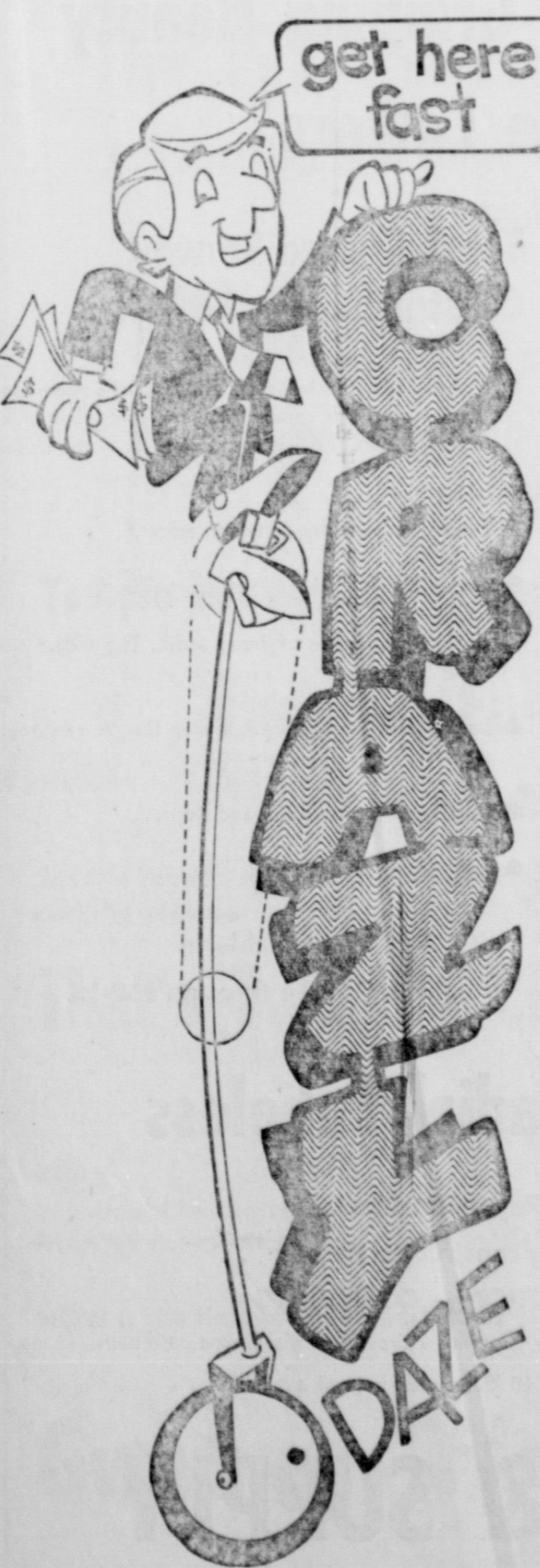

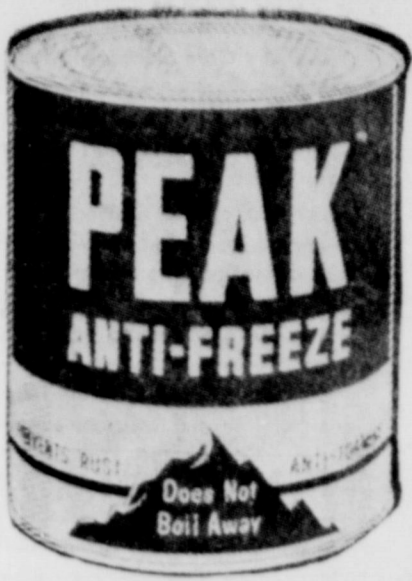

Beginning September 20, 1971, the following policies shall be in effect: Duplicated, written, or printed materials, handbills, photographs, pictures, films, tapes, or other visual or auditory materials shall not be sold, circulated, or distributed on or near the premises of any school in the Morton Independent School District without explicit approval of the principal of that school.

Any student violating this policy may be suspended by the principal and/or superintendent until board action can be taken. No person shall enter on any school campus to distribute such materials without explicit permission of the principal and/or superintendent.

Any student interfering with normal instructional processes, or associate school activities of the Morton Independent School District by inciting, encouraging, promoting, or participating in a protest demonstration, disruption, riot, sit-in, walk out, blockage of entrances, etc., shall be suspended from school by the principal and/or superintendent, until Board action can be taken.

Any person interfering with normal instructional processes or associated school activities of the Morton Independent School District by inciting, encouraging, promoting, or entering on school premises to incite or participate in a protest demonstration, disruption, riot, sit-in, walk-out, blockage of entrance, etc., shall, at the discretion of the Board of Trustees, have filed against him such charges as deemed proper.

frame of mental preparedness that is needed to reach their goal.

a Constitutional Convention to amend the federal constitution.

This can be initiated by the states with favorable action of 2/3rds of the states.

The amendment submitted to the Convention would prohibit compulsory busing to achieve racial balance unless ordered by local school officials. This is in no way an act to segregate our schools or to continue racial prejudice amongst our people, but this is to see that each and every student has an opportunity to be educated in a school nearest their homes without any thought to color, race or creed.

The emphasis should be placed on the quality of education in all of our schools and our neighborhoods should be so that any race can move in or out freely as they choose. In the history of our country the states have not used this method of amending our federal constitution.

This action seems necessary because it is apparent the federal congress is not going to move. I think that the American people have spoken. They are in need of relief from the harassment and the unnecessary edicts of forced busing which is threatening their freedom and causing more prejudice and hate than ever before.

It is my understanding that a Joint Resolution of this nature will not require permission for introduction in a called session; therefore, I will introduce, at the first opportunity, the resolution which is already in the process of being drafted by the Legislative Council. I am hopeful the resolution will gain the support of my colleagues in both the House of Representatives and the Senate.

Let me reiterate that the proposed Constitutional Amendment would leave the busing of students to the discretion of the local school officials. It would not outlaw busing of students if local officials feel they should be so transported. It would head off one of the most malicious, and disastrous attempts in our national history to remove one of our most cherished freedoms the right to an education that is controlled at the local level."
