Tribe ends long drought, captures 3-AA tennis title

competition at Abernathy Monday, the tennis team ended a six year drought by Lockney as Morton won the 3-AA net title.

Texas Library Week for April 16-22

"Reading Makes the World Go Round." That's what Texas librarians will be saying April 16 through 22 when they take part in this year's observance of National Library Week.

Librarians of all kinds are observing the week that calls special attention to libraries as sources of information and education. In addition to the state's 380 public libraries, there are also more than 100 college and university libraries as well as libraries in nearly all of the 1,200 counties.

This proclamation designating library week, Governor Preston Smith pointed out, is a "through organization into systems, and a look forward to sharing of resources in order to equalize the opportunities for all citizens to have access to the services."

In January, ten library systems have been organized under the Texas Library Systems Act passed by the legislature in 1967. The legislation permits public libraries to reach specified levels of local support by entering into agreements with one another to receive State funds when they are appropriated to carry out cooperative projects.

The Library Systems Act and the cooperative activities it provides can have a significant impact on library service in all Texas, said Dr. Dorman H. Byrd, director of the Texas State Library, the state agency that administers the act. "Although all system members are public libraries, the cooperative systems developed by the systems may include other kinds of libraries."

★ Troop activity . . .

A Morton man was among five arrested over the past ten days as the result of a crackdown by state and federal agents on what they describe as a three-state narcotics ring.

Two of the arrests were made in Lubbock on Wednesday, April 5 and three others were taken into custody Sunday night in Eugene, Oregon, according to an announcement by Guillermo Diaz, senior resident agent for the Customs Bureau of the U.S. Treasury in Lubbock.

Grady Courtney Sanders, 21, of Morton, and Michael Farabee, 26, and Russell Dean Johnson, 21, both of Eugene, were arrested in the Oregon city with Sanders being held in lieu of \$3,000 bond. Johnson was released after posting \$3,000 bond and Farabee was denied bail, according to reports received in Lubbock Tuesday.

The trio, described by narcotics agents as "big pushers," were charged with possession of Marijuana with the intent to distribute.

William J. Slover, 22, and Robert S. Tillingier, 23, both of Lubbock, were the two arrested in Lubbock last Wednesday. Their arrests were not made public at the time pending further undercover work linking them with the suspects in Oregon.

The two were charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute and released on personal recognizance bonds set by U. S. Magistrate Bill Brister. They are free pending federal grand jury action which is expected to take place in June, a spokesman said.

Approximately 190 pounds of marijuana were confiscated when Slover and Tillingier were arrested on a parking lot in the 3900 block of Avenue Q in Lubbock Wednesday.

"We can actually account for 600 pounds of marijuana as a result of the April 5 arrests," Diaz said. "We estimate that about 1,000 pounds of marijuana was actually involved in the shipment."

However, Diaz said, "What we confiscated represented only a small portion of the marijuana traffic that has been passing through Lubbock in recent months." Diaz said officers of federal, state and local narcotics agencies had been working to break the ring for about six months. It is believed the Lubbock-based ring operates in three states, but Diaz would identify only Texas and Oregon.

Marijuana is being transferred to Lubbock by trucks, automobiles and even aircraft, according to Diaz, who said it is "quite plausible" that as much as 8,000 pounds of marijuana could have been shipped to Lubbock within the past two months. At the "market" price of \$200 per pound of marijuana the four tons of "grass" would be worth \$1.6 million. The 600 pounds accounted for by the arrests in Lubbock would be valued at \$120,000.

"All the marijuana is coming from the Republic of Mexico by an unknown route," Diaz said.

Hard narcotics, including heroin, cocaine and hashish, are involved in the drug operations, according to Diaz, but none was recovered in the arrests here.

Lubbock also serves as the narcotics distribution point for many Panhandle and South Plains cities, such as Plainview and See LOCAL MAN, Page 3a

Real old frontier cavalry show slated here Monday

Shades of General Custer! Morton will be the recipient of a cav-

alry demonstration right out of the "old west" early next week.

The show, which will include a demonstration of cavalry maneuvers including a full scale charge, pistol course, use of the sabre while mounted and static displays of authentic frontier cavalry arms and equipment, will begin at 1 p.m. Monday, April 17 at the Cochran County Rodeo Grounds.

The demonstration is being staged by the First Cavalry Platoon of the First Cavalry Division, United States Army, under sponsorship of the Lubbock Army Recruiting office. The platoon, which is a ceremonial unit, is based at Fort Hood and is now in its formative stages.

The unit has less than ten members at the present time, but is mounting a recruiting drive for members who may enlist directly into the platoon if they qualify. Sgt. Roach, Army recruiter at Lubbock, states that anyone interested in taking the test may contact him during the show.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor of Texas, today announced plans to tour nine South Plains cities by helicopter next Wednesday, April 15. The tour will include Morton with arrival scheduled for 9 a.m.

Barnes told campaign workers and supporters earlier this week that his campaign for Governor "is gaining momentum daily."

The Lieutenant Governor's entourage which will include state representative Bill Clayton, is expected to land in two helicopters near the downtown area of each city.

Bob Lilly, All-Pro defensive tackle for the World Champion Dallas Cowboys, will also be traveling with Lt. Gov. Barnes.

Cities along the Lieutenant Governor's route are Levelland, 8 a.m.; Morton, 9 a.m.; Littlefield, 10 a.m.; Muleshoe, 11 a.m.; Hereford, 12 noon; Dimmitt, 2 p.m.; Plainview, 3 p.m.; Floydada, 4 p.m. and Tulia, 5 p.m.

Morton city council gains new features

The 1972 version of the Morton city council took its seat Monday night with an additional feature to that of a brand new face in the Mayor's chair.

The new decoration?—none other than Mrs. Bess Tilger, first female member to ever sit on the Morton council. Well, so much for the "City Fathers" title.

Leitzell moved up from councilman to the Mayor's post as a result of the April 1 election in which he defeated Billy R. Wells by a margin of five votes. Mrs. Tilger won her Place Two seat via a substantial margin over her only opponent and incumbent H. A. Lamb Jr. was returned to his Place One seat following defeat of his three opponents.

Outgoing Mayor Donnie Simpson, who had served in the post for approximately 2½ years, gave the oath of office to the new members.

A routine meeting was held by the new council with discussion of a semi-annual pay raise for city employees being the main order of business. After a lengthy discussion, the pay raise proposal was tabled until the next meeting in order to give the councilmen additional time to study all aspects of the question.

Dr. Rhew to conduct spring revival at Methodist church

Dr. Marshall Emory Rhew, District Superintendent of the Seymour District of the United Methodist Churches, will conduct a Spring Revival at the First United

Services are scheduled for 10:55 a.m. and 7 p.m. Sunday with a reception following the evening services in Fellowship Hall of the church. Week day services will be held at 7:15 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. Breakfast will be served each weekday morning at 6:15 a.m.

Dr. Rhew attended Texas Tech University two years before entering Southern Methodist University, where he received his B.A. degree in Sociology in 1930. In 1932 he received his M.A. and B.D. degrees from the School of Theology at SMU. McMurry College conferred the Doctor of Divinity degree on him in 1957. His first appointment in 1932 was associate pastor at First Church in Lubbock.

Other places he has served are Lueders, Vega, Abernathy, Roscoe, Borger, St. John's Stamford, First Church, Vernon, District Superintendent of the Samford District, First Church, Sweetwater, and First Church, Plainview.

Among other positions Dr. Rhew has held in the Northwest Conference are Dean of the Youth Assembly and Chairman of the Board of Ministerial Training. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of McMurray College in Abilene, the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock and the Methodist

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ENGAGE IN WEATHER MODIFICATION ACTIVITIES
Notice is hereby given that Atmosphericics Incorporated of 4981 East Dakota, Fresno, California, 93727, who holds License No. 2 of the State of Texas, intends to engage in a weather modification operation designed to decrease hail-fall and enhance rainfall, for and on behalf of the Plains Weather Improvement Association located at P.O. Box 1627, Plainview, Texas 79072 and Better Weather Incorporated, Littlefield, Texas, and will conduct such a program by means of aerial application of artificial nuclei as follows:
1. The area over or in which equipment may be operated shall include portions of the counties of Hale, Crosby, Floyd, Lamb, Castro, Parmer, Bailey and Cochran.
2. The target area within which hailfall is intended to be decreased and rainfall enhanced, can be described as follows:
"The boundary of the target area shall be a line beginning at a point of origin at Littlefield in Lamb County, Texas, and running northwest along Highway 84 to a point four miles southeast of Sudan; thence due west to a point one mile west of Road 303; thence due north to the north boundary of Lamb County; thence due east to the intersection of the east boundary of Parmer County; thence due north along the east boundary of Parmer County to Road 145; thence easterly along Road 145 to its intersection with Road 1424 in Swisher County; thence south on Road 1424 to the north boundary line of Hale County; thence due east along the north boundary line of Hale County to Road 378 at the intersection with the north boundary line of Floyd County; thence due south to the south boundary line of Floyd County; thence due west along the south boundary lines of Floyd, Hale and Lamb Counties to the intersection of Highway 84 and the south boundary of Lamb County; thence northwesterly along Highway 84 to the point of origin at Littlefield."
3. The equipment, materials and methods to be used in conducting an operation within this area of approximately 1,000 sq. miles include a 3cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.

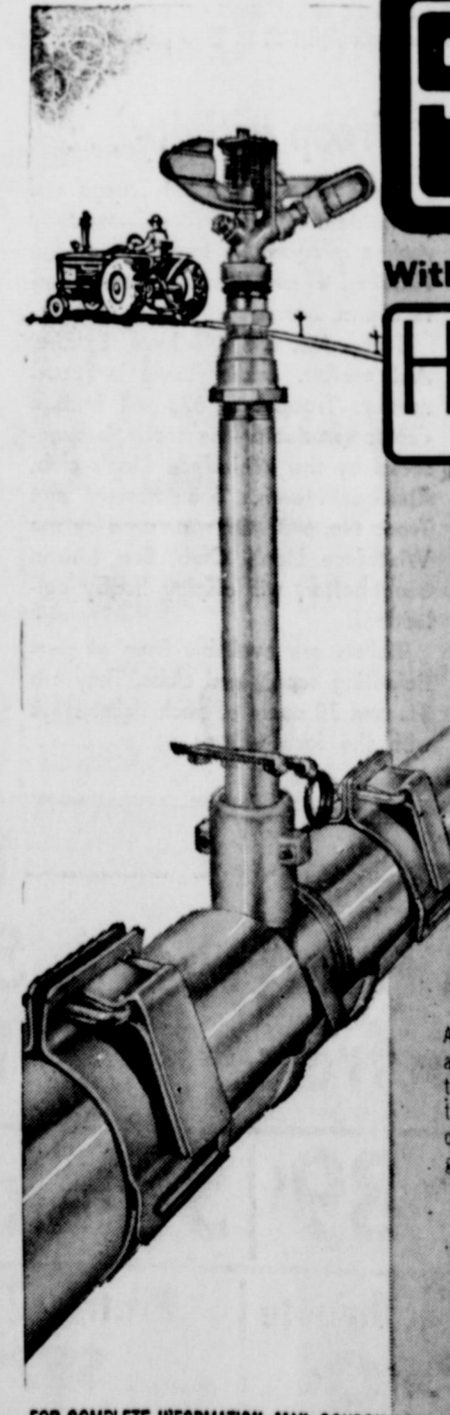

Half of the delegates are ministers, and half are from the laity, with 129 of the latter being women — a higher percentage than ever before in the church's history. Eighty-nine blacks comprise about 10 percent of the American delegates — 58 percent more than in 1968. Well over half of the 86 overseas delegates are also non-white.

Pointing toward rather extensive alterations in the denomination are several reports of four-year study commissions. These call for restructuring the church's general boards and agencies, re-stating its social principles, re-thinking its doctrinal standards, changing its attitudes toward the role of women, and reducing the number of its theological schools.

Also spurring delegates toward general improvement of the church's life and work will be the episcopal address to be delivered Monday morning, April 17, by Bishop F. Gerald Ensley of Columbus, Ohio. This "state of the church" message will be prepared and given by Bishop Ensley but will bear the signatures and have the support of the nearly 100 active and retired United Methodist bishops throughout the world.

In addition to formal reports from study commissions and other groups, the General Conference confronts a heavy grist of business growing out of petitions sent in by members and groups throughout the denomination. These run the gamut of social and religious concerns all the way from amnesty for war resisters to woman's role in society and the church. They include such issues as the war in southeast Asia, homosexuality and changing life styles, empowerment of minorities, investment policies of church agen-

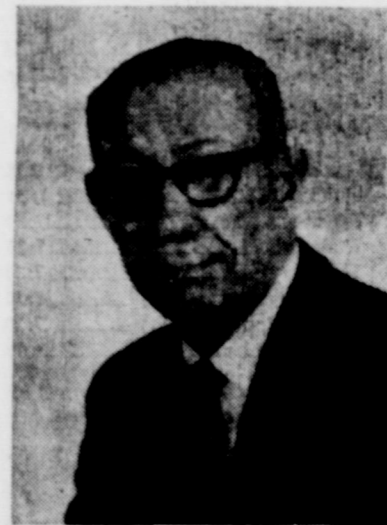

Outler of Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas.
