## Court Okays Giving Funds To Schools

**HARVEST AND GINNING** of the 1984 cotton crop has now "lapped over" into 1985.

Ginning of the crop is still going on. According to our survey on Tuesday, a total of 50,772 bales of cotton have now been ginned in Parmer County.

This is by far the most bales of cotton the county has raised in the last several years, and the figure is expected to continue to rise, as many bales are still in the field in the form of ricks.

One of our farmer friends said this week that most of the cotton has been harvested, with just a few scattered fields remaining.

With all of the snow and wet weather that the area has had since late fall, the harvest and ginning of the crop has been stretched out much more than any harvest season in years.

## Nominations Needed By Friona C-C

The Friona Chamber of Commerce is currently accepting nominations for the community honors which it will present at the annual Chamber banquet, slated for March 14.

Nominations may be made for the Man and Woman of the Year, the Most Courteous Employer, the Teacher of the Year, and the boy and girl for Outstanding Young People award.

Letters of nominations, with biographical sketches and/or reasons for the nomination, should be mailed to the Chamber of Commerce at Box 905, or dropped by the Chamber office at 921 Main Street.

Deadline for the nominations is February 28.

In a historic decision Monday, the Parmer County Commissioners voted to return the county's permanent school fund, which will amount to almost \$900,000, to the four schools in the county, on a pro-rata schedule based on average daily attendance.

Superintendents of the schools from Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie, along with members of their respective school boards, met with the court Monday asking for distribution of the money. It was the group's second appearance before the court.

According to law, the money can only be used for permanent improvements, or for payment of bonded indebtedness.

## Bi-District Game Here

A girls' bi-district basketball game will be played at the Friona High School gym Friday, February 15, between Littlefield and River Road. The game begins at 7:30 p.m. Admission prices will be \$4 for adults and \$2 for students.

Littlefield, the District 3-AA champs with a 22-8 season record, face a River Road team (15-9) which is in the playoffs for the first time in the school's history.

## Stock Show Sale Beats Recent Years

The auction sale at the 1985 Parmer County Junior Livestock Show totalled \$87,333.19, according to show officials. The total is the most in the past three years.

The totals represent the amounts paid in premiums by bidders (\$64,676.82) and floor prices (\$22,543.37). It did not include the animals which would have sold at floor prices, but were pulled out and taken home. This would have accounted for another \$13,419.26, and would have pushed the total above the \$100,000 mark.

The auction figure is the most since the record total of 1982, which was \$120,025.47.

The barrows in the 1985 sale sold for an average of \$1.89 during the auction sale, but when the additions, or "bumps" are added to the figure, the 76 barrows sold for a total of \$37,461, and their average sale price was hiked to \$2.25 per pound. The grand champion barrow sold for \$3.50 per pound.

Anchored by the grand champion steer, which sold for \$3 per pound, the 16 steers which went through the sale ring sold for an average of \$1.48 per pound.

The lambs sold for excellent prices--an average of \$3.61 per

The distribution of the funds was approved on a split 2-1 vote by the court. Commissioners Tommy Williams and Robert White voted in favor, with Ernest Anthony opposing. Commissioner Raymond McGehee was ill and not able to attend the session.

The school officials explained that due to the implementation of House Bill 72, every school is facing the need of having to make some type of change in their facilities.

Tom Jarboe, Friona Superintendent, said that Friona's pro-rata share of the money should be "in excess of \$400,000."

The four schools had agreed on a formula to divide up the funds. It would be based on the schools' average daily attendance for the past five years. This set the percentage at: Friona, 51.66 per cent; Bovina, 19.95 per cent; Farwell, 17.64 per cent and Lazbuddie, 10.75 per cent.

Although the Friona school board is looking into the building of some additional classrooms in high school, Jarboe said that it was the board's hope to be able to accomplish this with local maintenance funds, and place the permanent school fund money into interest-bearing accounts, with the possibility of using the interest, as each of the schools has done in the past.

Up to this point, the county has distributed the interest from the permanent school fund to the county schools.

Some years, this interest has amounted to more than \$100,000. In 1984, it came to around \$79,000. The balance in the fund as of December 31, 1984, was \$874,900.

"We would hope only to have to use from the main fund in an emergency, but this gives the local school districts more control over their destinies. It could be possible that by having the funds, it could save a school a tax increase, if they chose to use their funds," Jarboe said.

"The board feels very committed to the wise use of the money," Jarboe said.

The permanent school fund has grown from the time the state gave Parmer County three leagues of land in Andrews and Gaines counties, to help support the schools. A number of years ago the land was sold, with proceeds going into the fund, but the county retained three-fourths of the mineral rights.

## Three Seats Expiring

An order for an election, for the purpose of electing three members to the board of trustees was passed this week at the regular meeting of the Friona School Board.

The election will be held April 6, in conjunction with the City of Friona election. School board members whose terms are expiring are Floyd Reeve, Kathryn Goddard and George Frye.

Anyone interested in having their names on the school board ballot may come by Superintendent Tom Jarboe's office. The filing deadline is March 6.

The resignation of B.E. Duggins, director of counseling and guidance at Friona High School, effective at the end of the current school year, was regrettably accepted. Duggins has been with the local school system for 30 years.

New two-year contracts were approved and extended to Tommy Moss, head football coach and athletic director; Freeman Melton, elementary principal; Cecil Maddox, junior high principal; Hal Ratcliff, high school principal and James Warren, administrative assistant.

After receiving a recent state school board interpretation that allows some school days to be shortened, the board approved 2:45 p.m. dismissals for the current school year on February 21, April 4, May 22-23. The first two dates are prior to spring holidays, and the latter dates are semester test dates.

The school calendar for 1985-86 was considered and tentatively adopted. Final adoption will be made at the board's March meeting.

Jarboe reported that tax collections through February 11 amounted to 82 per cent of the tax rolls.

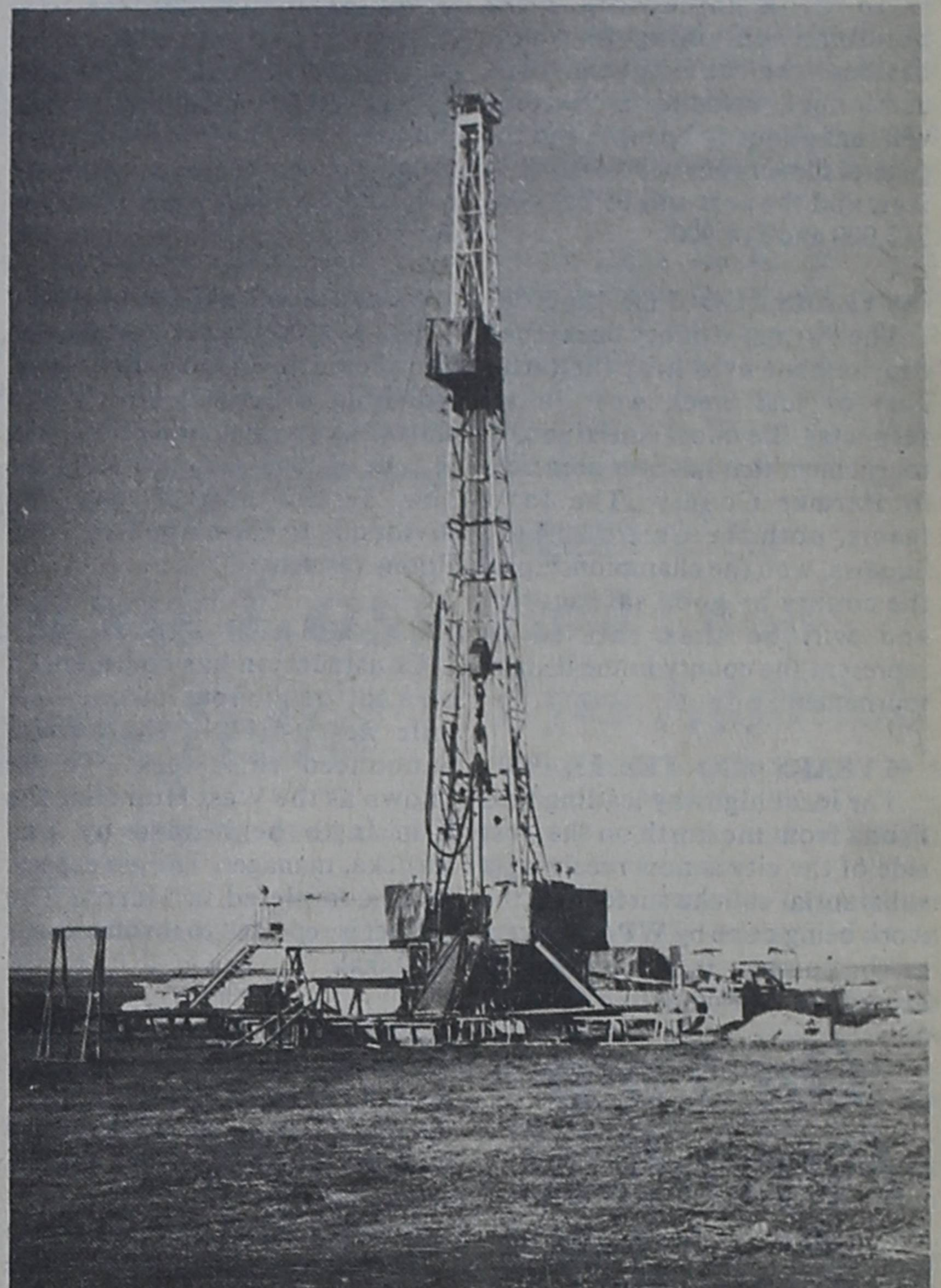
Jarboe also reported to the board on the various school funds. Payment of bills and other routine business made up the balance of the meeting.

## School Fund Issue Main Court Topic

The division of the permanent school fund among the county's four schools on a pro-rata basis was the main item of business at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioner's Court Monday, February 11.

Considerable discussion with the four superintendents in the county and members of the various school boards was held by Commissioners Robert White, Tommy Williams, Ernest Anthony and Judge Porter Roberts. Commissioner Raymond McGehee was absent due to illness.

After the discussion, Williams made the motion to divide the money, it was seconded by White, and carried by a vote of 2-1, Commissioner Anthony voting against. (See further details in a separate story, this issue.)

In other business, the court voted to pay the county's two senior citizen centers \$1,200 each to help with their various expenses.

Peek Industrial Tractor Parts Company was awarded the bid on a motor grader for Precinct 4, on a cash price of \$78,800. The county

plans to pay \$20,000 down, and finance the balance.

Bids for the county depository were received from Friona State Bank and First State Bank of Bovina. Motion was passed to accept the bid of Friona State Bank.

Approval was given for payment of boarding care bills on foster children in the county amounting to \$527.00. Such amount will be reimbursed the county by the state.

Permission was granted for a vibroresis survey to be done on school land in Andrews County.

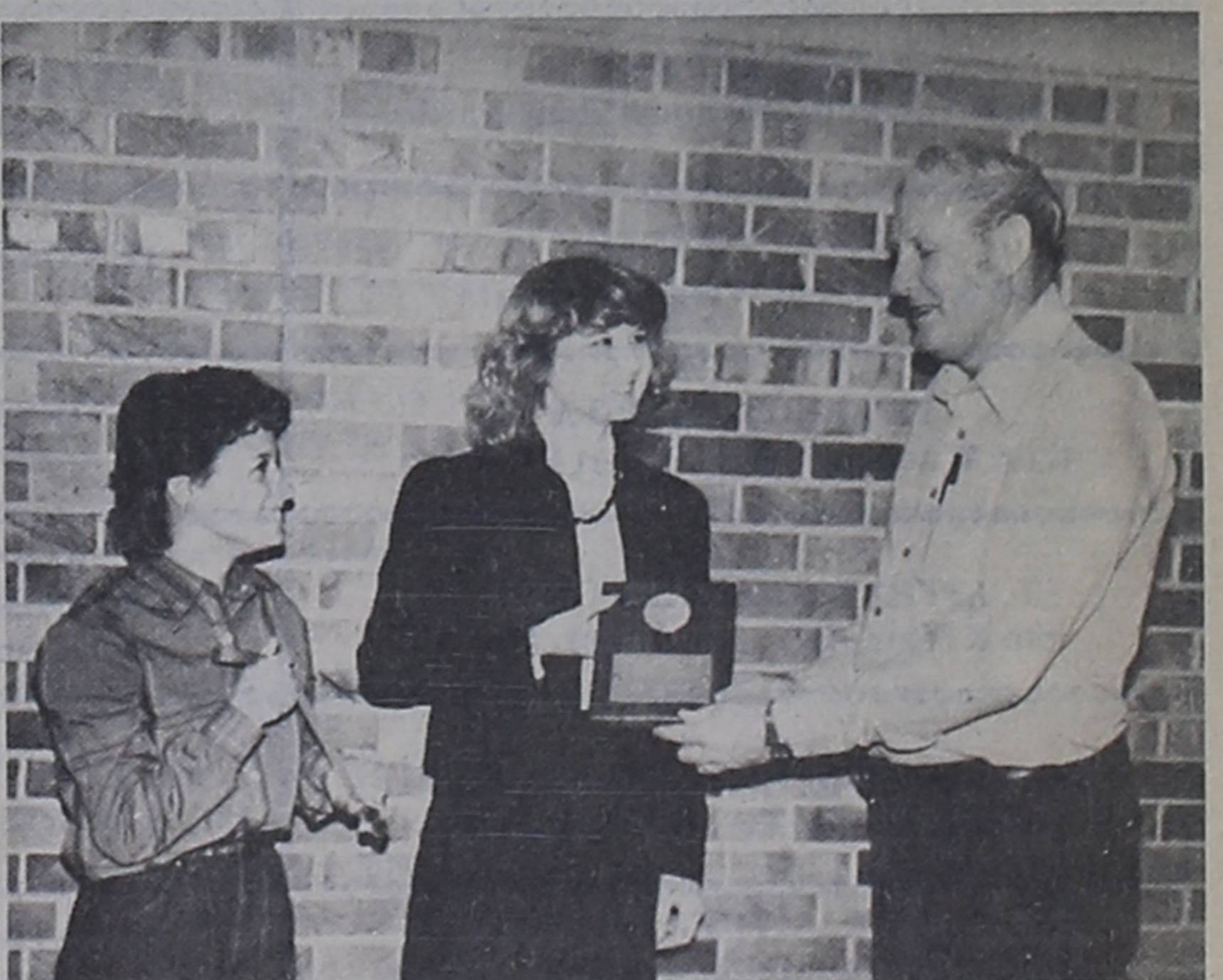
Payment of a court reporter's bill in the amount of \$186 was approved, as was a bill for \$150 to a legal firm which acted as counsel on two mental hearings.

Judge Roberts was reimbursed \$23.65 he had paid for gasoline for an indigent citizen, needing to go to Lubbock for medical assistance.

Other routine matters included amending the by-laws of the Parmer County Child Welfare Board.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

**55 YEARS AGO--FEB. 21, 1930**  
The building committee of the Methodist Church met Thursday night and adopted plans for the new Methodist Church building. It is to be a three-story brick building, containing 14 rooms besides the auditorium. The auditorium, including the balcony, will seat about 500 people and the general dimensions will be 42 by 74 feet, and the cost will be between \$12,000 and \$14,000.

**50 YEARS AGO--FEB. 22, 1935**  
The Parmer County basketball tournament held here the latter part of last week was, in all respects, the most satisfactory tournament that has ever been held in Parmer County. The local teams, both the Chiefs and the Squaws, won the championship of the county by good safe scores, and will be thus entitled to represent the county in the district tournament.

**45 YEARS AGO--FEB. 23, 1940**  
The local highway leading into Friona from the north on the west side of the city is now receiving a substantial caliche surfacing, the work being done by WPA workers of the county. It is proposed to extend the surfacing to a distance

of three miles north. This will be a decided help to traffic from that part of the territory.

**40 YEARS AGO--FEB. 23, 1945**  
The Air Medal and Oak Leaf Cluster has been awarded to Staff Sgt. Roy E. Hughes, and the decorations will be sent to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Buford Hughes, according to word received here last week from the Air Force.

**35 YEARS AGO--FEB. 17, 1950**  
The \$93,000 sewer system was completed in Friona this week, finishing a project which was started by passage of a bond issue in June of 1946. Completion of the new system should pay big dividends to the estimated 1550 Friona residents.

**30 YEARS AGO--FEB. 18, 1955**  
Construction has commenced on a cotton gin located one-half mile west of Hub, the owners announced this week. To be known as the West Hub Gin, the firm is to be headed by Leo Ruzicka, manager. The gin expects to be completed in March. The project is reported to involve about \$210,000.

**25 YEARS AGO--FEB. 18, 1960**  
Funeral services for Mrs. F.L. Reed, a resident of Parmer County the past 52 years, were conducted from the Friona Methodist Church at 4 p.m. Saturday.

Needing a victory to enter the district playoffs against Tulia, the Friona Squaws soundly defeated the Canyon girls, 83-48 last Friday night.

**20 YEARS AGO--FEB. 18, 1965**  
A man was found dead, apparently from exposure early Sunday morning in a Friona street. Patrolman Travis Clements, who investigated after a call was received by the police department, discovered the man's body at Fourth and Prospect. Officers are investigating.

**15 YEARS AGO--FEB. 19, 1970**  
Members of the Chamber of Commerce, the city manager and

publisher of the Friona Star met with representatives of General Telephone Co. of the Southwest Tuesday at noon, and discussed possible additional telephone service to Friona. One of the things discussed was the possibility of connecting Friona and Bovina for dialing purposes, with no toll or long distance charges.

**10 YEARS AGO--FEB. 16, 1975**  
Friona and Dimmitt, each winners of half a district title, go for the whole ball of wax next Thursday in a special playoff game to decide which team will enter the state playoffs. The battle will be played at Levelland's Texan Dome fieldhouse on Thursday, February 20.

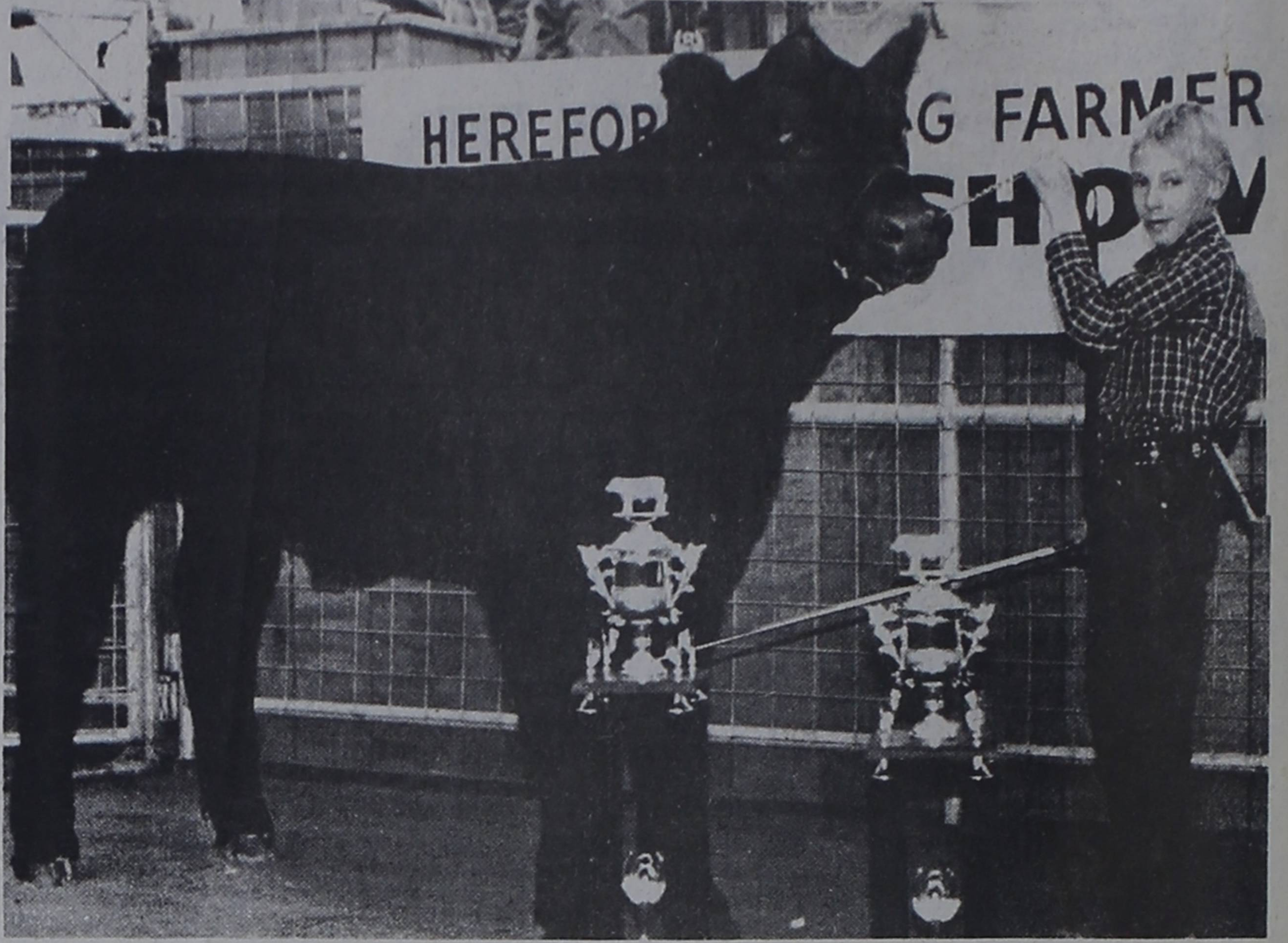

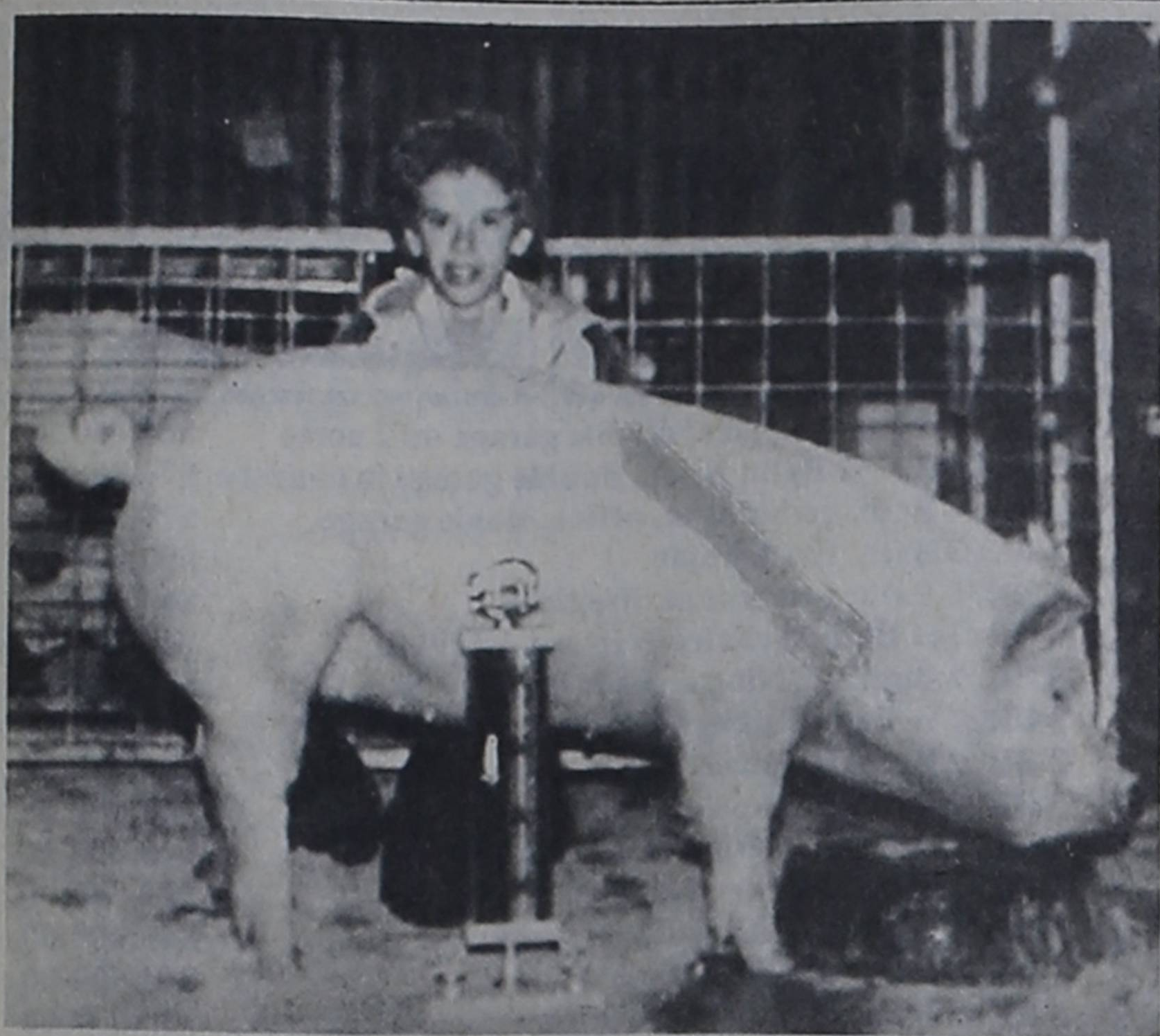

## Friona Industries Shares Are Bought

Friona Industries, Inc. announced today that it had been notified that Richard L. Falter and John C. Falter have completed the sale to Eller Enterprises, Inc. of 487,725 shares of Friona common stock, for a purchase price of \$17.25 cash per share. The shares sold represent approximately 22 per cent of the issued and outstanding shares of Friona common stock, and the purchase of these shares increases the combined holdings by Eller Enterprises and David G. Eller of Friona common stock to

approximately 27 per cent. Friona Industries also announced that the Company and Paine Webber are continuing to explore financial opportunities which would be more beneficial to Friona shareholders than the previously announced proposal by Eller Enterprises providing for the merger of Friona Industries into Eller Enterprises at a price of \$17.25 cash per share for Friona common stock. Friona Industries common stock is traded on the American Stock Exchange under the symbol FI.

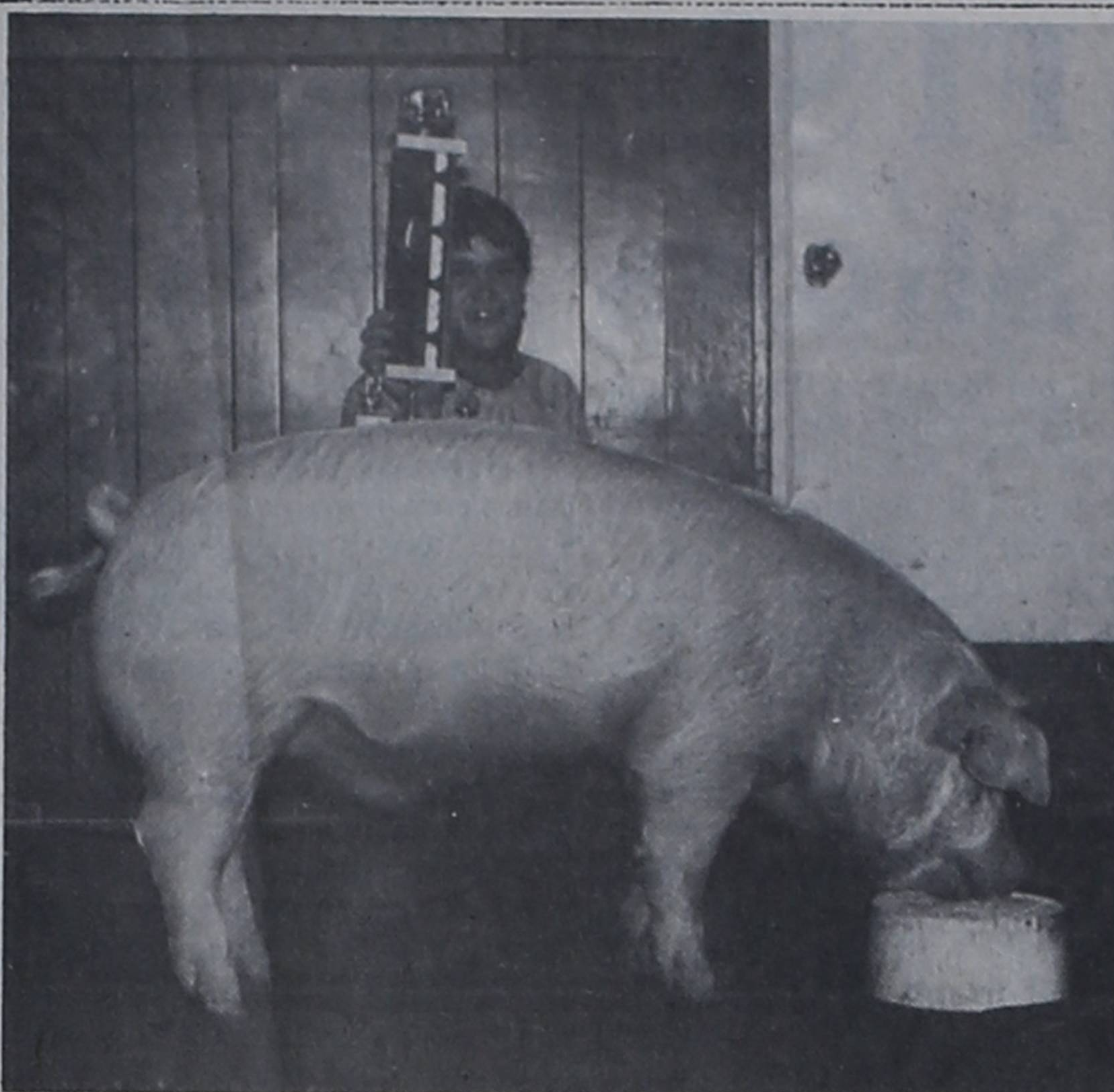

# Post Office Has Special Stamps

An adequate supply of "D" stamps and other nondenominated items is available at the Friona post office to help customers make a smooth transition after the February 17 postal rate change.

Postmaster Bill Wells says that the nondenominated "D" stamps in sheet, coil, and booklet formats represent the new 22-cent first-class rate. There are also nondenominated postal cards and plenty of two-cent stamps that, when added to 20-cent stamps, make up the new first-class letter rate.

"Nobody likes to see higher postal rates, but this increase is moderate and justified," Wells said. "Since the last increase in

November 1981, the cost of living in the United States, as measured by the Consumer Price Index, has gone up almost 13 per cent. The 22-cent stamp is only a 10 per cent rise," he continued.

"The nondenominated items are available because we estimate that stamp inventories in post offices at present will fall short of public demand and, we want to avoid customer inconvenience," Wells said.

Commemorative stamps, beginning with the Jerome Kern stamp, and other 22-cent stamps, are expected to replace the "D" stamps by the end of March, the Postmaster concluded.

# Workers May Have Funds Due

A person who works for more than one employer during the course of a year may have more Social Security taxes withheld than are required by law, Carl Thompson, Social Security manager in Clovis, said recently.

"If this occurs," Thompson said, "the person may claim a refund for the excess amount when he or she files an income tax return for that year, however, if the excess withholding occurs because an employer deducts too much in taxes, the person should ask the employer for a refund."

"Earnings in excess of the maximum amount that counts for Social Security cannot be used in figuring the benefit rate," he concluded.

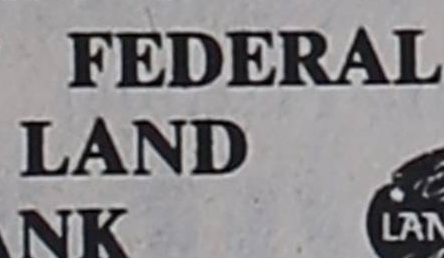

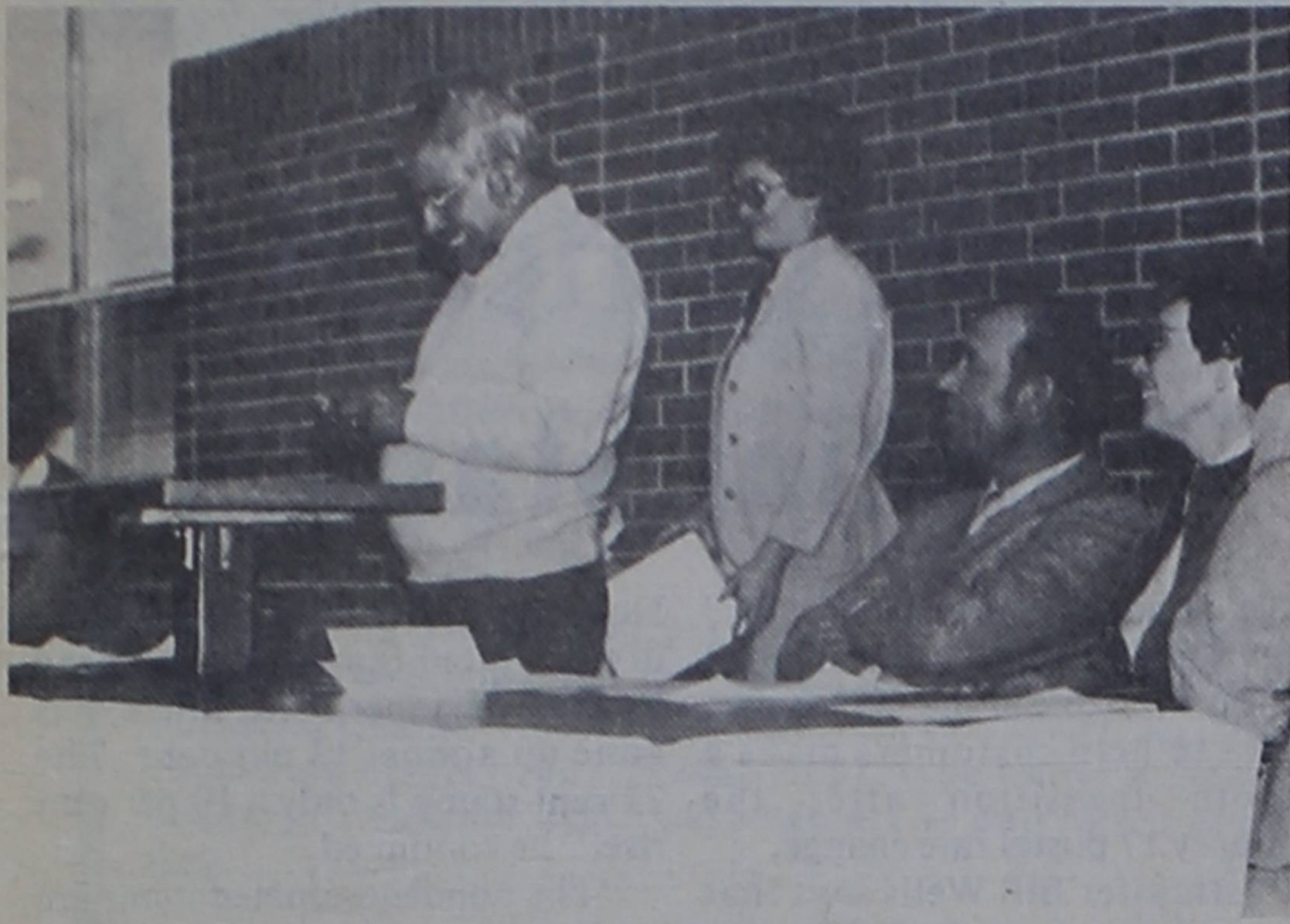

## Medicare Coverage

### Is Available

People approaching age 65 should know that they do not need to retire to get Medicare coverage. The law provides for separate applications for retirement and for Medicare.

Medicare helps pay health care bills for people 65 and over or who have been entitled to disability benefits for 24 months. Also, insured workers and their dependents who have permanent kidney failure have Medicare protection.

Medicare hospital insurance is financed through the Social Security taxes people pay. People who want the medical insurance part must enroll and pay a monthly premium. Medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and certain other expenses not covered by hospital insurance.

or 7.5 per cent, from the amount received for the similar period a year earlier.

The check reflects sales for the month of November, 1984, and did not include the Christmas shopping period. Some cities are expecting a slight increase for the Christmas season taxes, while others may be disappointed.

Parmer County's three municipalities received checks for the current period totalling \$9,261.88. This was an increase of \$602.14, or 6.95 per cent over the checks received for the corresponding period a year earlier.

"Statewide payments are up more than 15 per cent over last January's checks, mostly because of the new items brought under the sales tax by the legislature last summer," Bullock said. He cautioned city governments not to expect similar increases for the rest of 1985, as the rate of increase might not continue.

As usual, Houston's check was the largest single payment--\$8.6 million, compared to \$8.2 million in January of 1984. Dallas received \$6.7 million, up 24 per cent from the \$5.4 million a year ago. San Antonio's payment of \$3.1 million is 22 per cent more than 1984's \$2.5 million.

# FI Statement Shows Profit

Friona Industries, Inc. had net earnings of \$2,075,000, or 94 cents per share on sales of \$161 million for the first six months ended December 31, 1984.

This was an increase of 12 per cent in both net earnings and sales when compared with the prior year's first half which had net earnings of \$1,821,000, or 78 cents per share, on sales of \$144 million.

"Profits were reported by all seven industry segments, with Company-owned Cattle accounting for the major share of the year-to-year gain," said Ron Davenport, chairman, president and chief executive officer.

Operating profits from Company-owned Cattle were \$1.2 million. In last year's first half, an operating loss of \$52,000 was incurred by this segment. Approximately 6,000 fewer head of cattle were marketed in 1984 than in 1983.

The Custom Feeding, Animal Health Supplies and Transportation and Other segments had higher operating profits than in the prior year's first half, while Meat Processing and Distribution, Commercial Feeds and Grain were below fiscal 1984.

"Expenses involved with the move to a new processing and warehousing facility in Columbus, Ohio, curtailed operating profits from Meat Processing and Distribution operations, as did lower profit margins," said Davenport.

During the first half of the fiscal year, the Village Meats, Inc. subsidiary processed about 41 million pounds of ground beef, up 26 per cent. The number of Wendy's Old Fashioned Hamburger Restaurants serviced with ground beef and other food items increased by 80 units and totaled 959 restaurants at the end of the first half.

Occupancy at the Company's four feedyards increased 9 per cent to an average number of about 108,600 head on feed during the six-month period.

During the second quarter, net earnings of \$1,128,000, or 51 cents per share, on sales of \$76 million compared with net earnings of \$1,133,000, or 48 cents per share, on sales of \$78 million in the second quarter of fiscal 1984. The Company had 123,000 fewer weighted average shares outstanding as the result of repurchasing shares from an institutional investor in April 1984.

"The second quarter substantially mirrored the trend of the first quarter's operations," said Davenport.

Following the end of the quarter, Friona Industries announced on January 16, 1985, that its board of directors had deferred taking any action at this time with respect to a proposed agreement and plan of merger with Eller Enterprises, Inc., providing for the merger of Friona Industries into Eller at a price of \$17.25 per share for Friona common stock.

Friona Industries also announced that it has retained Paine Webber to explore financial alternatives to the proposed merger, including the sale of all or part of the Company's assets at a price which would be more beneficial to shareholders.

The Company's common stock is traded on the American Stock Exchange under the symbol FI.

A variety of learning centers will offer "hands-on" experience in areas such as oil painting, wind chime making, archery, needlecrafts and chair caning.

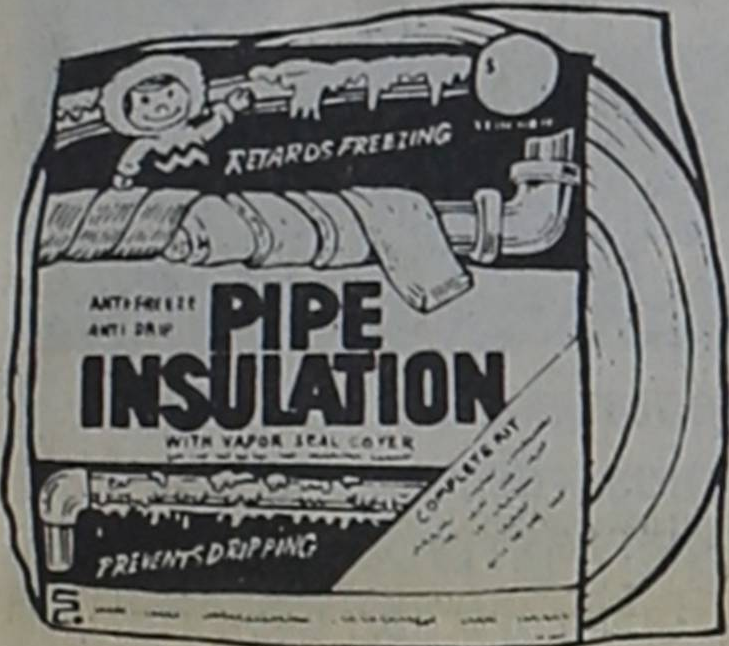

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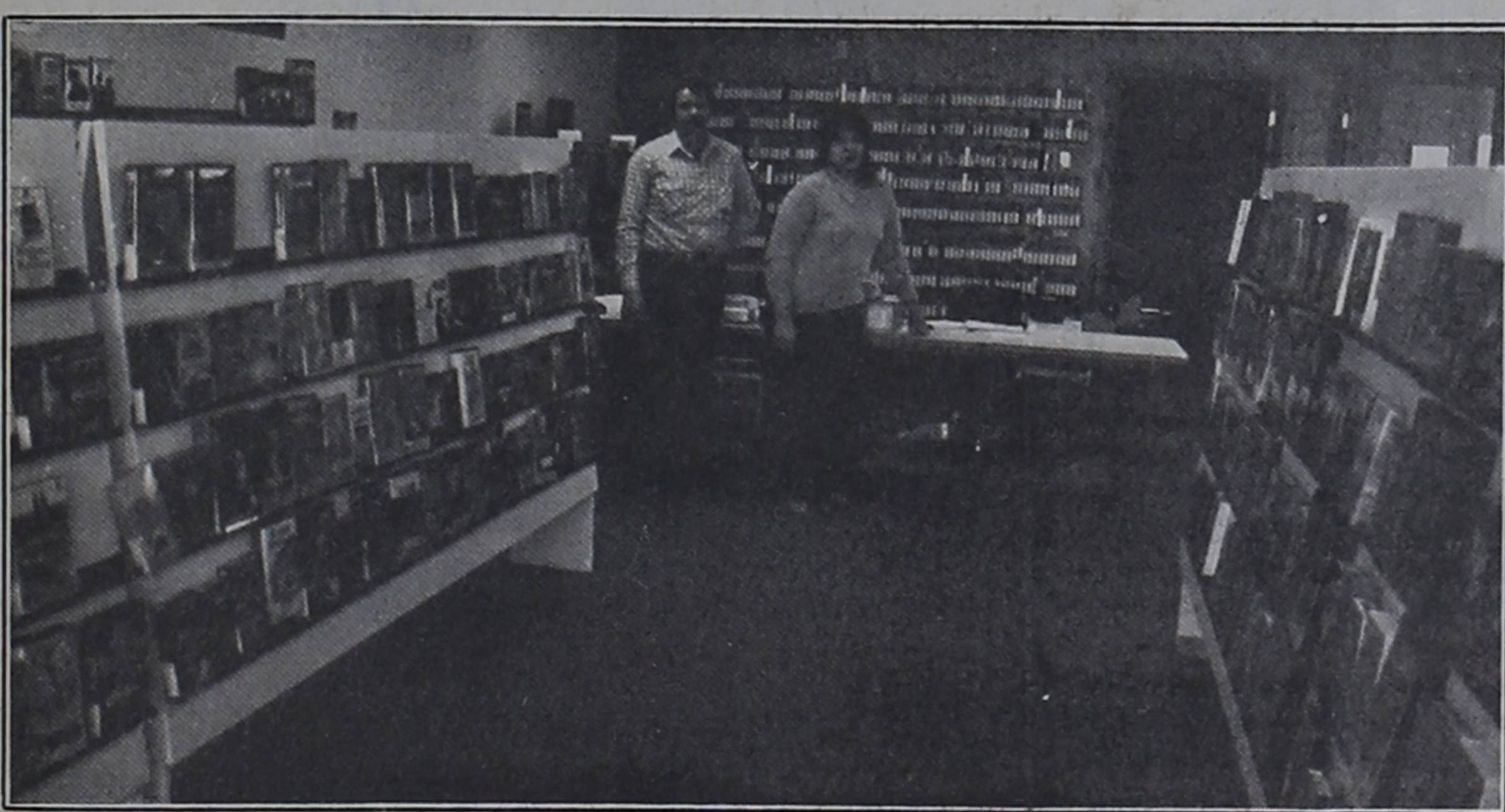

## Vo-Ag's Future Is Now In Jeopardy

"Learning to Do, Doing to Learn, Earning to Live, Living to Serve" has been the motto for the Texas Future Farmers of America since the state received its first charter in 1929. From the very beginning vocational agriculture and the FFA have been looked upon as essential education maintaining a link with the important agriculture economy of the state.

According to Chris Kountz, past president of the Texas Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association, "The very existence of these programs is being threatened by Texas Education Agency administrative actions and reformulation of vocational education funding to schools."

"Based on the new funding formula provided by House Bill 72 this past summer, a vocational agriculture program will have to maintain an average of 65 students in order to receive adequate funding, and in many schools, depending on the experience of the teacher and local economic factors, the number of students will need to be greater to maintain funding levels. In the rural areas of the Panhandle and South Plains the schools will not be able to pick up the slack caused by the loss of funding. At the very best the quality of the programs will severely deteriorate."

"Another devastating blow to vocational agriculture has been the proposal to close the area vocational education offices. The offices which are located in Plainview, Big Spring, Houston, Stephenville, Denton, Sulphur Springs, Austin, Waco, Crockett and Corpus Christi provide the necessary coordination and quality control for the vocational programs in the high schools," says Kountz.

He says, "The Occupational Education Specialist (Supervisors) located in the area offices are the important link between local and state activities."

State Rep. Jerry Clark of Buna,

a former state FFA president, says the Texas Future Farmers of America program will be severely crippled if the structure of the area occupational specialist is done away with.

FFA members in Texas currently number more than 60,000 in 949 FFA chapters. The area specialists coordinate leadership events, judging contests, workshops, and conventions involving more than three-fourths of the Texas FFA students. In addition, the area staff conducts inservice meetings for vocational agriculture teachers and provides technical assistance to schools in developing curriculums and maintaining program standards.

Ronnie Teichelman, Occupational Education Specialist for Texas Education Agency's Area I office in Plainview which serves Friona High School says there are three essentials that must be met if vocational agriculture education is to survive in many Texas schools.

"We've got to get vocational funding channeled back to the small schools. Secondly, the area offices have to be served. And finally, the teacher training supplement has to be funded to the colleges and universities."

"Without the teacher training supplement the universities such as Texas Tech would not be able to sponsor judging contests and teacher improvement workshops."

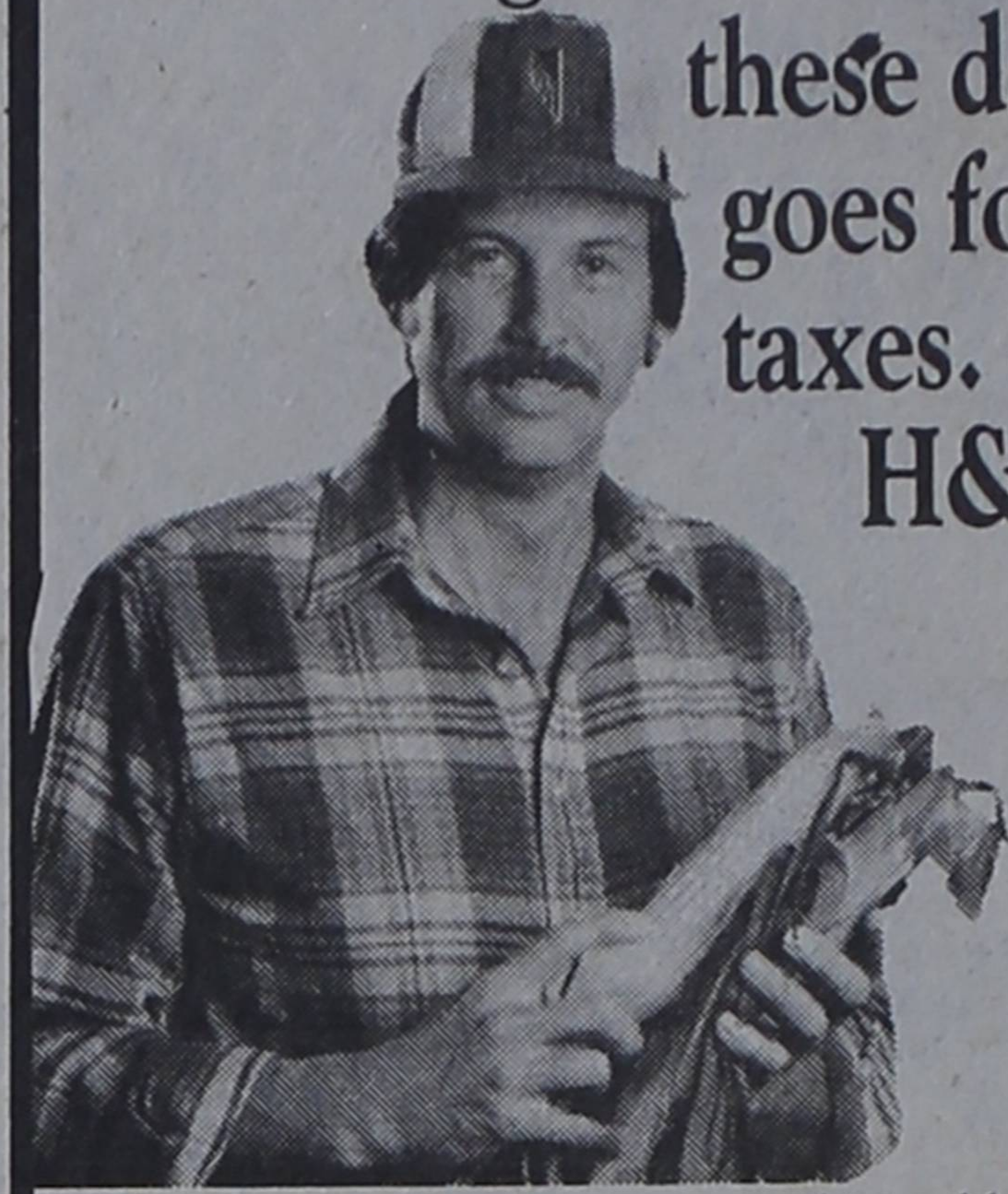
According to Teichelman, vocational agriculture programs such as the one in Friona High School under the direction of Benny Pryor will not be able to maintain the same high standards that the people of Friona have become accustomed to.

"There will only be a shell remaining of the co-curricular activities that provide motivation and education to students."

Vocational agriculture provides the students with job entry level skills in the technical areas of animal science, plant science, soil science, agriculture mechanics, and management, along with a strong program in leadership training. Additionally, in the previous school year Texas vocational agriculture students earned a net income of over \$24 million from their supervised occupational experience programs.

Vocational Agriculture Education in Texas is in trouble. It will take a united effort from the people to preserve what has become a tradition for more than 50 years. If you would like to help contact Benny Pryor, vocational agriculture teacher, for more information.

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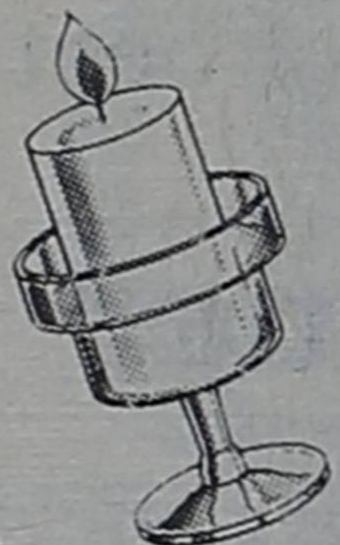

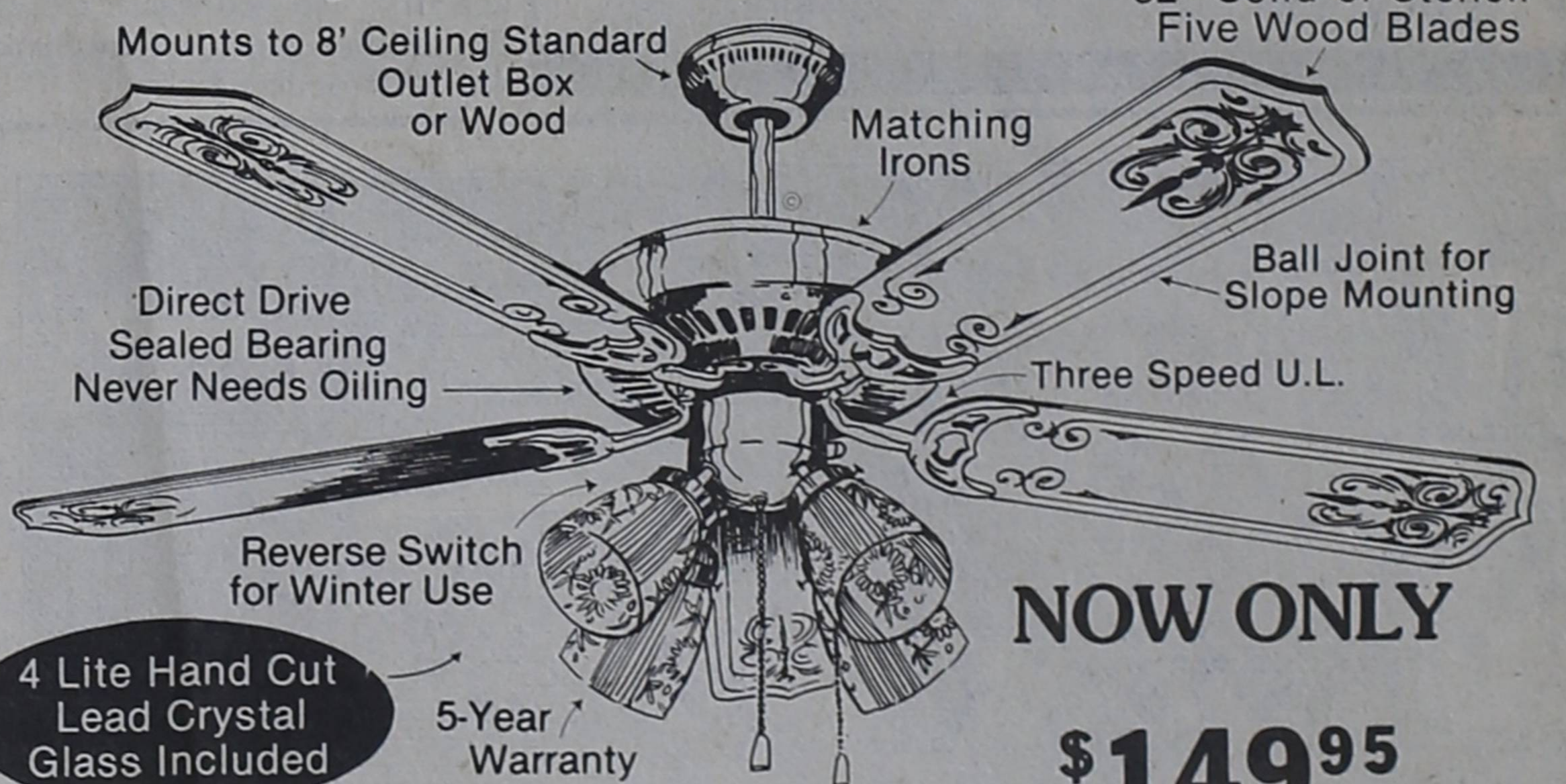

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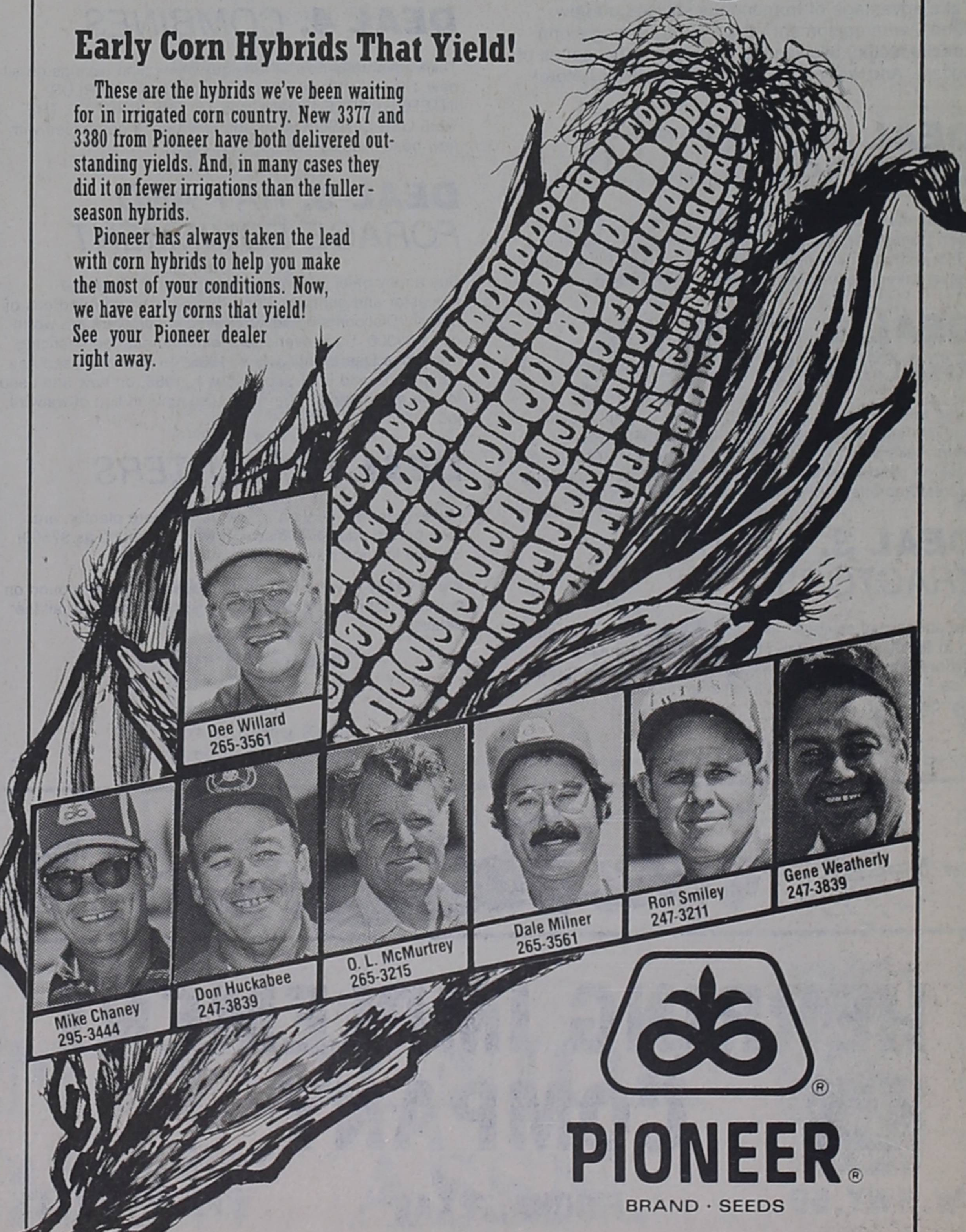
