Change Noted For Spraying

ONE THING WHICH has been a mystery to this writer since the hostage crisis involving the passengers on TWA Flight 847 is the fact that with all of the terrorist acts, President Reagan would even have to ask Americans not to travel to potential trouble spots, such as Greece.

Whatever happened to common sense?

With the additional acts of terror against airlines, such as the Air-India and Canadian-Pacific bombings, both of which originated in Canada, bound for overseas, it seems to us that this would make for a very strong argument for Americans to curtail overseas travel, at least for the immediate future.

We realize that everyone can't be expected to completely stop foreign travel, as this would be another form of "giving in" to the terrorists.

But to schedule, or to continue with plans for a trip anywhere close to the Middle East, in this writer's opinion, would be like volunteering for a real-life James Bond adventure, and would include more chances than we'd care to take.

A trip to the Holy Land has never been very high on my personal list, and with the events of recent weeks, has just sunk to the very bottom of any possible trip list, if it were not there already.

For years we have preached the idea of visiting our own state and nation's attractions before heading to the overseas attractions. It sort of goes along with the "shop at home" mentality, and besides, when you don't have a lot of extra money to spend on travel, it fits right nicely with your budget.

When our older children were young, we made it a practice of showing them our own state's attractions to begin with, such as San Antonio with the Alamo, its other missions and river attractions. One of our trips to the Alamo City coincided with Texas' only world's fair, HemisFair. Some of the fair's exhibits are still attractions today.

We've also visited Austin, the state capitol, with the eye-appeal of the central Texas flora and fauna. (It helps if you can tie this trip into a state meet of some sort, an experience most of us have been able to enjoy at one time or other.)

Then there's Dallas-Fort Worth with Six Flags as its major attraction; Houston, with the San Jacinto Monument, Battleship Texas and seafood restaurants. Galveston Island is a place we could spend a week, picking out old homes to tour.

El Paso has some attractions, and you can go to the races in Juarez without too much danger of being hijacked, although you might lose the contents of your wallet if you don't have a game plan. You can see the "Texas" production without ever leaving the Panhandle.

New Mexico and Colorado have to be considered "home states" for those of us in the Panhandle, since many of their attractions are in closer proximity than some of those we have named.

Closeby attractions in New Mexico include Carlsbad Caverns, Ruidoso, Red River, Albuquerque and Santa Fe. And in Colorado--pick your place.

To our way of thinking, there are plenty of places to see right here in our own "circle." Naturally, there are other places of interest within the continental United States.

A person could go for years and never have to think about foreign travel. If it's flying over water that's appealing, you can put Hawaii into your schedule, and still be in the U.S. of A.

Then, if you just have to have some excitement in your life--take a trip to New York or Miami. You don't have to go abroad!

The Texas Department of Agriculture is suspending the issuance of blanket spray permits in Deaf Smith, Parmer, Collinsworth, Donley and Hall Counties effective Friday, June 21. The action is being taken following the recent confirmation of several hormonal herbicide drift cases involving more than 1,000 acres. In the last two years, more than 50,000 acres of cotton in the Panhandle were severely damaged by drift from hormone herbicide, the most recent the 1984 Big Drift in Parmer and Deaf Smith Counties.

Angela Lamb, TDA Supervisor of the Amarillo District Office, said "We checked with several aerial applicators in the area and discussed the situation with them. They agreed that we should take the steps necessary to stop it, given the magnitude of the 1984 drift situation."

Effective immediately, no blanket spray permits will be issued for the four regulated counties (Hall is already covered until October 15), and all permits previously issued will be rescinded. That action means that the use of hormone herbicides must be covered by an individual spray permit for EACH application. In addition, no permit may be issued if there are any susceptible crops within 4 miles of the target area.

TDA has a team of field inspectors in the Panhandle as a direct result of last summer's drift problems in which more than \$16,000 in fines have been collected so far. The field inspectors are maintaining a high visibility in the area with the emphasis on obtaining voluntary compliance.

The high volatile (Butyl Ester) formulation of 2,4-D is used to treat broad leaved weeds, but can cause severe damage if it comes in contact with cotton or other susceptible crops. The Butyl Ester formulation can move off target even after being properly applied, if the temperature reaches 85 to 90 degrees. Its use is already prohibited in Deaf Smith, Parmer and Hall Counties during warm weather months. The confirmed drift cases so far are not believed to involve heavy losses, but any additional contact with the herbicide would only make the situation worse.

Lamb said, "As a farmer myself, I know those herbicides are necessary to modern farming practices, but we at TDA have a duty to protect people and crops from off-target pesticides. It's against the law to let those chemicals drift off target. We need to know who is doing the spraying and when."

Court Has Routine Business

Mostly routine items were on the agenda for the Parmer County Commissioners at their regular meeting June 10.

Bernard Gowens of Brown, Graham, & Co. met with the court to present the audit report on the county's books for 1984. A motion was approved to accept the report, and pay the auditor's invoice.

Motion was passed to renew the county's liability insurance with Ethridge-Spring Agency of Friona. Payment of the county's foster child boarding care bills, in the amount of \$1,519 was approved. This money will be reimbursed to the county by the state.

District Clerk Marjorie Watkins met with the court to discuss the part-time helper for her office. A motion was passed for the clerk's helper to work four days a week instead of three.

An indigent citizen met with the court asking for help on medicine bills. After considerable discussion, no action was taken.

Motion was passed to hire Mack Heald to spray the trees on the courthouse lawn for worms and beetles.

A representative of Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Texas met with the court to explain the company's new insurance proposal. A motion was approved to tentatively approve the plan.

A motion was passed to allow county machinery to do soil work on several county farms, when the machinery is not otherwise needed. Cost of such work is paid by the farmers asking for the work. Those approved were Pete Fulcher, David Sides, Richard Haseloff, Leon Billingsley, Carl Blackburn and Dee Pearson, all in Precinct 3.

Plans Are Finalized For Fourth Of July Activities

Residents of the Friona area will help celebrate the nation's 209th birthday next week, during the city's annual July 4th celebration. Most of the events will be held at the Friona Community Center.

Kicking off the events will be the annual free watermelon feed at Friona State Bank on their lawn, between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., on Wednesday, July 3. Residents and customers are invited to stop by the bank anytime during the day for a free slice of watermelon.

The annual holiday tennis tournament will contain more divisions this year, with divisions for juniors being added, according to director Lynn Weiland. Deadline for entering the tournament is July 2 for juniors and July 3 for adults. Entry forms can be filled out at the Chamber of Commerce office.

The Friona Noon Lions Club will hold their annual barbecued beef and sausage dinner at the Community Center July 4th, with serving to begin at 11:30 a.m. Tickets for the meal are on sale from members of the Friona Lions Club. Advance tickets cost \$4.50 for adults, and the price at the door will be \$5.00.

In the tennis tournament, there will be divisions for 17 and 18 year olds, 15 and 16 year olds, 13 and 14 year olds, and 12 and under. There will be both singles and doubles divisions for each age group.

In the adult division, there will be singles and doubles for both men and women, as well as mixed doubles. There will be no classification in the adult division. Play will start in the junior division on July 3, and in the adult division July 4th. Entry fees of \$3 for singles and \$5 per team for doubles will be charged.

 - 4) Also being increased are the theft limits for furs and jewelry. They will go from \$500 to \$1,000 and the limit for silverware, goldware and pewterware theft are increased from \$1,000 to \$2,500. Money, gold, silver, etc. goes up from \$100 to \$200. No increase in premium.

So, let us all try to be extra careful this holiday and make it enjoyable for everyone!!

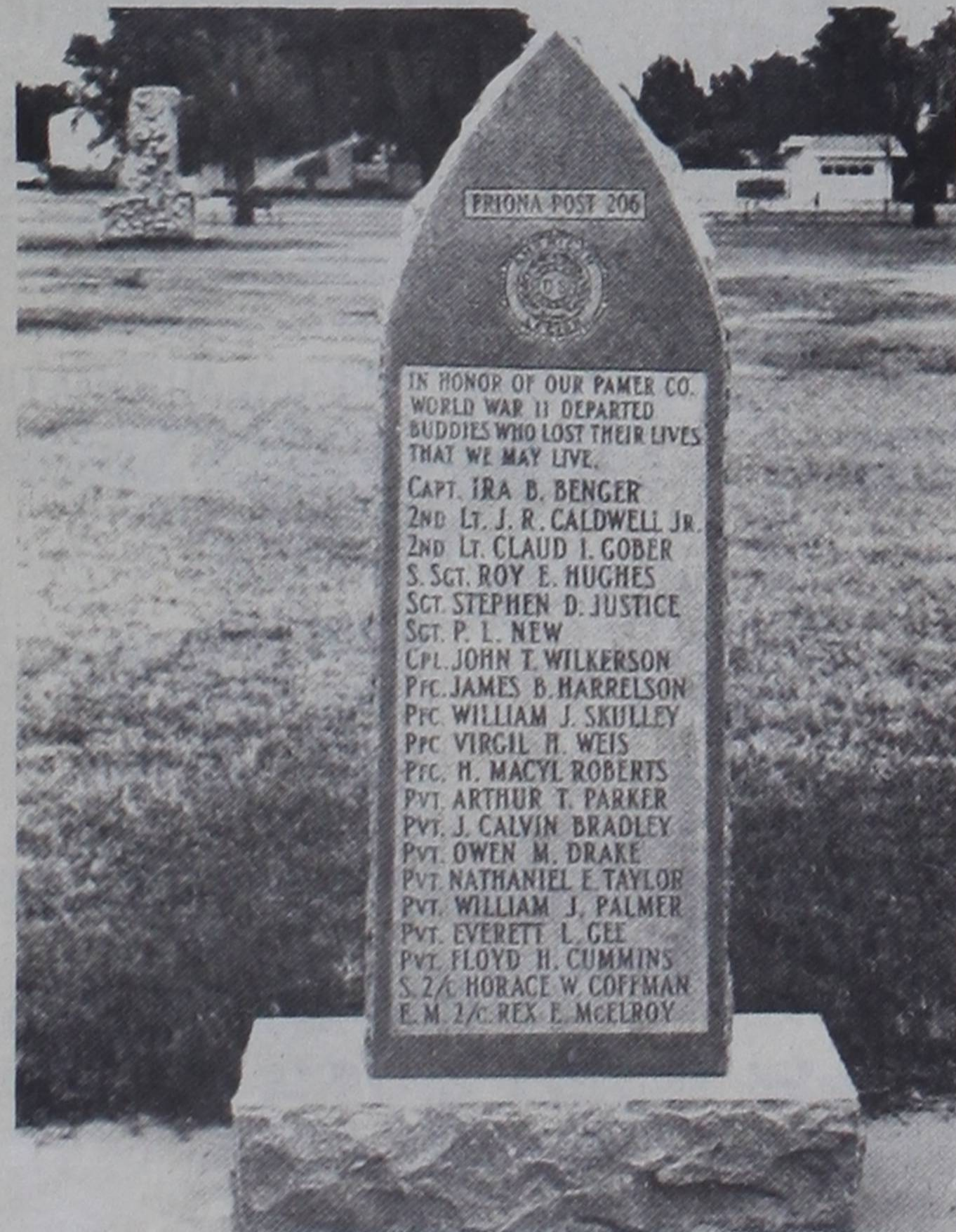

NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and tenant resale services.

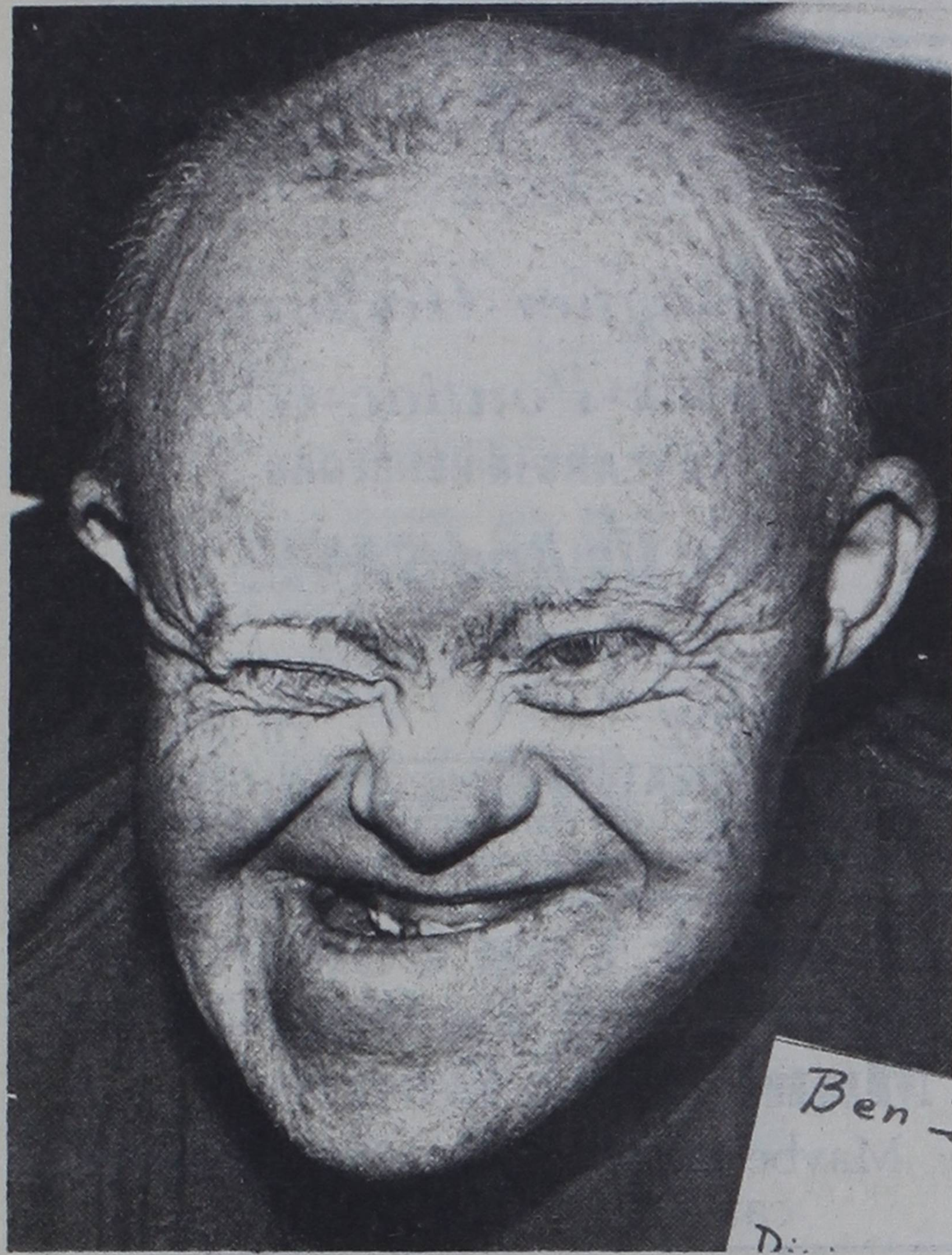
As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently, there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

The proposed rate schedule is on file with the Commission for public inspection and is also available at any business office of General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

During the seminar, TFB President S.M. True, Jr. and TFB Executive Director Warren Newberry responded to questions from the students and discussed Farm Bureau and its future.

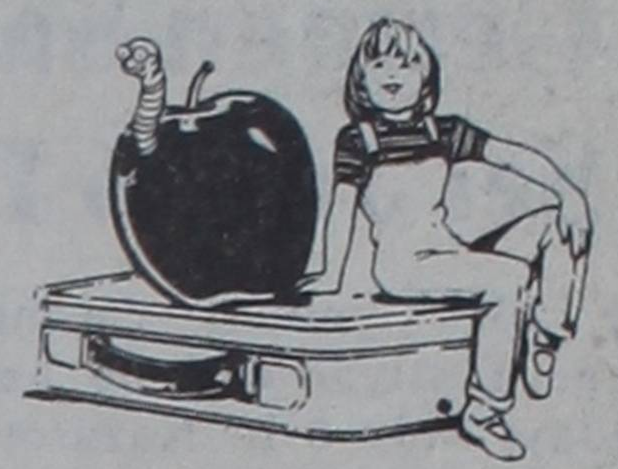

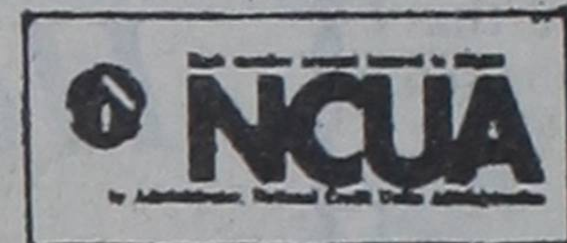

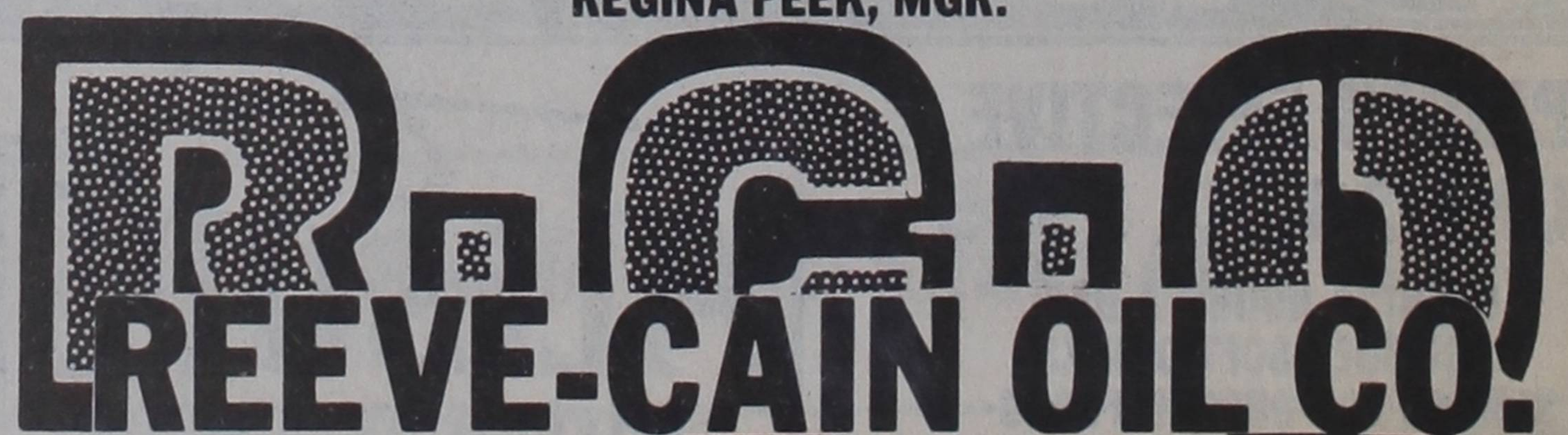
