'Two More Doctors' Key To Success Of Hospital

10 Pages In One Section

"If we could just recruit two more doctors " Doyle Walls says wishfully in speaking of what he believes is the primary way of solving a financial dilemma facing Caprock Hospital District. Walls is chairman of the hospital board.

Walls addressed Floydada Rotary Club last Wednesday and Floydada Lions Club last Thursday, enlisting their aid in the search for more physicians.

Two additional doctors in Floydada would produce a heavier hospital patient load, he believes, and thus would mean addition revenue.

Caprock Hospital, which is licensed for 40 patients, "had an average daily patient load of about seven" for the fiscal year which ended Sept. 30. The numbers of persons receiving treatment varied from 0 to 21 during the past year. "Two more doctors should put us up to about 20-21 patients daily (average)

Would Insure More Patients

For the fiscal year which ended Sept. 30, Caprock Hospital District experienced a \$32,000 loss for the hospital and ambulanace service combined "above taxes and income." The actual net loss was \$273,000 for the hospital, less \$246,000 collected in taxes.

The hospital district had operating revenue of \$480,000 and expenses of \$787,000.

Net actual loss from operation of the ambulance service was "about \$5,500." Seven thousand, eight hundred dollars was billed to patients for the fiscal year just ended, but only 55 per cent of this was collected.

Floyd County and City of Floydada contribute \$350 each monthly "to help maintain the ambulance fund.

In a capsule, Walls evaluates the hospital situation by saying that "it is just a matter of spending more than we are taking in.'

Despite the admitted need for more doctors, Walls "commends our two fine doctors - Dr. Jack Jordan and Dr. A.E. Guthrie — and our fine surgeon — Dr. Pedro Ochoa." Dr. Ochoa averages 15 surgeries per month.

A layman's thinking might be that the answer lies in fewer expenses. However, Walls told the Rotarians and the Lions that "we have cut expenses as much as possible." He quoted one medical authority from outside the county as saying "I don't see how you operate the hospital so economically!" Caprock Hospital has "49 full and

part-time employees with an annual payroll of approximately \$350,000 annu-

Expenses for telephone and utilities average \$4,000 each month. The phone 'represents only \$500-\$600 of this." Caprock Hospital alternates on an annual basis between City of Floydada and Southwestern Public Service Co. as its electrical source "thereby assuring a standby souce of electricity.

Insurance premiums for the year area about \$35,000. "This includes our employees' hospitalization, plus liability, workmen's compensation, insurance on the clinic, etc." Employees are responsible are hospitalization for their families.

ADMINISTRATOR COMMENDED

Walls told the Rotarians that Administrator Nell McClung "with the cooperation of other employees, fills numerous jobs." The next day, he told Lions that

'Nell wears a lot of different hats: she does everything but drive the ambulance.'

The board chairman explained that "there frequently is a 60 to 90 day lag in receiving our money" from Medicare, Medicaid, and insurange firms. Medicare pays 80 per cent of charges on eligible persons' hospital bills.

Discussing the ambulance service, Walls said that "improvement has been noted in service." He commended ambulance drivers who are "on call 24 hours a day at the rate of about 83 cents an hour while on standby.'



What would have happened had Iranian students who attempted to lay siege to the Beverly Hills, Calif., mansion where the sister and 90-year-old mother of the Shah of Iran were staying pulled such a stunt in their homeland? Most likely, they would have been shot!

In Iran, dissent is not encouraged, peaceful or otherwise.

It is different in the United States. Being free to speak one's mind is one of America's most prized freedoms, as its place at the top of the Bill of Rights indicates.

"Congress shall make no law abridging the freedom of speech....or the right of the people to peaceably to assemble" Uncle Sam has always permitted peaceful dissent.

But why should foreign students - many "planted", in our opinion - be allowed to constantly create not-always peaceful demonstrations and generally cause disruptions in this country, where they are student guests....at least that is their supposed purpose.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen wants any Iranian student found guilty of breaking U.S. laws speedily deported. We wholeheartedly agree!

These young Iranians' destructive behavior would not be tolerated in their mother country. In the United States, these guests should be permitted to freely speak their minds, assemble to protest the Shah's government, even his family's presence here.

But the first time one of them so much as breaks a window or sets a fire in expressing his opinion, that person should face immediate deportation.

The same situation should exist for any visitor in this nation!

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
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

QUESTIONS FIELDED

A: The doctors do not accept OB patients.

Q: Could malpractice insurance be an factor in an OB practice?

A: (by Willson; quoting an example) One doctor's malpractice insurance premiums are \$7,000 annually, but if that physician had an OB practice the premiums would be \$21,000.

Q: What about a contract with the Texas Tech University School of Medicine to supply doctors?

A: The Tech School of Medicine is operating at Crosbyton Clinic Hospital on a trial basis, but this is the only hospital at present.

O: What about outstanding debts. A: "If everybody paid their bill, we'd be in good shape. Some can't and some won't.

Q: What is the possibility of reducing expenses?

A: "We have reduced employees and everything else we think we can."

Q: What is the value of the Caprock Hospital plant? A: Approximately \$11/4 million.

Q: Why is it so hard to get doctors to small towns? A: Some doctors choose to specialize

and some doctors or their wives prefer to go to a larger city. This is partially because of constantly being on call.

Mr Waggoner was a son-in-law of Mrs. Claude Wofford of Lockney.


Services were Tuesday afternoon in First Christian Church of Claude. Burial was in Claude Cemetery by N.S. Griggs & Sons Funeral Directors.

QUANAH, ACME AND PACIFIC RAILWAY COMPANY ABANDONMENT BETWEEN ACME AND FLOYDADA, IN HARDEMAN, COTTLE, MOTLEY AND FLOYD COUNTIES, TX

The Interstate Commerce Commission's Section of Energy and Environment concluded that the proposed abandonment by the Quanah, Acme and Pacific Railway Company of its line between Acme and Floydada, TX, a distance of 104.8 miles, if approved by the Commission, does not constitute a major Federal action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment.

It was concluded, among other things, that diversion of rail traffic at current levels should result in only minimal increases in energy consumption, highway traffic, air pollutant, and noise intrusions. There has been little rail-related economic activity in the last several years, therefore, the abandonment is not expected to have a serious adverse impact on economic development. A determination has been made that the right-of-way would not be suitable for alternative public purposes following abandonment.

These conclusions are contained in a staff-prepared supplemental environmental threshold assessment survey, which is available on request to the Interstate Commerce Commission. Office of Proceedings, Washington, DC 20423; telephone 202-275-7011. Interested persons may comment on this matter by filing their statements in writing on or before February 9, 1979.

It should be emphasized that the environmental threshold assessment survey represents an evaluation of the environmental issues in the proceeding and does not purport to resolve the issues of whether the present or future public convenience and necessity permit discontinuance of the line proposed for abandonment.

Consequently, comments on the environmental study should be limited to discussion of the presence or absence of environmental impacts and reasonable alternatives.

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
