Would Insure More Patients

## 'Two More Doctors' Key To Success Of Hospital

"If we could just recruit two more doctors..." Doyle Walls says wishfully in speaking of what he believes is the primary way of solving a financial dilemma facing Caprock Hospital District. Walls is chairman of the hospital board.

The board chairman theorizes. With fixed costs fairly stable without regard to the number of patients, figures reveal that each additional patient would be "about 75 per cent on the profit side. Actually we can care for 40 patients almost as economically as seven."

other income, \$30,000; taxes collected, \$246,000." These figures result in the \$32,000 net loss.

Walls addressed Floydada Rotary Club last Wednesday and Floydada Lions Club last Thursday, enlisting their aid in the search for more physicians.

For the fiscal year which ended Sept. 30, Caprock Hospital District experienced a \$32,000 loss for the hospital and ambulance service combined "above taxes and income." The actual net loss was \$273,000 for the hospital, less \$246,000 collected in taxes.

A layman's thinking might be that the answer lies in fewer expenses. However, Walls told the Rotarians and the Lions that "we have cut expenses as much as possible." He quoted one medical authority from outside the county as saying "I don't see how you operate the hospital so economically!"

The board chairman explained that "there frequently is a 60 to 90 day lag in receiving our money" from Medicare, Medicaid, and insurance firms. Medicare pays 80 per cent of charges on eligible persons' hospital bills.

Two additional doctors in Floydada would produce a heavier hospital patient load, he believes, and thus would mean addition revenue.

LOSS REVEALED  
The hospital district had operating revenue of \$480,000 and expenses of \$787,000.

Caprock Hospital, which is licensed for 40 patients, "had an average daily patient load of about seven" for the fiscal year which ended Sept. 30. The numbers of persons receiving treatment varied from 0 to 21 during the past year.

Discussing the ambulance service, Walls said that "improvement has been noted in service." He commended ambulance drivers who are "on call 24 hours a day at the rate of about 83 cents an hour while on standby."

"Two more doctors should put us up to about 20-21 patients daily (average) — which would about break us even,"

Net actual loss from operation of the ambulance service was "about \$5,500." Seven thousand, eight hundred dollars was billed to patients for the fiscal year just ended, but only 55 per cent of this was collected.

Expenses for telephone and utilities average \$4,000 each month. The phone bill "represents only \$500-\$600 of this." Caprock Hospital alternates on an annual basis between City of Floydada and Southwestern Public Service Co. as its electrical source "thereby assuring a standby source of electricity."

Floyd County and City of Floydada contribute \$350 each monthly "to help maintain the ambulance fund."

In a capsule, Walls evaluates the hospital situation by saying that "it is just a matter of spending more than we are taking in."

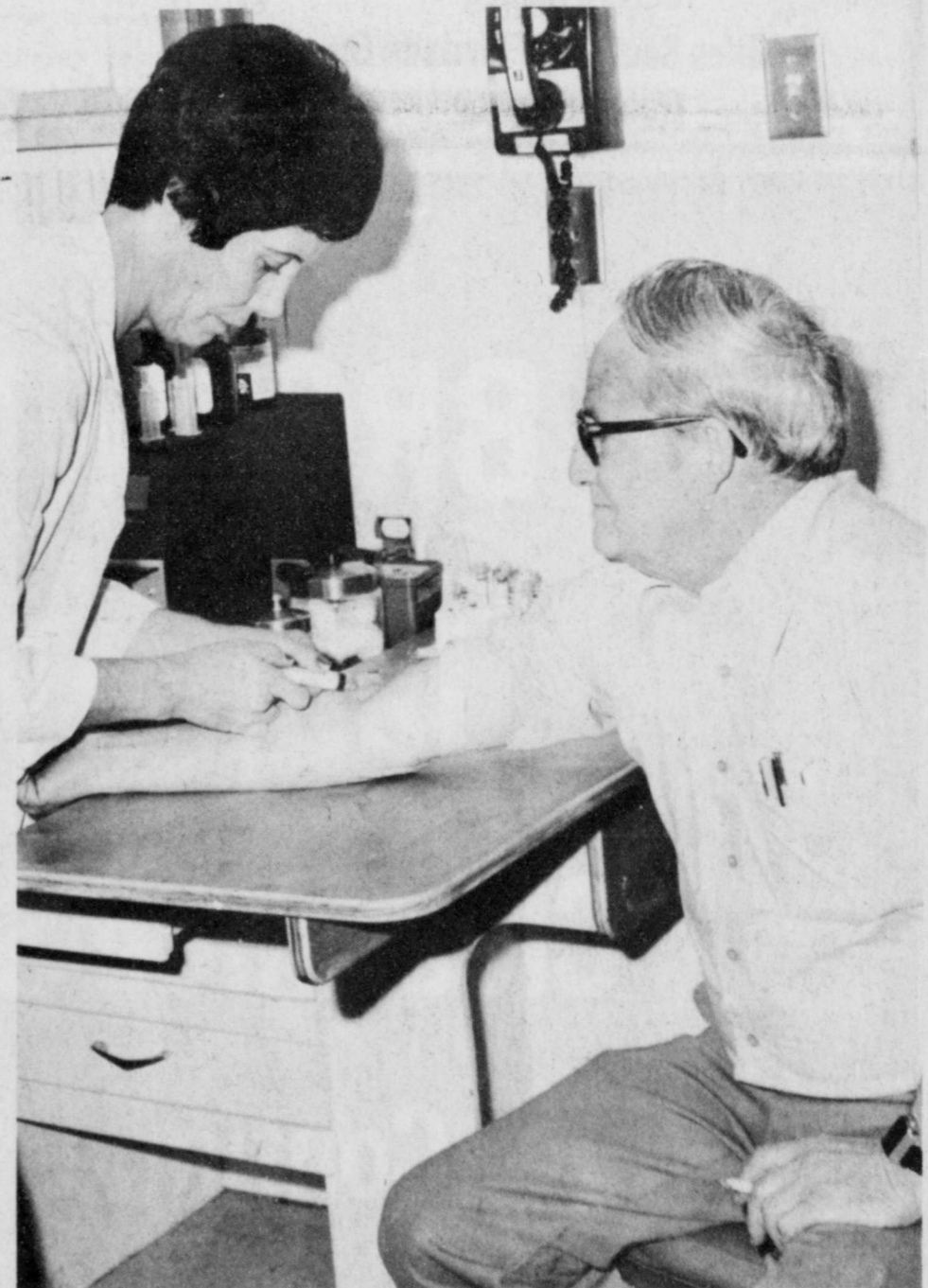

## AN EDITORIAL Send Them Home!

What would have happened had Iranian students who attempted to lay siege to the Beverly Hills, Calif., mansion where the sister and 90-year-old mother of the Shah of Iran were staying pulled such a stunt in their homeland? Most likely, they would have been shot!

In Iran, dissent is not encouraged, peaceful or otherwise.

It is different in the United States. Being free to speak one's mind is one of America's most prized freedoms, as its place at the top of the Bill of Rights indicates.

"Congress shall make no law...abridging the freedom of speech...or the right of the people to peaceably to assemble..." Uncle Sam has always permitted peaceful dissent.

But why should foreign students — many "planted", in our opinion — be allowed to constantly create not-always peaceful demonstra-

tions and generally cause disruptions in this country, where they are student guests...at least that is their supposed purpose.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen wants any Iranian student found guilty of breaking U.S. laws speedily deported. We wholeheartedly agree!

These young Iranians' destructive behavior would not be tolerated in their mother country. In the United States, these guests should be permitted to freely speak their minds, assemble to protest the Shah's government, even his family's presence here.

But the first time one of them so much as breaks a window or sets a fire in expressing his opinion, that person should face immediate deportation.

The same situation should exist for any visitor in this nation!

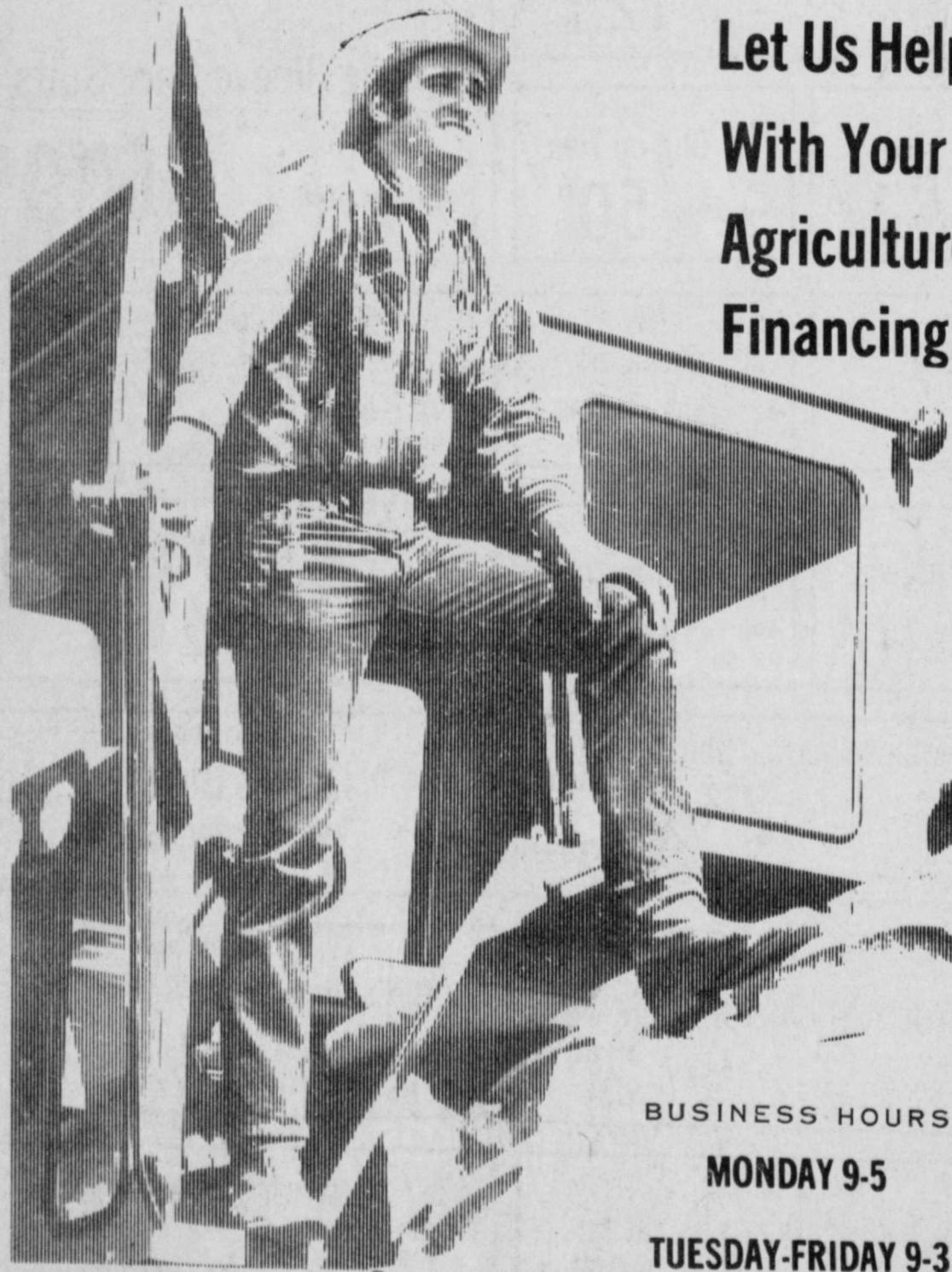

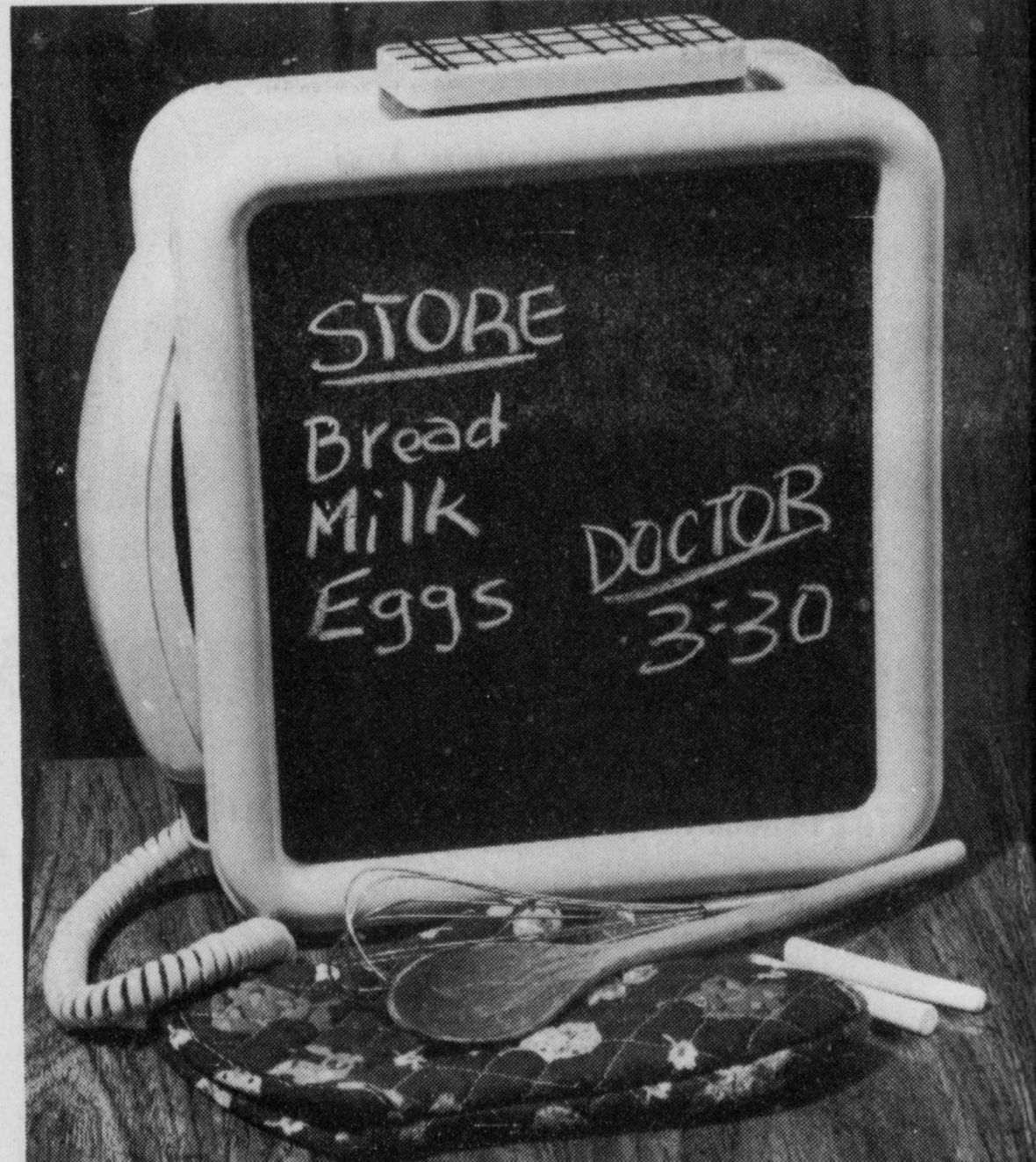

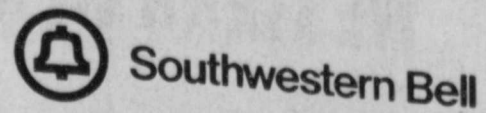

# Two More Doctors' Key To Success Of Hospital

Continued from Page One

In addition to physicians, the hospital always looking for RNs (registered nurses)....we have a constant recruitment program.

Walls said about the fact that 45 per cent of ambulance bills go unpaid, Walls said "when you go out and pick up an ambulance person, it's impossible to get payment before you take that person to the hospital."

**EXPENSES INCREASE**  
Caprock Hospital, not unlike other hospitals and individuals, is caught in an inflationary spiral. One example is that "dues to the Texas Hospital Association and American Hospital Association are \$3,100 for this year," compared to \$1,700 the previous year.

Caprock Hospital District owes \$100,000 to the Hill-Burton federal program. This is being retired with annual payments of slightly over \$20,000. The hospital has \$100,000 in certificates of deposit at First National Bank of Floydada.

However, funds have been borrowed against the CDs for the past two years "until the taxes came in." In 1977, \$30,000 was borrowed for a short period, and last year the loan was \$100,000.

Walls stresses that maximum taxation exists and that the only additional source of funds will come when property valuations are raised.

Despite the gloomy financial picture, Walls is optimistic. "We have bright spots," Walls smiles and mentions "our well-equipped hospital." He emphasizes "well equipped."

Walls notes that "charges are in line with other hospitals."

**OPEN DOOR POLICY**  
The hospital operates under "the open door policy, which means that emergency room services are not restricted to anyone." However, no patient is admitted to the hospital by anyone except a doctor. The emergency room is open between the hours of 5 p.m. and 8 a.m., as well as on Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays.

**PHYSICIAN RECRUITMENT**  
The board chairman says "we have tried everything we know to recruit doctors." Contracts have been made with two doctor recruitment firms, "but

to no avail."

Walls said "it takes doctors to get doctors" in answer to Rotary President Jimmy Willson's statement that Muleshoe has seven doctors and Littlefield has six persons practicing with another on the way.

He explains that a team of two young doctors would be advantageous because "then our doctors could alternate being on call and wouldn't be tied down all time." This situation has been detrimental in Floydada's quest for additional physicians.

**QUESTIONS FIELD**  
Some of the questions asked by Rotarians and Lions and Walls' answers:

Q: Why does Caprock Hospital not have an OB ward, which could be an asset in patient number?  
A: The doctors do not accept OB patients.

Q: Could malpractice insurance be an factor in an OB practice?  
A: (by Willson, quoting an example) One doctor's malpractice insurance premiums are \$7,000 annually, but if that physician had an OB practice the premiums would be \$21,000.

Q: What about a contract with the Texas Tech University School of Medicine to supply doctors?  
A: The Tech School of Medicine is operating at Crosbyton Clinic Hospital on a trial basis, but this is the only hospital at present.

Q: What about outstanding debts.  
A: "If everybody paid their bill, we'd be in good shape. Some can't and some won't."

Q: What is the possibility of reducing expenses?  
A: "We have reduced employees and everything else we think we can."

Q: What is the value of the Caprock Hospital plant?  
A: Approximately \$1 1/4 million.

Q: Why is it so hard to get doctors to small towns?  
A: Some doctors choose to specialize and some doctors or their wives prefer to go to a larger city. This is partially because of constantly being on call.

Q: Is the trend toward specialization?  
A: "No. The trend is back toward family practice, we are told."

**HOSPITAL NEEDED**  
At the conclusion of Thursday's program, Lion Boss Paul Westbrook told his club: "A community without a hospital is in bad shape. All of us need to get behind this thing!"

Walls told both groups "this is your hospital and your problem. The number one need in our community is for two doctors. We (board) think two doctors would be the answer to our problems, but we need more active community support in recruiting doctors."

He also emphasized that Caprock Hospital "could be a better drawing card for Floydada than any industry. People came here when they have relatives in the hospital, and frequently they shop while they are in town."

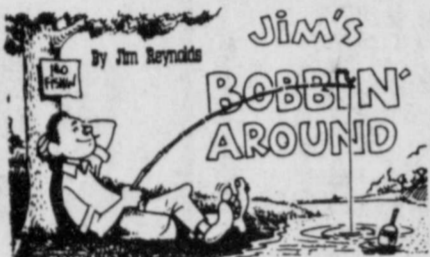

# Livestock Auction Owner Perishes In Plane Crash

A well-known South Plains resident perished Friday afternoon when a private plane in a muddy field in Crosby County, about 10 miles east of Acuff. The pair — (Jack) Alanson Ridpath Sr. of Acuff and John Thomas McCandless of Acuff — died instantly. The time of the mishap was placed at 3:10 p.m.

said the plane was "just circling and circling" before it "went straight down into the field."

The Crosbyton man said both of the plane's passengers were dead when he reached the scene. The craft's fuel tank burst on impact and witnesses detected a strong odor of gasoline. Roosevelt Volunteer Fire Department was summoned in the event that a fire might erupt.

McCandless was well in Floyd County. A rancher and stockman, he purchased Floydada Livestock Co. in September 1973.

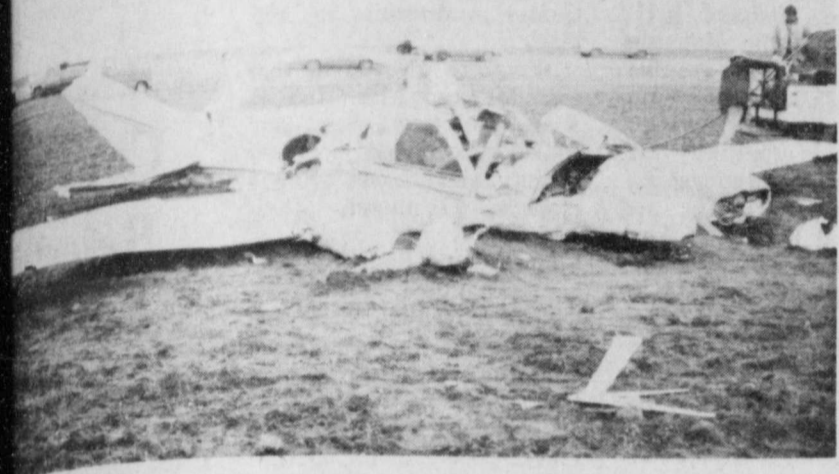

ABANDONMENT BETWEEN ACME AND FLOYDADA, IN HARDEMAN, COTTLE, MOTTLEY AND FLOYD COUNTIES, TX

The Interstate Commerce Commission's Section of Energy and Environment concluded that the proposed abandonment by the Quanah, Acme and Pacific Railway Company of its line between Acme and Floydada, TX, a distance of 104.8 miles, if approved by the Commission, does not constitute a major Federal action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment.

It was concluded, among other things, that diversion of rail traffic at current levels should result in only minimal increases in energy consumption, highway traffic, air pollutant, and noise intrusions. There has been little rail-related economic activity in the last several years, therefore, the abandonment is not expected to have a serious adverse impact on economic development. A determination has been made that the right-of-way would not be suitable for alternative public purposes following abandonment.

These conclusions are contained in a staff-prepared supplemental environmental threshold assessment survey, which is available on request to the Interstate Commerce Commission, Office of Proceedings, Washington, DC 20423; telephone 202-275-7011. Interested persons may comment on this matter by filing their statements in writing on or before February 9, 1979.

It should be emphasized that the environmental threshold assessment survey represents an evaluation of the environmental issues in the proceeding and does not purport to resolve the issues of whether the present or future public convenience and necessity permit discontinuance of the line proposed for abandonment.

Consequently, comments on the environmental study should be limited to discussion of the presence or absence of environmental impacts and reasonable alternatives.
