# Beedy, Molinar Exhibit Grand Champions

## Judging Monday And Tuesday In Floyd County Junior Livestock Show

Mark Beedy became the first exhibitor in Floyd County Junior Livestock Show annals to show three grand champion steers when judge Jerry Adams of Abernathy slapped his 1,217 pound cross on the hip, designating him as tops in the steer show Tuesday afternoon.

Minutes later, Adams — vocational agriculture teacher in Abernathy — singled out a 1,160 pound Hereford as reserve champion. The animal's owner

was Todd Beedy, Mark's younger brother. A 17-year-old Floydada High senior,

and last year showed the reserve champion. His brother, Mark, a 15-year-old Floydada High freshman, now

Eugene (Button) Beedy.

### LORI BAYLEY DOUBLE WINNER

Tuesday morning, judge Buddy Logsdon of Memphis had twice pointed at lambs belonging to a 15-year-old Lockney High freshman as breed champions. Lori Bayley exhibited both the champion Shropshire and Southdown wethers. She is the daughter of Mrs. Janie Bayley and the late Dan Bayley.

Another Lockney 4-Her, Matt Mitchell owned both the champion and reserve champion fine wool cross lambs. The nine-year-old fourth grader in Lockney Schools is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Mitchell.

Yet another Lockney 4-H member, Karyn Foster, became the first breed champion lamb owner Tuesday when her 99 pounder was chosen by Logsdon — Hall County agricultural Extension agent — as the elite fine wool lamb. She is the 13-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Foster.

### LARGE LAMB 'BREED'

Danny Tinney, a 17-year-old Floydada High senior and member of Floydada FFA Chapter, won the largest lamb breed when his 119 pound Suffolk was named champion medium wool. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Ray Tinney.

The reserve champion medium wool lamb was a Hampshire exhibited by Jenny Bayley of Lockney, Lori's younger sister.

The medium wool breeds included Hampshires, Suffolks, and other breeds. Hunter Smith, nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Choise Smith, showed his lamb to first place in other breeds. He is a Floydada 4-Her.

Reserve champions lambs were shown by: fine wool, Jodie Smith, Floydada; fine wool cross, Matt Mitchell, Lockney; Shropshire, Tracy Womack, Floydada; Southdown, Sherre Kinard, Lockney; and medium wool, Jenny Bayley, Lockney.

Susan Hendrix (Hampshire) of Floydada, Terri Sparkman (Suffolk) of Lockney, and Monty Williams (other breeds) and class reserve champions in the overall medium wool breed.

Emotions swept over a 16-year-old Lockney High junior, Dean Molinar, as judge Scotty Windham of Lazbuddie singled out his 250 pound Hampshire as grand champion of the swine division.

Moments later, Windham went to a 235 pound Duroc as reserve champion barrow. It was exhibited by Karen Pruitt, a 14-year-old Floydada High freshman.

Swine were placed Monday afternoon. Molinar's barrow first was chosen as first place heavy weight barrow and then as breed champion, which qualified the animal to vie for grand champion honors. The grand champion

**FLOYDADA SENIOR CITIZENS LARGEST**  
Local residents probably fail to realize that the Floydada Senior Citizens is the largest such organization on the South Plains.

The group, which has 17 members, held its annual meeting in the Floydada Senior Center.

Members were invited to the monthly meeting last Thursday and haven't seen many different types of food. It was a good job for the young exhibitors.

Marvin L. Stiles of Stiles and Stiles, Architects, in Lubbock was authorized Monday by the Floyd County Commissioners Court to advertise for construction bids on an additional and remodeling project at the county jail.

The bids are to be opened at 2 p.m. Thursday, March 29, in the county court room.

The Floyd County governing body received correspondence February 2 from the Texas Jail Standards which stated: "All items in contention have been satisfactorily resolved. The project is approved for completion."

Stiles met with the commissioners court during the Monday called meeting.

In another move Monday, the group accepted the county depository contract made by First National Bank of Floydada, which will be the Floyd County depository for county and school funds during 1979 and 1980.

**SPACE ALLOCATED FOR HUMAN RESOURCES OFFICE**  
During the commissioners court's regular session earlier this month, the group agreed to provide approximately 1,800 square feet of office space for the Texas Department of Human Resources. This area will be in the "agricultural building" on the southeast corner of the courthouse block in Floydada.

The space is to be made available for 10 years "to justify the expenditure of state or federal funds for this building."

The Department of Human Resources is to pay gas and electricity bills, while the county will provide water, sewer and garbage removal services.

Karl Morris and Emil Schattell, official representatives of the Texas Department of Human Resources, met with the county governing body.

During the same meeting, a landfill contract with City of Floydada was signed. The contract stipulates that the county pay \$2,000 and is to dig whatever pits the county and city mutually determine are necessary at the dump grounds.

Floyd County residents living outside the Floydada city limits are permitted the same dumping privileges as city residents. The sanitary landfill will continue to be managed by the City of Floydada.

The sale of a county-owned building and lot — Lot 10, Block 73 in Floydada — to Jerry Finley was approved. Finley submitted the high bid of \$7,500 during a public auction conducted Feb. 2 by Olin M. Watson, who was authorized to act in behalf of the county.

### MINI-BUS PROGRAM AUTHORIZED FOR '79

Kathy Green, director of the community action center, and a group of senior citizens met with the county heads to discuss the mini-bus program for the coming year. A motion was offered and adopted to continue the mini-bus operation in 1979 as it was last year.

Candidates must file at least 25 days prior to the election. This means that March 13 is the filing deadline.

## Auction Grosses \$96,216.16

One hundred and 80 animals which passed through the sale ring Wednesday afternoon grossed exhibitors in the Floyd County Junior Livestock Show a total of \$96,216.16, a new record for the county show auction.

Officials said that animals sold for floor bids would "pushed the gross above \$100,000."

Mark Beedy's grand champion steer led off the auction, conducted by Raymond Akin of Plainview, with a bid of \$1.50 per pound. The 1,181 pound crossbreed calf was purchased by Floydada Co-op Gin and American State Bank for \$1,771.50.

Sterley Gin and Producers Co-op of Floydada joined forces to pay \$1.25 per pound for Todd Beedy's reserve champion steer. The 1,125 pound Hereford grossed \$1,406.25.

The third animal to be auctioned was Dean Molinar's grand champion barrow. Four firms — Patterson Grain, Western Ag Sales, Providence Farm Supply and Bob Gardner Chevrolet — bought the 242 pound barrow for \$3.50 per pound, a total of \$847.00.

Karen Pruitt saw her reserve champion barrow, a 228 pound Duroc, bring \$3.25 per pound from Consumers Fuel of Floydada. The sale price was \$741.00.

Next in the sales ring were the five breed champion lambs. They included [exhibitor, weight, price per pound, total price, and buyer]: Karyn Foster, 96 pounds, \$3.50, \$336.00, Lockney Cooperatives; Matt Mitchell, 116 pounds, \$4.00, \$464.00, First National Bank of Lockney; Lori Bayley, 106 pounds, \$3.50, \$371.00, Lockney Cooperatives; Lori Bayley, 99 pounds, \$4.00, \$396.00, Providence Community; and J. S. Hale, 99 pounds, \$4.50, \$517.50, J. S. Hale.

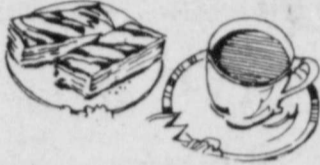

- 1/2 pound butter or margarine
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon celery salt
- 1 teaspoon onion salt
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1/2 teaspoon Accent
- 1 quart "popped" pop corn
- 3/4 pound unsalted nuts
- 1 quart doughnut-shaped oat cereal
- 3 cups bite-size shredded rice cereal
- 3 cups bite-size shredded wheat cereal
- 1 (5 1/2 ounce) package bite-size cheese flavored pretzels, or 1 (5 1/2 ounce) package thin pretzel sticks.
- Melt margarine; add Worcestershire sauce, celery salt, onion salt, and Accent; mix well. Place remaining ingredients in large roasting pan; pour margarine mixture over them; mix gently, but thoroughly. Bake in slow oven (250 degrees) 2 hours, stirring frequently. 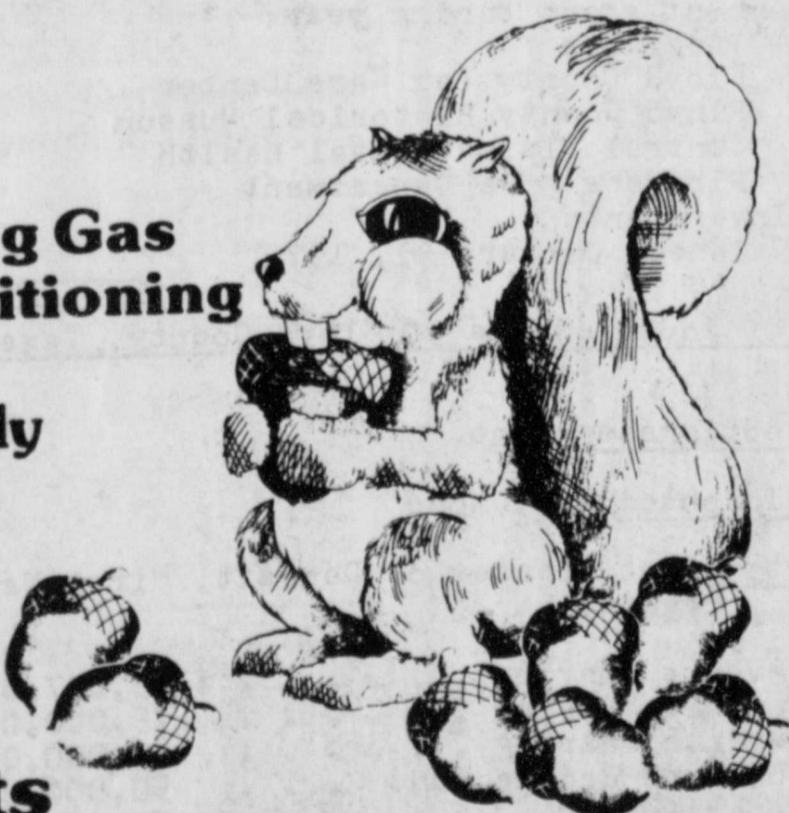

**Transportation Act Offers Funds For Rural Areas**

The Surface Transportation Act of 1978 offers Federal financial assistance for public transportation in non-urbanized areas. An urbanized area is a city with a population of 50,000 or more according to the 1970 census.

The funds available may be used for the purchase of equipment or for assistance in paying expenses of a public transportation system. Eligible applicants include state agencies, local public bodies, non-profit organizations and operators of public transportation services.

The program will be jointly implemented by the Federal Highway Administration and the Urban Mass Transportation Administration with the individual states providing the necessary administrative

assistance.

In Texas, the Governor has designated the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to oversee the program. Applications for assistance through this program will be submitted to and processed by the District Offices.

The goals of the program are to provide better transportation opportunities to people in rural and small urban areas. This will be accomplished by the development, maintenance and improvement of passenger transportation systems

Jim Lucas, attorney for Warren Electric Cooperative, is credited with finding the following article, which originated in Australia. With Americans being threatened on every hand by the Environment Protection Agency, we thought it appropriate:

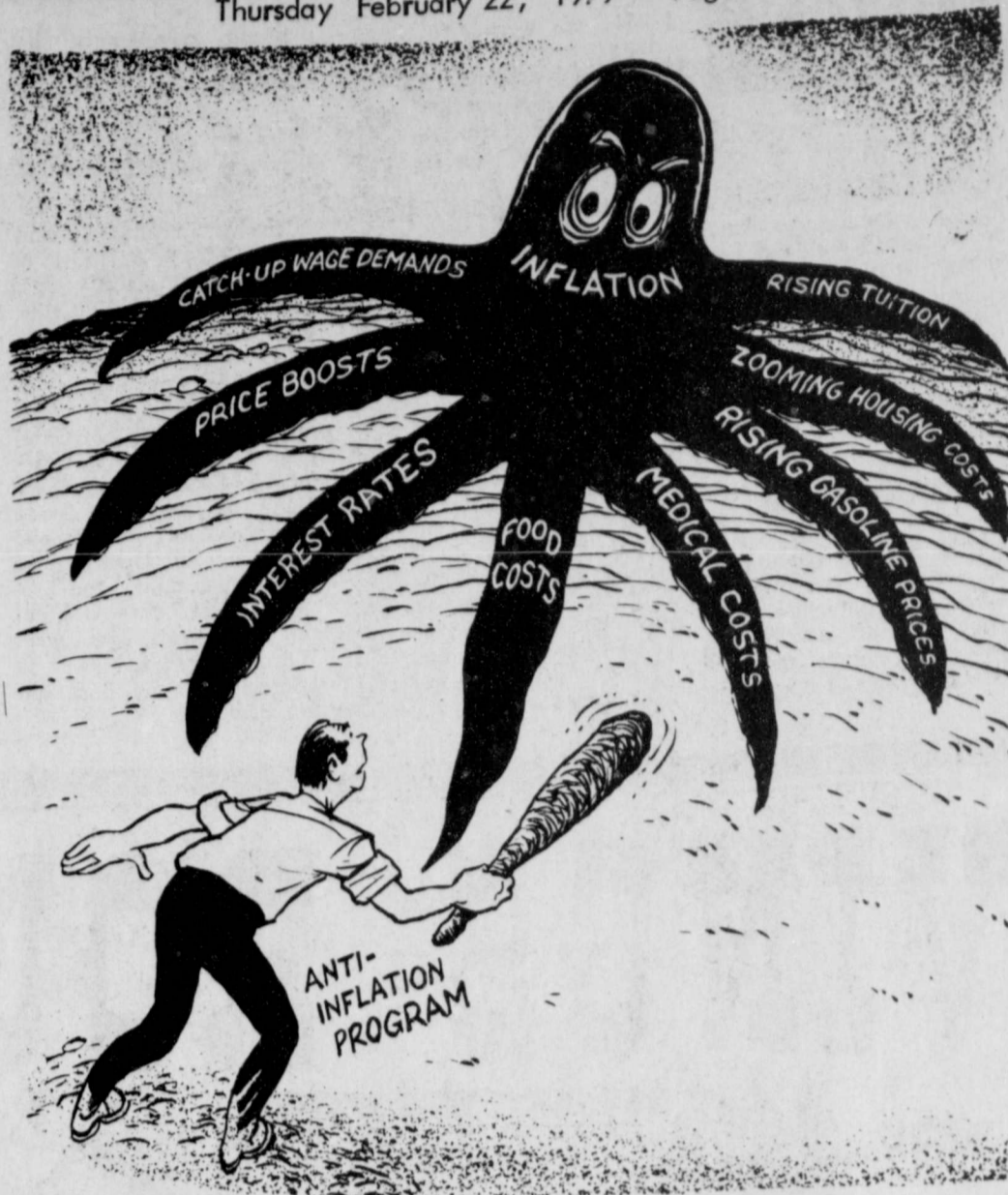
"Imperial Chemical Industries has announced the discovery of a new fire-fighting agent known as WATER (Wonderful and Total Extinguishing Resource). It is particularly suitable for dealing with fires in buildings, timber yards and warehouses, and is fairly cheap to produce. It is intended that quantities of about 1 1/2 million gallons should be stored in open ponds or reservoirs near urban areas and installations of high fire risk.

WATER is already encountering opposition from safety and environmental groups. One group member has pointed out that if anyone immersed his head in a bucket of WATER, it would prove fatal in as little as three minutes. Each of the proposed reservoirs will contain enough WATER to fill half a million three gallons buckets. Each bucketfull could be used a hundred or more times, so there is enough WATER in one reservoir to kill the entire population of the United Kingdom.

"Did we know, asked a firebrigade spokesman, what would happen to the new medium when it was exposed to intense heat? It has been reported that water is a constituent of beer. Does this mean that fireman could become intoxicated from the fumes when they use it to put out a fire?"

"The 'Friends of the World' said they had obtained a sample of WATER and found it made clothes shrink. If it did this to cotton, what would it do to people?"

"In the House of Commons, the Home Secretary was asked if he would prohibit the manufacture and storage of this lethal new material. A full investigation was needed he replied, and the Major Hazardous Group would be asked to report."
