All types of books will be one sale. The selection will range from popular fiction, non-fiction, and children's


books - even comic books, paperbacks, encyclopedias and valuable old books at bargain prices.

## Texas Tech Museum To Feature Historical Print Collection

LUBBOCK—America one hundred and more years ago will go on exhibit with a collection of 125 Currier & Ives lithographic prints to be shown April 25-May 30 in The Museum of Texas Tech University.

The prints are from the Esmark Collection of 650 originals made between 1835 and 1890. The collection was acquired by Esmark Inc., a Chicago holding company, in celebration of the nation's Bicentennial. Four touring collections are being shown in major art museums, outstanding university art centers in the United States, as a special exhibit in Asia, Africa and Europe and by Esmark companies.

The Texas Tech museum exhibit is sponsored by the West Texas Museum Association. The WTMA Women's Council will hold a reception from 3:30-5 p.m. May 2 for all persons of retirement age-plus who would like to see the Currier & Ives reminders of times past.

Other than historical events, the prints depict almost every phase of American life—hunting, fishing, whaling. The views include steamboats, railroads, the great clipper ships, rural scenes and urban views.

Currier & Ives had its beginning in 1834 as Currier & Stodart, a short-lived company which produced primarily letterheads, sheet music and business forms. Nathaniel Currier, born in Massachusetts in 1813, received his early training during a five-year apprenticeship with William S. and John Pendleton of Boston, one of the first successful lithography firms in America. After spending a

year with a Philadelphia lithographer, he moved to New York in 1834 to start his own business. In 1857 he made his office manager, James Merritt Ives, a partner.

Many outstanding artists of the time were employed to create the original pictures. George Catlin, specialist in Plains Indians, was one of these as were political cartoonist Thomas Nast, Louis Maurer and Eastman Johnson. Fanny Palmer was the most prolific of the Currier-Ives artists. Most of the

prints were colored by hand.

The vast output—close to 7,000—of Currier & Ives provides one of the greatest sources of color impressions of the early American scene, but the development of practical, mass-produced photographs in the late 1880s gradually diminished interest in the lithographs. The company ceased printing their famous lithographs in 1907.

The Esmark collection was assembled over a 30-year period by Mr. and Mrs. Roy King of New York.

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# Sales Tax Returns Increase In County

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said in a Friday news release that local one percent sales tax rebates to Texas cities for April were up over the same month last year. This was true in both Floyd County towns.

Floydada's net payment for the period ending April 3 stood at \$7,503.04, compared with \$6,262.41 the previous year.

Lockney's sales tax payment for this period was \$2,935.53. This was a strong increase over \$1,603.68 for the same reporting period last year.

Also tabled was a proposed cancer plan for county employees. Jon Chapman of Blue

Cross discussed changes in insurance for county employees. The court voted to retain the present plan without change. Another matter tabled was equipment signs for each precinct. Ken Howell of a sign company made the proposal. The commissioners court voted to reinvest \$75,000 in certificates of deposit for the county and to reinvest \$20,000 in CDs for Precinct Three. Official bond for Walter Hollums, justice of the peace, was unanimously adopted.

### Red Cross Aiding Storm Victims In Two States

The Red Cross has been on the scene of the Wichita Falls, Lawton and Vernon Disasters since the vicious tornadoes ripped through the area April 10, leaving 34 known dead and 750-800 injured in Wichita Falls, alone, 12 unconfirmed dead in Vernon and six in Lawton, with some 200 injured in the latter two cities. In the Fairway and Southwest Parkway areas of Wichita Falls, the Sykes Mall, Southmore Shopping Center, and French Quarter Apartments were leveled. Faith Village housing unit was also damaged. In the Midwestern University and Jacksboro Highway area, an estimated 2,000 homes were destroyed and another 2,000 damaged. Red Cross disaster equipment and trained personnel from Dallas, Ft. Worth, Lubbock, Texarkana, Waco, Longview, Houston, Tulsa and St. Louis were immediately dispatched to the devastated area. Concerned neighbors across the state are asking how they may help. Persons wanting to assist the victims may do so by making a cash contribution to the Red

Cross. Donations are being accepted and transmitted by all Red Cross chapters and should be made payable to the Red Cross Disaster Fund, First National Bank, Floydada.



This long Easter weekend will be the last respite for Legislators before we move into the final busy weeks of the 60th session of the Texas Legislature. The Senate has acted somewhat slowly recently with lengthy on-again, off-again filibusters. There have been some lively debates in the House, too, but the House calendar has remained crowded. This week alone, before Tuesday adjournment, House members dealt with over 100 Senate and House bills and resolutions.

With so many bills coming out of committees and now reaching the floor of the House for debate, certain issues are drawing considerable attention from people in the district. My mail shows that you are concerned about the Blue Law, teacher pay raise, legalized bingo, mandatory headgear for motorcyclists, utility rate settings, and various bills related to child care services.

Many of you, I know, are keenly interested in the status of particular pieces of legislation. For your convenience, a Legislative Information Service was established in 1975. This was a joint venture of the House and Senate. The information center is located in the Legislative Reference Library on the second floor of the Capitol. ## Bobby Rainer To Be Graduated From Wayland



She is currently in her 16th year of teaching, having started her career at an elementary school in Amarillo teaching P.E., grades four through six. Since moving to Floydada, she has taught reading, English and P.E. in junior high; and P.E., 9th grade English, Health I and II and will teach Drivers Education this year. She has also taught a third grade class. Dale has directed the girls golf program for the past 7 1/2 years and this year has taken responsibility for the boys team as well.

Dale is married to Charles Tyer, principal of Floydada High School, and the couple have three daughters: Tammy 21, who is a law enforcement major at UTPB in Odessa; Tracy, 18, a senior at FHS; and Tana, 16, an FHS sophomore.

Health I is a required two quarter course for high school graduation. In Floydada it is set up on a ninth grade level and is required of all incoming freshmen. During the third quarter, if the student is old enough for Drivers Education, he or she will take Health II. In Health I many aspects of a person's life are covered. Among these are how to adjust and adapt to both your environment and yourself, a study of different factors that influence our lives, how our bodies function and why we act as we do. Basic first aid is also covered as is Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). A student learns to look at himself in a constructive manner and hopefully learns to look at his role in the overall picture.

Even though a different textbook is used, Health II is simply a continuation of Health I — possibly more detailed but just as important.

Golf is a lifetime sport taught all three quarters with the participants competing actively with other golfers from various size high schools. Both the boys and girls teams compete in several invitational tournaments as well as represent their school in District play.

This year there are 13 girls and 16 boys competing for F.H.S. During the six years we have had U.L.L. golf, the girls have won district every year and have had the district medalist each year. The girls have also won regional once, placed second one year, were third one and had the district medalist one year. The boys have not fared quite so well but this year's golfers looks very promising.

Drivers Education Here the students receive their classroom instruction. The classroom hours, plus passing a written examination, allows a 15 year old student to receive a beginner's permit to drive a motor vehicle. While in the classroom the student learns the rules, laws, regulations on vehicle and pedestrian travel. Hopefully he also learns to be a considerate and understanding driver — both for his sake and for the safety of other drivers.






