A FEW YEARS AGO, auto makers were threatening to make the convertible car a collector's item.

And, probably due to the scramble by those who loved the "ragtop" auto, and wanted to have one before Detroit quit turning them out, the auto industry has done an about-face. Practically every major car maker now has a convertible in its repertoire.

The "revival" began about a year and a half ago when Chrysler LeBaron and Dodge came out with a convertible automobile, and were followed shortly by a Buick Riviera model.

This year, four other companies will join the move back to making convertibles: Chevrolet, which will make a Cavalier convertible; Ford Mustang, Pontiac Sunbird and Porsche. If current plans continue to develop, auto customers will have a Cadillac convertible and two more Chryslers to choose from in 1984.

(We recall the feeling of nostalgia a few years back when it was announced that the "last" Cadillac convertible had rolled off the assembly line. The buyers of those cars, who thought they had plunked down big bucks but at least had a collector's item, will soon have just another used convertible.)

The main reason for the return of the convertible to the auto-makers' lineup is the public demand for the car. It's the old rule that always holds true: "Take something off the market (or make it illegal), and suddenly everyone wants it."

Another important factor in the manufacturers' willingness to put the cars back "on line" is the companies' new-found ability to manufacture convertibles more efficiently than they could in the 1970s.

Previously, entire assembly lines had to be devoted to convertibles, which represented a very small percentage of the vehicles manufactured.

Today, convertibles roll off the same assembly lines as other passenger cars. Their tops are then sheared off. Floors, doors and windshield pillars are reinforced for structural support. And, lastly, they are fitted with a folding cloth top and equipped with the mechanism for raising and lowering it.

In former years, ragtop owners often had to endure a number of quirks in order to enjoy the pleasure of top-down driving. These included squeaks and creaks in the frame, air leaks and noises in the passenger compartment, and smaller back seats and trunks, to accommodate the top and its mechanism.

However, due to improved technology, these former drawbacks are not as big a problem as they formerly were. In fact, the convertible automobile should afford its owner virtually the same comfort as those whose tops had not been redesigned.

Convertibles have always had a limited amount of popularity in this area, probably due to the fact that in springtime, owners are faced with a certain number of days that they would be faced with driving them around in sandy or windy weather.

Nevertheless, it's nice to know that one aspect of Americana has been saved from extinction.

Patrolmen Are Added To Force

Two new patrolmen who have joined the Friona Police Department are John Spring and Paul Ramirez.

Spring is the latest appointment to the Friona PD. He is a native of Friona, and received his bachelor's degree in law enforcement from West Texas State University.

When Spring heard that Friona was in need of police officers, he saw this as an opportunity to serve the community in which he grew up.

Ramirez comes here from Hereford, where he held the rank of lieutenant. He is nearing completion of his associate's degree in law enforcement from Amarillo College. Ramirez has approximately 1,760 hours in training from various academies and hold two instructor ratings. He brings a total of 16 years experience in law enforcement to the Friona Police Department.

Spring and Ramirez join newly-appointed Chief of Police Bill Thieman as new members of the force.

Two prior members of the force are Lloyd Niece and Steve Jones.

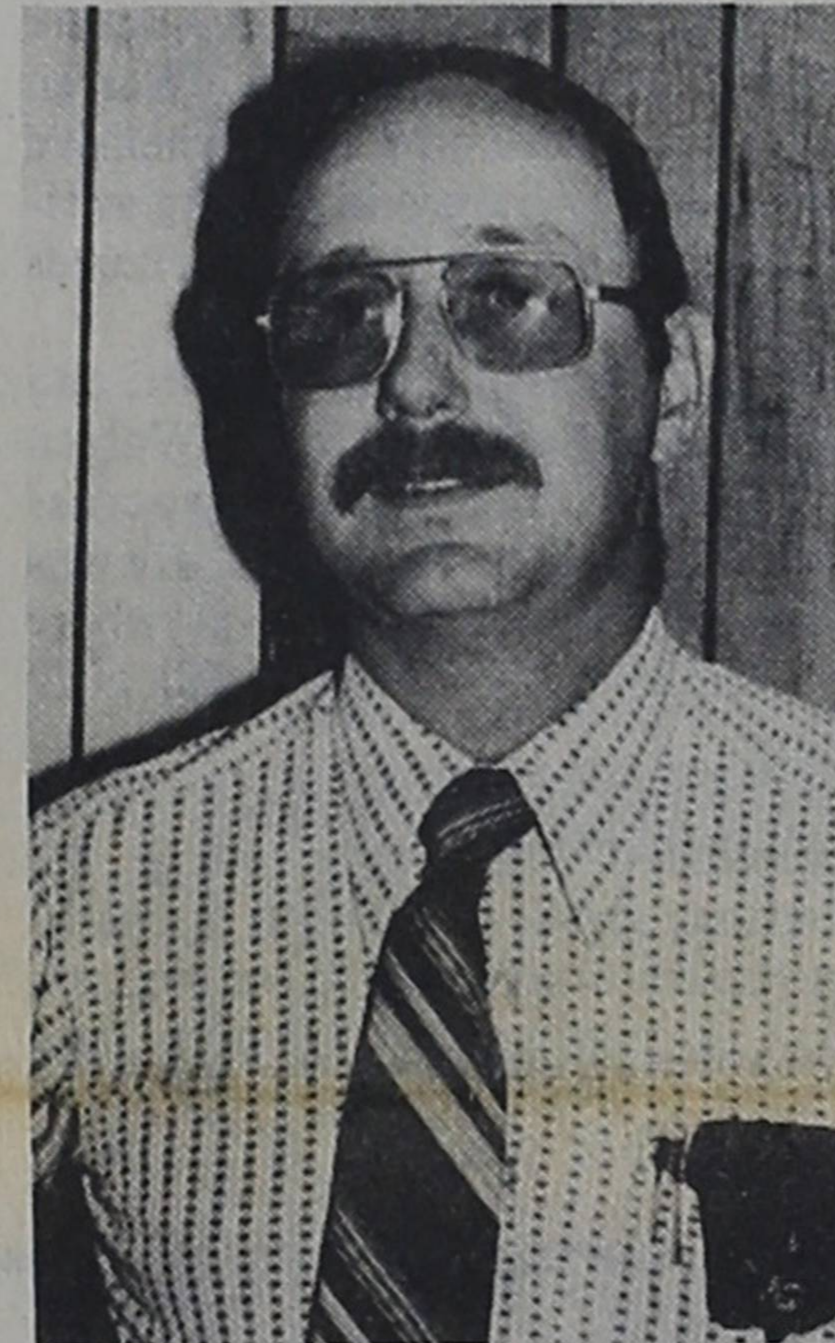
Niece is a veteran of 32 years of police and police-related work. He previously was a chief deputy with the Parmer County Sheriff's office, and prior to that served as Chief of Police in Clovis, N.M. He has attended various law enforcement academies in Texas and New Mexico and has accumulated 1,350 hours of training.

Jones recently completed the Panhandle Regional Police Academy in the upper one-fourth of his class. A native of Melrose, N.M., Jones served as a truck driver prior to

joining the Friona PD. He also serves the city as a volunteer fireman.

"The current experience of our force, including newly-hired officers, totals sixty-four years of police and police related experience. Formal education includes three high school graduates; one officer with an associate of arts degree in law enforcement, one with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and one with a master of science degree in criminal justice administration," Thieman says.

The accumulated training hours within the department totals approximately 4,540 hours from 47 various schools, workshops and academies. Two of the members of the department have served as instructor in various community education, law enforcement and courses related to police topics, the new chief pointed out.

"Don't miss out on a fun summer. Register now for day camp," say the organizers of the program.

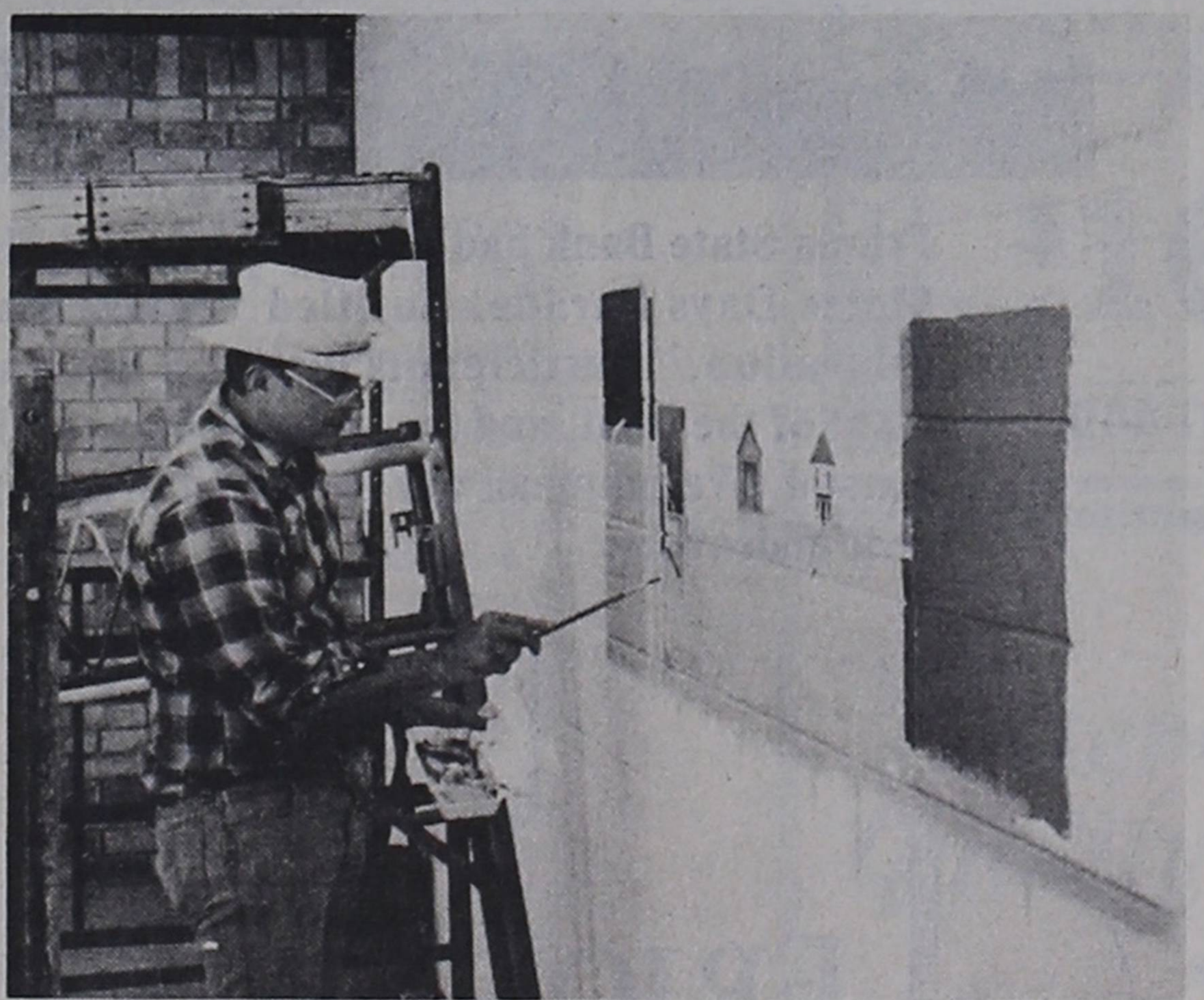
Cool Spell Sets Record For Temps

A weekend of cool, cloudy weather in the area failed to produce hoped-for moisture. A shower late Sunday afternoon left .20 of an inch of rain, and a similar shower about noon Monday added a tenth of an inch.

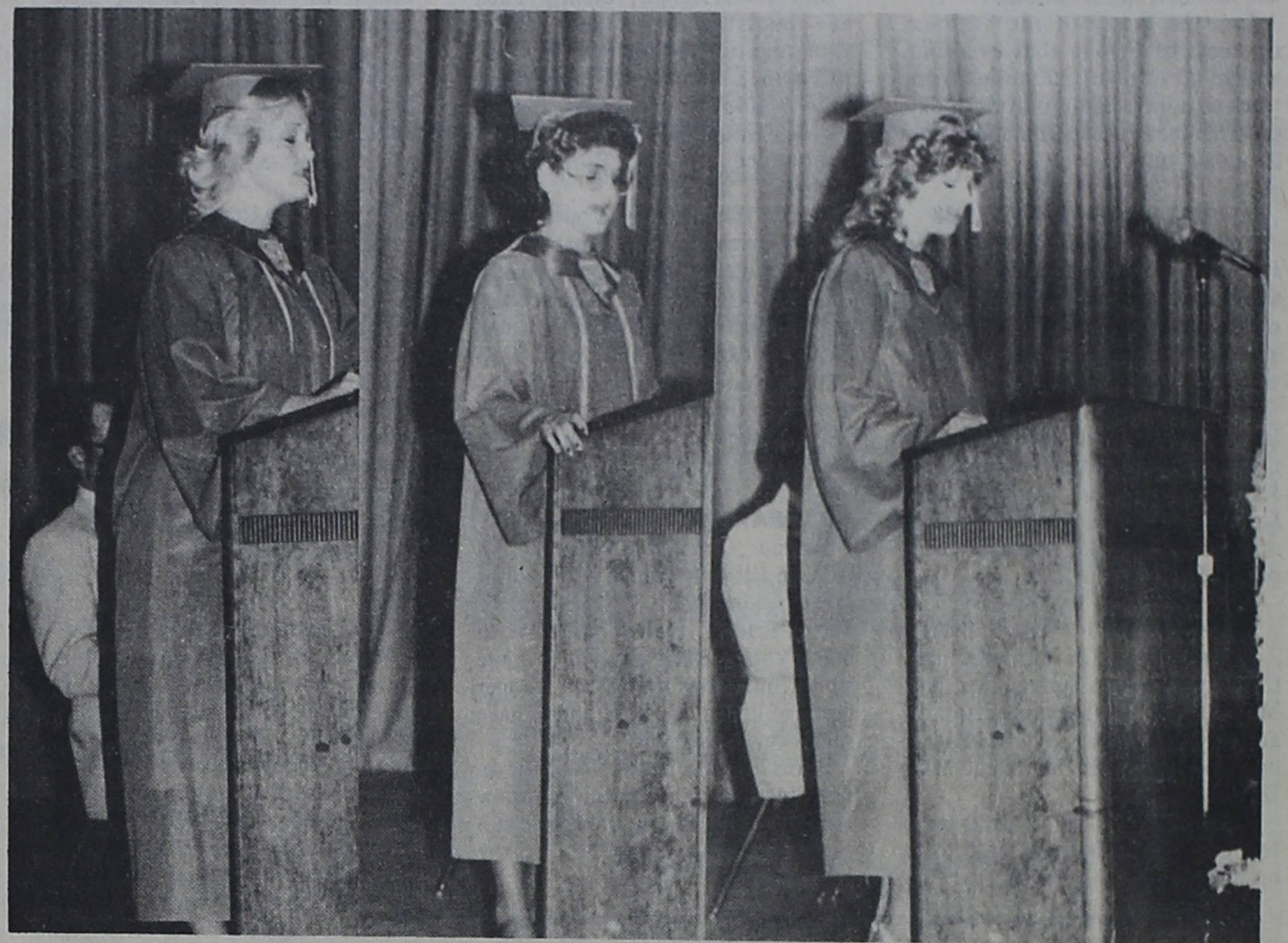
The month of May totaled out at 1.63 inches of moisture, something below normal—or at least below what was needed from an agricultural standpoint.

Monday and Tuesday saw a cold front hover in the local area and drop temperatures to record lows. Tuesday morning's low in Friona was 42 degrees. The Amarillo weather station established an all-time low temperature for that date of 44 degrees. The high temperature that day reached only 52 degrees.

Things were returning to normal by Thursday, however, when the mercury climbed to 88 degrees.

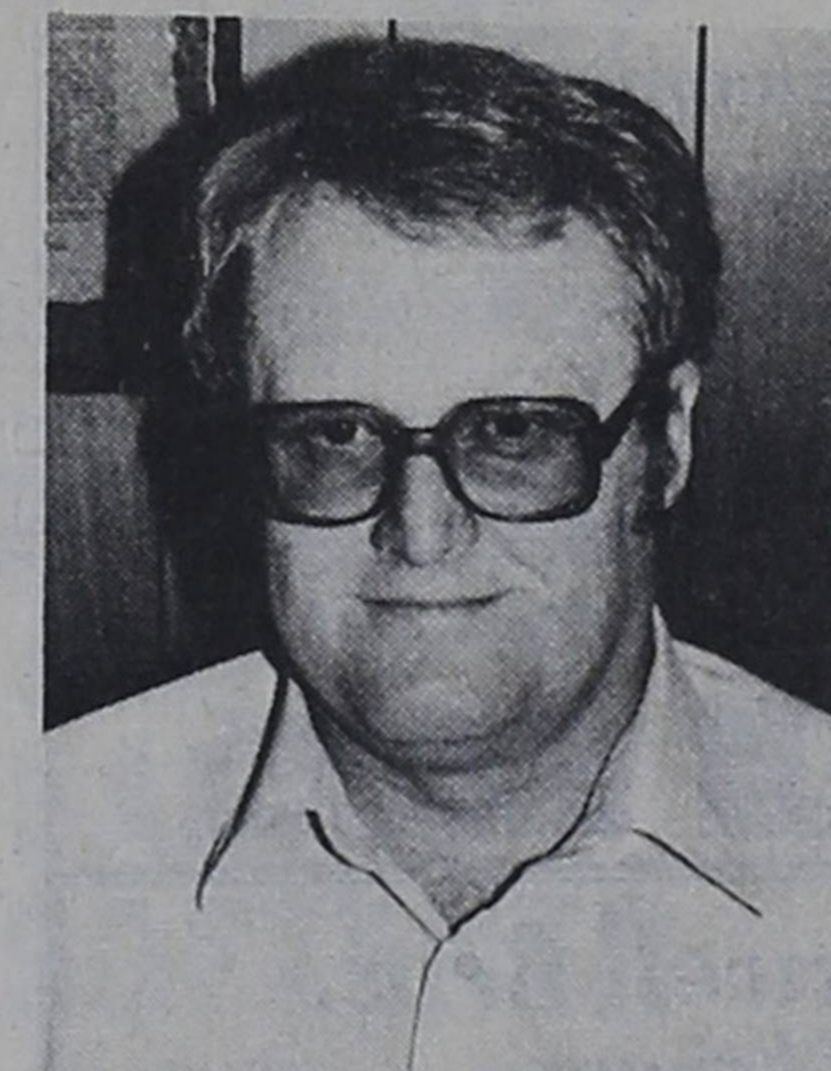

Talley Is New Local Minister

T. Leon Talley, 40, is the new minister at Friona's Sixth Street Church of Christ.

Talley is a native of Carrizozo, N.M. He is a graduate of Oklahoma Christian College, holding a B.A. in Bible, and Kansas State University, where he earned a Master's of Arts in Education.

He preached in Oklahoma from 1969 until June of 1982. Talley served as Bible Chair Director at Eastern Oklahoma State College at Wilburton, Oklahoma, for five years, and then preached for seven years (1975-82) at Hooker, Oklahoma.

In June, 1982, the family moved to Anchorage, Alaska, where he entered private business. "But I was just not satisfied, not being in the ministry," Talley says.

Epileptic X-Country Walker Due

Patrick Warren, a Philadelphia, Pennsylvania resident is walking across the country to prove that persons who have epilepsy can function normally and "even go one step further."

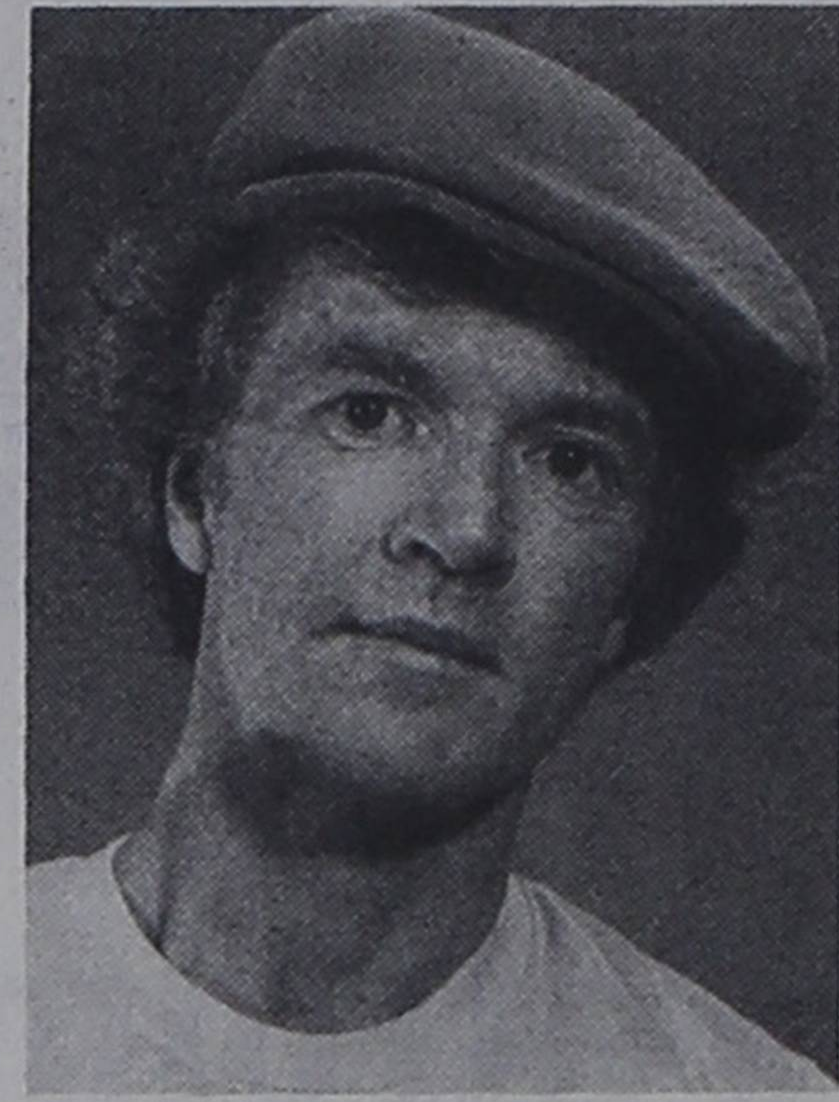
Warren, 35, began his 3,000 mile trek at the UCLA Medical Center on May 2 and will arrive in Friona on or around June 8. The purpose of the walk is to dispel the numerous misconceptions that surround epilepsy and those who are afflicted with the seizure disorder.

Warren, a roofer by trade, fell from a roof while working in 1974 and fell again in 1979 suffering a fractured skull and multiple abrasions. This began what Warren terms "a medical merry-go-round of fainting spells, laboratory tests and inconclusive diagnoses." He said, "I saw a lot of neurologists at several different hospitals, but epilepsy was never diagnosed." Subsequently, his decision to continue roofing was almost a death sentence, for on two separate occasions (according to co-workers) he set down his tools and walked off the roof. Warren has no memory of walking off the roof on either occasion.

In order to find out what was wrong, Warren sought further help. He was eventually referred to the Comprehensive Epilepsy Center (CEC) at The Graduate Hospital in Philadelphia. There Warren's condition was diagnosed as epilepsy by Dr. Neil Sussman, Associate Medical Director of the CEC. Warren was then placed on a comprehensive treatment program involving anti-convulsant drugs, and his seizures were effectively controlled.

Determined to thank the CEC and bring attention to epilepsy, Warren walked 720 miles round trip across Pennsylvania in June 1982. He was received with open arms everywhere he went and completed the walk in 29 days.

The success of last year's walk convinced Warren to carry the message across the nation. He walks approximately eight to ten hours a day, averaging 35 to 40 miles, and hopes to complete the walk in 85 days. This year the Pizza Hut

Corporation has agreed to provide meals for Warren and an accompanying driver, and the Atlantic Richfield Corporation is covering all fuel expenses.

Epilepsy is a disorder of the central nervous system and occurs when brain cells create abnormal electrical discharges that result in seizures. Epilepsy is not a disease and is not contagious. It can be caused by a number of events such as birth trauma or a severe head injury; it can also develop without any specific triggering event. An estimated two million Americans have epilepsy which includes approximately 720,000 undetected cases. For most persons with epilepsy, seizures are brief and infrequent. In between seizures most persons lead normal and healthy lives.

Eighty per cent of those with epilepsy can be treated with conventional anticonvulsant medications. Of the rest, two of every three can control seizures through intensive therapeutic programs. Dear Friona Citizens:

Since going to work for the Friona Police Department in September of 1967, the hardest thing I had to do was to submit my resignation after being informed that I was not professional enough to handle the job of Chief of Police.

The department is a small department, consisting of a chief, assistant chief, and four patrolmen, which has been added to over the years, as the city of Friona grew. The city has to have 24 hour police protection, seven days a week including all holidays.

There has to be police coverage when there are court dates to be met by some of the officers, and during times when the department may be caught short handed because of illness of an officer.

In order to give the kind of protection and coverage that the city of Friona deserves, all six members of the department must pull a shift. All members of the police department were Texas licensed, holding certificates in all required subjects and more. A member, by receiving certificates through the Amarillo College, or any other state approved course received credit for the hours in order to obtain a higher state certificate.

The police department for the last few years has also had a reserve program, to assist the regular patrol.

Rev. Blaylock Services Held In Lubbock

Funeral services for a former Friona minister, Rev. Hugh F. Blaylock, 70, were conducted Monday at the First United Methodist Church in Lubbock, with Dr. Sam Nader, Rev. Elton Wyatt and Dr. Luther R. Kirk officiating.

Burial was in Resthaven Memorial Park in Lubbock.

Rev. Blaylock died Saturday, May 28 at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital after a brief illness.

A native of Childress, Rev. Blaylock had lived in Lubbock 13 years, moving there from Pampa. He had served as a Methodist minister in the Northwest Texas Conference for 52 years. He was pastor in Friona from 1955-60.

He had served on the Conference's Board of Hospitals and Homes. He had also served on the board of directors and building committee for King's Manor Methodist Home in Hereford.

Rev. Blaylock was active in Boy Scouts, Kiwanis, Lions Club, Chamber of Commerce and the Ministerial Alliance. He was a 32nd degree Mason and had served in the U.S. Army and Air Force as a chaplain in the South Pacific and in Korea.

He married Elsie Bock in 1953 in Earth.

Survivors include his wife; four daughters, Charlotte Ratcliff of Friona, Janice Baxter of Faith, S.D., Elizabeth Snapp of Odessa and Sherry Green of Dallas; two sons, Hugh, Jr. of Athens and William of Goldsmith; two sisters, Mrs. Mattie Holloway of Levelland and Mrs. Wilma Smith of Muleshoe; a brother, Odis of Muleshoe, 14 grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

The requirements for a reserve officer is a 70 hour course to be certified. To be Texas licensed, the requirements for a full-time officer was a 300 hour course, but has now been increased to 400 hours.

The reserve officer can only perform duties under a full time licensed peace officer in the field, and under the direction of the Chief of Police. The Chief of Police is required to be certified by the state in order to be a licensed officer. A member of a small department should be depended upon to perform any duty of a law officer, regardless of their position within that department.

A department the size of the Friona Police Department definitely has to work together by keeping everything such as complaints and case information within the department and under one department head, namely the Chief of Police, until such time it is proper to release any information.

As long as I had been with the police department, the City of Friona definitely was covered 24 hours a day, seven days a week with police protection. House Calls For Repeal Of Tax

The House of Representatives repealed one of the most unpopular tax measures in history today, voting 382-41 to kill the withholding tax on interest and dividends.

The repeal vote came on a bill sponsored by U.S. Rep. Kent Hance, D-Texas, and six other members of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee.

"This should be a clear signal to the Administration and to all concerned with tax legislation that the American people will not tolerate such an unfair tax," said Hance. "Now that the House has called for repeal, I think the Senate will pass the measure and if President Reagan can read public sentiment at all, he will sign the bill into law before the July 1 starting date for withholding."

Under the Administration-backed law, ten per cent of the income savers and investors earn would be withheld by banks and other financial institutions.

"Withholding would take money out of the savings accounts of Americans who need the interest on that money more than the government does," said the Texas Democrat after the decisive vote.

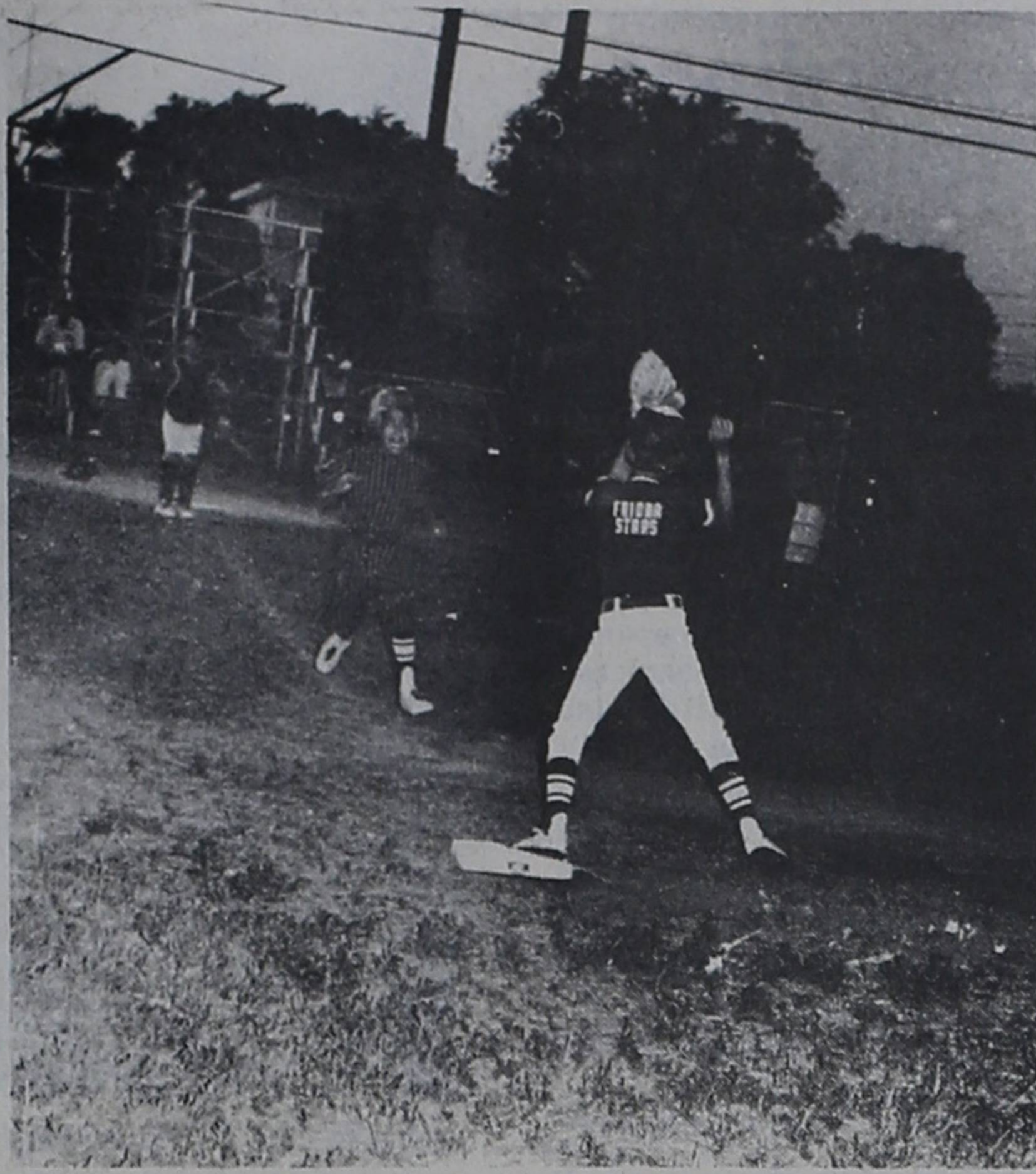
Black Grain added seven more runs to bring their total to 12, while Cattle Town was only able to add one more run and therefore suffered their first defeat.

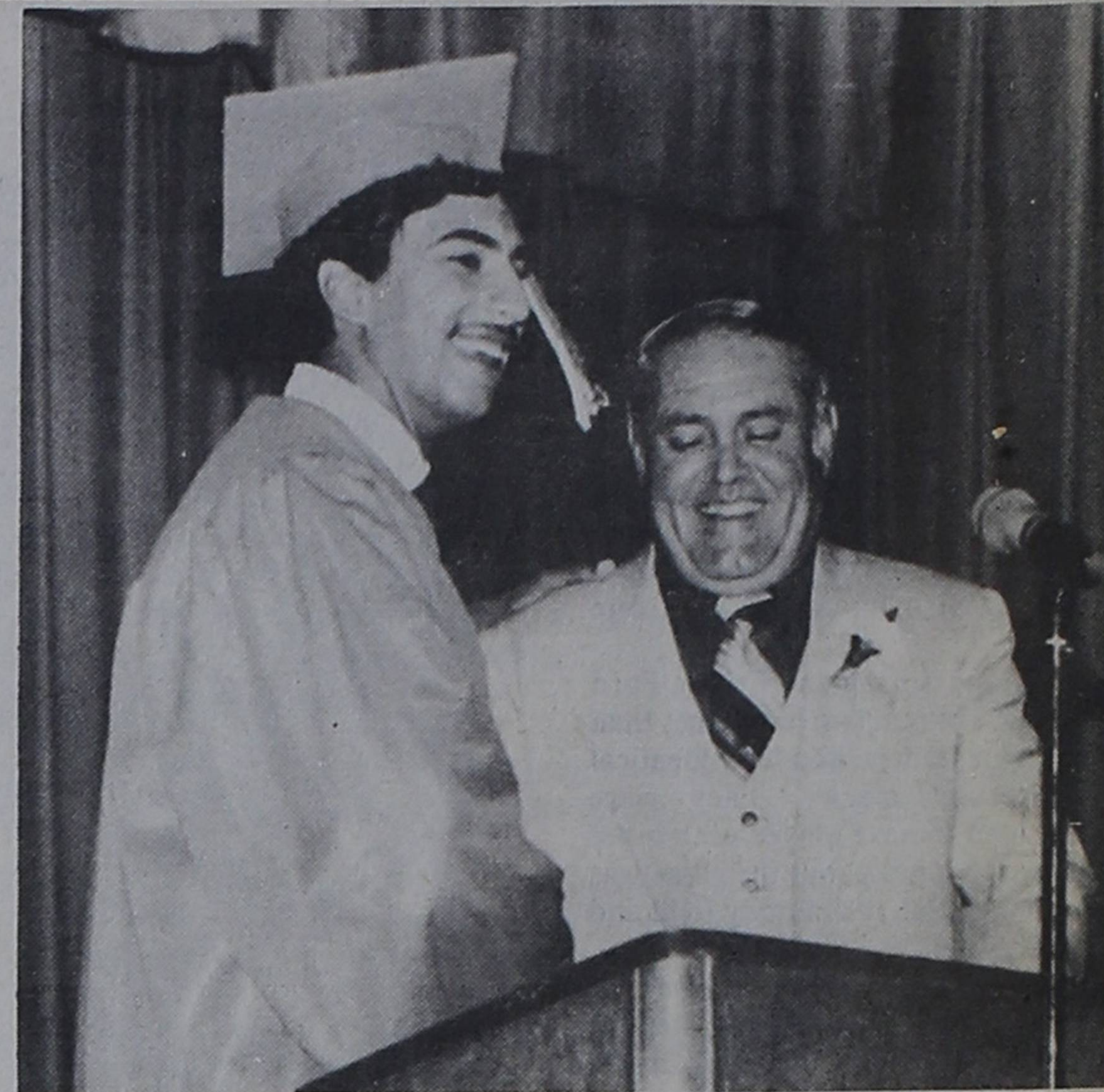

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IS ASTIGMATISM CORRECTABLE?

Yes, in almost all cases. It is not a disease, but an eye condition that distorts or blurs images. It may occur at any stage of life or it can be present from birth. 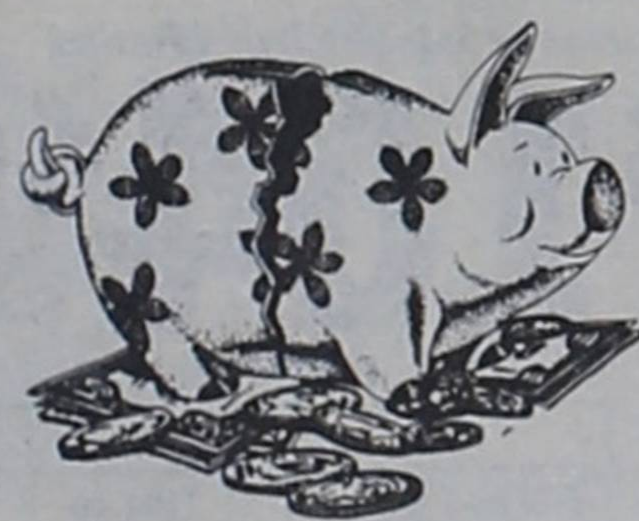

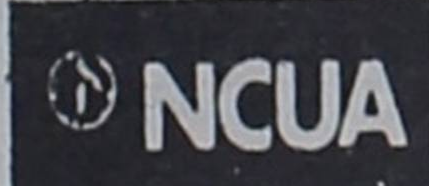

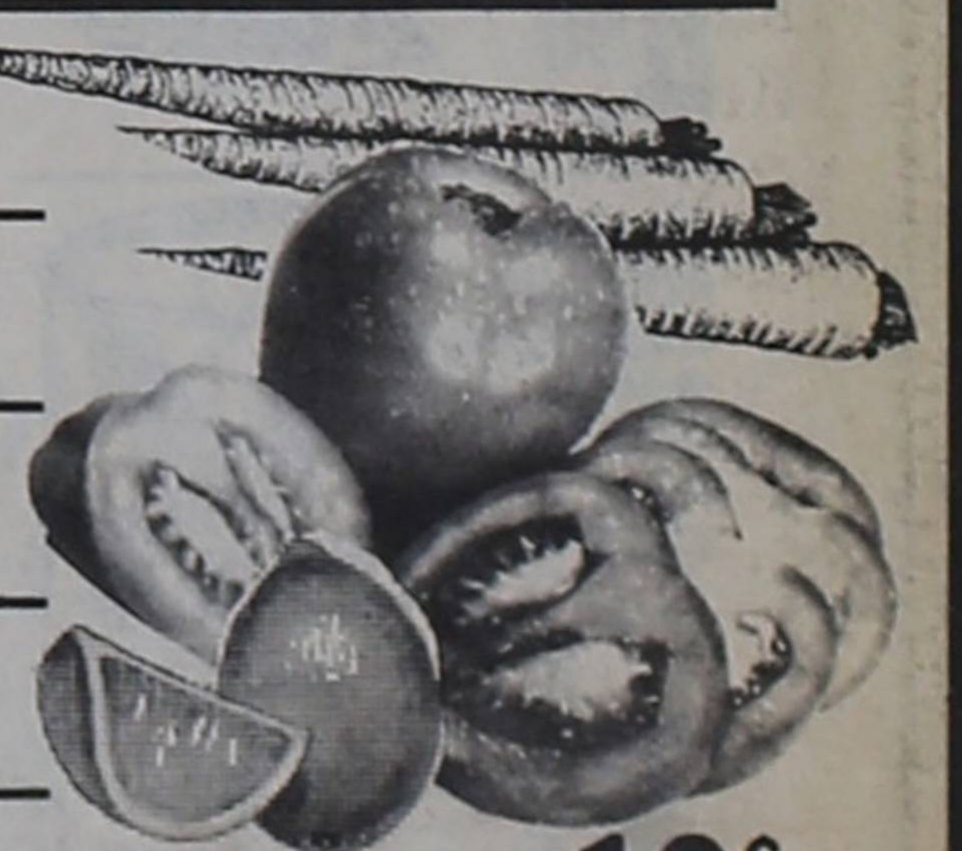

Miss Alexander is the daughter of Dr. Bob Alexander of Friona and Sarah Owen of Bovina.

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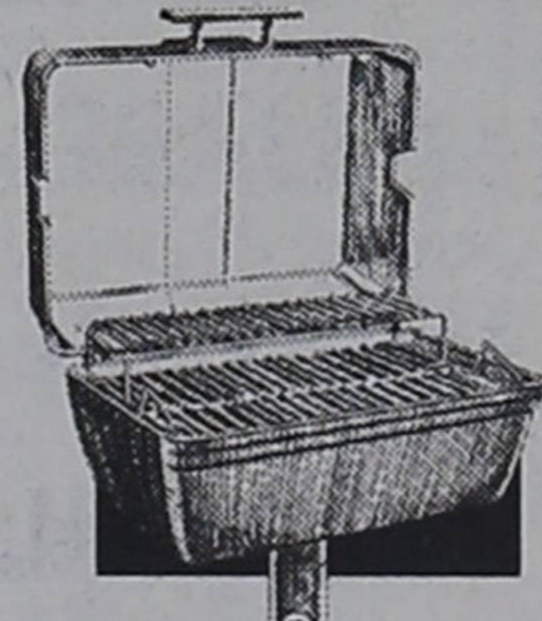
