Rail's future assured

AMERAIL buys local spur

The Floydada spur of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad Co. has sold to AMERAIL, an Illinois-based subsidiary of the TEMCO Corp.

The 27-mile Floydada line will continue to operate as the Floydada and Plainview Railroad, said Richard C. McClure, president of AMERAIL.

Hesperian closed Friday

When Santa Fe made known the fact that they intended to abandon the rail if buyers could not be found, local South Plains citizens formed the South Plains Rural Rail Association.

The association consisted of one representative from each county in the Lubbock cluster. Floyd County Commissioner Connie Bearden represented Floyd County. The purpose of the organization was to secure local backing to buy the rail line and keep it operating.

"As far as I know, AMERAIL will be able to handle the line and give good service," said Bearden. "AMERAIL won't be unionized, so they will be able to make a profit."

"If the association would have bought the line, it would have been leased to a private line anyway, but we would have had to rehabilitate the line.

"In my opinion, the forming of the South Plains Rural Rail Association is what attracted a buyer. Up until that time there had been no interest shown in buying the line. In the first meeting we had, with shippers and bankers, we got

enough pledges (\$80,000-\$90,000) to buy bonds to rehabilitate the line.

"I am real proud of the people in Floyd County and the South Plains. They showed an interest and put up the money. We couldn't have done it without them. If we had lost the railroad it would never have come back.

"I believe this new company will create more interest and will probably get more shippers and more traffic," said Bearden.

Said December, Santa Fe has unloaded four of five lines of its Lubbock Cluster, which had faced abandonment if buyers were not found.

According to a March 31 story in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, the Floydada, Levelland and Brownfield spurs had been projected by a consultant to the South Plains Rural Rail Transportation District as the best money-making lines of the five-spur cluster.

AMERAIL has hired a railroad manager who has experience in grain, petroleum and cotton shipping to oversee day-to-day operations, McClure said.

Morales and his wife Frances have three children. The oldest, Monica, is 9 years old. Veronica is 8 and Amado Jr. is 6.

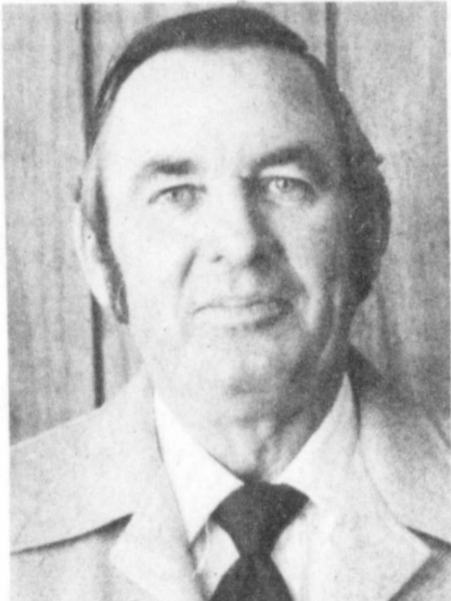
Ochoa is challenging incumbent Amado Morales and former councilman Don Green for the District 1 seat.

Ochoa is employed by Floyd County Precinct 4 as a machine operator. He is active in the First Mission Baptist Church and is working with the Floyd County Centennial Committee this year. He is also the vice president of the Advance/Advance community organization here in Floydada.

Ochoa and his wife, Nelda, have three children. Jeanie, age 10, is a student at R.C. Andrews. Danny, 5, is in preschool and Dustin is 2. Mrs. Ochoa is a parttime substitute teacher at A.B. Duncan Elementary. She is also working for the 1990 Census.

Ochoa says he decided to run for city council office because "I want to present a positive image in the community, not one of negativity," he continued, saying, "I feel that all of us, the city and the county, could work together to combine a lot of our resources and provide the people with good services while saving both the city and the county money."

"I would also like to strive to secure some type of recreation in the city for young people," said Ochoa. They need a place to go and some guidance in order to grow up to be productive members of our community."



DON GREEN

Don Green, returning to the political arena, is seeking to unseat incumbent Amado Morales for the council position in District 1. Morales defeated three term councilman Green in 1988 to secure the post.

Green, owner and operator of Don Green Auto Parts, has been a Floydada resident for more than 20 years and is active in the community. He is a member of the First Christian Church and coached little league teams for 18 years.

Green has also served on the Floyd County Fair Board and on the Floyd County Livestock Show Association Board.

Green and his wife Carolyn have two sons at home, Chad, 16, and Robbie, 18. Another son, Bobbie Don, is 27. Mrs. Green is employed by the ASCS office in Floydada.



WAYNE RUSSELL

Wayne Russell, mayor pro-tem and a twenty one year veteran of the Floydada City Council has filed to run for reelection to his at-large council post. Says Russell, "I want to see through to completion several projects the council is involved in at this time."

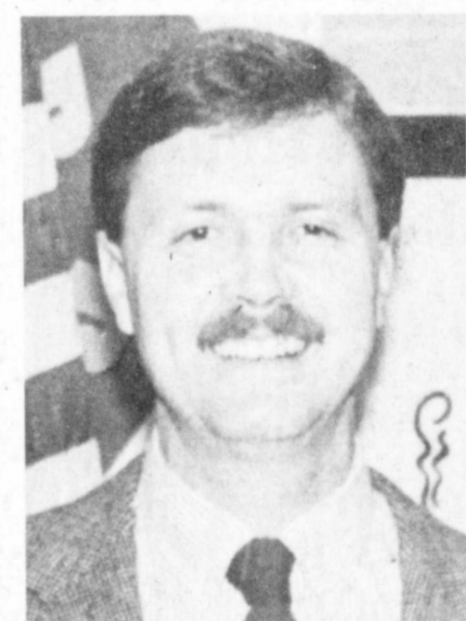
"I want to see the landfill expansion in operation. It has been a big problem for us and for all the other small towns, but we are looking good. We are on top of it," said Russell.

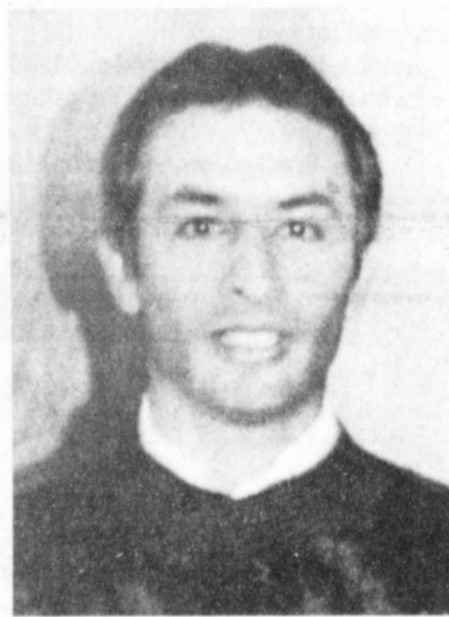
Cornelius has been on the board of directors of the Floydada Lions Club since 1986 and will take over this year as president of the organization. He was also a director on the Chamber of Commerce in 1988 and 1989.

Honored for his work on the ambulance fund drive, Cornelius was the recipient of the Extra Mile Award at the chamber banquet this past month. As president of the fund drive, Cornelius assisted in raising more than \$92,000 to purchase a new ambulance. He continues to serve as president of the committee which oversees the funds being used to maintain the ambulance and conserve funds toward the purchase of future ambulances.

As your council member, I will work to make our community an even better and prouder place to live."

Tickets to the event will go on sale next week at the chamber office. The price for the adult tickets will be \$7.00 and \$3.00 for children under 12.

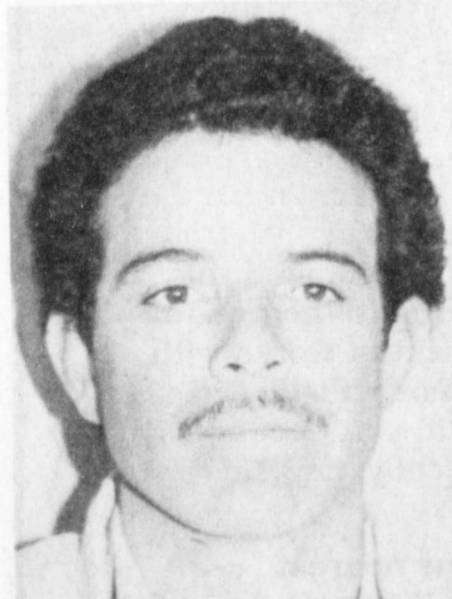


WAYNE TIPTON

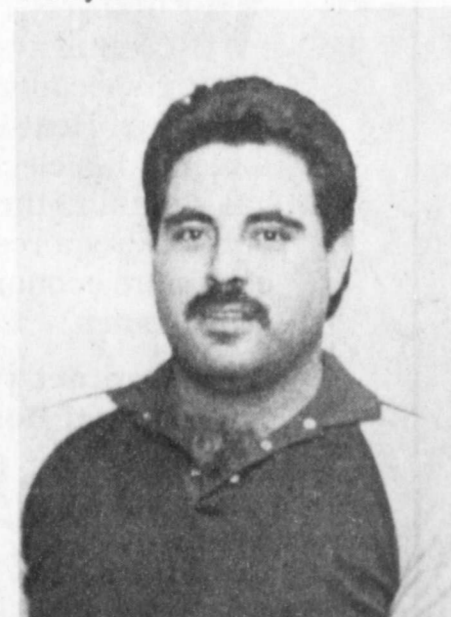
Tipton and his wife Lin have been Floydada residents for more than eleven years. The couple has five children.

Ted Bell art exhibit on display at bank

In a continuing effort to bring exhibits of fine art to Floyd County and the surrounding area, the First National Bank of Floydada is proud to present paintings of the late Ted Bell from private collections. The selected works are representative of the talented artist's ability to capture moments, subjects, the very substance of history and translate each event to a page in watercolor.

Ted Barnett Bell, born in 1921 in Silverton, came to Floydada in 1925 with his parents, Fred and Antonette Bell, and one older brother, Floyd.

He had no formal art training, but began experimenting with art quite by accident. His roommate at Texas Tech moved out leaving behind his drafting supplies, and Bell began to copy watercolors from "Ford Times" magazines. From then until his death in 1978 he painted quite extensively, but always as a hobby; and, his paintings are found today in homes and businesses all over the state of Texas, as well as in other states and even some foreign countries.

It always surprised Bell that people

were willing to pay money for his work, and it was always the interest in his work by the people of his hometown that brought him the greatest satisfaction. The exhibit this month represents only a few of the many people in this area who own his paintings.

The first public exhibit of Ted Bell's work was at the Floyd County Library in July, 1963. The first painting purchased at that show was by Billy and Frances Staniforth, and that painting, "The Hartman House" is on exhibit this month.

In 1952, Ted's father retired from his mail route, and Ted took over as carrier on the Star Route. He would paint in the afternoons and evenings after work.

Bell's favorite subjects in his paintings were old barns, windmills, and homeplaces that he saw on his mail route from Floydada to Silverton everyday. Many of those places have long since disappeared. He also painted many scenes from the area from Silverton to Memphis and in much of northern New Mexico.

He was never without his camera and

took hundreds of black and white snapshots from which to sketch when he was back in his studio in his home.

As his work became better known, most of his time was spent painting on commission from old family photographs and family homeplaces. As he got busier with his painting, however he never would consider giving up his mail route. He was quoted as saying, "Neither mail carrying nor painting ever gets tiresome. I enjoy both!"

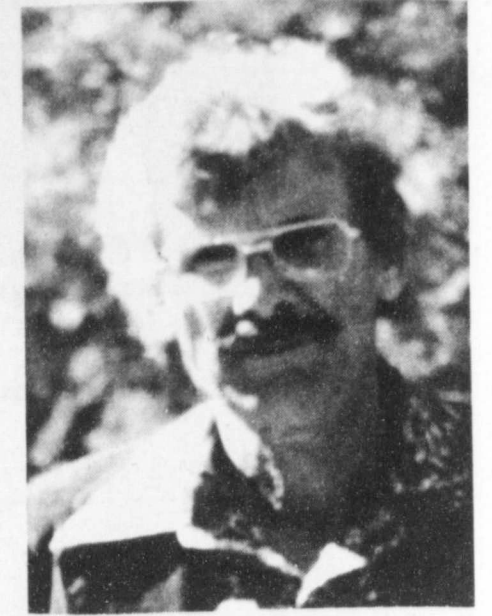
He was a people person, and he enjoyed being out in the country visiting with people. At the time of his death tributes poured in to his family, from both young and old. One wrote, "He was the kind of man that everyone loved to love."

His work won awards and honors all over the Panhandle and state and was sold on commission in art galleries in Texas, New Mexico, and Colorado. One month before his death, he had a very successful show at the Running Water Arts and Crafts Show in Plainview. There he took orders for many other paintings, some of which were not finished at the time of his death.

Ted's son, Rex, lives with his wife, Cheryl and one-year-old daughter, Anna Marie, in Fort Worth. Rex is in the landscape business. His daughter, Shannon Hart, lives in Dallas with husband, Mark. Shannon is a briefing attorney. Ted's brother, Floyd, lives in Texarkana.

It is fitting that in this year of celebration of Floyd County's Centennial that this art exhibit honors one of its own who loved the country so much and contributed his unusual talent in such a way that it will help to keep alive the history of Floyd County.

School board absentee voting begins April 17

Absentee voting for the May 5 school board trustee election by personal appearance will begin on April 17 and continue through May 1. HOSPITAL BOARD ELECTIONS

County renews employee insurance with BC/BS

In a special called session on March 28, the Floyd County Commissioners Court voted to renew the current employee health insurance plan with Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Texas. The renewal date is April 1 and the contract will run for one year, until March 31, 1991. A provision was added allowing the county to cancel the policy with 30 days notice.

The court gave the City of Floydada permission to install a light pole with a storm warning siren on the back of Lot 1, Block 36, Original Town of Floydada.

The sale of a tax title lot was also approved by the court. Lot 19, Blk. 85, Original Town, Floydada, will be sold for the sum of \$200 to be divided on a pro-rata basis between the taxing entities involved in the transaction. The sale is dependent on all the entities granting approval.

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Progressive Farmer magazine features agro-rescue training

Floydada has made national recognition once again, this time with the Agro-Rescue School. The annual Agro-Rescue School sponsored by Texas A&M and the Floydada Fire Department is featured in the April 1990 issue of Progressive Farmer.

According to the Progressive Farmer article, the highly acclaimed training school "lets the firemen make practice rescues in simulated agricultural accident situations under the supervision of trained instructors."

Floydada's Agro-Rescue School is the largest of only three ag accident training schools in Texas, according to Billy Marquis, a Texas A&M Extension safety engineer. Usually there are more than 200 participants and instructors, most of whom are volunteers, that attend the school.

The school attracts emergency volun-

teers from a 250 mile radius. The training sessions are held on a 4-acre site. Students practice by using dummies and old equipment donated by farmers, as well as some newer machinery loaned by area equipment dealers.

Sessions include simulated equipment accidents, grain bin emergencies and rappelling techniques. According to the article, "One of the first things we learn to do when a piece of farm equipment is involved is to call the local machinery dealer," said Ray Sanchez, an instructor at the school. "A mechanic on the scene who knows a machine inside and out can really help. 'The firemen are learning that you can often take equipment apart easier than you can tear it up while making a rescue."

FmHA election set

Farmers in Floyd County will have an opportunity to choose one person from candidates running for the Farmers Home Administration County Committee in the June 29th election, FmHA County Supervisor Becky Via said today.

Any person who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper is considered a farmer and is eligible to vote. Spouses of eligible farmers also are considered farmers for voting eligibility.

Among other duties, county committees help determine whether an applicant is eligible for a FmHA farm loan. Two of the three members are elected by county farmers, and the third is ap-

pointed by FmHA.

Eligible voters have the right to nominate candidates by petition. The "NOTICE OF RIGHT TO NOMINATE BY PETITION" is also published in this week's edition of the Hesperian.

Speakers highlighted at insect scouting school

An insect scouting workshop has been planned for Floyd County producers to be held on Thursday, April 12, at Lighthouse Electric Cooperative from 8:00 a.m. to noon.

Emphasis during the workshop will be placed on proper pest identification; life habits of the major pests of wheat, corn, cotton, sorghum, sunflowers, and soybeans; and field scouting techniques. The training will be sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Speakers at the workshop will include Floyd County Extension Agent, Brent Crossland; Mark Brown, EA-Entomology (PM) at Crosbyton; Greg Cronholm, EA-Entomology (PM) at Plainview; District cotton specialist, James Supak at Lubbock; and District plant pathologist Harold Kaufman at Lubbock.

This workshop promises to be very informative. All area producers and agri-businessmen are welcome to attend.

HPWD measurement shows decline in groundwater level

Floyd County groundwater levels decreased an average of 1.21 feet in 1989 in 98 privately-owned wells measured by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in its 579,400 acre service area in the county. This decline indicates a decrease of 105,161 acre-feet of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in the portion of Floyd County lying within the boundaries of the Water District.

The change in groundwater levels within this portion of Floyd County during the 10-year period from 1980 to 1990 was a decrease of 8.3 feet. Groundwater levels decreased 1.1 feet during the five-year period from 1985 to 1990.

Groundwater levels in the Ogallala Aquifer in the Water District's 5.5 million-acre service area had an average decline of one foot from January 1989 to January 1990, indicating a net reduction of 825,000 acre-feet of groundwater stored in the Ogallala Aquifer.

In 1985, groundwater levels in the

Ogallala Aquifer in the Water District service area showed a zero net change for the first time in the Water District's history. In 1986, a one-half foot average rise in water levels was recorded, followed by an average rise of 0.9 of a foot in 1987. Below average precipitation resulted in heavier pumpage in 1988 and caused groundwater levels to decline one-half foot.

Drier than normal pre-plant soil moisture conditions and below average precipitation during the growing season caused irrigators to apply heavier and more frequent irrigations than normal in 1989.

A network of 1,018 privately-owned observation water wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the District. Depth to water measurements are taken during January and February of each year after water levels have had time to stabilize from pumping during the previous growing season.

By comparing the current depth to water measurements with those taken early in the previous year, District staff members determine what changes in groundwater levels have occurred.

Of the 15 counties or portions of counties making up the Water District, 13 showed an average decline in the depth to water measurements in 1989. These counties were Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Parmer, Potter and Randall. Counties showing increases in groundwater levels during 1989 were Cochran and Hockley.

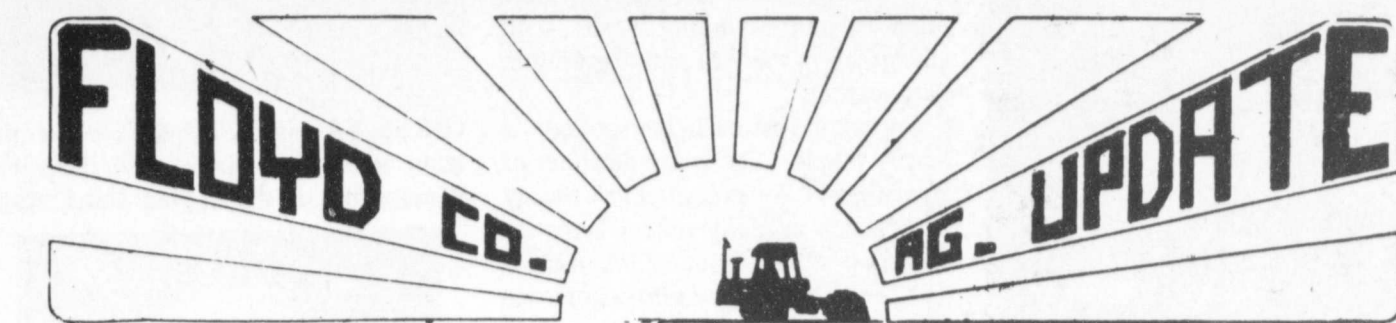
Property tax rules change

A recent rule change by the State Property Board's Special Committee on Agricultural Land Appraisal comes as a breath of fresh air to thousands of Texas farmers and ranchers who are already burdened with a mountain of bureaucratic red tape.

This committee has chosen to do the right thing by adopting a rule which forbids tax appraisers from requiring landowners to submit personal income information in order to qualify their land for an agricultural property tax exemption.

As a result of this new rule, most producers will only need to send a written sworn statement to their local tax assessor to ensure their property is taxed according to its agricultural productivity, as opposed to its market value. Prior to the committee's rule change, many of Texas' 165,000 family farmers and ranchers were required to provide their income tax returns, income statements, lease agreements, and other personal information to the local chief appraiser to receive the agricultural exemption. This appraisal status ensures that farm and ranch property is taxed at its agricultural value and not at some inflated commercial land value.

The Special Committee on Agricultural Land Appraisal reports to the State Property Tax Board whose membership includes appointees of the governor, the state agriculture commissioner, the state comptroller, the attorney general, and the general land commissioner. Deputy State Agriculture Commissioner Mike Moeller, made the motion to adopt the new rule which eliminated the requirement of income tax returns and other personal financial data for appraisal applications. The motion was approved unanimously by the committee.



Cotton trade show starts today

The Texas Cotton Ginners' Association (TCGA) will hold its 83rd Annual Cotton Trade Show and Convention on April 5, 6, and 7. The show will again be held at the Memorial Civic Center in Lubbock as it has been since the late '70s.

The 1990 Cotton Trade Show will feature over 170 exhibitors representing all aspects of the ginning industry. The products on display range from gin machinery and office equipment to farm supplies and cotton fashions. In short, the show offers something for everyone—ginners, producers, consultants, and friends of the cotton industry.

The highlight of the convention will be the educational workshops and meetings. Three workshops will be offered covering the electric ratemaking process at the PUC, gin wage and hour regulations, and migrant housing and field worker sanitation regulations. The PUC workshop will be conducted by Marta Greytko who is a Commissioner and former Chairman of the PUC.

The other workshops will be conducted by experts from the U.S. Department of Labor and Texas Department of Health.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service will present a seminar on marketing, fiber quality, and growth and development of cotton and how it relates to improved yield, quality, and profit. Five manufacturers of harvest aid chemicals will present a program on the proper and efficient use of their products in preparing a cotton crop for harvesting. Larry Nelson, president of TCGA and a cotton ginner and producer in Edmonson, says, however, "The best educational opportunity is the chance to visit with each other and with members of other segments of the cotton industry."

Another highlight of the convention is the TCGA annual meeting. At the meeting, Rick Perry, State Representative and Republican candidate for Agriculture Commissioner, will address convention participants. Awards will also be given to the 1990 ginner of the year and to the winners of the annual golf and domino tournaments.

Nelson adds, "I cordially invite all ginners, consultants, producers, and

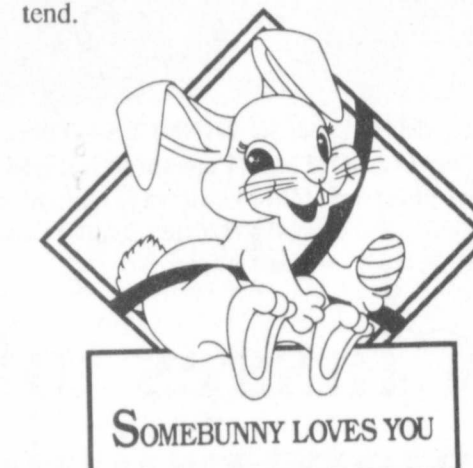
anyone associated with the cotton industry to come to Lubbock and view the products of the cotton ginning industry."

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Lake Mackenzie Report

On March 18, a 6 lb. 14 oz. large mouth bass was caught with a brown jig on Deadman's Creek, by Jeff Pharp from Texico, New Mexico.

March 27, a 3-3/4 lb. and a 2 lb. channel cat and an 8-3/4 and 5-1/2 lb. yellow cat and a 9-3/4 lb. blue cat were caught on trout line on Tule Creek by "Mule" Grantham from Silverton.

There are reports of crappie being caught in all the creeks, using minnows, about 8-10 feet deep, average 3/4 to 1/2 lb.

Also reports of large mouth bass being caught on rattle trap and black 6-inch worms. They average 2-3 lbs. and are being caught in the small cove on the north side of the lake.

Cactus Cove Marina is now open seven days a week, 8:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. during the week and 7:30 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on weekends.

The new rule states that a tax appraiser may only request information needed to determine whether land qualifies for an agricultural exemption. The tax appraiser must also inform applicants that income tax returns and other personal financial information are not required to qualify for the agricultural appraisal on their farm or ranchland.

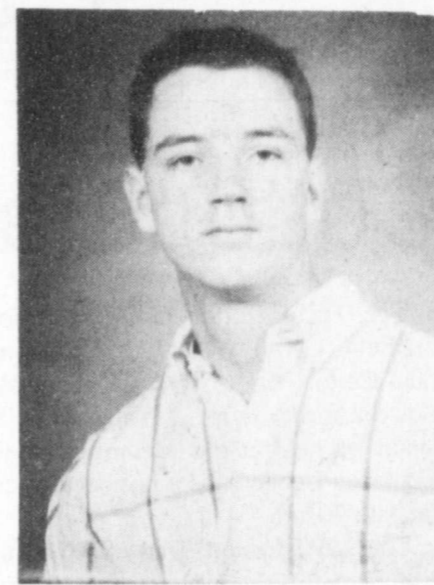

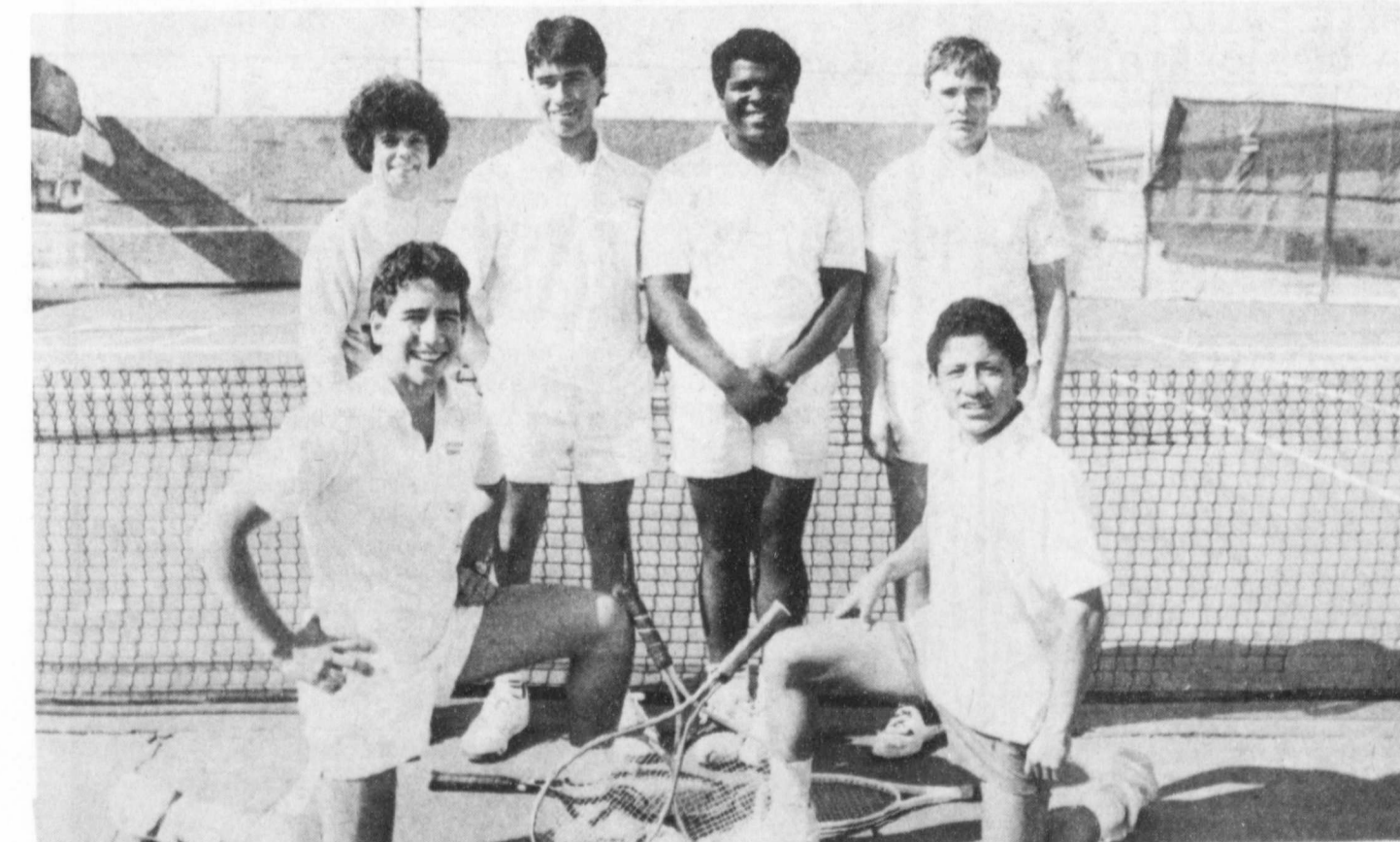

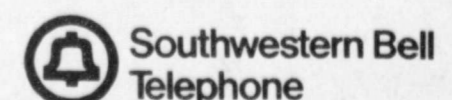
