Wilt Chamberlain, another seven footer had con-siderabe difficulty adjusting to the rugged NBA in his first few as a pro. Alcindor as heavy nor as rough as Chamand will take a beating. One thing he should enjoy though is getting away from the ridiculous rule that prohibits dunking the ball in college The rules makers have taken away the most ex-citing shot in the game. No matter what happens Alcindor will add greatly to the interest


