County To Elect One To Board

Parmer County cotton producers and agribusinessmen will elect a businessman director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at an 8 a.m. breakfast meeting on Tuesday, April 10 at Lucy's Restaurant, Farwell.

Announcement of the election comes from Bert Williams of Farwell, Parmer County Producer Director to the 25-county cotton organization, and Donald Christian, also of Farwell, current Businessman Director.

Each of the counties in PCG territory has two directors, one a businessman and the other a cotton producer. They are elected on alternate years for two-year terms. Each is eligible for re-election every second year.

All producers and businessmen are invited to the meeting. However, under PCG By-Laws, only current dues-paying members of PCG will be eligible to be elected a director or to vote in the election. This provision of the by-laws will be fully explained at the meeting.

A PCG staff member will conduct the election, review and answer questions about recent and planned PCG activities.

Officials Seek Help Locating Pre-Schoolers

Friona Elementary School is asking for assistance in its efforts to contact all parents of children who will be kindergarten age for the 1984-85 school year.

A kindergarten enrollment is planned for later this spring and school officials are presently compiling a list of students to be included in the plans.

Letters have been sent home by students who are currently enrolled in school, but this will not assure officials that all eligible children will be contacted.

Anyone who has a child that will be five years of age on or before September 1, 1984 is asked to contact the Principal's Office or phone 247-3340 so their name can be included on the mailing list.

The annual City and School Board election will be held at the Friona Fire Station Saturday (April 7), from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

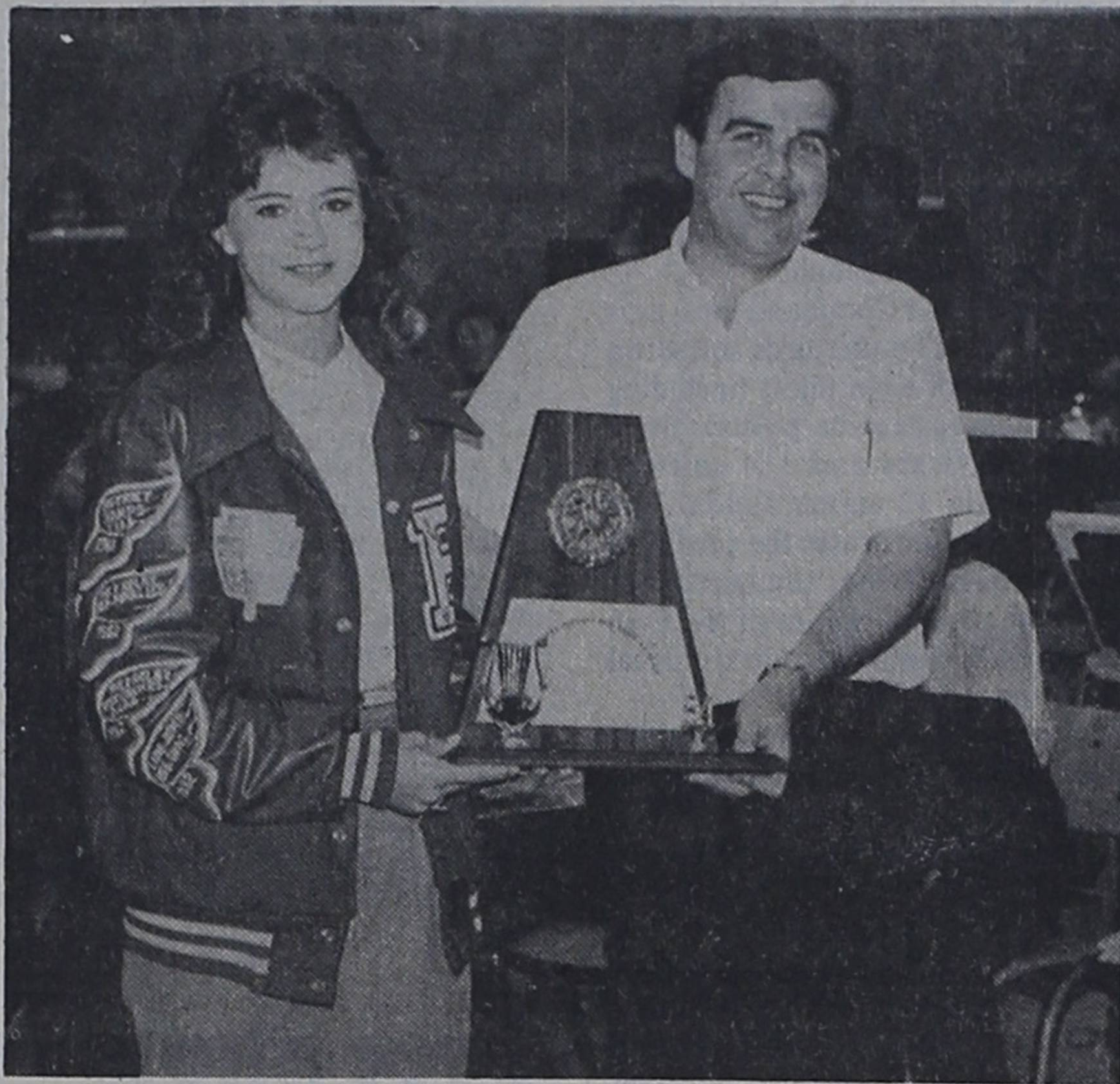
Contested races are on tap for the two city council spots, where four candidates are running, and in the school race, where five are seeking two spots.

The Friona Chieftain concert band received Division One ratings in both concert and sight-reading at the UIL competition last week.

The band received the "I" ratings by all three judges in the concert event, and capped off their day with a similar rating in sight-reading, and received a handsome trophy for their efforts.

In the concert division, the band played "Iowa Band Law March," "Brookshire," and "Exaltation." Eldon Sommenburg, one of the contest judges, of Dennison High School, said in his comment sheet, "This group plays well the music chosen for them. (The band) exhibits

good training and understanding of aspects of performance."

Gerald Smith of Panhandle High School, another of the judges, said "The band does a really fine job. (It) plays very musical--good style dynamics. Good teaching going on in Friona. My pleasure to hear you."

Soaking Rain Is Received Friday

The calendar says it's spring, but you sure wouldn't know it by the kind of weather the area had over April Fool's Day. At least by looking at the foggy, damp weather, one would have thought the cold winds might have brought snow.

The area received some needed rain and also some pea-sized hail fell in town. Golf ball size hail was reported at Cannon Air Force Base Sunday in Clovis.

Friday evening (March 30), the area received one of the best rains it had received in the past eight months. A slow, soaking rain started falling at about 5:30 p.m., and continued falling until after 8 p.m.

The general concensus was that around .75 inch of moisture was received from the Friday rain, which was very general in nature. Another quarter of an inch was registered on Sunday, making an inch overall, and about 1.75 inches for a ten-day period.

Even though the temperatures weren't all that low, the wind that swept through Sunday, bringing rain and heavy fog made for a chilly afternoon and night.

Monday's temperatures were in the forties but the winds continued and clouds gathered. Some blowing dust was seen throughout the day.

Cemetery Association Electing Officers

The board of directors of the Friona Cemetery Association met in official capacity February 16 at the City Hall. Those present were Roy V. Miller, president; John Fred White, vice president; Geneva Williams, secretary-treasurer; Juanita Reed and Russell O'Brian, City Manager Beelee Goodwin and Larry Martin, city employee, were present.

Letters to the Cemetery Association membership were discussed and plans made to get these letters mailed. This was done and

letters mailed March 20, requesting selection of officers to be nominated for Place 3. Present Board members of Place 3 are Roy V. Miller, Geneva Williams and Russell O'Brian. Other nominations made were Zona (Estes) Bass, Larry Martin and Melody (Owen) Drake.

Ballots should be marked and returned in the enclosed return envelope by no later than April 15. This is the date of the annual meeting of the membership. This meeting will be held at the City Hall at 4 p.m. At that time the ballots will be tabulated and the Board of Directors will be re-organized. Any and all interested persons are encouraged to be at this meeting.

The Friona Cemetery Association donated \$2,000.00 to the City of Friona for upkeep and beautification of the cemetery this year. More work is being done on the sprinkler system. Other projects were discussed with City Manager Goodwin. He expressed his desire to improve the cemetery and pledged his support for the Association.

The board of directors encourage comments and suggestions for improvements to be made at the cemetery.

Better Crop Year Is Crim's Forecast

"This year is going to be a better than average crop year for farmers," says Weldon Crim of Lazbuddie, in a traditional weather forecast taught him by his father, J.W. "Indian" Crim. The forecast determines the year by the direction the wind is blowing at sunrise on March 22 of each year.

A teepee-shaped pile of wood was burned last Thursday morning in the Lazbuddie area at the crack of dawn. The east wind blew the smoke from the fire toward the west and according to Weldon Crim, this means a better than average crop year.

The tradition of forecasting was passed down to Weldon by his father, who performed the Indian ceremonial rites for many years. The forecast custom had been passed down to J.W. Crim by his father, Taylor Crim, who was taught the ritual by the Indians.

It is said that this ceremony is well known throughout the Panhandle and South Plains area and J.W. Crim had performed this ritual near Lazbuddie from 1923 until 1980, when he died. His wish was that his sons continue the tradition.

A bumper crop is on its way if the wind is blowing from north-northeast

at sunrise on March 22. A northwest wind means a fair year, a west, south or southeast wind indicates a poor crop year with little moisture.

It may be interesting to mark this date on your calendar and see how it goes each year.

53 Local Kids Enter Sci-Fair

Friona youngsters are involved in the Regional Science Fair this weekend at the Activities Center at West Texas State.

Friona High School science instructor Rick Tullis is serving as chairperson for the regional fair.

A public display of the projects will be held between the hours of 8 a.m. and 2 p.m., Tullis said.

Some 150 exhibits are expected in all, and over one-third of them will be from Friona. Tullis said there were 23 high school, about 15 junior high and 15 grade school youngsters, winners on the local level, entering their projects at Canyon.

WHAT A LOVELY rain the area received last Friday evening! How long has it been since a slow-moving system set in and rained nice and easy for two or three hours? That's exactly what happened, and it was just "What the doctor ordered."

That nice three-quarters of an inch won't necessarily break the drought, but, added to the equal amount that had been received during the past week, gave the area a better than average total for the month of March, and for the first time in months, there is some honest-to-goodness mud to be found.

The dryland wheat has really perked up, and now has been given a fighting chance to make a crop--or at least will provide some good grazing for those with cattle.

The weather experts have indicated that more moisture might be in the picture during coming days, and it seems that our area's weather pattern has changed just enough to include our section of the country in the moisture department.

We were glad to note that Weldon Crim, who has taken up his late father's practice of making a weather reading on the first day of spring, has predicted that 1984 will be a better than average crop year.

Maybe things are ready to make a change for the better for our area's farmers, and if so, it isn't a minute too soon!

WE FEEL SORRY for University of Houston Coach Guy Lewis, whose team has been to the NCAA "final four" for the past three years in a row, but in each case, UH has failed to bring home the trophy, finishing second the past two years.

Naturally, the Cougars have a lot to be proud of, having beaten a number of good teams to get to the NCAA finals, but as you know, in anything you do, the top spot is the ultimate goal, and once again it was "Close, but no cigar."

We really thought that Houston U. would win the post-season national tournament this year. They had played some outstanding basketball, as indicated by their 32-5 season record.

And their super-star, Akeem Olajuwon seemed to be virtually unstoppable. But Georgetown found a way to outdo him Monday night. Seemed to have been with a seven-foot center of their own, named Patrick Ewing.

The thing that kills yours truly about watching these college championships is the way these good teams like Houston cannot make their free throws.

It seems like the free throw is becoming "lost art" in the sport of basketball, and in many cases, it's too bad. I didn't see all of Monday night's game, but saw enough of it to know that if Houston could have made 80 per cent of their free throws, they would have won the national title game.

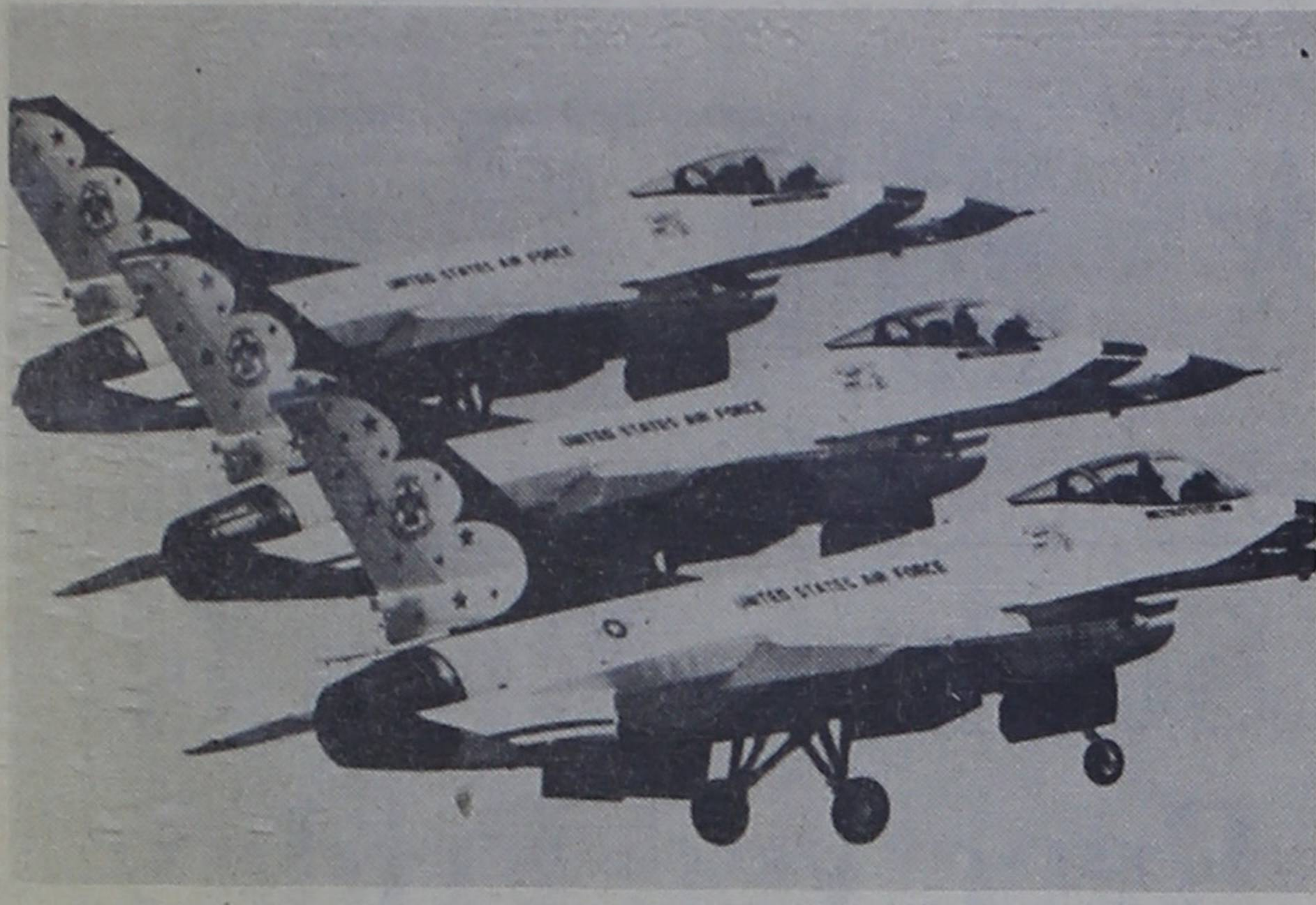
And, as I remember that the Cougars lost last year's finale by an even closer margin, again because they couldn't make their free throws.

The immediate strategy for Coach Lewis should be to send his troops to the gym from now until next November, and have them work about two hours a day shooting free throws....over and over and over.

Today's players spend too much time working on the art of "slam-dunking" the ball, when about the only talent that takes is a lot of height and agility. A five-foot, ten-inch player can beat the seven-footers at the foul line. To lose one national title for that reason was bad, but two in a row is almost inexcusable.

Court Outlaws Use Of 2,4-D Chemical

A long discussion concerning the use of 2,4-D or derivatives of 2,4-D in Parmer County was held at the last meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Monday, March 26.

Taking part in the discussion were Dennis Maloney, pesticide specialist with the Department of Agriculture, Gary Patterson, Extension Agent for Agriculture, and Joe Jones, Bovina, a pesticide applicator.

After a detailed discussion of the needs and conditions, a motion was passed setting April 15, 1984 as the deadline for spraying 2,4-D and its derivatives in Parmer County, and setting the closed time from April 16 until October 31, 1984.

Notation was made of the possibility of the county joining the Hi-Plains Agricultural Development Corporation through the PRPC, for the purpose of promoting the processing and marketing of farm products.

Judge Porter Roberts received notice from the Bureau of the Census stating that on July 1, 1982, their estimate of the population of Parmer County was set at 10,932, using the county's base figure from the 1980 census, which was 11,038. This would

indicate a drop of 106 people, or less than one per cent, for the period.

After discussion of a letter from the Texas Assn. of Counties, a motion was passed asking support for funding for county roads through a one-cent fuel tax. A resolution was to be mailed to the governor, lieutenant governor, house speaker, state senator and Bill Sarpalius and Representative Pete Laney asking their support.

At the suggestion of County Treasurer Benna Felts, some certificates of deposit which were maturing March 30 were reinvested as follows: general fund CDs of \$100,000 and \$150,000; Farm to Market fund CDs of \$100,000 and \$200,000, to mature May 15, 1984; also \$100,000 in general funds, new money, was invested until May 15, 1984; and \$30,000 in Right of Way funds, new money, was invested, to mature September 28, 1984.

The new money has come in as tax receipts and is held until needed, while earning interest.

Soil work was approved for three county farms, to be completed when machinery is available. Such work is re-imbursed the county.

Thunderbirds Are Coming To Cannon

The U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds are coming to Cannon Air Force Base on April 22.

Flying in the F-16 Fighting Falcon, the Thunderbirds will perform at 4 p.m. during Cannons' annual Community Appreciation Day.

Community Appreciation Day begins with opening ceremonies starting at 1 p.m.

The U.S. Air Force Air Demonstration Squadron, the Thunderbirds, perform precision aerial maneuvers, exhibiting to people throughout the free world the capabilities of Air Force aircraft and people.

A Tactical Air Command unit, as is Cannon, the Thunderbirds squadron is composed of eight pilots (including the six demonstration pilots), three support officers and 114 enlisted personnel in 32 career fields. The squadron demonstrates the precision of formation flying, the maximum performance capabilities of the F-16 and the readiness of a modern tactical flying unit.

Early in 1983, the Thunderbirds began flying the General Dynamics F-16. This aircraft represents the full range capabilities possessed by our newest tactical fighters. This highly maneuverable multirole fighter has proven itself to be one of the world's best precision tactical bombers and air-to-air combat aircraft. It is a multi-national aircraft used by eight countries other than the U.S.

With the transition to the F-16 from the T-38 Talon, the team was able to retain manpower and fuel efficiency while demonstrating to Thunderbird spectators the very latest in fighter technology.

Other activities scheduled during the day are a military working dog show, a drill team performance, a security police rappelling exhibition and a demonstration of emergency escape procedures from an F-111D aircraft.

Community Appreciation Day provides an opportunity for local citizens to visit the base and learn more about its mission, equipment, facilities, people and the skills required to operate in the Air Force. Gates open at noon with activities tailored for the whole family's enjoyment lasting through 5:30 p.m.

Cannon's F-111D along with other Air Force aircraft will be on static display. Refreshments and parking will be available throughout the day.

Church Sets Talent Event

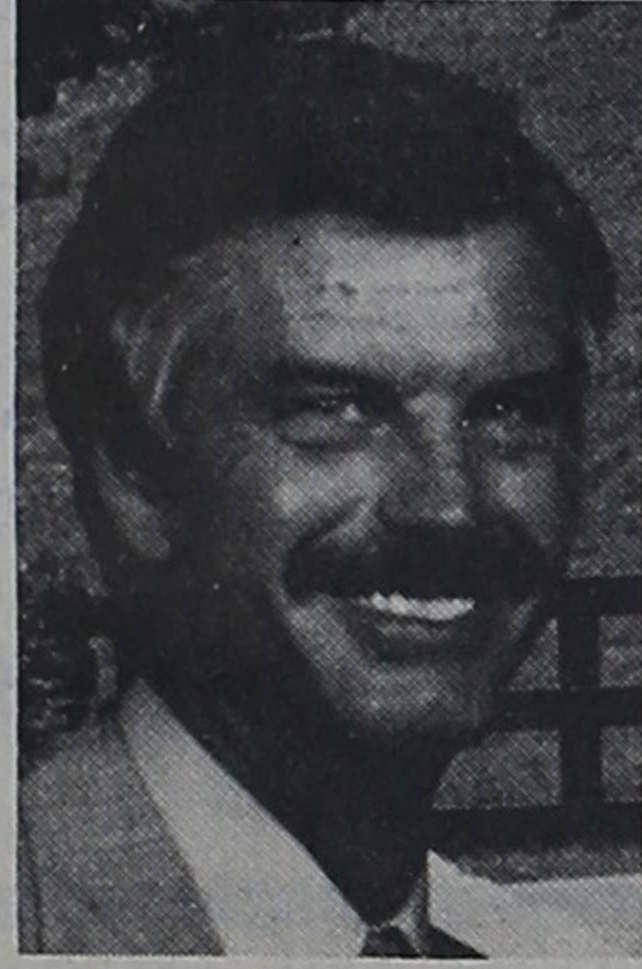

T.S.C., Friona's local men's team, won second in their division of the tournament.

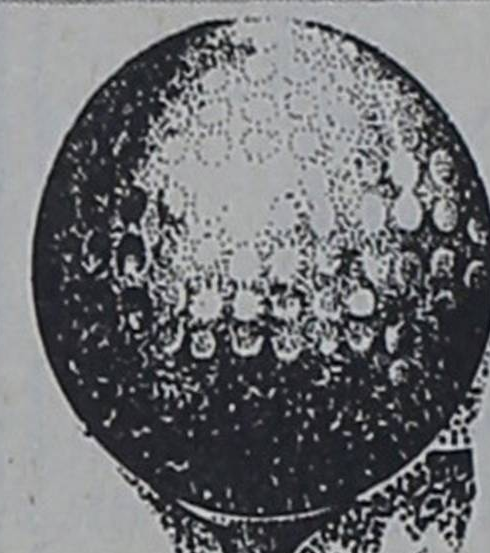
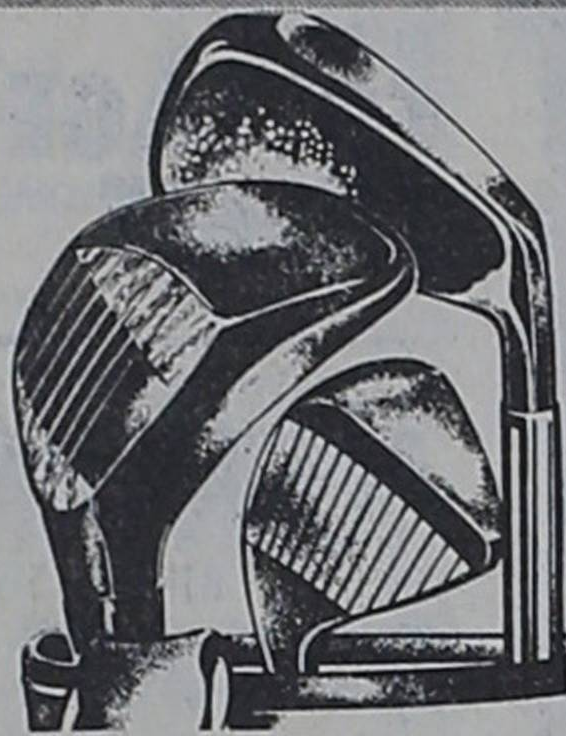

Chiefs 2nd At Seminole

The Friona Chieftains' track team placed second overall in the Seminole Indians' Invitational meet last Saturday.

The team scored 131 points, to trail only meet winner Slaton in the race for the team title, and Coach Steve Williams was very proud of the performance.

"That's the most points we have scored in a meet this season. Overall, it was a very successful meet for us. Considering the long drive, I felt we did very well," Williams said.

Also, the 400-meter relay team (Joe Garza, Charlie Morgan, Ricky Marquez and Eloy Caballero) placed second with a time of 45.2. The 1600-meter relay team (Aguirre, Garza,

Marquez and Caballero) were second with a time of 3:33.1.

Morgan also placed third in the long jump at 20-2, and third in the 100-meter dash at 11.5, racking up a 30-point individual performance.

Aguirre placed fourth in the long jump at 19-5; and fourth in the 110-meter high hurdles in 16.2, to account for 22 points in the team's total.

Caballero placed fourth in the discus with a throw of 118-8.

Thomas Merritt was third in the pole vault, clearing 10-6, and LeRoy Mercado was third in the 3200 meter run at 11:02, his personal best.

Troy Crutchfield was fourth in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:12 and

also fourth in the 1600-meter race at 5:02, his personal best mark.

Neelley placed sixth in the 300-meter hurdles with a 43.6 clocking, and Richard Perez was sixth in the 400-meter dash at 56.1. Leroy Mercado was sixth in the 1600 meters with a 5:13 clocking.

The Chieftains are entered in the Amarillo Relays Friday and Saturday, the largest meet they've entered, which will also feature some of the stiffest competition.

Coach Williams was expecting his troops to do some scoring. After Amarillo, the team has only one meet, at Boys Ranch, prior to their UIL district meet at Abernathy.

During the business meeting awards won by the club at the recent District Federated Convention in Lubbock were displayed.

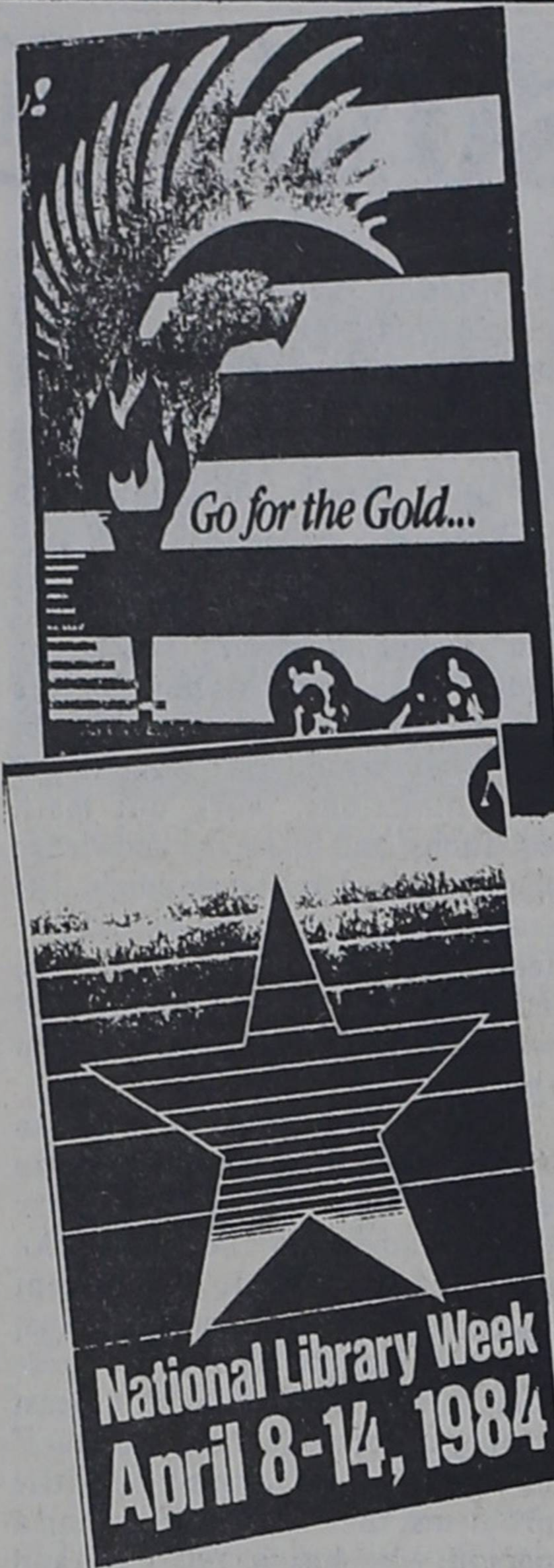
Beth Thompson and Allo Reeve of Modern Study Club were re-elected as District Committee Women during the convention.

Alcoholics Anonymous Aids In Arresting Alcoholism Early

*Inga is 23 years old. She had her first whiskey sour at 16; a year later, she was mixing liquor with uppers and downers. She dropped out of school, decided to hitchhike from her home in Atlanta to San Francisco and start a whole new life. She drank and drugged as she thumbed her way West. In Kansas, she was raped and beaten and left for dead on the highway. At the hospital, she was detoxified and introduced to Alcoholics Anonymous.

*John is 51 years old. He graduated cum laude from Yale in 1950 and started up the career ladder at IBM. From the start, he liked his two martinis at lunch, cocktails before dinner and brandy after, but he knew how to handle his liquor. He married and produced three children, belonged to the right clubs, and was on a first-name basis with the right people. Then his drinking got out of hand; he had the shakes, the sweats, wound up in one drying-out place after another. His wife insisted that he see their minister, who referred him to a psychiatrist. But John kept on drinking. In time, he lost his job, the mortgage was foreclosed on the house, his wife left him, the children would have no part of him. Those endless nights, his bedroom was a Bowerly. That's when he found A.A.

Just how far down the path of alcoholism do you have to go in order to qualify for membership in A.A.? As these two true stories show, not far...or else very far; hitting "bottom" is an individual thing.

Inga drank for seven years, John, for about 30. She stuck mainly to wine and beer because they were cheaper; he could afford the hard stuff. But they both qualified as alcoholics--because drinking had made both their lives unmanageable. And once they crossed the "invisible line" that separates the alcoholic from the heavy drinker, there was no going back.

In A.A., time was when virtually all the members had lost families and jobs, to say nothing of time spent in hospitals, jails, and skid rows across

the country. Today, however, the portrait of membership has changed. Newer members come in speaking of days lost from work rather than of lost jobs. Most of them still have families intact; have never seen the inside of a jail or lived in a fourth-rate hotel or slept in a hallway on skid row. They may not have had blackouts or taken the morning drink. They may not have had the shakes and the sweats in the long, lonely nights. But they know they have a problem with alcohol.

In large measure, these alcoholics owe their early recovery in A.A. to the fact that the disease of alcoholism has been recognized, at all levels, as a national health problem. According to a recent A.A. survey of its membership, 41 per cent credit another A.A. member for introducing them to the Fellowship; 38 per cent came "on my own"; 24 per cent through counseling and therapy; 21 per cent because of a family member; and 10 per cent through their family doctor. Moreover:

--The under-30 membership in A.A. increased by nearly 50 per cent in the past three years.

--At a typical A.A. meeting, one out of every three people is a woman--a jump of 33 per cent over the past ten years.

Virtually all occupations are represented by alcoholics in A.A. Among men, for example, 29 per cent are in sales and business; 27 per cent in crafts; 26 per cent in the professions (such as medicine, law); and 11 per cent are semi-skilled. Among the women, 40 per cent call themselves homemakers; 21 per cent, professionals; 18 per cent, office, clerical; 14 per cent, in sales and business; and 7 per cent skilled and semi-skilled.

Some A.A.'s may have been referred to the Fellowship by a doctor, psychiatrist, or clergyman. Or, the alcoholic's spouse or a friend may have read about A.A. in a national magazine or newspaper. Or, the alcoholic may have seen a movie

or television drama dealing with alcoholism and A.A. Moreover, such alcoholics may work for some of the thousand or so companies in the country that have developed programs to combat alcoholism among employees--as early on in the progression of the illness as possible, before chronic absenteeism and diminishing performance on the job have rendered the worker unemployable.

Like most other illnesses--heart disease, cancer, diabetes--alcoholism can strike people of any age; and it develops at different rates in different individuals. Nor does it matter how much or how little you drink. The important question is: What is your drinking doing to you? How is it affecting your life?

Alcoholism is a progressive illness; as long as the alcoholic keeps on drinking, it will grow progressively worse. Until the drinker chooses to stop.

There is no known "cure" for alcoholism, but the disease can be arrested with the help of A.A.--BEFORE the horror stories start.

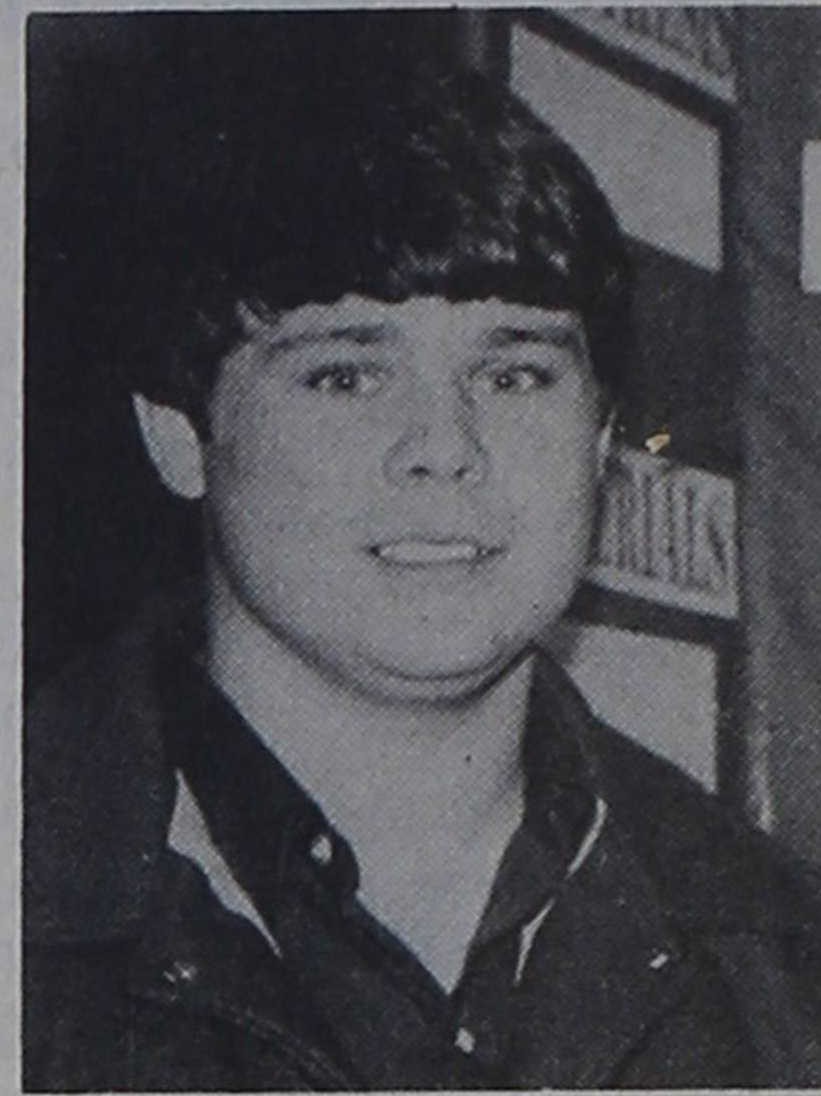

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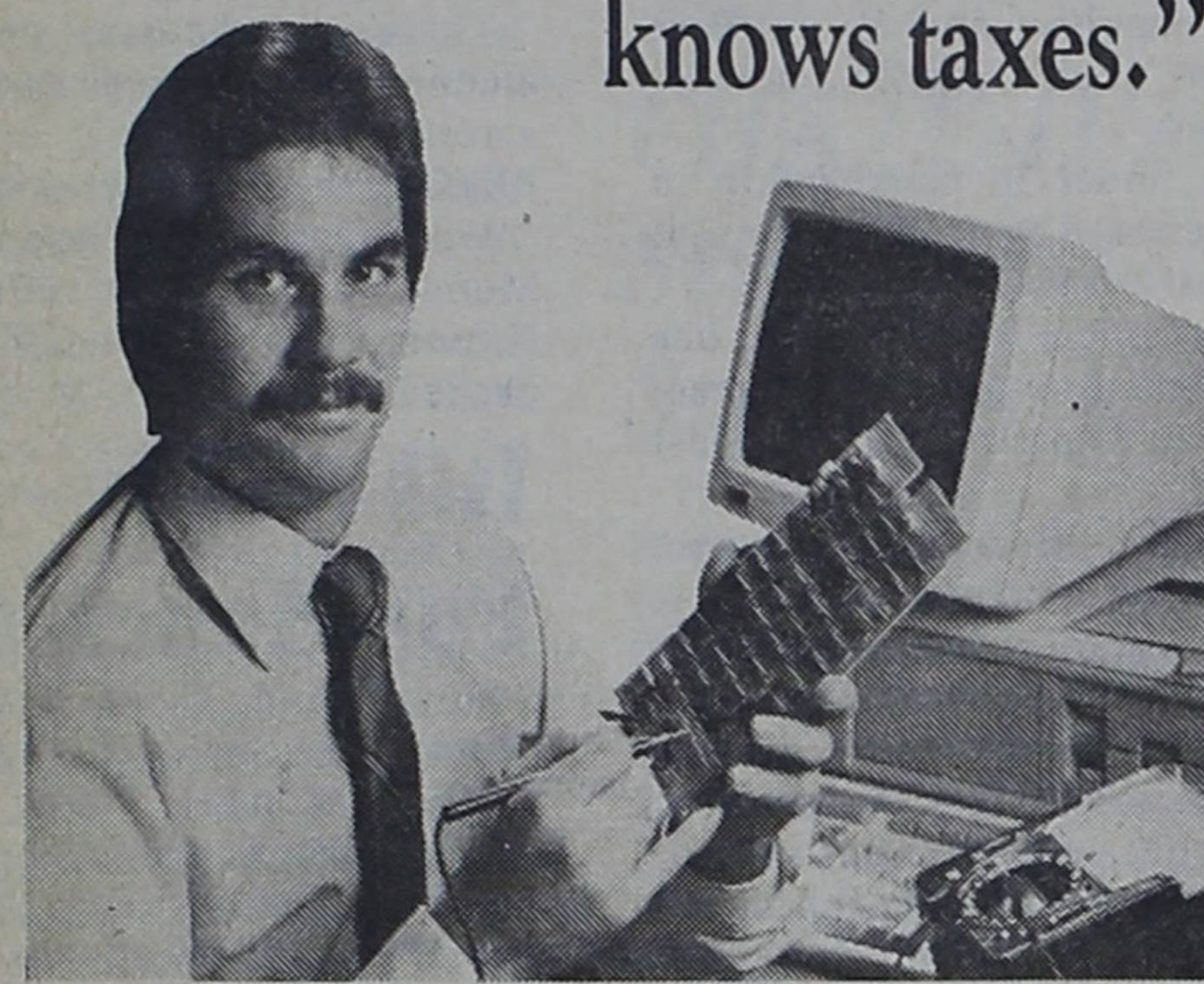

April Proclaimed "Buckle-Up" Month

Governor Mark White has declared April "Buckle-Up" Month and urged all Texans to buckle-up themselves and their children in cars. Citing an estimated 3,850 traffic deaths in Texas last year, White noted that traffic collisions are the leading cause

of accidental death, especially for young people.

Texas leads the nation in traffic deaths of children between the ages of 0 and 4. At least 162 children in Texas in that age group died while riding as passengers in motor vehicles within the last two years, according to Department of Public Safety accident records.

According to national estimates of use, only about 15 per cent of drivers wear safety belts. About 27 per cent of children are properly protected in vehicles.

Everyone should "take a few extra seconds to protect themselves and their passengers by the use of safety belts and car seats," said White, who is an habitual safety belt user.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that safety belt use could reduce traffic deaths by as much as 50 per cent. Among infants and young children that estimate of lives saved goes as high as 90 per cent. Safety belts have also been cited as a major line of defense against the drunk driver, as the best protection now available in a collision.

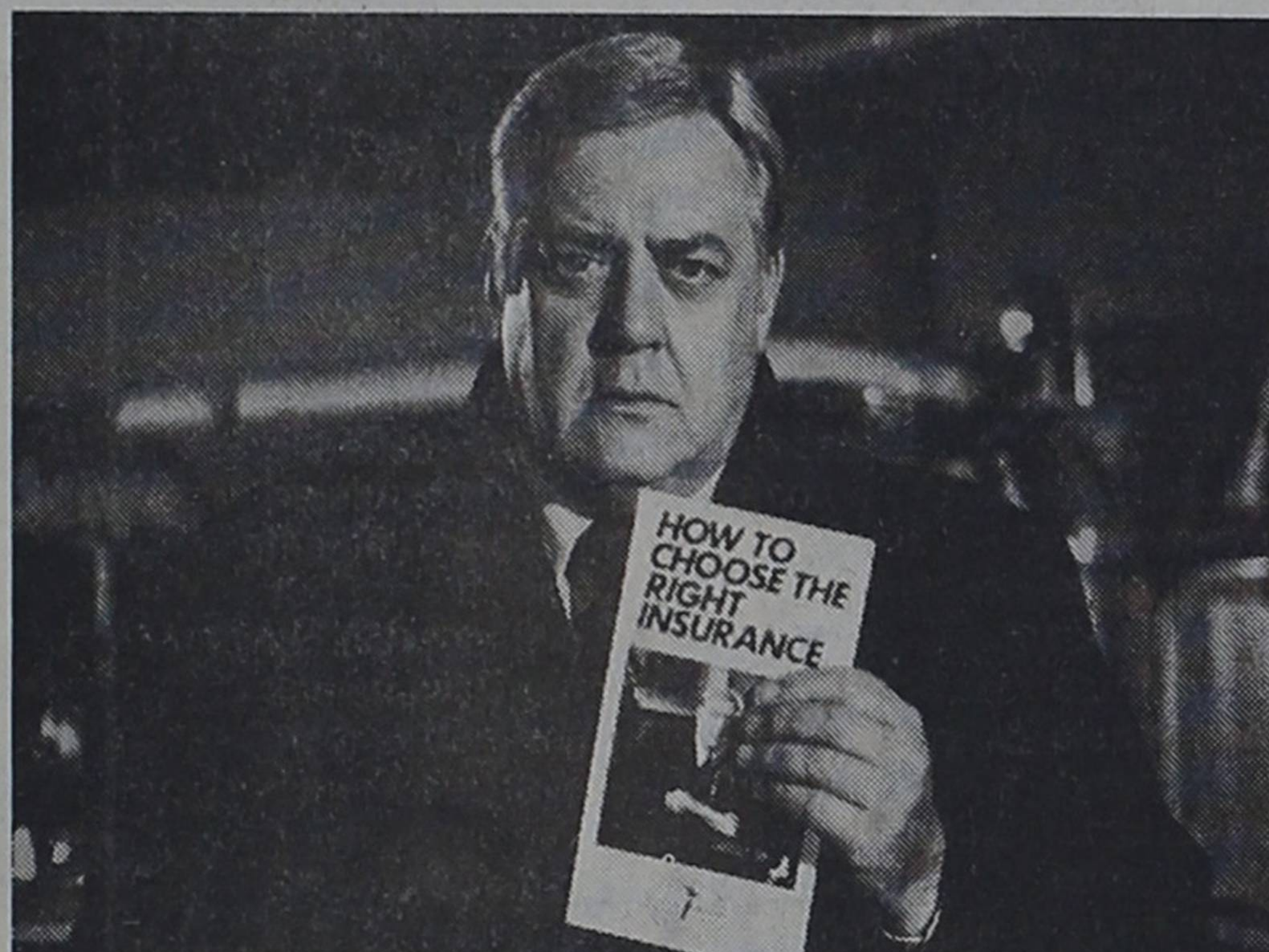

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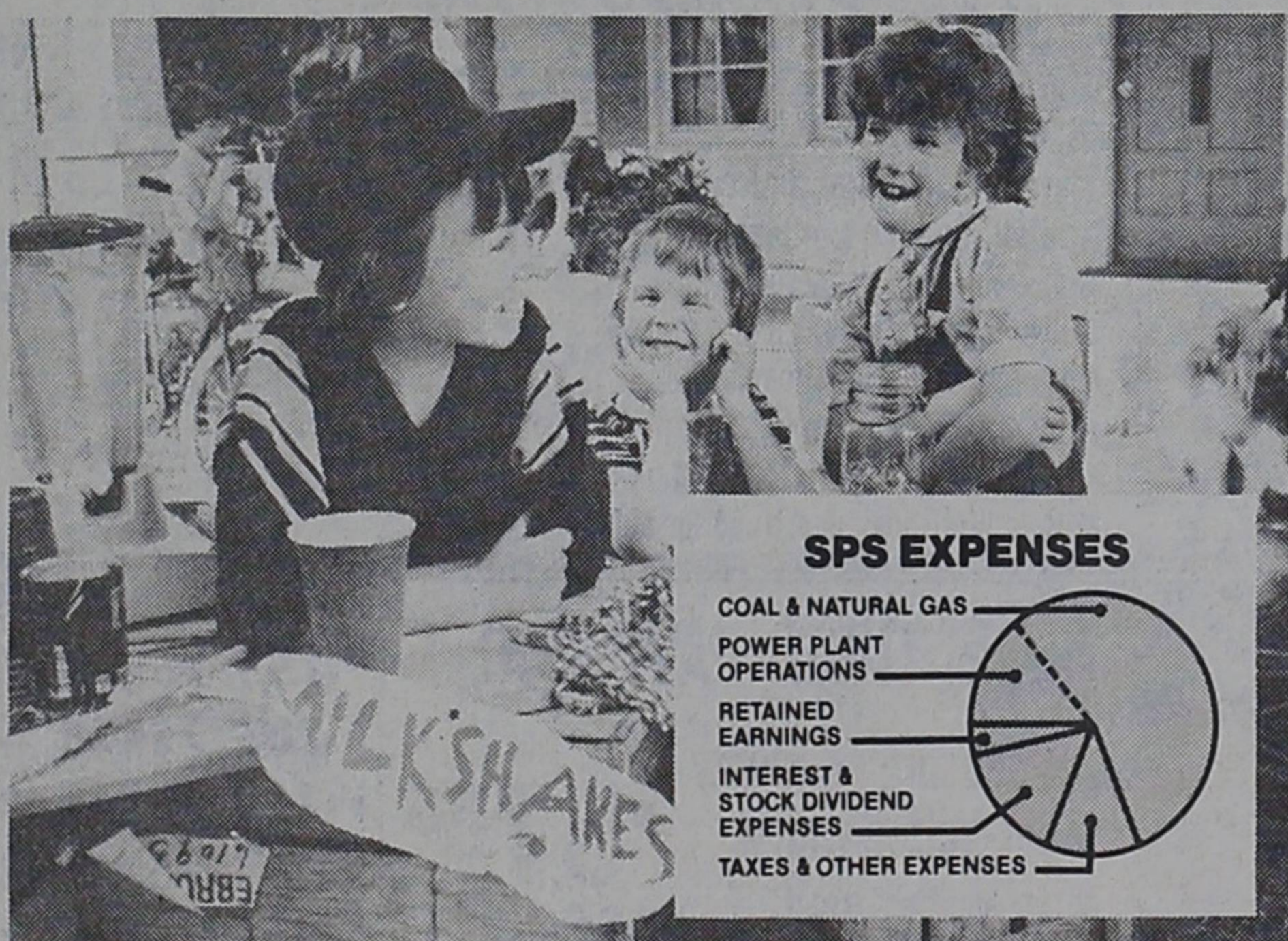


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Letter To The Editor

The Friona school system issued its annual letter dealing with the tornado season this week, and the school's requirements and procedures in case of a tornado warning.

The letter was as follows:

"Once again we are into the stormy season in West Texas. Tornado drills are most important in our schools so that we will be prepared in the event of a tornado alert. This letter is to advise you of our procedures and plans should we be placed under an alert or have a warning.

Sunny Horton Makes UT Honor Roll

The College of Natural Sciences at The University of Texas has named 443 students to the 1983 fall semester honor roll.

To be eligible for the natural sciences honor roll, students must earn at least 52 grade points during the semester, passing all courses undertaken.

Students who earn 67 grade points and above are named to the list Summa Cum Laude. Those who earn 61 to 66 grade points are listed Cum Laude Ampla et Magna; 58 to 60 grade points, Magna Cum Laude; 55 to 57 grade points, Ampla Cum Laude, and 52 to 54 grade points, Cum Laude. Total grade points are calculated by multiplying the number of semester hours undertaken by the value of each grade (A equals four points).

The list, announced by Dean Robert E. Boyer, includes Sunny Irene Horton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hollis Horton of Friona.

"The school is informed by radio, local fire department, civil defense units, the police and the highway patrol. School personnel are also on the alert for observing the weather in times of threatening clouds. If an alert is received a tornado signal is sounded in our buildings.

All students are informed and drilled in what to do in case of an alert. We have assigned students certain places to go in order to get the best protection possible. The safety of each child is our utmost concern. We make every effort to see that every child is well drilled on what to do in case of a tornado alert.

There are some ways you, the parents, can help us in this safety precaution. These things are:

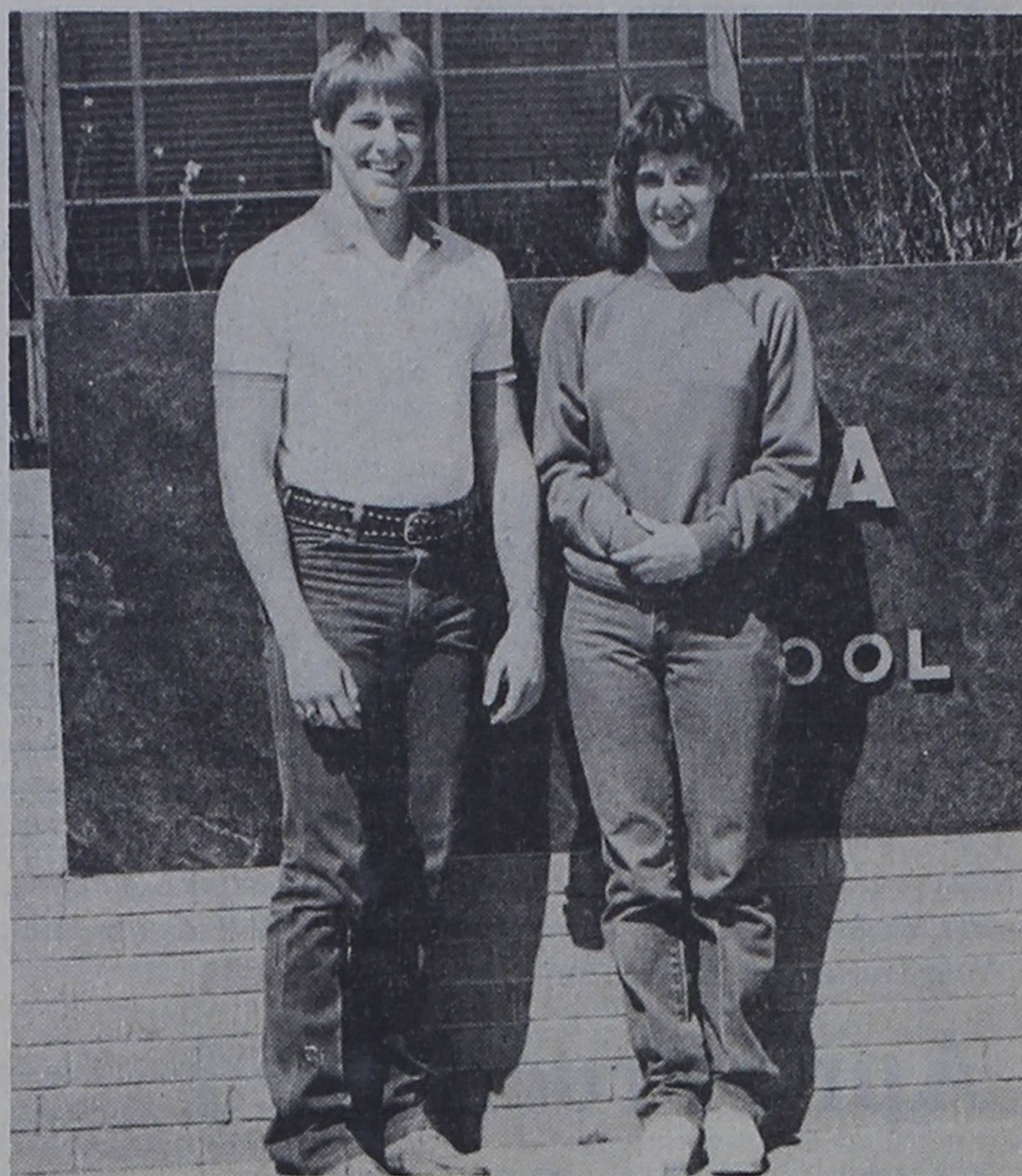
1. In times of severe weather, you may come and get your child if you wish, but we strongly encourage you to do nothing or say nothing that might alarm the children. We must do all that we can to eliminate panic.

2. If you do pick your child up, please be sure and see the child's teacher or principal and advise them that you are taking your child. The teacher is responsible to account for each child and must be informed if a child is picked up by a parent.

If, during tornado season, our area becomes under severe weather warning, we may dismiss school early provided we feel the children will have enough time to get home before the storm begins. Therefore, it will be necessary for you to have a prearranged plan with your child as to where to go in case you are not at home.

We appreciate your cooperation in this matter that involves the safety of our school children.

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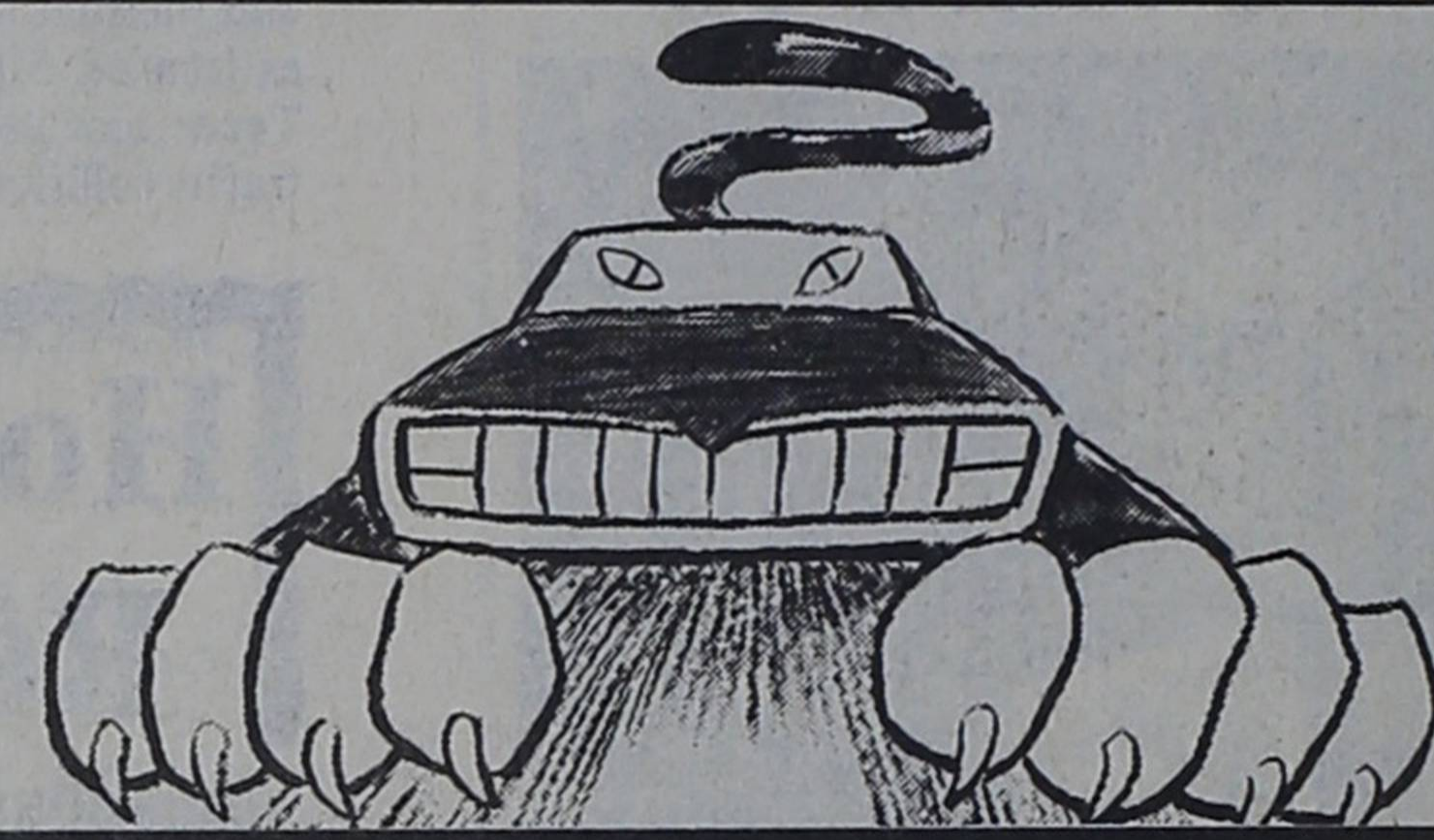

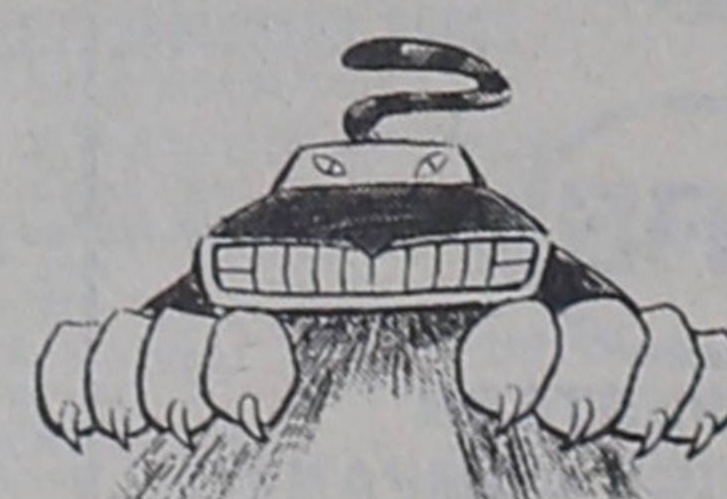
