EULA BOX RULED ILLEGAL, SPECIAL ELECTION CALLED

BAIRD — At a hearing on the election contest held Monday, June 22 before District Judge Raleigh Brown, concerning the run-off election held June 6, at which time Lowell Johnson won by a vote of 122, to 120 for Glen Swor.

After testimony was given, the Judge ruled that the Eula box was illegal, and called for another election for Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, to be held July 7th.

The election will be held in Denton Valley. Voting Precinct 6 and in Oplin, Voting Precinct 7. Those persons who voted previously on Commissioner, Precinct No. 2, in Eula box, will have to go to Denton Valley to cast

their vote. It will be necessary to come to the County Tax Assessor-Collector's Office to have their registration changed from Eula Precinct 5 to Denton Valley, Precinct 6.

Absentee voting starts June 29 and continues through July 2nd.

RASH OF FIRES IN COUNTY, CITIZENS ASKED TO USE CARE

BAIRD — Fire Chief Lee Roy Brooker warns everyone to be extremely careful at this time of the year. There have been numerous fires lately because of no rain and weeds and grass are dry and brittle. A carelessly tossed cigarette or unwatched trash fire can cause a major blaze. Take precautions to prevent any fires around your home and property.

Last Wednesday there was a series of fires. A fairly large grass fire burned an estimated 400 acres of pasture land on the Hugh Ross and James Windham ranches north of Clyde. Both Baird and Clyde Fire Departments, and many volunteers fought the blaze. There was no stock lost, but a lot of fence posts were burned in the fire.

Mr. Ross said, "Thanks to the hard fighting firemen, the men with bulldozers and the county grader, that fire was brought under control." A strong south wind was blowing, and if the men had not been able to control the fire, it would have done a

lot more damage.

A small fire was burning Wednesday just west of town on Mount Airy along the railroad tracks. Another fire was east of town along the railroad right-of-way behind the R. D. Williams home. Still another fire broke out at Higgins Dairy.

Just a week ago, a house 2 miles west of Baird, burned to the ground.

Everyone please be careful. A small trash fire left unwatched may cause a major fire; a carelessly thrown match or cigarette may burn acres of good pasture land. Always be cautious with fires of any kind.

CLYDE RESIDENTS JUSTLY PROUD OF NEW LAKE

CLYDE — Over two hundred gathered at the Clyde lake site for dedication ceremony Saturday. Congressman Omar Burleson was on hand for the occasion. "This is the sort of thing I call closing the barn door before the horse gets out. You just can't have too much water if you can control it," Burleson stated.

Main purposes of the lake are for flood water storage, sedi-

ment storage, recreational and municipal use.

City Attorney Gaston Swofford introduced E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist from Brownwood, and Congressman Burleson as speakers.

The lake project was started in May of 1969, and completed in early April of this year. The 63-foot dam hold back almost 264,000 cubic yards of water.

At the principal spillway level the lake covers 449 acres. At the emergency level, it covers 649 acres. The drainage area of the lake is more than 24,000 acres.

The lake is a part of the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed Project, including 36 planned dams. It has been made possible by the Soil Conservation Service of USDA, Central Colorado Soil & Water Conservation District, and Landowners sharing the drainage area. The Texas Water Development Board provided financial assistance.

Area residents are proud of the lake - it has been a dream of residents for many years. It will serve many purposes to the people, as a water supply and a recreation area.

Tuesday morning, Gaston Swofford, City Attorney, Mayor G. E. Eager, Councilman M. M. Tabor and James Herring, of the Soil Conservation Service of Baird, flew to Temple for a review of plans for the Recreation Area to be completed in the near future.

City Sales Tax Goes Into Effect July 1

BAIRD — The local Sales and Use Tax for Baird will become effective July 1, 1970.

What's right about America?



Today, the surest means of a book becoming a best seller is for the author to highlight and denounce bitterly the faults of this country. The same can be said of television and the movies, which prefer in these modern days to depict the seamier side of life in America.

But there's hope. As I have moved across this state, I have sensed that our people are growing weary of gloom. It's becoming easier to strike up a conversation about what's right about America.

I always suggest that there are a lot more level heads in this country than we are sometimes led to believe. There are a lot more decent, law-abiding citizens than there are criminals and cheats and sharks. There are a lot more young people in the "now" generation who want to improve America than the handful of radicals who want to burn it to ashes and start all over.

I can understand why the "majority" has broken its "silence." There's a growing impatience with agitation and controversy. But I feel we should continue to approach our nation's problems with a cool head and an open mind. We've listened to the voices of dissent. I think I know what they're asking of their government.

One thing they want is confidence. They want the assurance that their public officials have the courage to meet the issues of the 1970s with imagination and integrity, and not with some form of "old politics" that thrashes around with problems but never quite locates the workable solutions.

It was my desire to answer this urgent need that prompted me in January to seek the office of United States Senator.

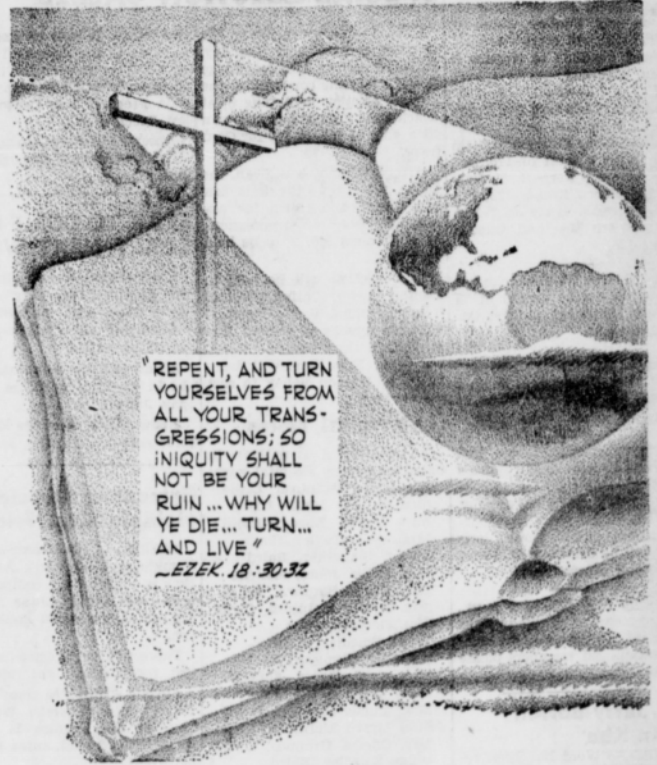

Proof Of Age A Must For Social Security

Concerned about proving your age when you file for social security benefits? James W. Smith, social security representative for Callahan County, says this is a problem for many people. "Of course, with a birth or baptismal certificate recorded at or within 5 years of your birth, you have no problems as that's all you'll need," he added.

In the absence of a birth or baptismal certificate, other evidence must be used. Some good documents are an early school record, family Bible, or school

or Federal census record.

Smith said if you do not have any of these documents, you can submit a combination of several proofs. These include your delayed birth certificate, one or more insurance policies, a child's birth certificate which shows your age at the time of the child's birth, driver's license, military record, or voting registration or an old poll tax receipt.

According to Smith, you should obtain your proofs in advance of retirement to avoid a delay in your first social security check.

The Social Security Administration recognizes the occasional difficulty in obtaining adequate proof of age, and will help you as necessary.

Check the social security travel schedule at the post office and see Smith if you need such help.
