THIS WEEK, the national media has been making much ado about the 100th anniversary of the Brooklyn Bridge, which was completed 100 years ago this week.

The television commentators have been calling the bridge "The Engineering Feat of all time," and the "Bridge that made New York."

These statements are no doubt true, but so far, we have not heard them mention some of the little-known facts pertaining to the bridge, that make the story even more interesting.

Nelson Lewis, who is quite a historian, especially on matters of the southwest, called to our attention the fact that the designer of the famous Brooklyn Bridge was a German-American, John A. Roebling.

Roebling had spent years attempting to convince financiers in New York that his idea for a long-span suspension bridge was feasible.

So, the brilliant engineer, like so many geniuses who are ahead of their time, peddled his idea elsewhere, and who should take him up on his idea but the people of Waco, Texas.

Roebling completed a bridge over the Brazos River at Waco 'way back in 1870. This was 13 years ahead of the Brooklyn Bridge, but Waco's bridge was used as a model for the New York bridge that was to become world-famous.

Lewis says he visited Waco's prototype of the Brooklyn Bridge a few years ago. The bridge is no longer open to automobiles, but used by pedestrians at South First and Austin Avenue.

"It was an awesome experience. Not everyone is privileged to tread upon hundred-year-old dreams," Lewis says.

When it was completed in 1870, the bridge across the Brazos River was the longest suspension bridge in the world, and it became a vital avenue for Western expansion.

Waco's bridge is a beautiful old masterpiece, and if you are like this writer, and don't have a trip planned to New York, the next time you're in the Waco area, you might look up Roebling's first major accomplishment.

Even 113 years ago, Texans took pride in being first!

The Brooklyn Bridge was completed on May 24, 1883, joining two of New York's five boroughs.

The bridge's designer, Roebling, died during the construction stage of the bridge. His son, Washington Roebling, finished the job although confined to a wheel chair.

When you consider that the construction of these bridges was accomplished in a day and time when there not only was no electricity, but no power equipment, cranes to lift heavy steel beams, etc., it is even more of a marvel.

The century-old bridges were also constructed at a time when America moved by horses, or horse-drawn carriages, and not in heavy automobiles or multi-ton trucks. The fact that Roebling's suspension bridges have been able to accommodate these modern-day ingredients of heavy traffic is even more astounding.

Happy birthday, Brooklyn Bridge! Too bad the old-time Yankees didn't have the faith of the Texans. They could have had the world's first suspension bridge.

Area Gets Showers

The Friona area received its best rainfall of the year Wednesday and Thursday evenings, with right at a half-inch of moisture falling each night.

The official measurement in Friona was .44 inch on Wednesday evening, and .49 inch the next night. Both rains fell very slowly, with virtually every drop of moisture soaking in.

The area has been in desperate need of moisture, as it had received very little since the big snows of last winter. Many farmers had planted row crops which were depending upon rainfall to get them up and growing.

This week's showers might help fill the bill, and in addition, the weatherman is predicting more rainfall for the weekend.

The Star had heard no reports of any hail falling with the rain showers.

New Storm Warning System Is Proposed

"By the time a tornado warning is put on television at Amarillo, the city of Friona could be blown away."

The above statement sometimes is all too true, and as a result of the problem of being situated so far from a regional television warning system, the local fire department, in cooperation with Friona Cablevision, is offering a new emergency warning system to cable television subscribers.

The warning, which would be completely local in nature, would over-ride whatever program a viewer might be watching on the cable system (even HBO), and broadcast

details relating to a weather or other emergency.

Local cable customers are being asked to make a one-time donation of \$5 to purchase the needed equipment to make the emergency warning system a reality.

Donations should be mailed to the Friona Fire Department, Box 501, Friona, or left at Friona State Bank.

The warnings, when the system is installed, will be coordinated with the local civil defense system.

In case a funnel cloud were to be spotted that appeared to be a threat to the city, after the system is installed, all cable TV subscribers can be notified within seconds.

Letters are being mailed this week to all local cable TV subscribers explaining the proposed emergency warning system.

"We feel that local cable customers surely won't mind paying this small one-time cost for a good warning system, which can be used from now on," said a spokesman for the fire department.

Memorial Day Weekend Offers Driving Hazards

Memorial Day weekend signals the start of the summer vacation season and increased dangers to motorists, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, urged drivers to exercise caution during the upcoming holiday weekend and throughout the summer.

"During the vacation season, more motorists will be exposed to highway driving hazards," Adams said. "Heeding the traffic laws, wearing seat belts, and staying alert for drunk drivers is the best defense for avoiding an accident."

The DPS director requested the assistance of Texas drivers in minimizing traffic deaths.

"Statewide traffic fatalities are now about 13 per cent below the number for the same period last year," Adams pointed out. "But we also have to remember that the potential for additional fatalities during any holiday weekend is great

and we must adjust our driving habits and attitudes accordingly."

A total of 58 traffic deaths resulted from accidents during the Memorial Day weekend in 1982.

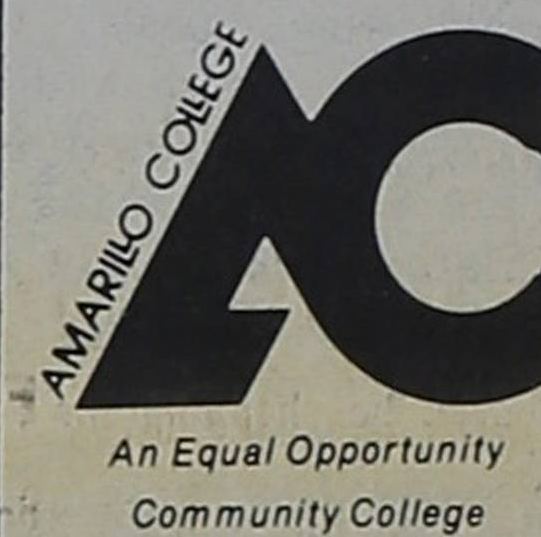

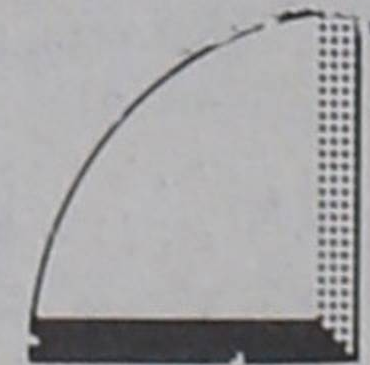

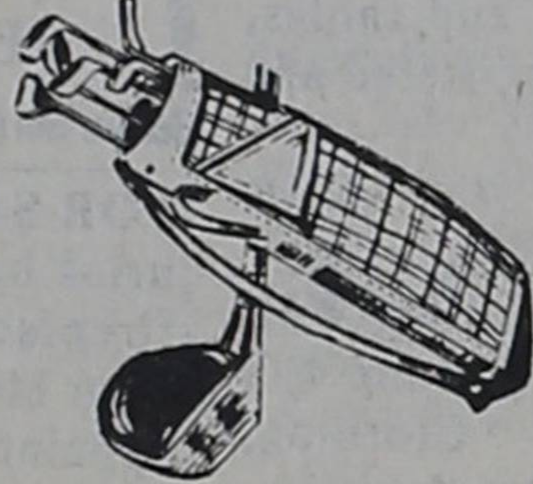

Regarding the letter to the editor from the mayor and city council in last week's Friona Star:

You are seeking public support for your approval of the actions of city manager Jerry Lewis. Because you have publicly implied that the city manager was responsible for the new library building, we feel impelled to publicly clarify a portion of your statement.

While it was indeed within the realm of responsibility of the city to provide this much improved service for its citizens, the new Friona Public Library building was an outright gift to the city through the efforts of the Friends of the Library, the Library Board and the people of Friona (building cost \$75,000, building site donated by Friona State Bank).

Aside from a \$10,000 donation from city funds committed prior to Jerry Lewis's employment, the city council cannot in good conscience claim the new library building as an accomplishment of the present city manager.

I contacted Orma Flippin and Hazel Weir and found that Viola Talbot was the sister of Everett Talbot, who lived west of Friona. His daughter, Edd Url (who married Dan Luttrell) was my school mate. I feel sure that she brought the poem to the Arrow staff.

The poem pretty well sums up my feelings for Friona. Although I don't always agree with the way the city is run, it is my town, and I can criticize it—but you newcomers watch out—I'll fight for "my town." Oh yes newcomers are those who have only been here forty years (or less).

Edelman's project, "Design Characteristics Influencing Windmill Power Output," determines blade compliment with corresponding angle to produce the maximum power output. Richard Tullis of Friona High School is Edelman's advisor.

Over 450 winners of regional fairs across the United States and 20 foreign countries compete in the international science fair each year. This year there were 12 different categories available for students to enter. More than ten per cent of the total were related to some form of energy.

The International Science and Engineering Fair is administered by Science Service, a non-profit organization which tries to encourage young people to develop an interest in science. The Department of Energy participates in the special awards program of the fair for the best energy-related exhibits.

Oak Ridge Associated Universities coordinates judging for the Department of Energy. Special awards sponsored by the Department of Energy's Office of Energy Research are based on scientific excellence and educational value of the projects. Participants are also interviewed personally by each judge to assure relevant understanding of the science and technology involved in the project.

ORAU is a not-for-profit association of more than 50 colleges and universities. It is a contractor of the U.S. Department of Energy, conducting research and educational programs in the areas of energy, health, and the environment for the Department, other private and governmental organizations, and ORAU's member institutions.
