THE ELECTION OF 1984 has finally come and gone, and we realize that everyone by now is probably sick of hearing politics.

Besides the obvious reflection that Tuesday was not the best of days to have run on the Democratic ticket, we just have one other observation.

That is the fact that a number of the registered voters in Friona were confused about where they were supposed to vote.

Having published the maps showing the new voting precinct lines two or three times, we at the Star had come to the conclusion (erroneously) that everyone knew their new precinct number, so that the location of the polling places would be the main thing they needed to know.

Boy, were we wrong! (In the first place, we need to admit that Ye Editor, having voted so often at the Fire Station, was headed in that direction until corrected).

We wonder seriously if a large part of the reason that 292 fewer voters went out to the polls in Friona on Tuesday than they did four years earlier may have been due to the fact that they simply did not know where they were supposed to vote.

If this is the case, then the re-districting, which was supposed to make the county commissioner's boundaries more fair to Friona since the city's population had made Precinct one by far the most populous precinct in the county, has in some ways backfired.

One suggestion as to a solution has been advanced by former Democratic county chairman Hollis Horton.

Hollis suggests that the polling places in Friona be centered in one location: for example, the Community Center.

Then, the various precinct subdivisions could hold their elections in the various corners of the building.

At least, when the voter arrived, he would be at the right location, and would not have to worry about driving to another location, which prospect may have turned off some voters, particularly in the older age group.

This is something to think about, and hopefully make some definite plans, before another general election comes around.

WE HAVE HAD a request for the 1984 pheasant season dates, and a call out to the Rhea Community and the old hunter himself, Jack Patterson, reveals that the season will kick off on Saturday, December 8, and run through Sunday, December 23.

A new wrinkle for the 1984 season is a limit increase to three cocks per day, with six in possession after the first day.

"In most instances, we are hearing that the pheasant crop is short this year, so this is unfortunate that the limit was increased on a year when we expect to have fewer pheasants to begin with," Patterson says.

Local Voters Give Reagan 85 Per Cent Vote Margin

The voters in Friona and Parmer County gave President Ronald Reagan an even bigger margin than those of the rest of the state and nation, according to vote totals released Wednesday by County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

Parmer County gave President Reagan 2,524 votes, or 81.7 per cent, to only 567 votes, or 18.3 per cent for Walter Mondale.

Nationwide, the president won re-election with 59 per cent of the votes, to 31 per cent, a difference of 18 points. Parmer County's difference was 63.4 points.

The Rhea precinct gave the president the biggest majority, with 95 per cent of the votes, 58 to three.

But of the larger boxes, Friona's Precinct 2-1 (the largest voting

precinct in the county), gave Reagan-Bush 569 votes, or 85.5 per cent, to 96 for Mondale-Ferraro, or 14.5 per cent.

Phil Gramm was likewise given a big sendoff by county voters, who favored the senator-elect with 2340 votes, or 76.4 per cent, to 723 for Lloyd Doggett, or 23.6 per cent.

The county lined up for Democrat Don Richards in the Congressional race, but by the barest of margins. Richards, who has relatives in Parmer and Bailey counties, received 1,503 votes, or 50.3 per cent, to 1,485 for Republican Larry Combest, who won the race district-wide.

County voters made it a virtual Republican sweep, giving John Thomas Henderson 1503 votes for the Railroad Commission, to 1288

for incumbent Mack Wallace. They favored John L. Bates for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, with 1462 votes, to 1372 for Democrat John Hill.

In the race for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1, voters gave Republican Virgil Mulanax 1388 votes, to 1264 for Sam Houston Clinton.

On the eight proposed Constitutional amendments, county voters favored four of the proposals, but were against the other four.

They favored number one, giving state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks, 1922-720.

Voters approved increasing the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund, 1856-829.

They went against authorizing assistance to surviving dependent parents, brothers and sisters of certain public officials, 1475-1154, but okayed allowing the counties of Bexar and Collin to abolish the office of county treasurer, 1157-906.

Voters narrowly turned down authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor, 1280 votes to 1233.

They were against the amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies, by 1825-646.

The voters okayed giving the Commission on Judicial Conduct the authority to discipline certain judges, by 1604-848.

Voters were against providing a "per diem" for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed as a deduction for business expenses (which is \$75 per day), by a whopping 1965 votes to 517.

Husband-Wife Duo Takes Win

In a switch-around from the first week of the contest, Suzanne and Rick Tullis claimed the top two spots in the Friona Star football contest's ninth week.

Mrs Tullis captured the weekly first prize, with a score of 20. She was the only contestant to pick 20 games right for the week. She was awarded the weekly cash prize of \$10 for first place.

Mrs. Tullis' four misses were Canyon-Dumas, Dallas-Giants, Philadelphia-Detroit (a tie game), and St. Louis-L.A. Rams.

In addition to the tie, Tullis missed Canyon-Dumas, Boston College-Penn State, Raiders-Chicago and St. Louis-Rams.

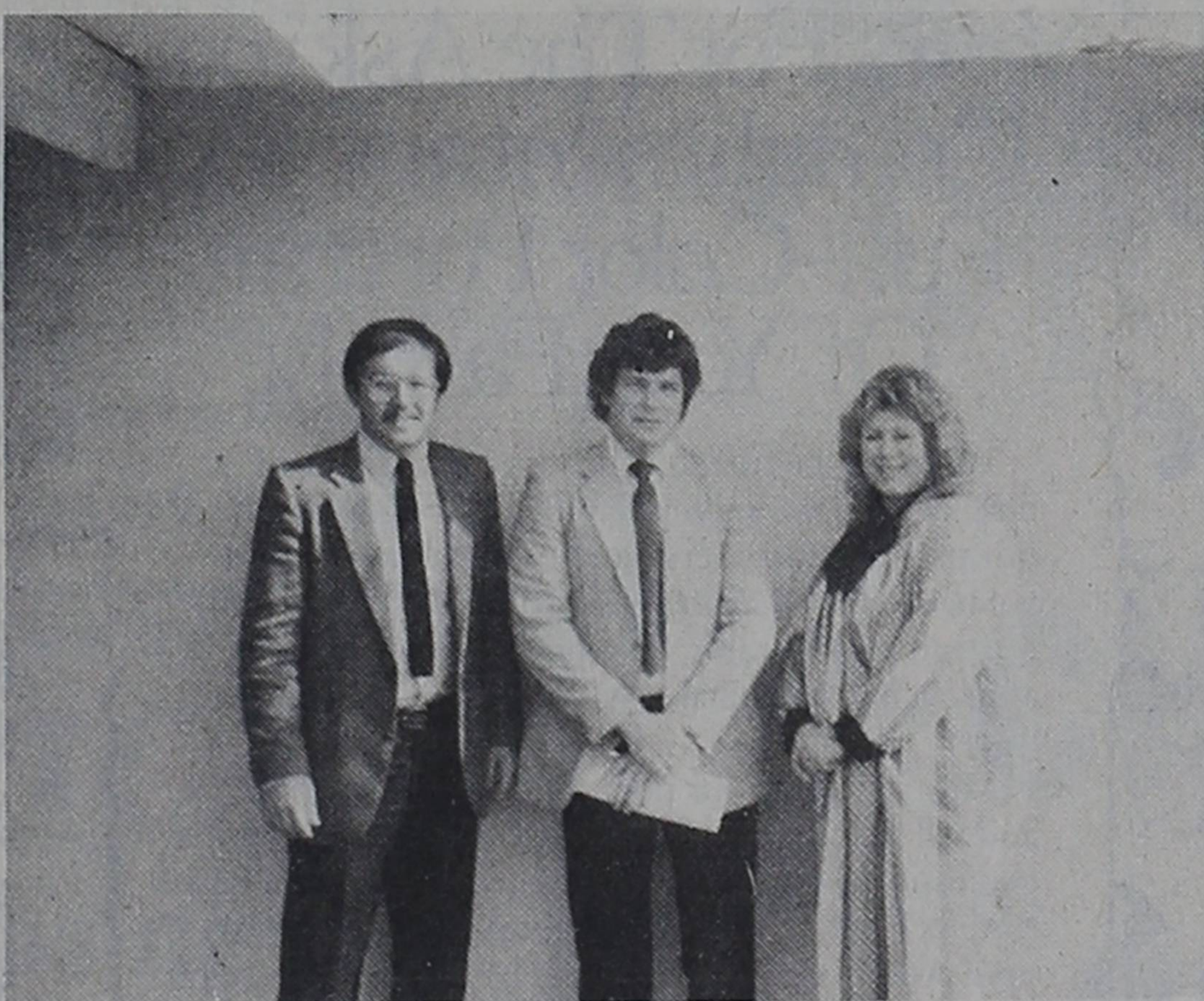
Ellis missed Canyon-Dumas, BC-Penn State, Air Force-Army, Dallas-Giants, and Cardinals-Rams. Mrs. Cain missed Dalhart-Childress, BC-Penn State, Michigan-Purdue, Raiders-Bears and Dallas-Giants.

In the race for grand prize, Kent Patterson pulled into a one-point lead with a score of 151. Mike Field of Dalhart, and Friona head coach Tommy Moss are tied for second place with scores of 150, and Bruce Patterson is in third place with a score of 149.

Next come R.L. Blakely and Rick Tullis at 147; Suzanne Tullis at 146; Danny Murphree, Hank Outland and Ricky White at 145.

Contestants are reminded that the Star will pay a \$10 special prize for the entrant who can correctly pick a tie game, with the stipulation that they may list only two games on the contest entry blank in the "tie" category.

Those in the running for the contest lead are also warned that the odds against picking a tie are considerable.



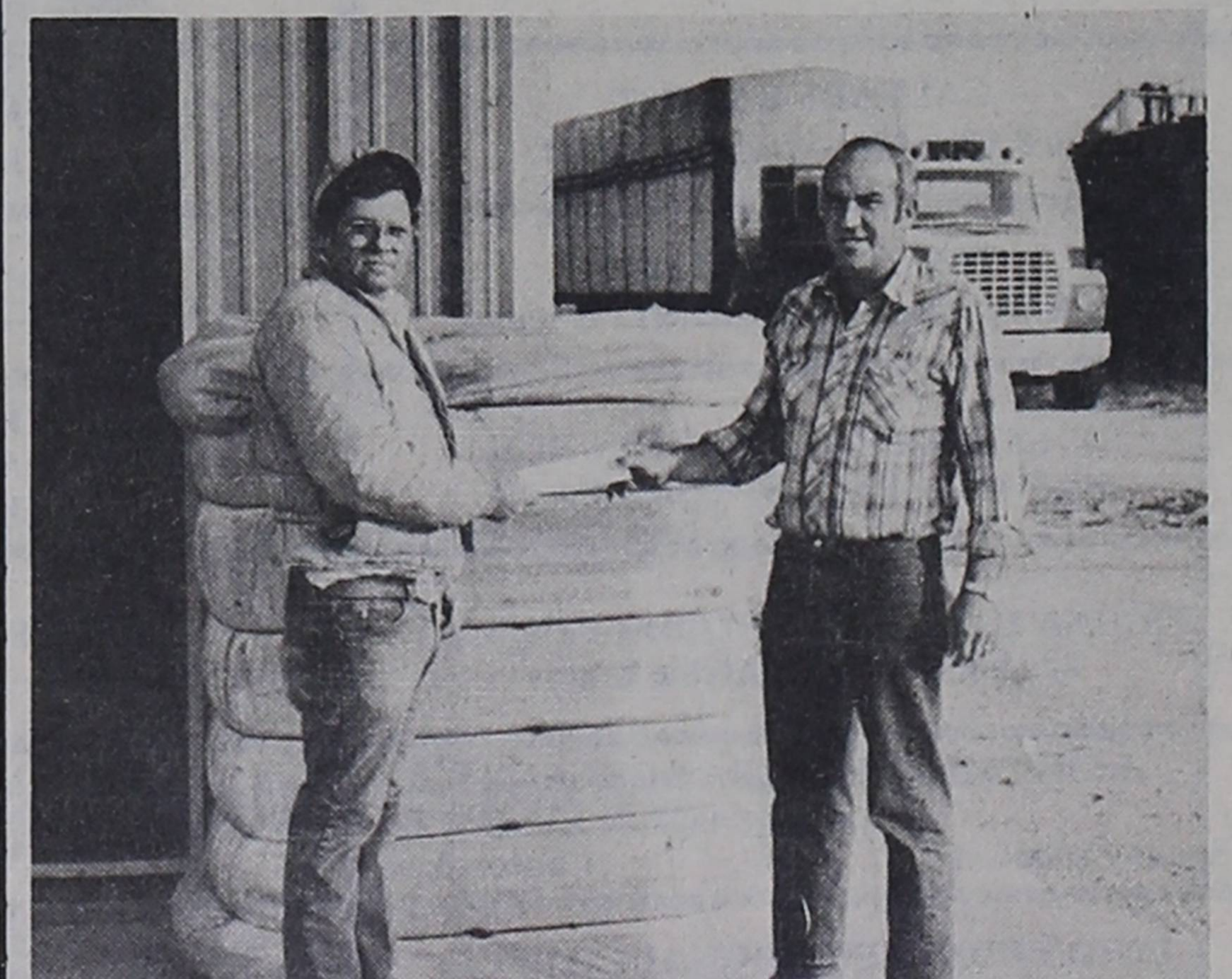

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1929

On Friday and Saturday of last week this vicinity was visited with one of the finest snows we have ever had, owing to the fact that it did not drift badly and contained an abundance of moisture. The temperature did not drop much below freezing.

The new laundry equipment which was purchased by Dr. McElroy for his laundry in the north part of town arrived last Saturday, and will be installed as rapidly as possible.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 16, 1934

The high school auditorium was filled to capacity last Sunday night for the special Armistice Day program. Mayor F.W. Reeve was master of ceremonies, and gave the opening address.

The schools, churches, women's clubs, city and Chamber of Commerce supported the local American Legion in a patriotic observance of the day.

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 10, 1939

A representative of the Southwestern Associated Telephone Company, was in Friona on Monday afternoon interviewing the executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce, relative to installing the dial system of telephones in Friona. It seems an unusual fact that the new system will be installed just as soon as the necessary work can be done by the company, which is estimated to take about six months.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 11, 1949

Mrs. Lindley Shields was found dead near her home four miles

north of Black last Thursday, after apparently suffering a heart attack. She apparently became ill while feeding her child, and was found about 300 yards from her home, with her year-old daughter asleep in her arms.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 12, 1954

Concentrated drive to secure all needed funds to start construction of a new building for Parmer County Community Hospital will be launched this Friday night at a county workers dinner in the Friona school cafeteria.

Manager Jimmie Baxter stated today that of \$50,000 for commencement of construction, \$25,500 had been given in cash, at this time, with \$10,000 in pledges on the books.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 12, 1959

Friona's annual Community Chest drive will get underway Tuesday in an effort to raise a budget calling for some \$5565, to be used by charity and other community betterment used during the coming year.

Steve Bavousett and J.C. Claborn will serve as co-chairmen of the drive, which kicks off with a breakfast at the Friona Methodist Church.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 12, 1964

The Friona Chieftains go to Floydada on Friday seeking a win that would give them their first district championship since 1957, and send them into the Class AA playoffs for the first time. The meeting will be the first in history between the two schools in football.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 13, 1968

Diana Clark, ten-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Clark, was back in school this week after sustaining bad cuts and bruises in an accident involving a horse last Saturday afternoon. Diana sustained a laceration on her forehead and nose which required 36 stitches to close. She was taken to the Hi-Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo for the surgery.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 10, 1974

In what was considered a good turnout due to the lack of contested races, Friona and Parmer County voters went to the polls in ideal weather Tuesday to elect leaders for the next four years. The local voters went to the polls to give Friona's Paul Fortenberry a big sendoff by electing him as the next county judge. Fortenberry's name was marked by 730 of the 780 who voted in the Friona precinct.

Friona will have a local savings and loan office around January 1, 1975, it was announced this week. The Friona branch office of Tri-County Savings & Loan Association received its approval some months ago by the Savings & Loan Commissioner of Texas.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 4, 1979

Benny Pryor, vocational agriculture instructor and FFA advisor at Friona High School, has been nominated to receive the FFA's Honorary American Farmer Degree.

Workmen unloaded the large receiving signal belonging to Friona Cablevision, at the site north of Friona. The receiver will be utilized to pull in additional channels, including a Home Box Office (HBO) channel for the local cable system.

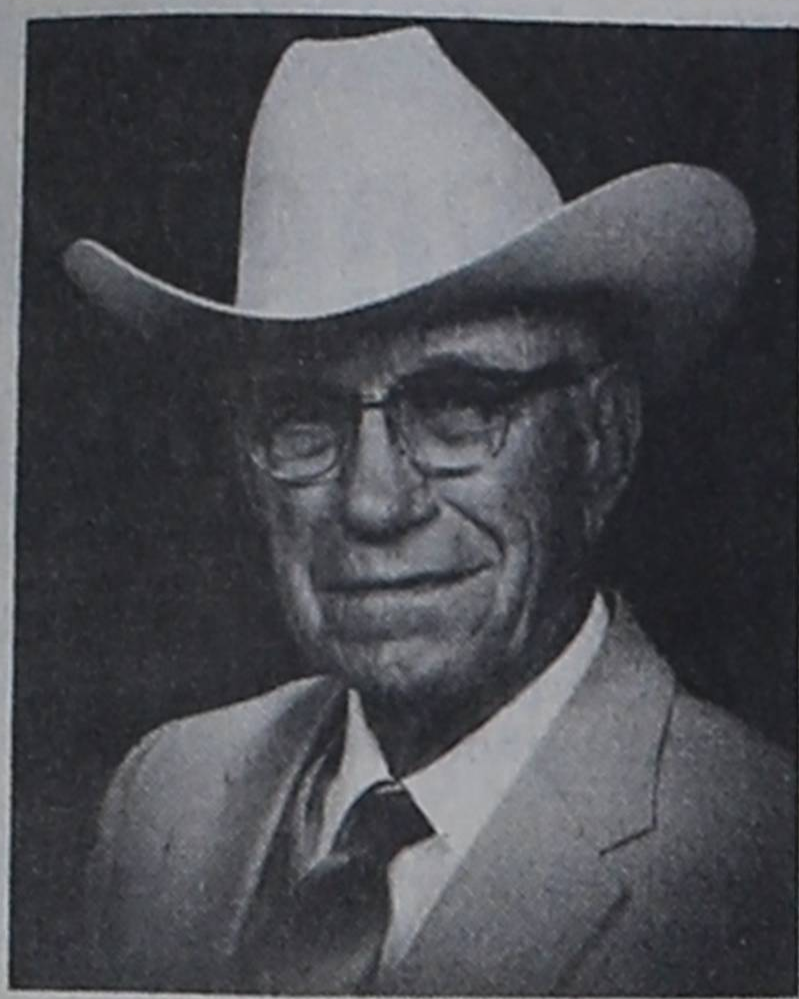
Floyd Rites Scheduled Saturday

Prairie Acres has enjoyed tremendous community involvement and support since its opening in 1976.

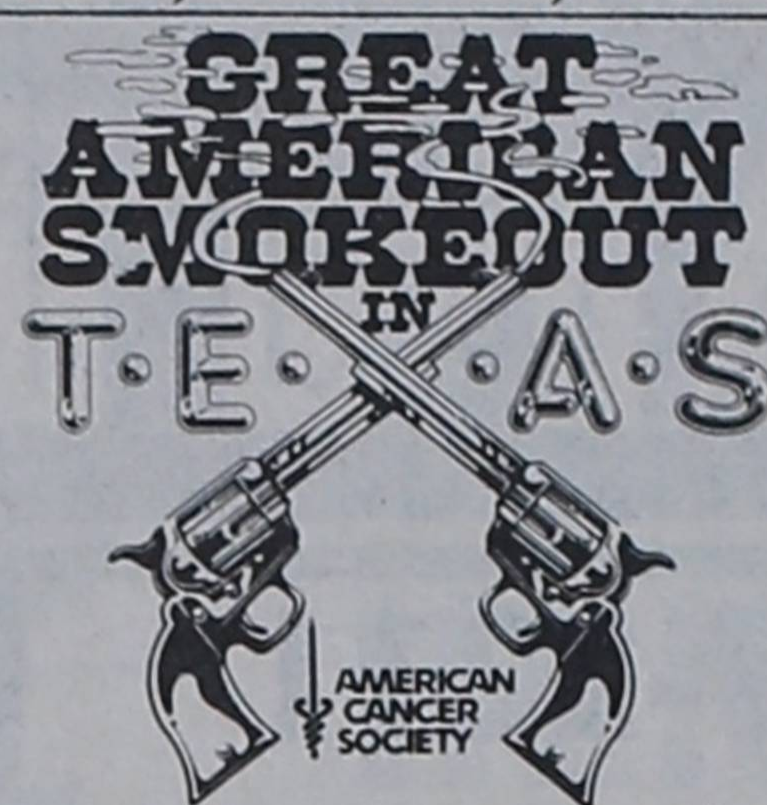





Fired-Up Hornets Control Action In 13-12 Victory

The Tulia Hornets unveiled a sharp passing attack, to go along with a slippery backfield combination of the Powell boys--Tony and Steven--and made off with a 13-12 win over the Chieftains in the District 2-AAA game at Chieftain Field last Friday night.

In the end, it was missed conversion points that cost Friona the win!

Friona had scored a come-from-behind win over Muleshoe with a two-point conversion, and duplicated the stunt a week later to tie the Morton Indians. But the third time was not charmed, as a conversion pass fell incomplete, and the team suffered its third straight loss, after a 5-0-1 start for the season.

"I thought we played our best game of the season. Tulia just had a super effort. They have some great backs, and we had trouble stopping them early in the game. We shut them down pretty good the second half," said Friona coach Tommy Moss.

In the final analysis, it was Friona's inability to move the ball during the first half, during which time they managed only four first downs, which cost the team, and forced the Chieftains into playing catch-up.

Tulia took the ball on its first possession, and acted like a team in contention. The Hornets marched 57 yards in only seven plays for the score. Quarterback Todd Lacy flipped a 17-yard pass to Tony Powell for the score, and the kick gave Tulia a 7-0 lead with 7:33 left in the opening quarter.

The Chieftains answered with a drive of their own. John Aguirre returned the kickoff to the 33-yard line. Rick Barnett and Brent Gatlin combined on a 31-yard pass play that moved the ball from the Friona 39 to the Tulia 30.

Barnett next hit Alfredo Mata over the middle for a 17-yard gain, and then threw a strike to Aguirre who dove into the end zone for the score.

The Chieftains got a good snap on the PAT try--something they haven't had in recent games, but Sam Montoya's kick sailed just wide, into the south breeze, and Tulia still led, 7-6.

The Hornets continued fired up. They put together a 61-yard drive, mixing their running and passing game to perfection. Friona appeared to have held Tulia, after a defensive play by Aguirre knocked down a third down pass near the goal-line.

But Tulia came back on a big fourth down play to execute a screen pass to Powell, who danced his way 17 yards into the end zone as Friona's defense had backed up anticipating a longer pass. The kick was wide, but Tulia had extended its lead to 13-6. The TD came on the second play of the second quarter.

Friona never could get another scoring drive going in the first half, although getting down to the Tulia 13 at one point. Barnett, who had connected on his first four passing attempts, had a pass picked off at the Tulia 15, and this turned out to be a critical play.

The next down would have been fourth, and Friona had the wind. Montoya should have had an excellent shot at a field goal from that distance, and you can see what a difference three points would have made for Friona before the game was over.

The second half was mainly a defensive struggle, as Friona was never able to put together back-to-back first downs until the fourth quarter.

The team finally fashioned a scoring drive, after a great Tulia punt into the wind had backed the Chieftains up to their own ten-yard line.

On a big third down from their own 17, Mata threw the option pass, finding Leroy Mercado wide open at midfield. Mercado gathered in the pass, for a 34-yard gain to the Tulia 49.

The next play was not in the Chieftain's playbook. Aguirre

took the ball across the middle, and after about a five-yard gain, the ball popped loose, rolling forward for about ten yards. Rodney Allen recovered, for a total gain on the play of 14 yards.

Barnett hit Ben Neelley on a sideline pass, with Neelley making a great catch under coverage, as Friona moved the ball to the Tulia 20.

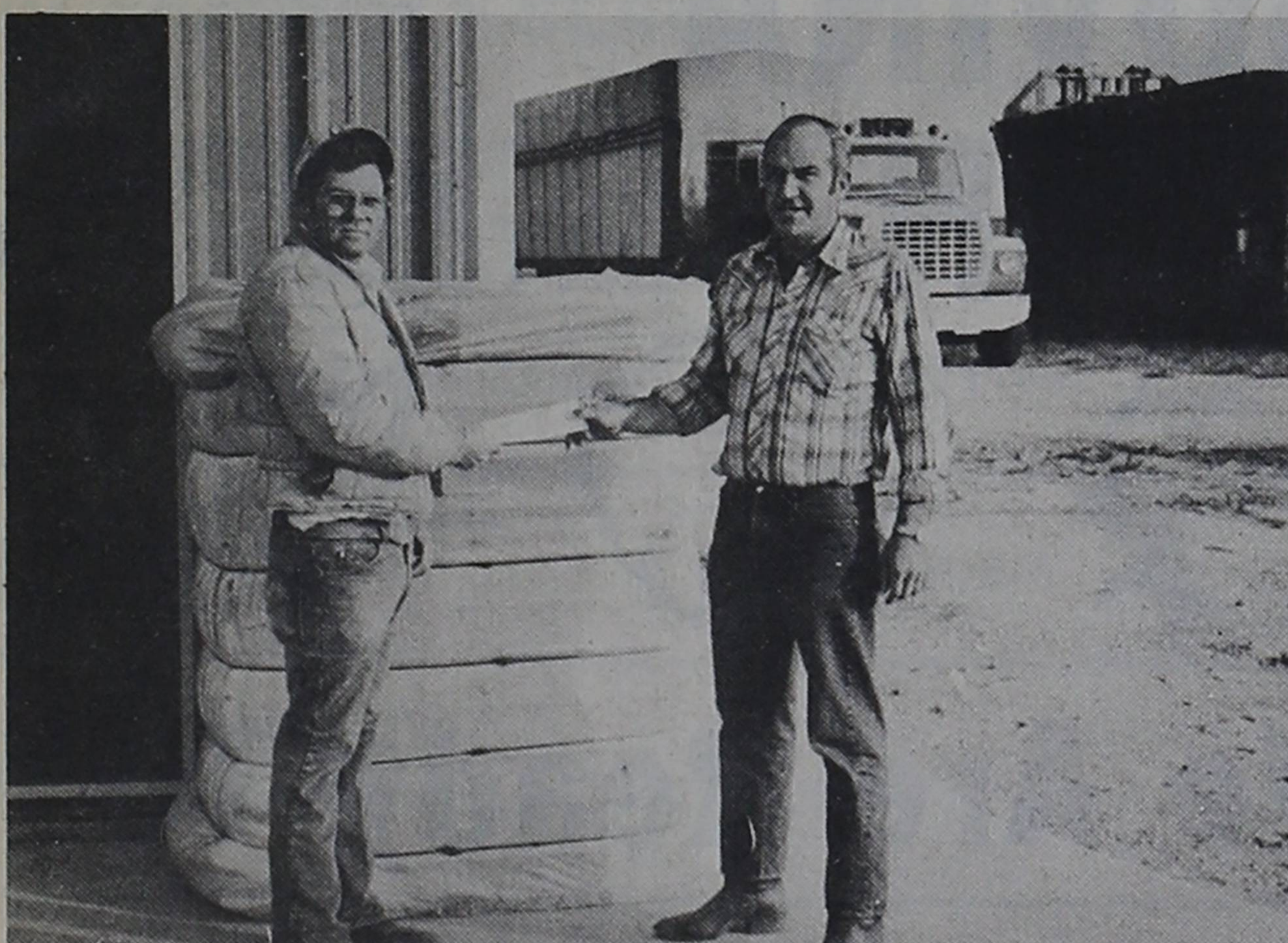

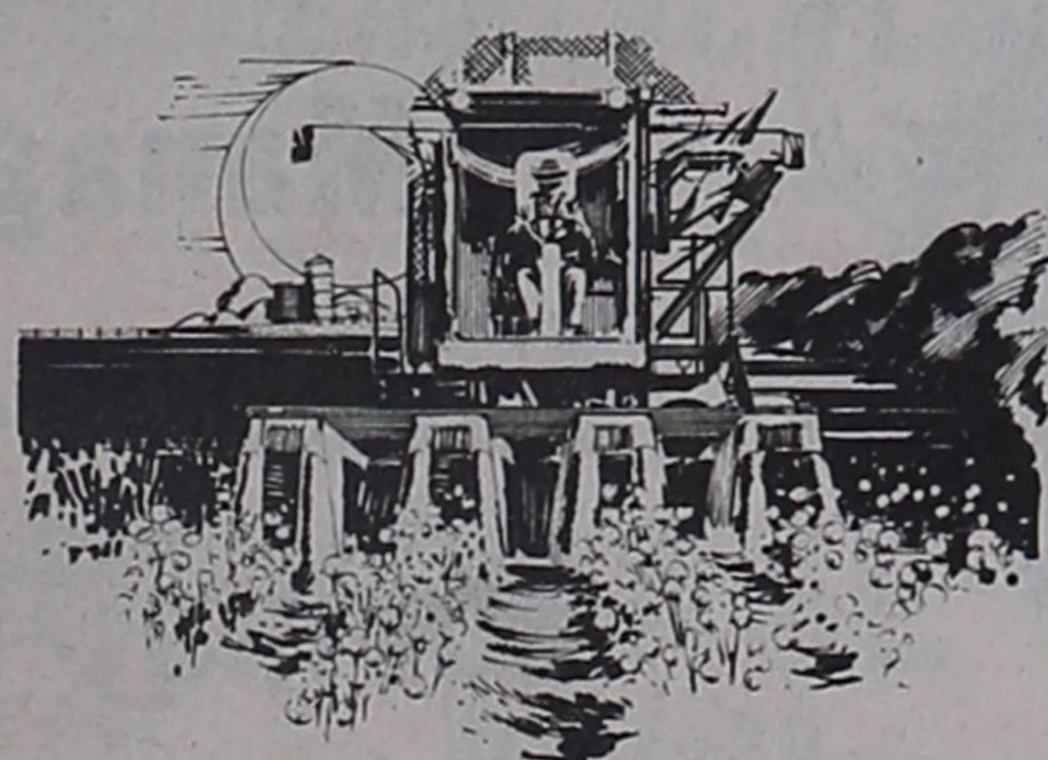

**Gas Rate
Changes
In Areas**

The Railroad Commission has allowed new gas rates for customers of Energas Company in the unincorporated areas surrounding 46 Texas cities.

The cities, which are part of the company's West Texas system, include Amherst, Anton, Bovina, Brownfield, Canyon, Crosbyton, Dimmitt, Earth, Edmonson, Floydada, Friona, Hale Center, Happy, Hart, Hereford, Idalou, Kress, Lamesa, Levelland, Littlefield and Lockney.

Also, Lorenzo, Meadow, Nazareth, New Home, O'Donnell, Olton, Pampa, Panhandle, Petersburg, Quitman, Ralls, Ransom Canyon, Ropesville, Seagraves, Seminole, Silverton, Slaton, Springlake, Stanton, Sudan, Tahoka, Tulia, Turkey, Wellman and Wilson.

The new rates are identical to those approved by the respective nearby city governments for customers inside their corporate limits.

With the change, an average monthly residential bill for five Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas will increase by \$1.06 in each of the environs areas.

The changes will be effective after November 1.

The Railroad Commission has the authority to approve rates for gas service in unincorporated areas of Texas. Proposed gas rates for these areas are examined in light of the company's operating efficiency and the rates that have been approved by the nearby city governments.

Freshmen Roar To Win Over Dimmitt

Friona's freshman footballers have split their past two games.

The team scored a 47-6 win over Dimmitt, but then fell to Tulia, 36-8 last Thursday.

Against Dimmitt, Glen Trimmell ran the ball 11 times for 77 yards, including a five-yard touchdown run and a two-point conversion.

Lance Gatlin carried nine times for 71 yards, and scored 27 points. Gatlin scored touchdowns on runs of six, 12, 31 and 16 yards. He also ran a two-point conversion and kicked an extra point.

Daniel Echols gained 44 yards on three tries, including one run of 22 yards for a touchdown. Terry Widner added 21 yards on two tries, one of which was a 13-yard TD.

Echols completed three of three passes, for 53 yards.

"The entire offensive line played great. They are Steven Thornton, Steven Moore, Daniel Padilla, Albert Trevino, John Cass, Eddie Raymond and Rusty Rainey," said Coach Steve Williams. He credited Louis (Animal) Amador for an outstanding defensive game.

Against Tulia, the team fell behind 20-8, then saw Tulia score a pair of TDs in the final couple of minutes, one on a blocked punt, to break the game open.

Gatlin gained 73 yards and scored the team's only touchdown on a 12-yard run. Trimmell gained 63 yards, and had a two-point conversion run. Echols added 37 yards on four tries. Echols completed six of 18 passes for 42 yards.

Friona was 5-2-1 going into their season finale.




