TERRY COUNTY FAIR THE GREATEST EVER HELD

The farming people of Terry county are just about the busiest people you ever saw, but they love their annual fair, and they had already held nine very success ones and of course could not afford for any to be as good—yea, nearly so good as the 10th annual fair. And that reminds us. Lubbock was claiming the oldest fair on the south plains, but they lack four years being as old as the Terry county fair. The first fair in Terry county, was held at Gomez in October, 1909, and with but one exception, 1918, the year that we were in the throes of the World War when even the great Dallas Fair did not open its gates, we had no fair, and therefore we can easily claim the oldest county fair in this section.

There were well upwards of 1000 people other than town folks here, many of them from other counties and States, and all that we heard express themselves, said they never saw a better exhibit for the size of the county and her population in their lives. In fact the people of this county have had enough fairs now that they are well coached in the art of preparing displays, and especially this year, they had the "displays" to display, and they were of course proud to exhibit.

In the agricultural section, and the garden section—the orchard section being a failure this year—there was some real class. Corn that would be a credit to the Mississippi Valley, or the \$350 corn lands of Illinois, and it represented all lines; white and yellow dent, bloody butcher, strawberry and June. The maize showing was well up to the average, and the kaffir showing was well above the average. In fact we believe the hard land counties will beat Terry on the maize crop except dry years, but she will show kaffir and corn with the best of them. Needless to say, the pumpkin, kershaw and mellow and all varieties of fruits that grow on vines were exceptionally good, and attracted considerable attention. Speaking of maize, however, there was one head there that would not go in a water bucket, and had people guessing all day. We finally learned that it was made up of many heads by the genius hand of Mrs. Verner, of the Union community.

The fancy work department conducted by the ladies was up to the minute in every detail, and we believe we are safe in saying that the most optimistic of the ladies were surprised at the showing. Talking about glad rags, but they were there in abundance, but of course the ladies did not call them glad rags, and the editor is too dense to call them by their right names. Anyway the gentle sex was crowded around this department all day admiring the varied and pretty showings.

The poultry department came in for a full share of praise, for the "fine haired" chickens were there in abundance. In fact we heard many say that our poultry show was better than at Lubbock, and might near any kind of chicken you might wish was on hand, besides a few turkeys and ducks. The latter—Indian Runners—were exhibited by Mrs. Will Moore of Gomez, and she need not tell us they are good layers for there were only two ducks in the coop and we noticed two eggs. No three hens on display equaled them that day. There was a great deal of trades and speaking for spring eggs among the poultry fanciers—and this is one great feature of a county fair—the people come together and each finds what the other has that he might need without the necessity of having to order the very same thing clean across the State and then risk it dying before

it is climated.

There were lots of fine horses and mules on display as well as jersey cows, calves, etc., but the swine department was slim. This department attracted considerable comment and attention, and is the only department that we are able to give the results in, as all the other judges seem to have carried their papers home and burned or buried them from the result of our endeavor in trying to locate them. C. OF C. MEETING

The local Chamber of Commerce held an interesting meeting at the Courthouse Tuesday night, at which time, laws and by-laws governing the body was adopted. The laws governing the city of Dallas were adopted with only a few minor changes to meet the requirements of a town the size of Brownfield.

Road building came in for the larger part of the discussion, and a competent committee was appointed to work in conjunction with the commissioners to this end.

The change in the schedule of the south bound train on this line was up for discussion, and it was learned that our neighbors to the west, and especially Tatum, N. M., are opposed to the change, and it was decided to drop the matter of the change until it could be conclusively proven that the change would help them as well as us, at which time a committee will visit them, and thoroughly thresh the matter out. Mr. Charley Collum, a prominent citizen of Tatum was present at the meeting, and gave their reasons for asking us to defer the matter.

After the adoption of the constitution and by-laws it was found that the Chamber would have to have an extra director and a first and second vice-president. W. A. Bell was elected 1st vice-president and A. J. Stricklin 2nd vice-president, and R. Barrier the other director, making six in all.

Other business not complete was taken up and will be reported latter. The membership campaign is going along fine, and one hundred members are sought. The next regular meeting will be on the 2nd Tuesday night in Nov., and it is hoped that a house full will be on hand.

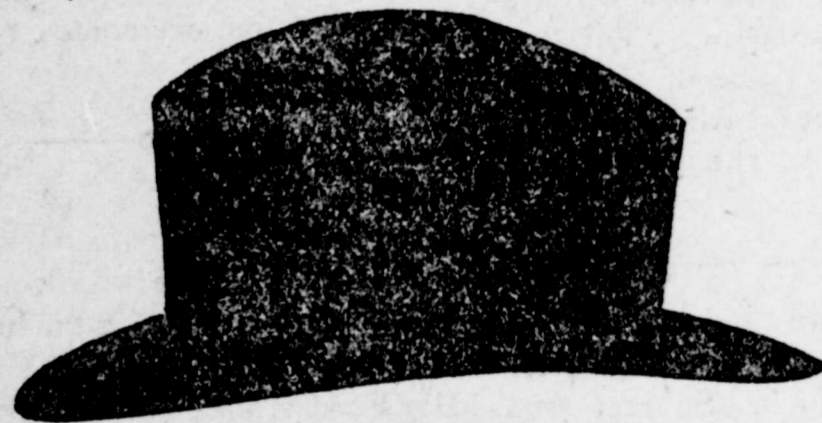

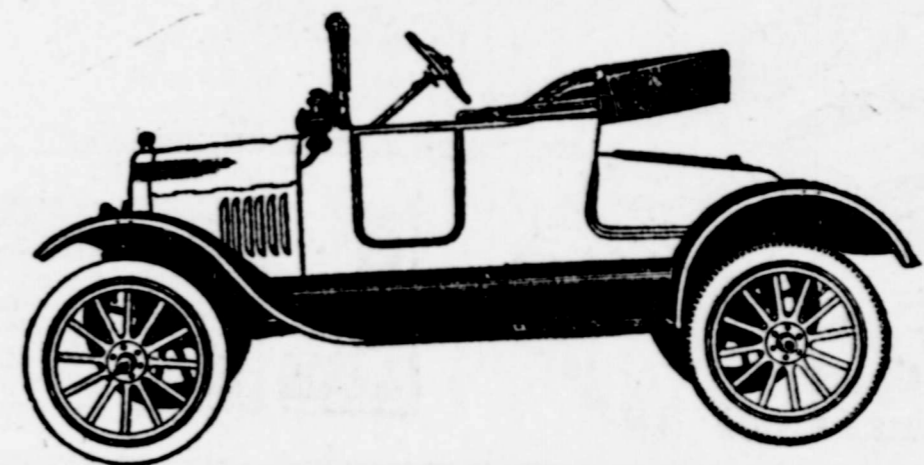

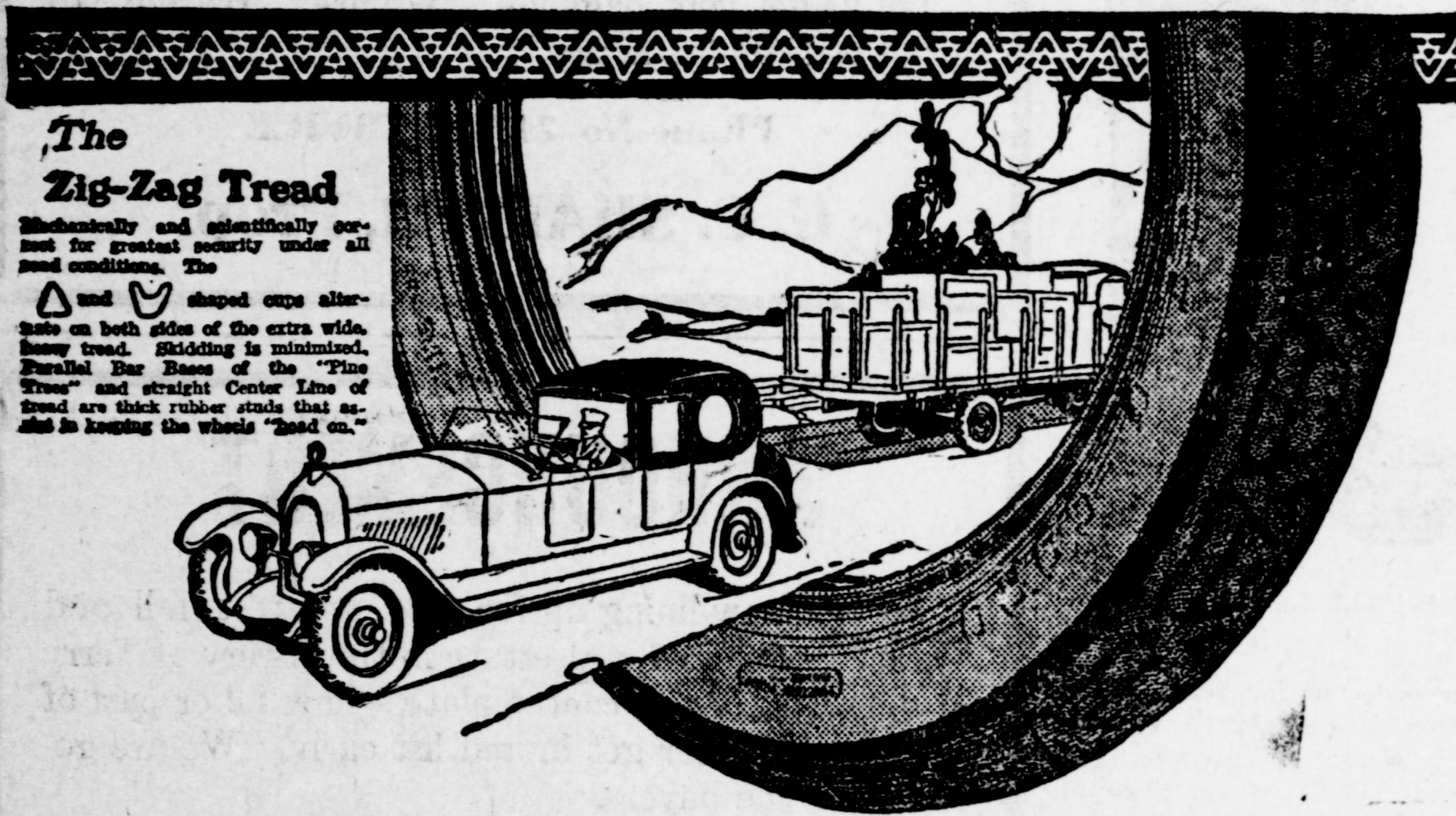

KING COTTON PROVING CURSE OF SOUTH

Ever since we can remember, and that has been a duration of about forty years, just at cotton picking time, with only a few exceptions, the price of cotton has always taken a tumble, and just at cotton planting time, almost invariably, the price is up.

We were raised in a cotton patch in Texas, working about nine months in twelve, planting, cultivating, picking, denied the advantage of an education, did not know what the luxuries of life were, lived in a shotgun shack, dined on black coffee, cornpone bacon and buttermilk whey, and we grew to manhood a durned ignoramus. Yes, the last crop of cotton we raised, and we were 25 years old then, we hauled it to town and sold it for \$20 a bale—and stayed in the wagon yard and slept on hay. Of all the curses ever saddled on the south, we place King Cotton at the head of the list. It has made paupers, filled more jails, poor houses and asylums, sent more Southern girls to houses of prostitution, cursed more homes, sent more of our Southern boys to city slums and down to hell than all

other agencies combined. It has broken more Southern merchants and bankers, made more crooked demagogues, produced more bone-headed legislators and prostituted state governments, and gave more damfool laws—Socialism, discontent and poverty.

Folks, look over this Southland, the richest spot on earth. It has more coal and iron and oil than has England, France, Germany and Belgium combined, and this fertile spot has raised enough cotton in the past fifty years to build a castle on every farm, red barns and colleges, and to checker the Southland with concrete highways, had the South gotten its share of the profits. Yes, common slaves for the moneyed class. Oh, yes, King Cotton has made England the financial mistress of

the world, twenty-eight million operatives work in her cotton mills; it has built castles, bought jewels for the dainty fingers of society butterflies, constructed ship lines, made more millionaires and created the greatest commerce on earth. Oh, yes, the cotton gamblers and speculators and mill owners live in castles in Scotland and on the Rhine, and along the New England coast, and live like kings, and the Southern farmers live in shacks and die in poverty, and, now, here it is, cotton picking time again, and in the last few days the cotton gamblers have pulled the wires and robbed the Southern people of over a billion dollars. How long, oh, Southern man, are you going to stand it. It ain't legislation nor statutory laws that we need, but its organization and common horse sense.—Moran News.

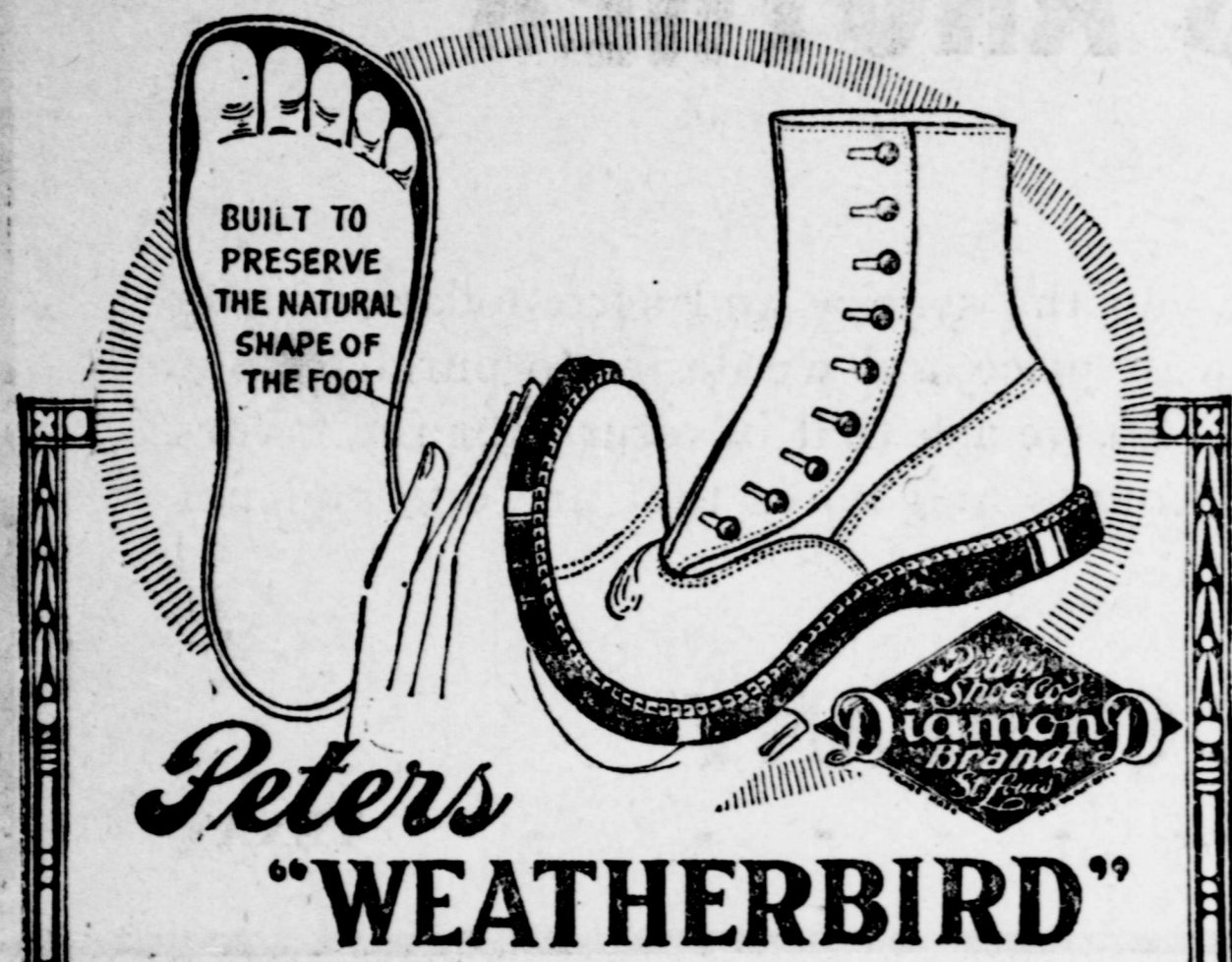
