HERONS CLING TO OLD HOMES

Their Dwellings in Rotterdam Invaded, They Take Refuge in City's Zoological Gardens.

The gray herons of Rotterdam, familiar to the city for centuries, have gradually, according to a correspondent of the Times of London, been pushed out of their old territories to make way for the growth of the port. The waters had been gathered into canals, the spaces began to dry, and little by little new streets built on piles invaded the heron ground. Herons, unlike storks, do not take to the dwellings of men, but they cling desperately to their nesting places, the elms and the willows of the boulevards. Finally ousted, they preserved but one refuge and that the Zoological gardens, which in 1857 was established on one of the reclaimed areas. Some of the herons were put in an aviary and some of the wild ones, watching the proceeding, set up house in the elms close by. And so it came about that Rotterdam Zoological gardens can proudly lay claim to a natural heronry in their gardens. But since 1857 Rotterdam has grown, and the parent birds have now four miles to fly to reach the waters for food for their nestlings. They cover the distance by day and night over the tramways, railways, and the noise and smoke of a city, the return to the nest marked by the usual outburst of welcoming cries from the voracious young.

BLIND WARNED OF DANGER

Mysterious Sense Tells the Sightless When There Are Obstacles Which They Must Avoid.

Blind men whom I met told me that as time passed I would sense obstructions as I approached them. They give back an echo too faint for common ears, but audible to the delicate hearing of the blind.

There is, too, a mysterious something which warns a blind man of his danger, but which he cannot understand. Some think it is an ever-so-delicate pressure of the air. There is really no knowing what it is, but if, for instance, you were to take a tea tray and hold it two feet from a blind man's face he would shrink away, knowing it was there, but not knowing how he knew.

I am too young in the business of blindness to avoid collisions with such objects, but I begin to feel the sense growing in me, and with time it will develop.

Also, the crossing of streets was a problem, because the blind walker just naturally bears away to the left. If he was in an open space he would go round in a circle as hunters do who are lost in a forest. But in the city he merely misses the opposite walk and wanders about in midstreet until some kind pedestrian sets him right.—Ainsley Burroughs in the Saturday Evening Post.

Laundry Marks in Europe.

Laundry marks vary greatly in Europe. Those used in England consist of certain small letters or figures stitched in red thread. In some parts of France linen is defaced by having the whole name and address of the laundry stamped upon it, and an additional geometrical design to indicate the owner. In Batavia every piece has a number stamped on it in large letters. In other parts of Germany a small cotton label is attached by means of a hot water-proof adhesive. In Bulgaria each laundry has a large number of stamps engraved with designs, and in Russia the laundries mark linen with threads worked in arrow shape. In some Russian towns the police periodically issue regulations for laundries, while in Odessa books of marks are furnished annually to the laundry proprietors, and these marks and no others may be used. By this system criminals and revolutionary agitators are often traced.

In China, the oldest, largest, and most densely populated nation in the world, there are no policemen except in the cities controlled by foreigners, and in the foreign compounds of the Chinese cities. W. A. WOOLEY DEAD

Brownfield lost another mighty fine citizen last week in the person of Deputy Sheriff W. A. Wooley, who we reported some time back as having accidentally shot himself in the leg some time ago. At the time of the accident there was some talk of amputation, but Mr. Wooley was so anxious to save his limb that the doctors agreed to do their best to do so, but the ankle bone was so shattered and the flesh so mangled that it was all in vain, and last Friday it was decided as a last resort to amputate, but he never came out from under the influence of anaesthetics, and he died about five minutes after being put back in bed at the Brownfield Sanitarium, between twelve and one o'clock, Friday.

Mr. Wooley has been a citizen of Brownfield about two or three years, and is held in high esteem by all and was considered one of our best and most progressive citizens. He has been a deputy sheriff under J. N. Lewis for the past two years and has made good as an officer. He was president of the W. A. Wooley Land Co., a member of the Baptist church and a Woodman.

He leaves a wife and five children, besides a father and brother from Paducah, who attended the funeral. Funeral services were conducted at the family residence by the Baptist pastor, Rev. J. E. Anderson, and the large concourse of people who followed the remains to the cemetery attested the esteem in which he was held.

ELECTION RESULTS

MAJOR GEORGE W. LITTLEFIELD DIED LAST WED.

Austin, Nov. 10th.—Funeral arrangements were being made today for Major George W. Littlefield, pioneer Texas resident, and retired banker of Austin, who died here shortly after midnight from a long illness. Until recently he was a member of the board of the Wrenn library of the University of Texas.

Major Littlefield was a member of Terry's Texas Rangers during the war between the states, and won his title in that conflict. He was 78 years of age, and was well known in West Texas and New Mexico, where his land holdings were extensive. The library of the University of Texas, is a gift of Major Littlefield.

He also endowed the institution with a chair in Southern history.

Major Littlefield was born in Panola county, Miss., June 2nd, 1842. He married Miss Alice F. Tiller, of Houston, on Jan. 14th, 1863.

After the war between the states he engaged in farming and cattle raising. His estate is valued at a million or more dollars.

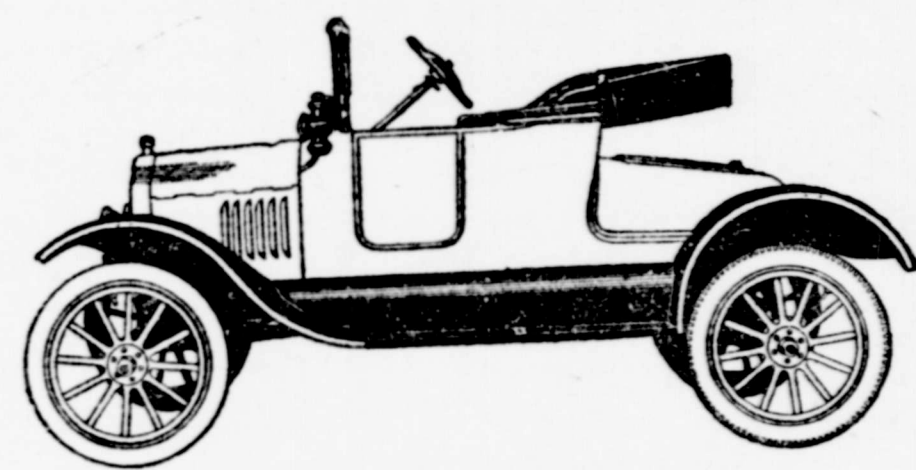

LOWERY BEMOANS LOSS OF OLD TENNESSEE

James H. Lowery, of the Honey Groves Signal thus expresses his sorrow over the loss of Tennessee from the "Solid South." The Solid South is no more. For more than half a century the old southern states stood as true to Democracy as the big dipper to the north star. For years no state warmed by the southern sun and kissed by the southern breezes gave ear to the vapors of the wicked Republicans, and evening would have blushed to her own star sooner than a member of this noble confederacy would have turned her back upon the Democratic party. But the Solid South is broken, and it was broken by the grand old Volunteer state, the state of Andrew Jackson, James K. Polk and David Crockett. It was in Tennessee that this writer first saw the light of day. All the tender memories of childhood's happy days cluster around the hills and hollows, the forrest and meadows of Old Tennessee, and the very name of the old commonwealth has been as music to our ears. But Tennessee has fallen from her high estate and not only has she departed from the house of her fathers, but she has shattered the Solid South. What must be her punishment? Surely the wrath of the Lord must fall heavily upon poor old Tennessee. Every chestnut crop will be wormy, the persimmons will lose their golden glow and honied taste, the crystal waters of the Watauga will turn to mud and slush, and the lustre of the muscadine and the grape will fade. For Tennessee there will be no southern zephyrs bearin the breath of the magnolia and the jasmine and for Tennessee the mocking bird and the cardinal will not sing. The glory of the South has departed from the old Volunteer state and never again will the rapture that wells up from the Democratic soul light the faces of her sons and daughters. Dear old state of legend, song and hallowed memories, though we were nurtured at your breast, we do say you ought to be ashamed of yourself.

The same dear old land has on more than one occasion been boastfully proclaimed as the nativity of the humble scribe of the Herald—but the news of a Republican victory in Tennessee stung us like an adder. But instead of seeking a quiet nook as did Editor Lowery to pour out a mournful prose, we wanted to take the old sister by the nap of the neck and almost choke the liver out of her. But after reading Lowery's sad plaint, we got sorry for the dear old mother of Texas, and just join him in wishing she hadn't "jined" the horrid Republicans.

Twenty-two crates or coops of turkeys were shipped to the market from here Tuesday, and three coops from Seagraves. These birds will be enjoyed by the hungry people of the

cities on Thanksgiving. Local buyers predict that not one-third of the turkey crop has not been delivered yet. Turkey growing has become a great industry on the South Plains, and will continue to grow, as there is always a market for these birds when the marketing season open. Owing to our dry climate and the remarkable number of insects, such as grasshoppers, turkeys need very little feed here, and that is mostly when they are real young, or at the finishing stage.

We note that a West Texas man, Dr. J. D. Sandifer, president of the Simmons College, of Abilene, has been elected president of the Texas Baptist convention, at its recent session at El Paso. A good as well as a strong man of that denomination has been signally honored.

We notice that the Republican pie hunters are going to try and have the Civil Service law repealed so they can get in the postoffices—qualification or no qualification. This was one of the Democratic reforms that gave the 2nd, 3rd and 4th class postoffices to those who could make the highest grade upon examination, regardless of his politics, and in fact took this branch of our government out of politics, and we imagine the Republicans are going to have one hard time getting it repealed.

CAVE-MEN IN MANY LANDS

Some of Their Dwellings Are Not Without a Fair Standard of Modern Comfort.

Troglodytes, cave men, living in their cave dwellings, are to be found in Mexico, the Canary Islands, in the Crimea, as well as in Spain, France, Italy and England, according to Harold J. Shepstone, in the Wide World Magazine. The Italian troglodyte dwellings at Bari are little more than houses which it has been found simpler to cut out of the soft rock rather than to go to the trouble of collecting building materials.

The chief headquarters of the Spanish troglodytes is the village of Burgasot, near Valencia. Their dwellings are practically entirely beneath the ground. Many of these dwellings have been recently excavated and offer a fair standard of comfort, often having a handsome palm tree in front of the entrance.

Throughout the whole of Crimea there are endless successions of cave dwellings, but the only ones still inhabited are in Inkermann, a name which itself means "cave castle." There are vast holes and cozy rooms, with ledges of stones which were doubtless bedsteads in prehistoric times. There is also a wonderful cave church, fitted with columns, a choir loft and elaborate sarcophagi. The altar and the cross are of so unique a form that antiquarians are unable to connect them with any known sect.

WEAR DEAD HUSBAND'S SKULL

Andaman Widows Carry Growsome Relic for Full Year, and Then Take Another Mate.

Widows in the Andaman Islands mourn on the death of their husbands by detaching the jaws of the dead, placing the heads on a platform in a tree for the birds to pick, then cleaning and ornamenting them with shells and wearing them on their backs for a year, even while working. At the end of the year they are free to marry again.

The widow has a warrior picked out for her by the chief, and he is usually accepted by her at sight. Then she goes to some lone spot, buries her beloved skull and returns to the camp to feast and dance. She soon, however, returns to the skull and spends a week in praying and fasting in its company, after which the skull is unearthed and brought to the village, where it is stuck on a pole and made to look on at a scene of feasting and dancing. When the marriage ceremony is over the skull is buried somewhere and forgotten.

The dead man is of no importance to the tribe. At the banquet the people gorge themselves and whirl and dance like mad things to the sound of the yemnga, a native instrument, until they drop one by one from sheer exhaustion.

Alexandria Modern City.

Alexandria, founded by the world conquerer, Alexander the Great, is an Egyptian city that is eager to lose its connection with the far away past and become completely modernized. Fate favors this ambition, for the wonders that Cleopatra knew have been eaten by fire or swept away by the sea. Alexandria is a city of trade and fashion, dominated by prosperous Europeans too deeply absorbed in the stock exchange to be even vaguely interested in the romantic side of their city.

Except for a few visitors who have read a little history and are wildly inquisitive regarding Cleopatra's palace and Pompey's pillar, the ruins of Alexandria rest peacefully, unphotographed and unchipped by souvenir hunters. One thing against the popularity of Alexandria's ruins is their scantiness. For the most part, they consist of a few carved stones and some "sites."
