FINAL AMENDMENT RETURNS

Austin, Dec. 14.—Official announcement by the State canvassing board today of the vote on the three constitutional amendments submitted at the election Nov. 2, show one defeated and two carried.

The vote was: Amendment proposition that cities of 5000 and less may increase their tax rate from one-fourth of one per cent to one and one-half cents for 173,920 against 146,031.

Amendment proposing limitation of taxation for school purposes: for 221,223; against, 126,282.

Amendment proposing the elimination of the fee system in paying the public officials, for 149,324 against, 164,603.

The returns from four counties—Chambers, Collingsworth, Kinney and Nolan—have not been received, and were not included in the tabulation.

The board is now engaged in counting the vote of the State officers.

WHAT DO RATS COST TEXAS?

The damage done by rats and their role as carriers of disease are well known. They are active agents in the distribution of bubonic plague.

The presence of the disease in cities of Mexico and its occurrence in Texas seaports last summer prompted the health authorities in these seaports to institute in August, measures for the destruction of rats. Occasional new cases of plague in these cities show the menace still to be present and in danger of being carried to inland towns. Rats perpetrate and transmit the disease trichinosis, so much dreaded by humans. They gnaw into boxes of dry goods and cut furs, silks, carpets and leather goods. They gnaw matches and cut the insulation from electric wires and so start many costly fires. They flood kitchens by gnawing through lead pipes, and cause disastrous floods by burrowing through embankments and levees. They consume grain, fruit and vegetables in the fields or orchards and continue their depredations in the shocks, cellar and bin. They cut containers of flour and breakfast foods and by pollution render unfit for food far more than they consume. The U. S. Public Health Service declares that in cities the rat population is at least equal to the human population and that in agricultural sections, it is 4 to 10 times as great. The annual upkeep per rat, estimated on pre-war values, was \$2.00, so that at present prices the annual cost of keeping a rat is at least \$4.00. Using these figures as a basis, R. E. Reppert, Entomologist Extension Service A. & M. College of Texas, estimates that this means that Texas rat population is at least 18,000,000 and that their annual cost is \$72,000,000. This is exclusive of fire loss and the other damage due to them.

With such facts staring us in the face, the Extension Service, A. & M. College, of Texas feels that strenuous efforts should be made to encourage rat extermination campaigns and is prepared to render some valuable cooperative effort and assistance.

SEVERITY IN THIS PENANCE
Hindu Pilgrims Make Long Journeys
With Most Extraordinary Method
of Locomotion.

An extraordinary Indian penitential
pilgrimage takes place every
year, invariably on a Tuesday, usually
in the first half of May. The penance
consists in the Hindu penitent's
measuring his length on the ground
from his home to the temple, often a
distance of many miles.

The penitent throws himself on the
ground at full length, and with a pot-
sherd or a stone, makes a mark within
reach of his fingers. Upon getting up
he sets his feet on the mark, repeats
the process, continuing to do this, with
alternate rising and prostration, to the
end of his journey.
The dress worn during the pilgrim-
age is exceedingly scanty, as the pil-
grimage takes place during the hot-
test season of the year. If the journey
is likely to take two or three days,
the penitent may halt at night for
food and rest, in which case he sets
up some mark to show where he left
the road, and resumes his journey
from that point on the morrow. Only
men are permitted to perform the
penance, but women and children are
allowed to accompany them on foot,
supplying them with food and fanning
them with punkahs made of palm
leaves.

Upon arriving at their goal the peni-
tents present their offerings in money
or kind to the attendant priest, who
utter a few words of benediction.
Every few years there are deaths from
exhaustion and exposure during the
pilgrimage, but the enthusiasts are
never deterred.—Detroit News.

GREATEST OF ALL VIRTUES
Gratitude Means Recognition of
Amount of Good Which Has Been
Bestowed by Others.

Gratitude means that memory has
come to the aid of purpose, and that
praise is reinforcing prayer. Grat-
itude links the past with the future, the
debt incurred with the duty to be per-
formed, the service received with the
service rendered. The question,
"What ought we to do for others?"
cannot receive a proper answer until
pains have been taken to weigh and
value all that others have already
done for us. Benevolence is largely
an affair of memory and of the grati-
tude that memory inspires. The
virtue that is most beneficent
does not begin, as some moralists seem
to think, in a desire to do good to
other people, but in adequate recogni-
tion of the enormous amount of good
which other people have done to our-
selves. Nine-tenths of what we have
to give is a gift bestowed upon us,
and only when this is realized does
altruism rest upon its proper ground,
or feel the full force of the motives
which impel the individual to the
service of others. Divorced from
gratitude, all the social virtues would
shrivel.—L. P. Jacks.

First Failures Not Fatal.
How often have we heard people
say that if they had their lives to live
over again they would do very differ-
ently at certain points! And, though
we could see that they thought they
meant what they said, we understood
that they did not mean it very seri-
ously, and that a second chance at life
would probably not yield a much bet-
ter result than the first one had. As
a matter of fact not many of us have
made such fatal mistakes in life that
we have not had hundreds of second
chances of overcoming very largely
the handicap and disadvantage that
they brought us. Indeed, the pathway
of life for every man of us is strewn
with second chances and new opportu-
nities of making good. There is this
to be said, however: a second chance
may be a little harder to realize on
than a first one would have been. But
to say that a thing is hard is not to
say anything about its possibility. A
first mistake or a first failure may be
bad, but does not decide a life unless
we let it.—Montreal Family Herald.

And even if his cotton cost him 35 cents to grow, he beat himself out of \$25 per bale. Did he? Wait and see." The foregoing farmer did not mean his talk for the farmer who was not able to hold.
