Tankersley came in last week rom Lamesa and brought his corn sheller and tractor, and begin at once to shell up some of the bumper corn crop of old Terry, and to say they are going down the line is to use mild language. Seven or eight hands are required to operate the big sheller, and they are knocking out in the neighborhood of 1000 bu. per day from sun to sun. This is being loaded into cars on the track as fast as shelled. We understand that Williams and Bowers are buying the corn off wagons and are biring Mr. Tankersley to shell it.
