County Judge's Order of Election

The State of Texas, County of Terry. To the Resident Property Taxpaying voters of Road District No. 1 in Terry County:—

Take notice that an election will be held on the 7th day of May, 1921, within Road District No. One of said County to determine whether or not there shall be levied upon the property within said Road District No. One by the Commissioner's Court a special Road Tax not to exceed fifteen cents on the \$100 worth of property in obedience to an election order entered by the Commissioner's Court on the 11th day of April, 1921, which is as follows:

On this the 11th day of April, 1921, the Commissioner's Court of Terry County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Court House in Brownfield, Texas, all members of the Court to-wit: D. J. Broughton, County Judge; D. S. Cunningham, Commissioner of Precinct No. 1; J. Barrett, Commissioner of Precinct No. 2; W. H. Black, Commissioner of Precinct No. 4, and H. R. Winston, County Clerk, being present, came on to be considered the petition of J. C. Scudlary, Jr., and fifty-four others that an election be ordered in Road District No. 1 of Terry County, for a special road tax not to exceed 15 cents on the \$100 worth of property, to be levied upon the property in said Road District No. One of said County, subject to taxation; said tax being for the purpose of buying machinery, equipping, building and maintaining the Public Roads of said Road District No. One, and
It appearing to the Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident taxpaying voters of said Road District No. One of said County, and
It further appearing to the Court that said Road District No. One of Terry County, Texas, has been duly established by an order of the Commissioner's Court of said County, dated the 13th day of September, 1920, and of Record in book 2 page 66 of the Minutes of the Court, and that the boundaries thereof are herein described and defined in the order of the Commissioner's Court establishing such district as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the South County line near the S. W. Corner of Survey No. 6, Block C37 on the line between Terry and Gaines counties; thence north a distance of 7 miles, following the west line of Surveys Nos. 6, 7, 18, 19 of Block C37, and Surveys Nos. 15, 19 and 26 of Block C36 to the N. W. corner of Sec. 26 of said block; thence west 1/2 mile to the block T. line to

the S. W. corner of Survey No. 146 Block T; thence north eight miles following the west line of Surveys Nos. 146; 144; 145; 143; 142; 141; 140 and 139 Block T to the northwest corner of said section No. 139; thence east two miles to the north line of Survey Nos. 139, and 128 of said Block T to the northeast corner of said section No. 128; thence south on the line between Surveys Nos. 128 and 113 of said block T a distance of 1/2 mile to the southwest corner of the town of Brownfield; thence east on the south line of said town following said one-half mile line, parallel with the north line of said section No. 113 a distance of one mile and 600 feet to where said line intersects a point where A street of the East Addition of the town of Brownfield intersects the Lamesa Road; thence following the said Lamesa Road in a southeasterly direction a distance of 262 feet to the southwest corner of a 62 1/2 acre tract of land heretofore conveyed to J. C. Bond by A. M. Brownfield and wife; thence north, following the west line of the said Bond tract a distance of 746 yards to the northwest corner of said Bond tract, and where the same intersects the south end of D street of said East Addition; thence following said D street north on the east side of same said street appears on the plat of said addition on file in the office of the County Clerk of Terry County, a distance of 142 feet to where said street intersects the Tahoka Road, the same being the north line of section 102 Block T and a point 2880 feet east of the northwest corner of said section No. 102; thence east about 11 miles following the north line of Surveys Nos. 102; 87; 76; 61; 50; 35; 24; and 9 of Block Y to the east line of Terry County; thence south following the east line between the counties of Terry and Lynn to the southeast corner of Terry county; thence west on the south line of Terry county to the place of beginning, and
It further appearing to said Court that said Road District No. One does not embrace any part of a political subdivision or defined road district that has been heretofore established and has issued bonds which are now outstanding and unpaid;
It is therefore considered ordered and adjudged by the Court that an election be held in said Road District No. One of Terry County, on the 7th day of May, 1921, which is not less than twenty nor more than ninety days from the date of this order to determine whether or not there shall be levied upon the property within said Road District No. One of said county by said Commissioner's Court a special road tax not to exceed fifteen cents on the \$100 worth of property under the provisions of the Constitution of 1889 of the State of Texas as amended and adopted in 1890; said tax being for the purpose of buying machinery, equipping, building and maintaining the public roads of said district.
That said election shall be held under the provisions of Art. 7042 to

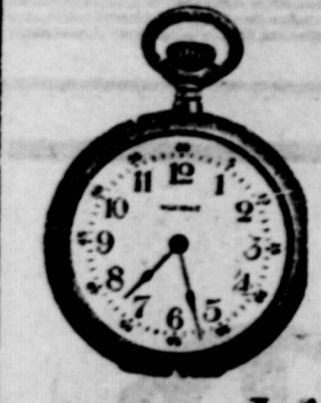

BAPTISTS REPORT GAIN IN NUMBERS

IN LAST 14 YEARS THEY HAVE ADDED OVER MILLION MEMBERS IN SOUTH.

WILL MEET IN CHATTANOOGA

Many Matters Related to Future Work Will Come Up for Consideration at the Annual Convention May 12 to 18.

Following the close of the second year of the Baptist 75 Million Campaign April 30, several thousand messengers from the local churches are expected to assemble at Chattanooga, Tenn., for the seventy-sixth annual session of the Southern Baptist Convention. The Convention met in Chattanooga last in May, 1920, and during the interim there has been a marked growth in every department of the Convention's activities and in the numbers and work of the local churches as well. The total number of Baptists reported to the Convention in 1920 was 1,855,734, while last May, fourteen years later, when the body met in Washington, the total membership of the local churches as reported was 2,961,348, or a gain of 1,105,614. The returns for this year are not yet available, but inasmuch as it is known there were practically 175,000 additions to the local churches last year by baptism alone, there is every reason to believe the showing for 1921 will be even larger.

Growth Shown in All Lines.
At the same time there has been a marked increase in the membership of the churches, there has been a distinct advance in all departments of local and denominational work, it is set out. The total number of local churches has grown from 20,129 in 1906 to 25,303 in 1920; the total number of Sunday Schools from 17,686; and the number of Sunday School pupils from 857,244 to 1,835,936, an increase of more than 100 per cent. The value of local church property has mounted from \$4,501,122 in 1906 to \$74,275,728 in 1920. An increase of more than 1600 per cent, while contributions to missions and benevolences in 1906 were \$1,501,366.67, as compared to \$7,331,266.55 in 1920, an advance of practically 500 per cent. Fourteen years ago the contributions to all purposes in a year were \$5,941,383.44, as against \$21,327,416.67 for 1920.

Next Meeting Important.

The approaching session of the Convention is regarded as vitally important to the future of the denomination's work. It is hoped that by the Convention two-thirds of all subscriptions to the 75 Million Campaign will have been paid in cash and that the program for the completion of the remainder of the campaign task can be formulated at this time. Dr. J. B. Gambrell, president of the Convention, and Dr. E. Y. Mullins, who recently completed a tour of Europe, where they carried fraternal greetings to the Baptists of that continent, will give their impressions of Baptist opportunity in that country, while Dr. George W. Truett and Dr. J. F. Love, who represented the Foreign Mission Board at the London Conference last summer when the mission fields of Europe were considered, will tell of the new territory of Spain, Yugoslavia, Hungary, Roumania and Southern Russia, which Southern Baptists are asked to occupy. This territory is as large as the Southern States and has a population of 128,000,000.

All the boards of the Convention will report the largest year's accomplishments in their history. The Home Mission Board being scheduled to report the completion of its million-dollar loan fund for church building, in addition to the aiding of a thousand churches during the year with gifts and loans for the erection of new houses of worship. The Sunday School Board will report more than \$1,900,000 in sales for the year and with collections as well as sales better than at any previous time in its history.

CHURCH SMALL BUT FAMOUS

Brent Tor, on Coast of Devonshire, England, Has Been Prominent Landmark for Centuries.

Brent Tor is a little bit of a stone church built high on the crowning cliffs of the wild North Devonshire coast in England. The church is so little that a Devonshire yokel who has been sense of humor is said to have scribbled this creepy warning, which puzzled many a simple-minded Devonshire farmer: "If you get into the second aisle of Brent Tor, you will never get out again." There is no second aisle in the wee church at all.

Brent Tor was built centuries ago by a man who was lost among the steep cliffs and rushing waters of the wild North Devon coast. The fog mists enveloped him. In his anguish as the roar and spray of the cold Atlantic assailed him he vowed solemnly that if he ever came safely out of the fog without being blown into the sea, he would build a church where he landed. Brent Tor was the result.

SHAMANS KEEP THEIR POWER

Alaskan Natives Still Believe Impotent in the Words and Actions of "Medicine Men."

Shamanism, or superstition and sorcery, always has played an important part in the life of the Alaskan native. So implicitly does the Alaskan believe in the words and actions of the shaman that a whole tribe go hungry rather than incur his displeasure by eating foods he has tabooed.

The shaman attained his position and power by unusual methods. By fasting and prayer amid the solitude of the woods or mountains, where he fed only on grasses and roots, he prepared himself to become a shaman. By this method it was believed the candidate's body became sufficiently purified to become the abiding place of a spirit.

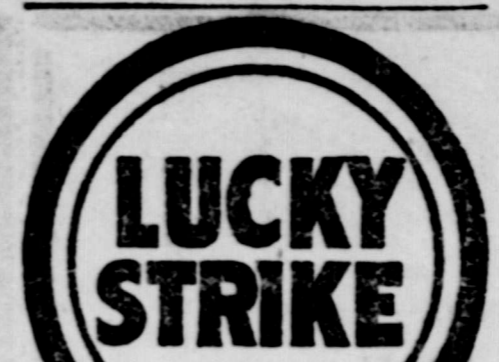
Usually the spirit, willing to abide with the shaman, sent the novice a land otter which the candidate killed, the otter's tongue to be preserved as a talisman away from human view, for should it be seen it was believed the shaman would go insane or be turned into the animal from which the tongue was taken.

Thus the land otter was regarded as too sacred to be killed by other than shamans.

Beginning of Life Insurance.

Life insurance grew out of marine insurance, for merchants sending goods by sea in early times usually accompanied the ship themselves, and were liable to capture by pirates, especially by the Moorish and Turkish pirates who then infested the Mediterranean sea. In order to provide the necessary ransom for their release, if captured, it became the practice of traveling merchants to pay a premium to certain individuals, called underwriters, who guaranteed the payment of the ransom in the event of the merchant's capture. The practice was gradually extended to insuring the lives, first of mariners and then of other persons, the underwriters agreeing, in return for a certain premium, to pay a fixed amount if the person insured died within a certain time. Out of this was evolved the various forms of contracts of life insurance in use today.

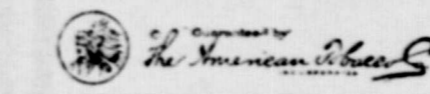
