MEADOW BRIEFS

The Meadow community is just now being afflicted with the water-melon thrip, just as at an earlier day we had the case that there is no difference in the two, as far as results are concerned, except in the case of the melon thrip, there is a marked difference on the part of some individual members of the community, that boys will be boys, and the offense is condoned and the individual who has suffered at their hand is given the "horse laugh" if he dares to complain, or suffers from personal abuse—usually behind his back—if he takes steps to protect himself.

We have in our midst quite a number of settlers who have plantation notions, and they are not to be trusted in the hope that they would be able to sell some, and buy the baby a new dress, get a little sugar and in other ways vary the menu from corn bread and sow-beds, to an occasional ham and pig.

However, there is in this community as in most others, a few shiftless boys and men, kept up by their parents and relatives, who tend not to do their spin. They go to bed at some time after the war small hours after midnight, sleep on into the day and like the rats and croquete issue their products of some lowest man's toil.

In early times, when there was no market for melons, this kind of behavior was tolerable, but now a melon patch is as much a money crop as some cotton or other products of the soil. To take it without paying, or needlessly destroy it, is rank robbery.

If this thing is to continue, steps will have to be taken to put these stragglers on the rock pile. The writer has boys; they are out the greater portion of each night, whether or not they are engaged in this notorious business, I am unable to say, but they have been taught to obey the law and if they see proper to violate it, let them take their medicine.

There is little respect for law or morals here, or elsewhere, and sooner or later it will react on us seriously.

Some man who has worked hard to make his melons, may take it into his head to detain his property, and then the writer and his neighbors, and other one of these prowlers should get some lead in his back.

The eastern part of our country is organizing the Klan and other things, and the writer is sure that this is to be the status of our country—the fate of our community! Let us work, hope and pray that we may be delivered from such calamity.

This disreputable hunting of hen coops and forays on melon patches can be stopped, if we cease winking at such crime. Remember that "the boy who steals a penny in his youth will take a pound in his manhood."

Editor's Note—A house divided against itself, cannot stand, is a Bible fact brought forward by the Savior himself. We are glad to say that the Herald correspondents are with the paper they represent, truth and justice for the suppression of petty crime in Terry county. If the people of the Meadow and other communities will stick up the Herald and its writers, who all stand for law and order, then as the Meadow writer suggests, this low bunch of criminals will either leave or reform. One good way to stop it is to have the girls and moral boys of each community to absolutely ostracize these crooks.

REV. ANDERSON RECALLED BY HIS CONGREGATION

Rev. J. E. Anderson, pastor of the local Baptist church, has re-considered the hearty call of the church here. It will be remembered that a month ago, Bro. Anderson offered his resignation as pastor, of his own accord, feeling that his work was finished at this place. But on Sunday night a hearty recall was extended to him, and he consented to stay.

Bro. Anderson's many and varied experiences ably fit him for a very efficient pastor. During the outbreak of the Spanish American war, he served for three years in the Philippine Islands. He was connected with the 8th U. S. Cavalry under General Pershing, then afterwards was detailed for service at the division hospital located at Manila. Sometime thereafter, Pres. Roosevelt sent Maj. Gen. Wood on a mission around the world, and Bro. Anderson was assigned to duty with Gen. Wood, and while on this trip visited many quarters of the earth.

After arriving in New York, he returned to his home in Texas, and graduated at High School in his home town the following year. Later he entered Baylor University, and while in the university, the great war broke out and again responding to the call of his country, he volunteered as a chaplain, and was assigned to Louisville, Ky., where 30,000 men were stationed. He was located here when the awful flu epidemic broke out. Risking his own life, he would go in where the suffering and dying ones were, many of whom would turn their faces to the wall and give up. Bro. Anderson, as chaplain, would slap them in the back and encourage them by saying, "brace up old man; fight a good fight; be courageous and get well."

Shortly after the war was over, he returned to Baylor University, and taking his degree in the spring of 1919. After finishing his work in the university, he remained in Waco as one of the pastors. During the same fall, Bro. Anderson accepted the hearty unanimous call of the Brownfield church, and has been the local pastor of his church here since that time.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO EX-SERVICE MEN

On Friday and Saturday, August 19 and 20, a clean-up square, from the Bureau of War Risk Insurance will be in Lubbock, to meet every disabled ex-service man in order to see that his claims are settled. This squad will consist of:

1. A representative of the Bureau who will be an authority on compensation and insurance claims.

2. An examining doctor who advises the men concerning his physical condition, and to make arrangements for him to go immediately to the hospital, if this is necessary.

3. A representative of the Federal Board to adjust any training matters. Any man who is in need of hospital care, who is entitled to more money than he is getting from the government, or to training under the Federal Board for Vocational Education, or who has any other claim is urged to be on hand on August 19 or 20 to present his claim. If you think for any reason it will be impossible for you to be in Lubbock on the day mentioned, get together all data pertaining to your claim and hand it to Mrs. M. Fulton, Executive Secretary of Lubbock County Red Cross Chapter, who will see that your claim is presented for adjustment. Where the headquarters of this squad will be, in Lubbock is not yet known, but if you will communicate with the Red Cross, you will be advised as soon as it is learned. This notice is not only for the ex-service men of Lubbock county, but also the adjoining counties, as Lubbock is the only city between Amarillo and Sweetwater in which these meetings are to be held.

**ATTENTION MILO MAIZE
AND KAFFIR SHIPPERS**

By a recent ruling of the railroads that 4000 pounds be the minimum car on maize and kaffir heads the shipper shall be held to pay freight on this minimum. It is clearly impossible to load 20 or 40 foot cars to this minimum weight with maize heads. Every shipper in West Texas should keep complete records of each car loaded during the season movement with milo maize or kaffir corn in the head. The record should clearly indicate:
1. Exact amount loaded in car, each car.
2. Statement as to whether or not the car was loaded to full visible capacity, if not, the approximate space left in the car.
3. Car number and initial and the length of each car used.
At the end of the season this information should be submitted to the Traffic Department, West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and they will forward the same to the Interstate Commerce Commission for adjustment, which they should make justly if the shipping will be able to be of additional value and service to their members.—West Texas Today.
