BROWNFIELD HIGH SCHOOL OPENED MONDAY MORNING

The big auditorium that seats 750 people was taxed beyond capacity for the first time probably in its history Monday morning at 9 o'clock, when the fall term was formally opened. We noticed people from all parts of this county here to enter children into our school, and judging from the expressions of all present, this is going to be one of our most successful terms. Harmony and work was the keynote.

The ten members composing the 1921-22 faculty were present, save one Miss Jones, of Lometa, who thought we had Sunday trains, and was therefore tied up at Lubbock. She came in on the afternoon train. Some weeks ago we printed a list of teachers, except one, the Spanish teacher. She is Miss Caldwell, of Lubbock, who had not been elected at that time.

The total enrollment for the first day was 392 and is expected that this number will rapidly increase.

The exercises were opened by the female audience singing "America" being rendered with a will. Rev. Hardesty, of Saxon, who has two daughters in the faculty, was then called on to lead the devotional exercises. He read the tenth verse of the tenth chapter of Proverbs, after which he led a short prayer for the advancement of the school. He then made a fine talk from his text, and stressed very much the keeping sharp of the "mind." Mayor Nell then made one of his usual witty but nevertheless encouraging talks, and was followed by Rev. J. E. Anderson, who in his usual pleasant, straightforward way, gave all a hearty welcome and lots of wholesome advice and encouragement. Rev. H. H. Bowers was then asked to come forward, and the audience was well paid in the many words of advice and cheer he gave them.

Misses Lois Brownfield and Stella Broadway, former graduates who are now finishing in some of the best colleges in the State, gave the heartiest good reading.

Prof. Shaw's address, a mixture of his wishes, intentions, rules and regulations, was good, but the high points in his address was classification and affiliation, and we believe that he made all present see the need of both and we believe the patron and the trustees will be a unit in seeing this school properly classed and affiliated in the next year or so at least.

We are crowded warm, and one or more rooms are having to be opened in the auditorium. An addition to the present building of at least four or six rooms including basement will be the next progressive forward step in building up our school. The basement of the addition may then be used for domestic science and manual training departments when they are added.



STOCK PROMOTION AND POTASH IN WEST TEXAS

To protect the public from misrepresentation and fraud by unscrupulous promoters and sellers of stock based on potash deposits in Western Texas, the United States Geological Survey, Department of the Interior, states that the potash deposits there, instead of being 1100 or even 300 ft. thick, as represented by the promoters, have not yet been proved to be of workable thickness or of commercial value. Rich potash salts, comprising the mineral polyhalite, which were deposited in association with great thicknesses of rock salt and gypsum in "red beds," as in Germany, and in fact, and at the same time as the German deposits, have been discovered by the representatives of the United States Geological Survey and the Texas University Bureau of Geology and Technology in cooperative search, but though this discovery, which was made public early in June, is encouraging and interesting, the practical question whether the deposits are thick enough to mine—that is, whether they are worth anything—has yet to be answered.

The signs of potash which constituted the recent discovery came from drill cuttings in three wells in Midland, Dawson and Ward counties, that have been drilled for oil near the Staked Plains region, which the geologists, on scientific grounds, have considered the most promising region for the occurrence of potash salts in connection with the great thickness of common rock salt covering the "red beds" region of western Texas, eastern New Mexico, western Oklahoma, and southern Kansas. The results of the tests of the borings from these three wells, of which those that

are furthest apart are distant from each other about 125 miles, are certainly encouraging, but the United States Geological Survey warns the public that the conditions of drilling and sampling at all three points are so unsatisfactory that it still remains to be seen whether the beds that are rich in potash are thick enough to justify their commercial exploitation.

For the accurate tests for such deposits necessary for a sound commercial conclusion, drill cores are needed instead of the unsatisfactory samples brought up by the bailer, or, worse yet, washed up by the rotary rig with out means of determining accurately either the thickness of the layer of potash or its depth from the surface. Thorough tests with the core drill are justified by the tremendous importance to the whole United States of the discovery of commercial deposits of potash in this region—a discovery of far greater value than that of an oil pool.

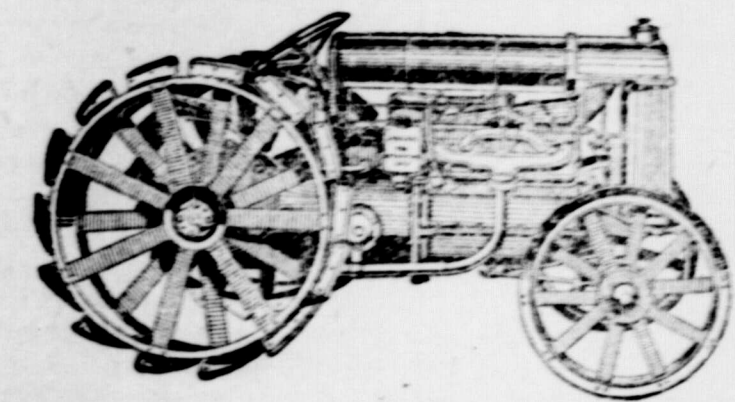

SAYS FEDERAL RESERVE BANKS BROUGHT ON PANIC

The charge has been made not only by John Skelton Williams that the Federal Reserve Board and Gov. W. P. G. Harding of that organization had deliberately brought on the present financial troubles, but the same charge is being made by many other prominent men. One of the men making the charge is J. S. Wanamaker, of South Carolina. Mr. Wanamaker is a witness before the congressional committee at Washington the other day and asserted in his testimony that the scheme of deflation began last year when the "deliberate" cynical and inexcusable. Mr. Wanamaker is president of the American Cotton Association.

Mr. Wanamaker charged that Gov. Harding was largely responsible for the deflation policy and that anything officials may say at this time will not excuse actions which resulted in loss to the agriculture and commerce of about twenty five billions of dollars. He added that the small bankers, because of the actions of the Federal Reserve Board, which he characterized as being "tyrannical," were almost afraid to call their souls their own. Through use of various disciplinary measures, he explained, the board of regional authorities "can and do make life wretched for the small bankers." The witness demanded that the Federal Reserve System be divorced from Wall street and its influences.

HOW TO OBTAIN RURAL FREE DELIVERY

As there has been some talk recently of establishing some rural routes out of Brownfield, we print the following from a leaflet issued by the Post office department, handed us by our postmaster, W. G. Hardin.

An application for rural delivery should preferably be made on the forms furnished by this department. These are supplied on application to the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General.

Requests for two or more routes should not be included in one petition; a separate petition for each being required.

Petitions for rural service to supply territory adequately covered will not be accepted. When the territory is partially covered and it is proposed to rearrange existing service, a petition for such readjustment, signed by the patrons affected, must accompany the petition for the new route.

Petitions for rural service, when properly signed, should be submitted to the Postmaster, who will furnish the information called for on the last page, and forward the petition to the Fourth Ass't. P. M.

It is not an absolute requirement that a form of petition for a rural route be presented except that in case of a motor route the law requires that a petition bearing the signatures of a majority of the heads of families to be served should be filed.

Any application from a postmaster or person not connected with the service accompanied with a sketch showing the territory which it is proposed to supply and the location of the residences of the families that would be served, and a statement from the postmaster that the roads are in such condition as to be readily traveled with facility at all times, will be carefully considered if presented to the Department.

When an application for rural mail service is filed and accepted, it is referred for investigation by a postoffice inspector who visits the locality and rides over the proposed route. The inspector then prepares a sketch map showing the roads traversed and the location of the residences of each patron within reach of the proposed service, indicates any obstruction that may exist, such as unbridged or unfordable streams, or nonautomatic gates. He also indicates any existing service by star routes or otherwise which would conflict. His report is transmitted to the proper authorities and such action taken as the circumstances warrant. If the service is established from the stated date, the Civil Service Commission is requested to hold an examination and certify the names of suitable persons for appointment as carrier. After the service is authorized an interval of about 60 days is usually necessary to enable the Civil Service Commission to establish a list of eligibles for the position of carrier.

The principal purpose of rural delivery is to carry and collect mails on a fixed line of travel to and from the people who would otherwise have to go a mile or more to a postoffice or to another route to receive or dispatch their mail. It is required that the roads traversed by the rural route shall be in good condition, unobstructed by gates, unless such gates are made to open automatically; that there must be no unbridged creeks or streams not fordable at all ordinary seasons of the year; and that each route shall serve at least four families to the mile, except on routes less than ten miles in length at least six fami-

lies shall be served for each mile of travel involved. A route shall be so arranged that the carrier will not be required to retrace or travel over the same road twice the same day.

Routes will not be extended to accommodate patrons who are in one mile of the road regularly traveled. It is not the policy of the department not to establish rural delivery on roads traversed by star route on which box delivery and collection service is given unless the service given by the star route can be easily superseded by the rural delivery service. The law prohibits the maintenance of star routes where the patronage can be easily served by the established rural routes.

Failure to maintain in passable condition at all seasons of the year the highway traversed by the rural carrier will be considered sufficient reason for the withdrawal of established service from a locality.

The acceptance of a petition does not imply that the route, if established, will be operated from the postoffice named in the petition, but from the most feasible point. Wherever it is desirable to establish a postoffice located on or near a railroad and having good railway mail service, the service is established from post-offices supplied by star routes only when it is possible to reach with equal facility from an office on a railroad the territory intended to serve.

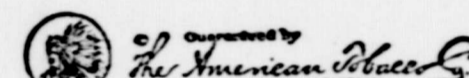
