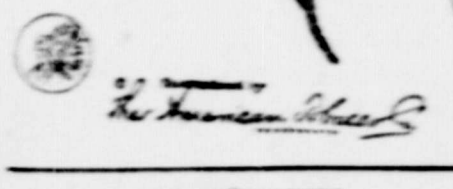

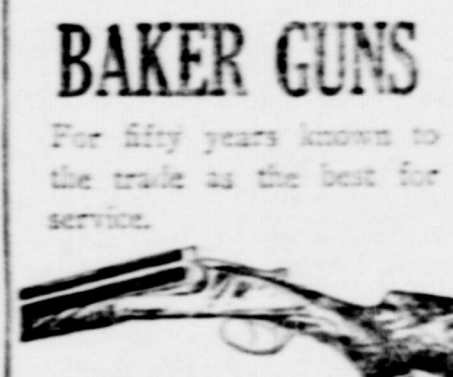

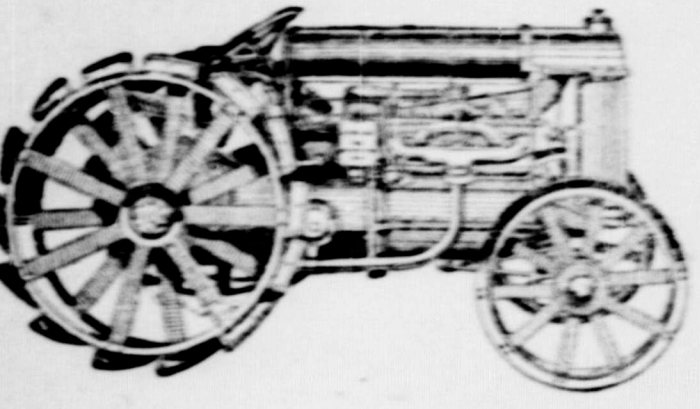

TWO YEAR OLD CHILD OF C. C. JACKSON KILLED

On Thursday evening the 8th of September, occurred the tragic death of the little two year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Jackson, residing in the Draw neighborhood southeast of Tahoka. The little child had climbed up on the hind wheel of a wagon loaded with feed, which a brother had driven to the house. The boy was unaware that the little sister was near at hand when he started the team. It is supposed that the little one's head either struck the front wheel or came in contact with the hard ground as the wheel turned over which resulted in her death within a few minutes. A physician was hurriedly called from Tahoka, but owing to the nature of the blow, nothing could be done to save her.

The sorrowing family has the deepest sympathy of their neighbors and friends in the untimely loss of their daughter and sister.—Tahoka News.
