Police Warn Of Burglaries

Friona police have investigated seven residential burglaries during the last 30 days. In each instance the residents were out of town.

Police believe that the burglars knew the residents were out of town and warn residents who are planning to be away this summer to be aware and take some precautions when leaving for vacation.

First of all, police say that people often make it known to many friends and family that they are going to be gone. Word of people leaving for extended periods of time can spread and is an

invitation for burglars. They advise to tell fewer people and to make sure you have friends, neighbors and relatives watch your house

Also have them bring in newspapers, leave a light on, and generally make your home look as though someone

was there. In all of the recent burglaries, the burglars entered through the backyards of the homes, broke doors or windows to enter, and stole mainly small electronics like VCRs, CD players, televisions,

Foundation Gives EMS A Grant

The Don Kay Clay Cash Foundation, based in Salt Lake City, Utah, has donated \$2,500 to Friona's EMS toward the purchase of an automatic blood pressure cuff.


The blood pressure unit will be carried in the ambulance and will digitally monitor blood pressure, pulse, respiration, and temperature of emergency patients, especially those with cardiac problems.

According to EMS director and paramedic Dana Hendrix, the EMS crews now use regular type of monitoring equipment, taking the pulse, heart rate and blood pressure readings through a stethescope. She said it is often noisy and EMS personnel have a problem hearing in the back of the ambulance.

The matrix automatic blood pressure cuff, which costs about \$2,800, will be a major addition and improvement for Friona's EMS,

Hendrix said. In a letter to EMS Director Hendrix, Kay Cash said, "May the Emergency Medical Service continue to save lives. Don and Clay join me in saying 'Thank you for your past response to my parents'."

Kay Cash is the daughter of T.I. and Melba Burleson of Friona. In addition to this grant, the Don Kay Clay Cash Foundation has supported the Friona Public Library expansion for the last two years.







He got married, had three children, got divorced. Over time he drank some whiskey, chased some women, considered suicide, and gave away hundreds of Bibles.

Today at age 65, he rides a motorcycle, flies an airplane, and preaches the gospel. But definitely not in that order.

Don McNerlin still shakes hands with the strength of a rodeo rider and oilfield worker. But as pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Bovina, his heart, smile and kind words are those of a preacher.

His coffee drinking buddies say he often preaches at the cafe too and has a way of steering any conversation toward the gospel.

Don McNerlin was born in 1934 in Spur, Texas during the hard scrabble life of West Texas. In 1936, during the now famous Dust Bowl years, his parents packed up and headed to California.

The old car broke down in Monahans. He remembers that his daddy, Blackie, spent the family's last quarter to "buy me a hamburger. It sure made momma mad."

They stayed in Monahans where his daddy became a police officer and then sheriff. They lived on the top floor of the courthouse next to the jail.

jail. His momma cooked for the inmates. The food money paid by the county was enough to cook for the prisoners and feed the family

He remembers helping his dad with the local drunks who came and went like the jail was a revolving door. Many made sure to get thrown in the tank around Thanksgiving and Christmas in some copper mines in Peru. holidays to sample his momma's cooking.

Water Tank because that's where you always found him, told Mrs. McNerlin that he hadn't missed a Christmas with her in 14 years.

He remembers taking the Catholic prisoners from jail over to the priest for blessing then back to jail. Don started with flying lessons when he was 13. He also took up rodeoing and went to work in the

"I worked the morning tower shift which was from 12 midnight to 7 a.m., so I could go to school in the daytime", he said.

At the age of 13 he won \$35 in a rodeo. He was the center on the Monahans football team for one game when a rival school told about his \$35 winnings. He was disqualified from a high school athletic career.

He graduated from high school He likes to say he was raised in on 1952, got married in 1953, had three children. After 11 years, the marriage ended in divorce, mainly, he says, because of his beer drinking, girl-chasing ways.

His frequent absences in the oilfield also led his wife to stray. She moved to California with the kids. In 1966, to earn enough money to take care of his child support obligations he took a job

While in Peru he became increasingly depressed. Over the Don says that one of his jobs years he had studied the Bible and when he was about 12-years-old read many other religious writings was to help daddy round up the such as the Koran and Buddhist drunks. One old drunk they called philosophy. He says that he

became interested in people who claimed to have had a personal spiritual experience.

At this point religion did not seem to help. In Peru he considered suicide. After days of contemplation and depression he said he decided against taking his own life, got rid of all his guns, and started reading the Bible

The idea of spiritual encounters

still haunted him. "I left Peru and worked in a lead mine in San Francisco for 6 months", he recalled. "Then I moved to Odessa to be closer to my family and became a life insurance salesman. But I found out I couldn't sell", he said with a laugh.

During his stay in Odessa he attended some services in various small churches in the area. In one Heightened moment he promised the Lord that he would give up sinful ways, booze, and women. His eyes twinkled "And I did for one solid

It was an incident with a waitress from the Miniskirt Junction Cafe and a bottle of Jack Daniel that led to his spiritual encounter. You can ask him about the details.

The next day he was supposed to go to have lunch with family. The bottle of Jack Daniel was gone. So was the Miniskirt waitress. But not the guilt.

He says he could not even bear to look in the mirror. Remorse and guilt flooded over him for what he had done to himself and others. It was then, he says, that his spiritual encounter became real.

"A light began to glow in the room", he says, "and as sure as I am sitting here I heard the Lord's voice say 'Don, I have always loved

He was 40 years old and was convinced that in spite of all the sins of his past, God still loved him because of it.

He says he spent the next few years reading the Bible and arguing with God, not convinced that his way was the best. In 1977 he was in Chad, Africa, as the warehouseman for an oil company. He stayed 3 1/2 years and gave away 200-300 bibles a month to

the local citizens.

From 1980 to 1984 he lived in Singapore. He bought a 29-foot yacht to live on and worked on oil rigs in Borneo, Sumatra and Java. Still, he gave away bibles and organized bible studies.

In 1983 he says he came back to Nocona, Texas with a \$250,000 net worth and 200 acres of property, planning on parlaying that into a million and never have to work again. "By 1985", he says, "I was flat broke.

Still knocking around the Odessa area, in 1986 he was listening to a Penecostal preacher when he finally got the call to preach.

At the age of 54, Don McNerlin turned his life over to the care of God and vowed to preach God's word as long as he was able.

In June, 1988, with a license from the Methodist church, he accepted a ministry at Logan and Nara Vista, New Mexico. "They hadn't had a preacher in 8 months, so I was surely better than nothing."

After three years of study from Southern Methodist University and three years from Duke University (one month in the summers), in 1995 he was ordained as a deacon in the Methodist church, which is equivalent to a masters degree in theology.

His preaching career has taken him to Tatum, NM, for 3 years, Santa Rosa, NM for 3 years, and now Bovina for one year.

"All I do is preach from the Bible and try to get people hungry for the Lord", he declares. "I know I have had colorful life, but I can't be a witness without witnessing something in life. I have done that, and I will be preaching as long as I can hold a Bible and as long as the Lord will have me."

He is content to preach in small churches. He speaks Spanish. He is still single.

Life is okay today for Don McNerlin. His buddies say he even preaches some while having coffee at the local cafe.

To Don McNerlin life finally became a permanent spiritual encounter.

School and later Floydada High School.



Eula Gross has seventeen grandchildren, thirty-four great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.



Parmer County Commissioners gave approval at their regular meeting last Monday to a new law enforcement center and jail, which will cost in the neighborhood of \$225,000.

PLANS APPROVED

The new facility is to be constructed as an addition to the Court House, adjoining the present building on the north

According to Judge Archie Tarter, the county's jail facilities had come under attack by both federal and state authorities in recent years, who pronounced the Parmer facilities as unfit.

"We were inspected by both federal and state agencies a couple of years ago. They were ready to condemn our jail, but we told them we would do our best to upgrade the facilities, and they have been lenient,"

Tarter indicated that the Court House improvements would be paid out of the county's Revenue Sharing

"We're hoping to pay every penny out of Revenue Sharing," Tarter told the Friona Star this

It was reported that the county's revenue sharing balance amounted to \$201,000. Parmer County has been receiving a quarterly check for \$25,906 in revenue sharing

The new addition, as proposed by Warren Pendleton and Associates of Clovis, would be 92 feet long and 66 feet wide. It would contain 21 cells, eight for men, three for women, three for juvenile boys, one for girls, one cell for first offenders, and a padded cell.

Bowie Bursts Title Dreams

AUSTIN-Second place ain't so bad, out of 214 class AA schools in the state.

Friona's Chieftains claimed the state runnerup title in basketball, in their first appearance ever in the state meet, falling to tall and talented Bowie, 76-66 in the finals Saturday in a noontime encounter.

The Jackrabbits turned out to be the bad guys in the "High Noon" epic, bursting Friona's state championship bubble after the Chieftains had controlled the first half of the game, leading at intermission 36-33.

But the Super Chief's championship express ran out of steam in a nightmarish third quarter in which Bowie outscored

Friona, 29-8 and took control of the game. The team was clearly showing the effects of their Friday afternoon battle, in which they faced a run and gun, pressing Bastrop team that left the Chiefs exhausted despite their win. Friona had used just six players in Friday's horse race.

[For details on Friona's thrilling 73-71 win over Bastrop in the state semi-finals, see the story on Page 12.]

For sixteen minutes of play, Saturday, it appeared that the Chiefs just might go all the way in this, their most successful basketball season in history, and first time ever past the regional playoffs.

Friona spotted Bowie a 10-4 lead after three minutes before its offense came alive. Gene Strickland, whose tournament performance was nothing short of fantastic, started things with a long jump shot, and Dale Cleveland made three straight baskets to tie the score at 12-all.

Bobby Lewellen's jump shot at 1:21 gave Friona its first lead at 14-12, and the team kept the lead the rest of the half. Four Strickland points gave Friona an 18-14 first quarter

Strickland kept up his barrage, with two jump shots to start the second quarter, and Friona had a six-point lead at 24-18. Then after Cleveland banked in a layup Strickland came back

with two more and Friona had its longest lead at 30-22. But Bowie came alive. A four-point play on a basket and two free shots cut the lead in half and the Jackrabbits came to within one, 34-33 with 11 seconds left. Dale Parsons got a basket from in close two seconds ahead of the buzzer and Friona had a 36-33 halftime lead.

Bowie scored the first eight points of the third quarter, and suddenly everything bounced their way. Friona went cold and Bowie went hot. The combination spelled disaster for the Chiefs, who found themselves trailing by eighteen points before the quarter was over.

Several baskets by big 6-8 center David Prater sparked Bowie's third-quarter rally.

The lead became 20 points as the final quarter opened, and the Chieftains proved their championship calibre by fighting back to trim the final margin to ten, instead of quitting, and losing by a bigger margin.

Strickland scored 28 points for the second straight day, and paced all scorers. Gene should have a good shot at the all-state tournament team, which will be announced later this week. He was Friona's big weapon in the playoffs, averaging over

20 points. With four juniors on the court in the fading moments, one Friona fan might have said it all for the Chieftain supporters as they filed out of Gregory Gym. "We'll be back," was the fan's





> Like the fleahopper, lygus feeding results in the shedding of squares, however, lygus can feed on matchhead to pencil eraser sized squares.

If you are checking your cotton for fleahoppers and lygus be sure not to shade the plant as you kneel down to check it. The fleahoppers will jump from the plant before you can properly inspect it. If you find a lygus nymph, count it as two. Nymphs are the juvenile stage of lygus without fully developed wings. If the wings do not extend to the tip of the abdomen, it is probably a nymph.


The Texas Department of Health is charging fees to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open.
