#### A NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING: MORE FACTS & FIGURES

Why ask for a new high school building instead of shack or adding to the present building? One reason is that the present auditorium is entirely too small for an auditorium. Its seating capacity is 400; really 300, since two pillars cut out the view of at least 50 people, while we really need an auditorium with a seating capacity of 1000. Again, there is no room in the present building suitable for laboratory purposes, and the sciences cannot be properly taught without laboratories. Again the auditorium does not meet state requirements with regard to lighting space, being too far in the ground. What would a modern high school building cost that would do very likely for the next ten years? From \$30,000 to \$36,000. What would it include in the way of rooms? In the basement, a modern heating plant; at present the coal is in the basement; also 100 pupils and three teachers, who are almost continually being interrupted by pupils from 8 rooms coming for coal. At least one laboratory room, a manual training room; a domestic science room, the boys and girls toilet. On the main floor a study hall to seat at least 75 pupils. At present two classes are crowded into one room and one class tries to study while the other recites, an impossibility from every viewpoint. Other rooms have part of the pupils taking one subject while the other is supposed to be studying. A library room in the same room as the study hall. Offices for the superintendent and principal, and at least 3 other class rooms. On the third floor an auditorium seating from 700 to 1000 people. A number of the larger towns of the plains are building municipal auditoriums. If Brownfield should do that then a high school building could be built for less than the above figures. But to develop that school and community spirit essential to the normal development of the high school pupil into an aggressive, wide-awake citizen, an auditorium is an absolute necessity. Again the question: Why build for next year when ten thousand additional we can provide for ten years? What are our neighboring towns doing to take care of their growing school-olities? Lubbock is finishing a \$1,375,000 high school building; Slason has built two additional structures this past year; Lorenzo has recently moved into a \$42,000 building; Tahoka is building an addition to their present building. What was the common mistake of all these places and Brownfield? Building on too small a scale. This is the fourth session in the present building, and we need a building twice its size now. What will we need in five years? A high school building, the present building crowded and another ward building very possible.

#### TERRY COUNTY BAR PASS RESOLUTIONS OF RESPECT

Brownfield, Texas, Jan. 15, 1923. At a meeting of the Terry County Bar on the death of Judge W. H. Spencer, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

We, your committee appointed by the Terry County Bar on the death of Judge W. H. Spencer, late judge of the 10th district, do hereby advise the following:

Judge W. H. Spencer was a native of Mississippi, a cultured gentleman of the old school. He removed to Brownfield, Terry County, Texas, the year the county was organized, to-wit, 1904 and was residing in this city and this county at the time that he was appointed Judge of this district by Governor Colquitt upon the creation of this district, and was elected at each succeeding judicial election. He died at Lubbock, Lubbock county, Texas, Sunday, January 14th, A. D. 1923, at 63 years.

Judge Spencer was a popular judge, holding the confidence and esteem of lawyers, litigants and citizens generally, and in his death the Judiciary, bar and citizenship of Texas have lost a most valuable member.

We recommend that a copy of this report be spread upon the minutes of the District Court of Terry County, Texas; that a copy of the same be sent to the press, and also to his beloved wife, who survives him, with whom we most profoundly and sincerely sympathize.

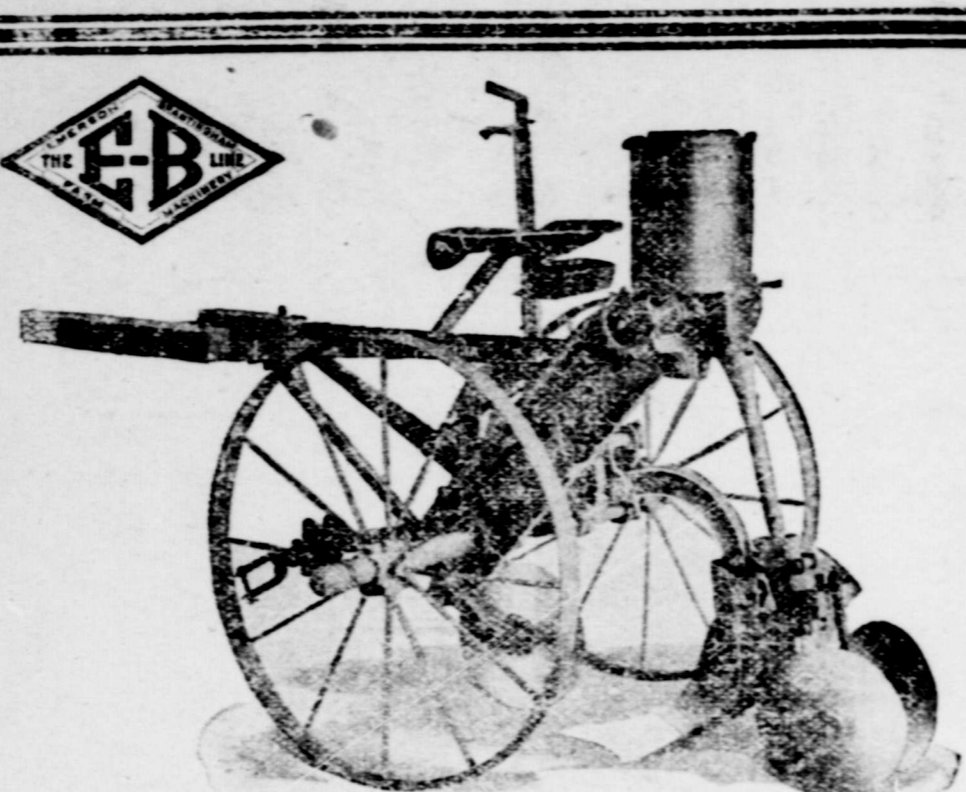

## COM. OF AGRICULTURE STARTS BETTER PRICE CAMPAIGN

To farmers and all business interests.  
New Years Greetings:  
"Farming must pay or the nation must perish."

Twentieth century civilization, with its boasted achievements, will perish from the face of the earth unless agriculture is made profitable.

This is axiomatic and needs no demonstration.

Our lands are depreciating in production because of erosion and loss of plant food.

Erosion cannot be stopped and the plant food cannot be restored without profitable prices.

Money spent for good schools and good roads is a great investment when intelligently expended, but it raises the price of land and increases taxes without increasing the productive capacity of the soil. In order to support good schools and build good roads, the farmer must receive better prices for his products.

Cotton is the greatest commercial crop of the United States, (i.e. brings more actual money) and is almost the sole dependence of the South. With depleted soil, ravages of the boll weevil and other pests, the high cost of living, it is no longer possible to produce cotton as economically and as cheaply as it was formerly produced.

Estimates of the cost of production filed in this department by thousands of practical farmers, shows that the average cost of producing the cotton crop of 1921 was 25.8 cents per pound, and the average cost of the 1922 crop was 22 cents per pound. The 1920-21 crops were sold at a loss, and the 1922 crop sold for about cost, with a small profit to the most successful farmers.

Business conditions materially improved because of the small profit to some of the farmers. This ought to convince every intelligent man in Texas and the South that cotton cannot be profitably grown for less than 20 cents, as the minimum price.

### The Remedy

1. Raise all the food and feed crops to supply the farm and the local city or town market and make the farm self supporting.

2. Stop the erosion or washing of the soil by terracing or other means, and plant enough peas, velvet beans or other legumes to replace the plant food taken from the soil.

Reduce the cotton acreage 25 per cent and improve the cultivation, control insect ravages, and produce more per acre at lower cost per pound. This plan will produce as much cotton and bring more clear money to the farmer. Demand 20 cents per lb. or more, according to the cost of production, supply and demand.

These suggestions, if put into execution, will materially benefit the South. The farmers, as a rule, are not properly organized and not financially able to carry out this plan, but are willing to do their part.

I appeal to all business interests to assist the farmers in a campaign for soil improvement, better methods in farming, and better prices, and this assistance requires both moral and financial support; and a campaign to appraise the cotton consuming world that cotton cannot, and will not, be produced hereafter for less than cost, and a reasonable profit. I appeal to the newspapers to assist in this campaign.

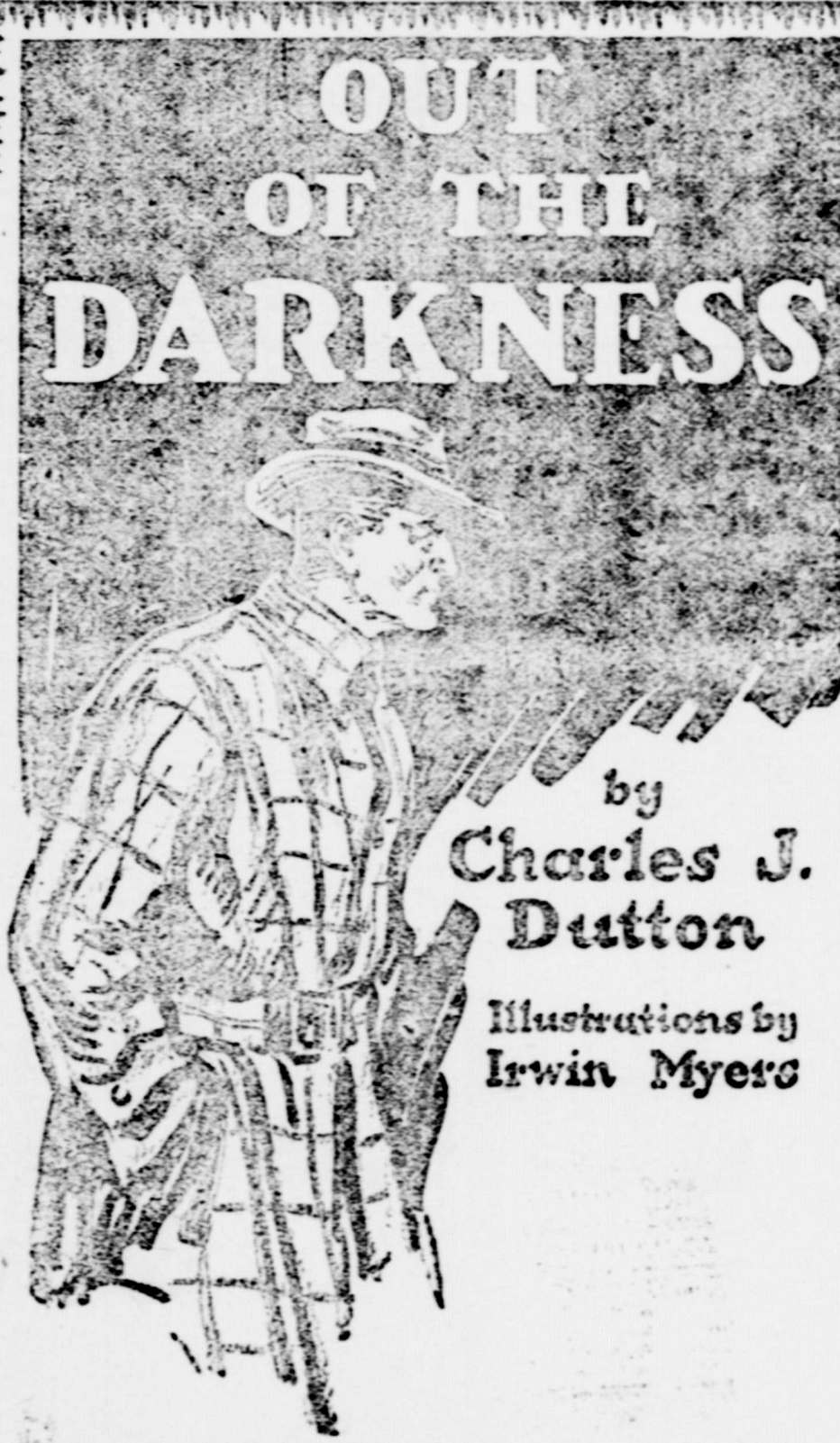
