





FORMER PRESIDENT Criticizes Se-FORMER PRESIDENT CRITICIZES SEVERELY AFTERMATH

OF WAR

HIS SPEECH WAS BY RADIO

Addresses People of Nation Directly for First Time Since He Left the White House

Washington.-Woodrow Wilson, addressing the American people directly Saturday night for the first time since he left the White House, declared America's attitude after the World War was "deeply ignoble, cowardly and dishonorable."

Mr. Wilson spoke exactly five minutes into a radio instrument at his home here and his message was broadcast to every section of the country.

"The anniversary of Armistice Day," he said, "should stir us to great exaltation of spirit because of the proud recollection that it was our day, a day above those early days of that never to be forgotten November which lifted the world to the high levels of vision and achievement upon which the great war for democracy was fought and won, although the stimulating memories of that triumph are forever marred and embittered for us by the shameful fact that when the victory was wonwon, be it remembered, chiefly by the indomitable spirit and valiant sacrifices of our own inconquerable soldiers-we turned our backs upon our associates and refused to bear any responsible part of the administration of peace, or the firm and permanent establishment of the results of the war-won at so terrible a cost of life and treasure—and withdrew into a sullen and selfish isolation, which is deeply ignoble because manifestly cowardly and dishonorable.

While a few weeks ago it was believed the pecan crop in Bastrop County would be practically a failure, it now develops that the yield in some parts of the county will be good. The trees in some of the groves are barren of pecans, yet in other places the yield is unusually heavy, the nut large and of splendid flavor.

One hundred and twenty-five state and national banks in Texas were designated Saturday as state depositories for the next two years, beginning December 1, by the state depository board. State funds to the amount of \$5,000,000 will be placed in these banks. State Treasurer C. V. Terrell, secretary of the board, has sent out blank bonds to be executed by these banks not later than November 25.

The center of the rice industry in Wharton County is on the west side of the Colorado River, 25,000 acres being under irrigation from wells, some of them flowing 2,000 gallons per minute. Each farmer has his own pumping plant, the investment ranging from \$1,000 to \$8,000. Water in abundance is found from 40 to 200 feet. Rice valued at \$1,000,000 is marketed annually at El Campo and a rice mill is operated there. The rice is recognized generally as of the best quality of any grown in the United

The cotton crop last year was 25,000 bales and thee for this year is expected to come to 30,000 bales from 100,000 acres. A million bushels of corn were made last year and this year's crop should be equally as good, the county agent, W. A. Yates, reports

RED CROSS HELPS WAR'S SUFFERERS

Aids 200,000 Veterans and Their Families-27,000 Disabled Still in Hospitals.

SPENDS \$5,866,255 IN YEAR

Individual Attention Assured to All Physically Ailing or in Distress.

Washington. - War service five years after the armistice, which on November 11 the American Red Cross marks with the opening of the annual membership canvass, shows that during the past year assistance was extended by the Red Cross to some 200, 600 ex-service men or their families. To 130 hospitals throughout the country approximately 75,000 ex-service men were admitted for treatment. and to 63,296 of these men definite and specialized service was extended, the Red Cross annual report discloses. In all hospitals under government operation a total of nearly 27,000 disabled veterans were reported by the Surgeon General of the Army.

These facts of the aftermath of physical and metal disability five years after the World War, and the burden resting upon the relatives and dependents of the ex-service men, show conclusively the great need of the Red Cross to act as a supplementary arm of the government in service to these many thousands of men who wore the uniform of the United States. It should be emphasized that government assistance is necessarily standardized along specified lines affecting by everyone present. them as a whole. The Red Cross service is to the individual man and the solution of his problems. This the Red Cross designates "home service" for its aims to give the loving care and interest of the home to these men undergoing physical reconstitution Saturday. far from their actual home influences.

In Veterans' Bureau hospitals the record of a single month illustrates the large service rendered by the Rei Cross. For example, 15,504 new case: required attention, and a total of 26, 687 cases were acted upon; 49,365 let ters and 1,868 telegraph messager written, and more than 1,000 enter talaments given in recreation houses for the benefit of the patients.

Authorities declare that the pres ant to a critical time in the lives of many of the disabled ex-service met who during the five years since the armistice have developed misgivings of recovery.

Work Among the "Regulars"

Service to the enlisted men of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps is a charter obligation of the Red Cross which in the last year recorded over 200,000 cases of assistance extended and \$34,420 visits to the sick and dis abled. Inquiries by the Red Cross at the request of Government authori ries into the home conditions of sol diers, sailors and marines aggregated 17.714, and there were nearly 6,000 instances where the Red Cross locat

ed mes for their families. All these autivities constituting a single responsibility of the American Red Cross demonstrated during the year that its "war service" in behalf of the veteran and the man enlisted in the nation's defensive arms must so forward unfalteringly and with out stint of funds. The work of the last five years has welded a close bond of regard between the men who sacrificed and the Red Cross, whose efforts are praised and indorsed by the veterans' organizations. To de all that can be done to soften the con sequences of the hard blows of war is the supreme duty of the Red Cross to which it is giving its best work azi most liberal service.


