## **WANT EXCLUSIVE WOMEN'S PRISON**

#### Feminists to Urge Congress to **Erect Special Institution for** Female Offenders.

Washington .- A federal prison "exclusively for the ladies"-a penitentiary with a "women only" sign hanging out-this is what prominent women and leading feminine organizations all over the country want congress to Young Students Flee

Since the eighteenth amendment was written into the statute books, feminize agitators explain, women lawbreakers have been treated exactly like men. In consequence, more of their number are being convicted of wrongdoing now than in the past, and a renal institution especially for them has become a national necessity.

Suffrage Hits Feminine Offenders. According to Mrs. Mabel W. Willebrandt, one of the chief advocates, who, in addition, is an assistant United States attorney general, suffrage has functioned in such a way as to focus judge and jury attention on feminine faults that formerly went

"But, despite all assertions to the contrary, there is no more crime among the women nowadays," Mrs. Willebrandt insisted. "The only difference lies in the fact that more omen are being brought to justice

low than in former days. "With equal rights for women come equal wrongs. With woman's participation in the law making has come an responsibility in lawbreaking. the part of the law-enforcement agencies, on the part of judge and jury, to recognize this and hold a weman who has violated the law responsible

"From the standpoint of justice, there is only one standard of responsibility for crime. Maudlin sentiment and chivalry have no place in it. But, even so, all the suffrage amendments and equal rights bills in the world cannot change a woman's organism. Fundamentally, she is of a different than a man. A woman convict





#### U. S. Birth Certificates Peddled to Immigrants

New York .- American birth certificates are peddled to immigrants at European ports with the same freedom that million-mark notes are sold on the streets of New York, according to the testimony of August V. Tozzi, formerly president of the Italian Immigrant society and now in the foreign exchange business at 4 State street, before the joint legislative ommittee investigating the exploita-

tion of immigrants. Mr. Tozzi said also that passports. never used from a United States port, were made out wholesale and mailed to Europe to help in evading immigration laws. These passports were the usual permits issued to aliens admitted to the United States to visit their European homes for a period of six months, he said. The immigrant

would assume the name of the restdent to whom the passport was made out and enter this country without difficulty, the witness said.

Other witnesses testified that rail road agencies here sold American money to the immigrants and collect ed a fee of from 20 to 40 per cent. These agents come to the steamship piers and sell raffroad tickets to the mmigrants to points in the interior where they desire to go, while at the same time changing the immigrant's money into American money, it was explained.

Proves Innocence in Jail. San Antonio, Tex .- After he had spent nine months in prison for forgery, William Taylor of San Antonio has been freed. Acting on Taylor's request, Judge McCrory made an investigation which proved the prisoner's innocence.

in War on Smugglers Cape May, N. J .- Capt. John Karr of Five Fathom Bank lightship, 20 miles off Cape May. said here that lightships would co-operate in the war against liquor smuggling. The new lightships which will be placed on the stations early next year, he said, will be equipped with powerful radio sets, and will flash the news of approaching whisky runners to the coast guard stations along the shore. . .
