FOR THOSE OF US from the "Sputnik generation," who grew up when the Cold War was really heating up, the events of the past couple of weeks have been nothing short of mind-boggling.

We seriously doubt that any American who recalls such events as the Bay of Pigs incident, in which our country was just a hairbreadth away from war with the Soviet Union, could believe that they would ever see the day when that same Soviet Union would outlaw the Communist party from operating within its borders.

The events in the U.S.S.R. in the last several days must be a followup to the fall of the Berlin Wall and the subsequent re-unification movement in Germany.

With such major movements underway across the world globe, those of us living in the final decade of the 20th century are literally being able to witness history in the making.

Today's Soviet Union is truly a powder-keg, since the big failure of communism has left the nation and its inhabitants in an impoverished state.

The trouble with any kind of new movement in the U.S.S.R. is that the people want and need immediate change. But the deep mire that communism has sunk the Russian people into has taken almost 50 years, and no "quick fix" is going to cure that nation's ills.

Another mind-boggling situation, as you see the news reports from some of the outlying areas in Russia, away from the heads of state, is the fact that that nation appears to be virtually 100 years behind the United States.

And besides being so backward from an industrial and cultural standpoint, it would appear that the Soviet Union is bogged in a perpetual depression.

We think our local economy is a bit on the "soft" side! When was the last time you had to stand in line eight hours attempting to buy the necessities of life, as the Russians do in their "super markets"? (And in many cases, after waiting all that time, only find out that the meager supply has run out before you got to the front of the line.)

When you see the pictures of the very small collective farms (or even private farms), it's easy to see why Russians as a people are a hungry nation.

Generations of government control have wrecked the economy along with the farms, and Russia's farming industry simply is not able to provide enough food for its population.

This situation will take years to Store. be solved. It cannot possibly happen overnight.

If our country's farmers have a surplus of commodities, it might goods to sell to the Russians. But as someone asked me this past week: "Who do you sell to?" referring to the unstable government

situation. Another of the "never thought you'd see it" situations in regard to the Soviet upheavel is the fall of the KGB. For years the most powerful police force on the face of the earth, the KGB has seen its power

unplugged. Remember when then-Russian premier Nikita Khrushchev told Americans "We will bury you!"? That was a pretty sober statement, and one that worried Americans, not so much as to the USSR's ability to fulfill the threat so much as the fact that Nikita's hair-trigger temper might plunge the United States into World War III, which everyone expected would be a nuclear holocaust.

Thank goodness Khrushchev didn't get the two nations into a war, although he tried his best.

The best part about the possible end of the Cold War is the fact that the current changes are coming about due to the will of the Russian people. Hundreds of thousands of young people from opposite sides of the globe have not had to die to accomplish this change--it's just an event whose time has come.





Notice Parmer County Residents

Beginning September 1, the Insurance Reform Bill, enacted by the 72nd Legislature went into effect.

An owner must submit Current Proof of Financial Responsibility with an application for initial Registration, Renewal of Registration, or Transfer of Registration. This new requirement is a must, regardless of whether registration is accomplished in person or by mail.

The most common evidence of financial responsibility is a liability insurance card issued to the policyholder by the insurance company. Examples of other types of acceptable proof include insurance policies and binders, pool coverage documents and certificates of self-insurance, bond, etc.

The original or a photocopy of the evidence will satisfy the requirement of proof of financial responsibility. All original documentation will be returned.



As it was, the visiting Eagles scored some late TDs for a 4-1 win in the controlled scrimmage.

With just a few plays remaining in the scrimmage, S-F popped a couple of long touchdown passes. They also scored on a pass interception.

Friona's touchdown came on a 50yard pass and run play from quarterback Britt Conklin to split end Brian Herring.

"Overall, we were real pleased with the scrimmage results. We went. If we could've eliminated a couple of plays it would have been great," said Coach Steve Williams. Williams said that the team came out of its scrimmage with Sanford-Fritch with no new injuries, and should be in top physical condition for Friona's season opener at River Road Friday.

Concerning the Wildcats, Williams said they had a greatly improved team over last year. Having scouted the north Amarillo team, Williams says the Chieftains will have to go to Amarillo ready to play on Friday if they are to score a win.

The Wildcats will be led by signal-caller Clint Latham, who passed for over 1200 yards a year ago. Friona's secondary, which has played admirably in the two scrimmages, batting down five passes and intercepting two, will get a good test in their regular season-

Friday's game will be the 15th consecutive year for Friona and River Road to meet in football, and the Chieftains hold an 8-6 edge in previous games. The teams first met in 1977, which was the first year for the Wildcats to compete in varsity sports.

Last year, junior runningback Iswere fairly happy with the way it mael Rocha had a fantastic night for the Chieftains, gaining 243 yards-third highest total in 29 years at FHS--as Friona scored a 39-23 win. Curtis Brady added 154 yards from scrimmage. Both Rocha and Brady scored three touchdowns in the opening-game win. And they're both back to kick off their senior seasons at FHS.



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"TEXAS" Has Fourth Largest Attendance

"TEXAS" closed its 26th season in Palo Duro Canyon State Park on Saturday, August 24, with its fourth largest attendance.

A total of 100,208 visitors from foreign countries filled the theatre with an average of 1,616 persons most often. each night and 93% of capacity. The Pioneer Amphitheatre seats 1,742 visitors.

Stormy weather caused two rainouts in 1991, and drowned the opportunity for another record season. "TEXAS" has averaged just 1.4 rainouts a year during its 26-year history.

Set beneath the towering cliffs of Palo Duro Canyon, Paul Green's "TEXAS" has officially welcomed 2,286,440 visitors since 1966.

The side-stage sets of the ranch house, bunk house and St. Louis scenes also received a sprucing up this season.

These new additions followed an extensive half million dollar electrical renovation that was completed this year. Over 40 miles of original wiring was replaced with stateof-the-art copper wiring and conduits. The sound and light booth also received a face-lift to enclose much of the equipment.

All changes continue to reflect the vision and images projected by Pulitzer Prize winning author, Paul Green, who "saw" before his time.

Green, who attended the first sound and light show in France during the time he wrote "TEXAS," saw the "grand finale" as a huge celebration, and expressed ideas for the final scene that remained mechanically impossible until the 1990s.

Gala celebrations also marked 1991. Opening night on June 12 was dedicated to Coronado's discovery of the area 450 years ago. "Mariachi Estrella" and "Folkloric Amarillo" entertained on the patio prior to the performance during a reception to honor the members of the non-profit producer of "TEXAS," the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation.

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Average School Cost Per Student Detailed

Austin--Last year trustees in the 1,047 Texas school districts voted a billion dollar increase in school budgets. Local school property taxes were increased by half a billion dollars. School budgets totaled \$15.3 billion expended for the 3,377,223 children enrolled last October, for an average of \$4,524 per pupil.

The figures come from the latest issue of "Bench Marks 1990-91 School District Budgets in Texas," an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

for current operations was counselors, nurses, supervisors, budgeted last year plus \$316 for repayment of debt and \$433 per student for capital outlay.

Friona ISD's budget provided \$4,054 per student for current operations, \$189 for debt service, and \$152 per student for capital outlay based on the 1,237 students enrolled in October, 1990.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by Friona ISD in October, 1990 was \$25,901 plus supplements for the career ladder. The average for administrators was \$40,793, and \$36,062 for other professional An average of \$3,775 per student support employees (librarians,

Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$3,087 per student, as compared to \$3,217 in Friona ISD. Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 13.7 students in Friona ISD, while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.4 to one. Because of the existence of small classes, especially at the high school level, and abbreviated teaching schedules, many classes have more than the average number of students.

The average school district imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.088 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 98.0% of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.066 (\$1.088 times 98.0%) statewide. Locally, the Friona ISD imposed a rate of \$.80 while property was appraised at 101% of its market value making the true rate \$.81 per \$100 of market value (selling price).

The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools.

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Friona ISD would have been \$548. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$508, and if owned by a person 65 years or older, the tax on an \$80,000 house in this district would have averaged \$428, or less if subject to a tax freeze. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$871, \$771 and \$586 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year, Friona ISD's revenue from the property tax increased by 2.3 per cent for 1990-91 as compared to an 8.7 per cent increase statewide.

Local property taxes, plus state aid totaled \$3,517 per student in Friona ISD as compared to \$3,661 statewide.

Friona's Cass Perkins Has Musical Interests

One of Friona's best known fiddlers, Cass Perkins, is a native of Potowattomie County, Oklahoma, and has lived in Texas since 1950. Friona has been his home thirtyeight years and he isn't making any plans to move.

Perkins, who grew up on a Central Oklahoma sandy land farm, is the fourth of nine children. He began his education in a one room school house, which was called the P. & G. School. This was a combination of a community named Pitman and one named Griffin, near Trousdale.

Through the sixth grade, the school had only one teacher. Cass said, "I vaguely remember learning reading, writing and arithmetic, but penmanship is the subject I remember best. The teacher wanted us to use the muscles in our arms rather than the ones in our hands."

He further explained, "I could hardly handle my pen the way she wanted me to and my circles and straight lines didn't always stay between the lines the way she wanted them to, so I used an eraser to make my papers look neater."

For the seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth grades, Cass went to school in Trousdale.

He and his wife, Marie, who grew up in Tribby, a small country town near Trousdale, were married in 1950 and established their first home on the Poindexter farm, which is five or six miles northeast of Friona soon after the wedding.

Cass made his first visit to Parmer County in 1940, and it was during this visit, that he first got acquainted with a violin and has been playing one ever since.

As a visitor in the home of the late Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Floyd, who lived in the Rhea community, in August of 1940, he was very favorably impressed with the country and decided to make his home here. That fall he returned to cut feed and remembers that he paid for his first car with money he earned working for \$1.50 per day. "Those days began early and ended late," he reminisced.

With the first fiddle he ever had in his hands, he was able to play the tune, "Cindy," and was real pleased with his progress. Some time later, after he returned to Oklahoma and was visiting with a cousin, he learned that the fiddle had been cross tuned.

After the cousin instructed him on the proper tuning of a fiddle, he began practicing consistently and has never lost his zeal for the stringed

instrument. As his skill increased and his interest in fiddling grew, he began collecting and now owns six fiddles or violins and one viola. The oldest one in his collection was crafted by Joseph Guarnerius del Gesu, probably an Italian, in 1713, and had been in his family over 100 years when it was given to him by an aunt about 50 years ago.

Another Joseph Guarnerius del Gesu in the collection was added about 40 years ago and had completely fallen to pieces. Cass rebuilt it after purchasing all the pieces in a basket.

Cass also collects works of other fiddlers, which he listens to often. Some tapes, which he enjoys very much, were made by the late Delmar Shirley, one of Parmer County's best known fiddlers for many years.

Soon after Cass and Marie moved to Friona, he was employed as a mechanic for Herring Implement Company, the local John Deere

All three of the couple's children, David Dirr, Darla Perkins Bracken and Leslie Wade Perkins, are graduates of Friona High School.



Money Fund Rule Since the highly publicized savings and loan financial debacle, investors have become more skeptical about how safe their "safe" money really is. It's not surprising that money market funds have also come under close government scrutiny as a result.

Today there are approximately 590 money market mutual funds with record assets of more than \$458 billion. The number of shareholder accounts is at an all-time high of 20.9 million.

haven for investors' money, and the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) hopes to retain that level of safety by imposing higher regulatory standards of quality on the funds.

"Raising the quality standards for commercial paper held by money market funds is entirely appropriate and welcome," says David Silver, president of the mutual fund industry's trade organization, the Investment Company Institute. In fact, the ICI has urged the SEC to add additional safeguards for money market investors.

Under the new SEC rules, money market funds are required to hold only the highest grade of commercial paper, such as A-1 or P-1. No more than 5 per cent of the portfolio can be held in second tier paper, such as A-2 or P-2. Many funds have always voluntarily im-

IKE STEVENS posed similar standards on their portfolios. Some have even restricted their portfolios entirely to government-guaranteed or government-backed securities. The new SEC rules simply tighten restrictions on those few funds that rely on lower quality securities to increase the fund's yield.

Other changes in SEC regulations include restricting the portion of a fund's total assets invested in the securities of a single issuer to 5 per cent and reducing the maximum allowable average maturity of a fund's portfolio from 120 to 190 days. The ICI pointed out, however, that the current average maturity of Money market mutual funds have money market funds at the begintraditionally been considered a safe ning of 1990 was only 41 days, far shorter than required by the new regulations.

Although money market mutual funds are not insured or their yields guaranteed, they are considered by many to be among the safest investments available. Their record of safety can be attributed to the short maturity, broad diversification and high quality standards set by the funds. A typical money market fund invests in a variety of Treasury bills, U.S. government agency obligations, certificates of deposit, banker's acceptances and unsecured, short-term corporate notes known as commercial paper.

The new SEC rules should add additional safety to an already secure investment. More importantly, they discourage funds from reducing the quality of their portfolios to gain a competitive yield advantage to lure new investors.

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
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
