

Jim Bowman, of Amarillo, was here the first part of the week on business. Jim came to Brownfield about the time the railroad got here and built the O.K. Wagon yard.



How Heat Affects Steel.

The heating of cast steel will affect the strength, either to increase or to decrease it, according to how the heating is done. Alloys ordinarily classed as "babbitts" melt at a relatively low temperature 400 degrees C. (775 degrees F.) may be given as an approximate temperature at which most of such alloys are entirely molten. Heating cast steel to such a temperature ought not to change the material appreciably.



Agency Nearest Local Churches Will Be Employed in Bringing About Fuller Development in Future

Indicating the objects to which the money collected on the Baptist 75 Million Campaign goes, the headquarters of that movement in Nashville has issued the following statement of the distribution of the \$53,-377,084.43, representing the revised figures on the sum collected on that movement up to May 1, 1924: Foreign missions \$9,898,830.30; home missions \$5,757,820.09; state and associational missions \$9,093.769.27; Christian education \$14,849,083.51; hospitals \$2,-672,692.43; orphanages \$4,464,965.87; ministerial relief \$1,570,356.94; expenses and fixed charges not otherwise absorbed \$2,091,608.56; special credits and miscellaneous items \$1,-590,990,47; purchase and operation of state denominational papers \$62,-200.38; foreign relief \$67,602.16; undistributed balance \$152,330.77; Home Mission Board specials \$15,340; Foreign Mission Board specials \$86,103; raised by churches on foreign fields and expended by them in work there \$1,003,390.68.

All Work Goes Forward

National Forest Visitor

His Only Attraction I never met anyone in my life whose personal appearance disappointed me more than Ruskin's, writes Frank Harris in American Mercury. His appearance was not even prepossessing. 

Abundant Proof That Animals Exercise Wits

That animals think before they act is the conviction expressed by Dhan Gopal Mukerji, Indian lecturer and au-

Mr. Mukerit asserts that all real doing was the result of active contenplation and thinking, and that deeds unpremeditated were short-lived, and cites examples from his experiences with animals in India.

"Once," said Mr. Mukerji, "I was with a party of men who were traveling in India on elephants. One morning we saw the purplish color in the high grass which indicates that a tiger is lying there. Before any of us could raise a rifle the male, for there were two of them, had leaped to the back of one of the elephants and remained there face to face with the helpless rider. Meantime his mate, the tigress, slunk away into some deep underbrush and safety. She uttered one little cry and her mate leaped from the back of the elephant and followed her. He was shot down.

"The whole act was not one of aggression, but of protection. The tiger did not want to attack our man, but to prevent us from attacking his mate. He did not instinctively save his own life, but, after thought, however brief, determined to sacrifice his own to save hers. He knew that she who could bear cubs and bring them up was of more value than he, and that it was his duty to save her.

"In another instance the elephant was left with a little Indian baby in a basket while the parent of the babe went away for several hours. The elephant was tied so that he could not reach the basket. When the parent came back (I was with him) we saw that a huge polsonous snake had coiled itself around the basket. We did not know what to do for fear that the snake would strike the baby if we made any move.

The elephant all the while was straining the rope which held him and trying to attract the snake's attention by swinging his trunk. He was clearly trying to get the snake to attack him and leave the baby. The parent carried a club. Suddenly the elephant saw it and with one swoop of his trunk wrenched it away from the man. He moved the club back and forth over the ground until the snake saw it. The snake uncoiled itself and moved over and coiled itself around the stick. With one rapid stroke the elephant raised and lowered his trunk killing the snake.

Llama Has Double Value. The llama is employed as a beast of burden in parts of South America chiefly in Peru, Chile, and Bolivia, and it is also valuable as the producer of a fiber commonly called wool, although it might be called a kind of camel hair. With respect to wool or hair, the most valuable of the llamas are those belonging to a species known as paca, or more generally alpaca This kind of llama resembles a sheep but with a longer neck. It produces a fine long wool or hair, usually dark brown in color or black. From this material are made several kinds of very durable and handsome fabricswomen's dress goods as a rule.

Castoreum.

Castoreum is a substance produced by a pair of glands in the anal region. It has a peculiar odor which is neither strong nor unpleasant, and is attractive to various animals, among them the beaver itself. Hence it is used as a bait by fur trappers, a little of it being placed in such a position that the beaver or other creature sought is caught in coming to it. It is used in the manufacture of perfumes, and was formerly recommended in medicine as a stimulant and antispasmodic, and has been prescribed for more than 2,000 years; and it still has a market value.


