Yes, we smiled mightily to ourselves.

But Brownfield's founders were wiser men than we toook them for. Perhaps, and we doubt it not, that the founders themselves never dream ed that horseless carriages would ever be a thing to be considered in controlling traffic, but these founders had seen narrow streets in moderate sized cities of that day jammed because of a double tracked car line, and they may have visioned such for Brownfield in the hazy future.

But a large town or city does not have to sport a street car system in these days of motor vehicles to have their streets jammed with traffic. In the good old days of old "Dobbin" that critter could be hitched in a back ailey, vacant lot, or a less used street -but who wants to insult his "lizzy" with an obscure corner.

Get Beautiful Effects From Lighted Marble

When an official of the United States bureau of standards was making an inspection of indoor lighting arrangements as used in Europe he was surprised to find an old church in Italy in which the daylight was filtered through thin slabs of delicate tinted rattble. The effect was a surprisingly beautiful one and one not easily du plicated by our makers of ornamental giassware, as there is a peculiar charm about the natural coloring of some of the Italian marbles, writes the Washington Star.

However, the marble must be so thin for such a purpose that it could not form a commercial substitute for window panes or for use in electric light fixtures. Now a French investigator has found that such marble slabs can be used in much greater thickness if they are polished on both sides and then saturated with paraffin or shellac. By giving them such a treatment he has been able to obtain beautiful effects in illuminating corridors by the light of tungsten lamps concealed behind the marble walls of the hallways. The loss of light is sald to be only about 20 per cent (or no more than with most of the milky glassware used in fixtures), and as the whole plate of marble glows the effect is surprisingly charming and un-



Nearly \$12,000,000 Devoted to Helping Victims of Great Japanese Earthquake.

Washington .- More than \$21 000 000 was the total of funds expended in all activities of the American Red Cross during the last fiscal year. ended June 30, says a statement issued by the National organization. This expenditure was almost onesixth of the amount of money disbursed by the Red Cross in the war year, July, 1917, to June, 1918. Of this extraordinary sum \$11,631,303 was America's contribution to the Red quake victims. This was increased to \$11.768.803 by appropriations from general funds of the Red Cross, and it represented probably the largest spontaneous outpouring of beneficence of a single nation in the history of the

Army, the Navy, and the Marine Corps, with their home ties, mean a never-ending Red Cross service which figures cannot fully interpret. In this work a total of \$685,285 was applied in meeting an obligation under the Red Cross charter which has been fulfilled for over 20 years.

Domestic Operations Extensive

In the past year Red Cross operaions were almost wholly confined to continental United States and the insular possessions. Relief work following disasters called for immediate activities in 192 places and a total of \$737,603.87 was spent in this service alone. In 33 major disasters trained workers were kept at the work of rehabilitation for many months.

In carrying on the health activities a total of \$444.886.66 from Red Cross national funds, and \$808,000 from Chapter treasuries-approprimately \$1,252. \$56 in all-was applied, giving some Idea of the extent of Red Cross service in the fields of public health aursing, nutrition instruction, and spreading knowledge of personal hygiene and care of the sick in the home.

For advancing the cause of human safety, the First Aid instruction, locally by Chapters and over extensive national territory by the Red Cross instruction car covering trunk line railroads, and in teaching watersafety and increasing the membership of the Red Cross Life-Saving Corne. the total cost was \$288,234.71, of which \$216,234.71 came out of national funds.

Army of Over 5,500,000 The Junior Red Cross in the schools - with over 5,500,000 in its "I Serve" ranks-was aided with \$233,510.78 to which it is estimated the Chapters added some \$277,000-a total of \$510,510,78. In various other domestic activities the Red Cross spent \$283,473.19, and the Chapters in their numerous voluntary services expended an additional \$1.048,000 during the year.

Foreign obligations, aside from Japan, were met with national funds is follows: Relief of refugees in Greece, \$200.887.18; Junior Red Cross projects, \$99,579.75; League of Red Cross Societies, \$165,000; other insular and foreign work, \$221,855.31. 

Additional 50,000 Water Safety Experts Probable Gain of Summer Campaign.





Chess Tournament No Place for "Rooters"

Chess is one game, or sport, where the rooter is conspicuous by his absence. The stickler for golf effquette, wno frowns if a robin chirps while some one is attempting to putt, would be considered a noisy nuisance at a chess tournament. A gailery of silent spectators may stand at a respectful distance from two masters of the game, but those of the gallery must keep quiet. If an important move is made-one that appears to have peullar significance in regard to the outcome of the contest-there must be no cheering. Even nodding approval is barred if the nod will cause the ollar to rattle.

Chess masters regard their pieces by the hour. Minutes will pass while all of the possibilities and eventualfties are considered from every angle. There must be absolute quiet, for is a game for thinkers, and thinkers cannot be disturbed without serious consequences to their train of thought. The escaping of a sigh seems as loud as the exhaust of a locomotive. The dropping of a pin would be re garded as an outright violation of the rode of ethics. Chess is a game where concentration rises to sublime heights and where silence is obligatory if not golden. Municipal authorities who have established quiet zones and then been at a loss to know how to maintain quiet in them might learn something from a chess tournament. Place a group of chess players in each zone. -Washington Star.

Cause of Petrifaction

This process is called petrifaction. When wood or the carcass of an anital apparently turns to stone we say it petrifies. The word "petrify" itself neans turning to or making into stone. It is from the Latin "petra," a rock or stone, and "facio," to make or to do. But the fact is, organic matter does not actually turn into stone. This is what really occurs: Water containing dissolved minerals, such as calcium carbonate and silica, infiltrates through the organic matter. Particle by particle, as time passes by, the calclum carbonate or silica takes the place of the organic matter. After many years, perhaps hundreds or often the original form and structure of Pershing's ability should be "dropmold while the stone is being formed from the minerals in the infiltrating
