

Scientists Will Make Research in Mongolia.

Roy Chapman Andrews has gone to Urga to arrange for his next expe-Ation into Mongolia, the Montreal Family Herald states.

When he comes back he will begin the task of assembling the loads of equipment that are now on their way to China. The caravan will be started on its way to Mongolia some time in December. "After dismissing his soup he entered with interest upon his dinner, and certainly such a gourmandeur never was it my fate to behold before. For the length of two hours his mouth was never closed, and even at the intervals of plate changing he filled up crevices by demolishing a dish of raw artichokes in his neighborhood."

Apparently in later life Talleyrand's appetite, though not so keen, was decidedly bizarre. Jules Mary-Lafon describes in his souvenirs an afternoon visit paid Talleyrand in 1832. "I noticed when tea was brought in, Talleyrand did not touch the cakes. All he ate was a slice of bread and butter lavishly sprinkled with pepper."-Kansas City Star.





OUR LEGISLATIVE LETTER FRESH FROM AUSTIN

The 39th session of the Texas Legislature now fully organized in starting upon what gives promise of a period of constructive legislation.

ft goes without saying, that the usual batch of bills will be emptied into the legislative hopper, but it is refreshing to know that in the grinding that is to follow, the chaff is junked; at least there is most hopeful signs that this will happen.

Economy: The motto of most of the legislators seems to be "economy" This reads well, but the thought should be added that "All is not gold

that glitters." There is an excuse for the sentiment of economy, but there are reasons for the statement, that all economy is not economics or con-

structive statesmanship. Legislature resounded with eloquent statements to the effect that all needed legislation could be passed within 60 days. But these sentiments begin to pass away before the end of the week. The fact is, Texas is growing more rapidly now than ever before, and it might be added, that with the large number of representatives in the legislature, the increasing business of the state and the varied interests involved, that it will be almost impossible for any legislature as now constituted to give the loose" that I read the statement that terests in a 60 day session.

Appropriations: Take the appropriations bill along, and it is necessary to give at least days to them, for as is well known, one week is consumed in the complete organization and co-ordination of the houses. So, it can be set down as a certainty that the sessions will last longer than 60 days, and it need occasion no surprise if the present session runs 90 days and then a special session or two may follow.

securit. New Revenue: It is also expected that in the hunt for additional revenue, that bills will be presented to raize the production tax upon oil and other natural resourses of the State. The suggestion is made that all citizens scan "headling" bills introduced as given in the press from day to day and feel it is a duty to address their representatives in the legislature, giving protests to measuresthat are inimical to the orderly and constructive development of

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce will maintain its legislative bureau in the Austin Chamber of Commerce and the membership of the organization is invited and requested to communicate with the manager upon matters pertaining to legislation, and at any and all times.

Italians Have Own Myth About Old North Church

Italians largely make up the population in the neighborhood of Old North church in Boston, in the towers of which were displayed the lanterns that served as a signal to Paul Revere to spread the alarm announcing the approach of the British on the night of April 18, 1775.

The Italians have a myth of their own concerning this same historic church and the lanterns. They will tell one, according to Edward Everett Hale, in his "Historic Boston," that in the old days, long, long ago, the people of Boston became very wicked and forgot God and heaven and hell and the angels and all the saints. And so, one night, the Virgin Mary descended from heaven and hung a lantern on the steeple of the famous church that all men and women might see and believe. The Old North is 200 years old. The cornerstone was laid April 15, 1723, and the first service was held December 29. Recently some bricks and a flagstone have been embedded in the floor under the tower. These are gifts from old Boston in England, taken from the Guild hall, where some of the Pilgrim Fathers were imprisoned. The bricks are probably between 700 and 800 years old.

Genuine Navajo Blankets Now Priceless Treasures

It has been scores of years since a Navajo blanket of the highest grade has been made, and only a few of the precious old ones remain. These are almost priceless. The colors of these choice blankets were red, white and bine, or rarely just red and white. In a few instances there was also a little black. Red was the prevailing color, and took up sometimes four-fifths of the blanket, the other colors merely drawing the pattern on a red ground-

The red material was from Turkish cloth, called ballets. It used to be imported to Mexico, whence the Navajos written on this side of the Atlantic of Arizona, New Mexico and Utah procured it. The fixed price of it was \$6 a pound. The Navajos used to ravel this cloth and use the thread for their finest blankets-such blankets as never have been produced elsewhere. thirds are of our own manufacture.-The weaving of one of these blankets occupied a Navajo woman for many months. It was too thin and stiff to be an ideal bed blanket, and it was never meant to be one. All blankets of that quality were made to be worn upon the shoulders of chiefs, and most of them were ponchos-that is, they had a small slit in the center for the wearer to put his head through, so that the blanket would fall upon him like a cape.
