THERE IS ROMANCE IN THE ELECTRIC MOTOR

A generation ago electric motors were little more than toys. Today they are the great driving engines of the civilized world. They vary in capacity from 1/300th part of a horse power, up to 10,000 horse power. The smallest is the size of a spool of thread and the largest will reach from the ground to a second story window.

Many millions of motors are used to turn the wheels of modern industry and to lessen the work of the housewife. The service you when you ride in a street car or in an elevator, when you step on your self starter, when you clean your carpet with a vacuum cleaner. Even when you want a drink of water it is a motor that pumps it ready to your hand. But as familiar as these faithful servants are, few people realize that the four quarters of the world are searched for the materials necessary to produce them.

For in order to make even the simplest kind of motor, over a hundred different materials are required.

There are thousands of men working in a score of different countries collecting ingredients for making the motors. Many of these workmen are dressed in strange garb, they speak a strange tongue, and man are burned with the tropic sun. They dig in mines, the harvest in fields, they pick, gather and scrape to provide the materials for building a motor.

Then these 111 materials must be carried a total of 250,000 miles, a quarter of a million miles on sea sea on land, on elephants' and on camels' backs, and on ponies' shoulders before

they arrive at the electric works in the United States.

Doctor Tells How to Care for Child's Teeth

We have been taught to believe that dentists have much to do with good teeth. The work of the dentist, however, only begins after the teeth are born, when they are all formed and in whatever condition they are developed in the jaw, which is the result of the prenatal influence, whether good or bad, so far as the teeth are concerned.

It has been said that a clean tooth never decays, but the teeth must be sound in the beginning to make this true. Prenatal influences and care are very necessary, and also as much care and attention in regard to diet and hygiene should be given when the child is from two to five years old.

The sixth year in a child's life divides the preventive and reparative care necessary, and the limit should not be reached before this care is given. Care in the kindergarten age is better than when in the first grade at six years, and the nursery or preschool time is better than the kindergarten.—Dr. Harold Cross in the Nation's Health.

Cafeteria Chief's Idea Halts Drain on Profits

How efficiency can be used to stop small leaks and increase large profits was illustrated recently in a downtown cafeteria where the manager evolved a way to conserve on toothpicks.

Originally he had a sort of slot machine to deal out the toothpicks, but this brought little good will to his patrons, as most of them would resent being permitted to take only one. Anxious to keep his trade, he corded the toothpicks in a large open glass dish. This made it handy for his customers to take a pocketful at one grab and some of them took enough to start the furnace fire at home, judging from the way the cafeteria's stock was depleted.

Then the manager hit upon the plan of dumping the toothpicks into the bowl and stirring them up with a large spoon. This gives the customers the impression he is liberal, but the toothpicks' tangled condition makes it difficult to get more than two or three as the patrons pass in front of the cashier's desk.—New York Sun and Globe.

"Chameleon Lakes"

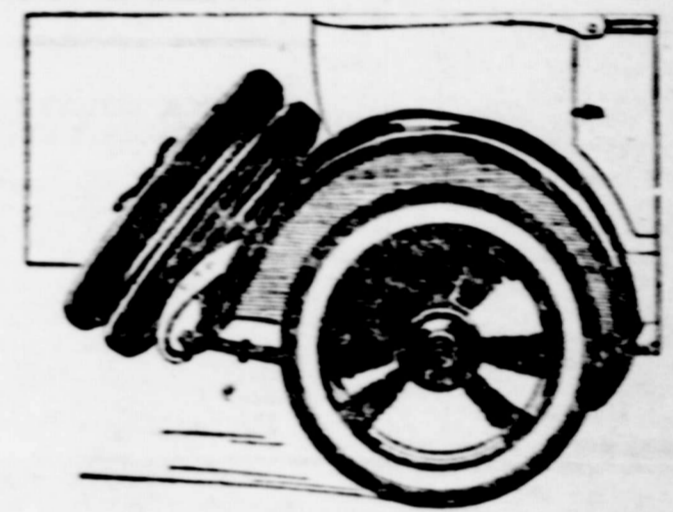

Lake Geneva, at the western end of Switzerland, is blue, while Lake Constance, at the eastern end of that country, is green. Blue implies purity, since the natural color of water is blue. A green lake has its water slightly clouded with impurities.

It is said that green lakes sometimes become absolutely colorless for a time, and it has been found that this sudden change of hue is due to the washing into the lakes of mud colored red by oxide of iron. Red is complementary to green, and the result of the mixture is that the green color of the water becomes for the time being neutralized.

EXPEDITION TO HUNT FOR CRADLE OF MAN

Scientists Will Make Research in Mongolia.

Roy Chapman Andrews has gone to Urga to arrange for his next expedition into Mongolia, the Montreal Family Herald states.

When he comes back he will begin the task of assembling the loads of equipment that are now on their way to China. Already about forty crates have arrived, and the cars and trucks are due in a few weeks' time. The other members of the third Asiatic expedition, fourteen foreigners in all, as compared with the eight who formed the foreign personnel last year, will follow in due course.

The caravan will be started on its way to Mongolia some time in December. By starting at this time of the year it will have the best chance of missing the blinding snowstorms that beat across the Gobi desert in the winter months. On April 15 next year members of the expedition will set off, traveling in motorcars, and the entire party will assemble in the heart of Mongolia at a point toward the eastern end of the Altai range of mountains, where the expedition finished its work last year. It is expected that the cars, which are especially designed for this difficult trip, will reach the rendezvous almost at the same time as the caravan, which has of necessity to follow a circuitous route.

The expedition will then divide into four divisions, working west and south of the Altai. Each division will be entirely self-contained, and with the addition of new scientific groups. It is hoped in this way to do more comprehensive work than was done last year.

The aspirations of Mr. Andrews are well known in outline, but in view of the importance of the expedition may be interesting in detail.

"We are going to work on human evolution," said Mr. Andrews. "In the past we have tried to test the theory that central Asia is the point of origin of a great deal of the animal and reptile life of the world. But for twenty-five years it has been said that this region is also the birthplace of man. We have found that Mongolia and the central Asia plateau constitute the paleontological Garden of Eden. Why should it not prove to be the place where man originated? The new expedition will work on rocks of a later period than those which were worked on last year. Those rocks which yielded among other things the eggs of the dinosaur are of course too old to contain any evidences of man. This time we shall concentrate on the younger rocks." Mr. Andrews agreed that the task was like looking for a needle in a haystack; but, he said: "All the evidence points more and more strongly to the central Asian plateau as the birthplace of man, and this time we are bringing together all branches of science to assist us in bearing down on this one problem. We hope—only hope, mark you—that we shall secure some evidence at any rate to shed light on the problem of human evolution. In any case we are bound to return with many interesting specimens. The country where we shall work is the birthplace of so many different groups of animals that it is inevitable that we shall unearth some things of the utmost interest."

Do Ducks Swim With Wings?

Do ducks use their wings while swimming under water? The question is discussed frequently among sportsmen and nature students, and opinions sometimes differ. Testimony of reliable authorities supports the belief that various species of ducks and grebes, loons and other diving birds do not use their wings when swimming beneath the surface for food or in trying to escape capture, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. A roddy duck was observed on Lake Michigan not long ago feeding in 15 or 20 feet of clear water. It did not well started on its downward plunge, the wings, about two-thirds extended, were used in quick, short strokes, at the rate of about one a second, to assist in propelling it and in rising to the top as well.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—America has paid the debt of gratitude to France for aiding during the revolutionary war, President Coolidge said in greeting the new French Ambassador, Emile Daeschner. Both governments should see that their material debts also are discharged, he added.
The same sentiments were expressed by the new Ambassador. No direct mention of debt negotiations was made, the white house said later.
History, which often repeats itself in the life of peoples, has demonstrated that France and America have in turn extended to each other, at critical moments in their existence, mutual and efficacious assistance, thus paying to each other their debt of gratitude just as they are firmly solicitous. However the case arises of paying their material debts," Ambassador Daeschner said.
Replying the President said: "The kindly support which was received in our struggle for independence developed into a permanent friendship and it was the privilege of Millions of young Americans to fight side by side with the heroic soldiers of France in defense of liberty. Thus was paid the debt of gratitude, and as you so rightly observe, both governments should experience deep satisfaction in their solicitude that material debts also be discharged."

At a glance his face is large, pale and flat, like a cream cheese; but on approaching nearer, cunning and rank hypocrisy supplant all other resemblances.
"After dismissing his soup he entered with interest upon his dinner, and certainly such a gourmand never was it my fate to behold before. For the length of two hours his mouth was never closed, and even at the intervals of plate changing he filled up crockies by demolishing a dish of raw artichokes in his neighborhood."
Apparently in later life Talleyrand's appetite, though not so keen, was decidedly bizarre. Jules Mary-Lafon describes in his souvenirs an afternoon visit paid Talleyrand in 1832. "I noticed when tea was brought in, Talleyrand did not touch the cakes. All he ate was a slice of bread and butter lavishly sprinkled with pepper."—Kansas City Star.

St. Augustine Like a Page From an Ancient Romance

St. Augustine is so different that it seems incredible that it is but 40 miles distant from Jacksonville, one of the most cosmopolitan cities in the country. 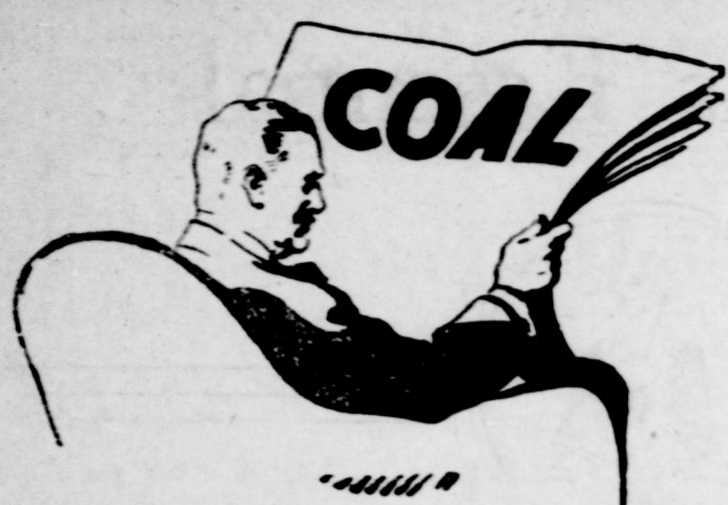

How U. S. and Britain Fixed Boundary Line

The famous slogan, "Fifty-four forty or fight!" was first written by Enoch W. Eastman, a delegate to a Democratic county convention in Iowa. He wrote some resolutions about local politics, and then added: "In the matter of the northwestern boundary we are for 'Fifty-four forty or fight.'" A state convention later adopted the same resolution. It was taken up by the Democratic press and speakers and spread like wildfire. In the guesses made by the public as to who was the author of the watchword, many prominent Democrats were named, but most of them centered on Lewis Cass of Michigan.

Caught up as a party cry and with the "reoccupation" of the whole of Oregon inserted side by side with the annexation of Texas as a plank of the Democratic platform on which James K. Polk was nominated for the presidency, the country, during the campaign of 1844 rang with the defiant slogan.

James Buchanan, secretary of state, offered the old line of the forty-ninth parallel between British and American possessions west of the Rockies, an offer that was rejected by Great Britain. Polk withdrew Buchanan's offer and reasserted his determination to stand out for the whole of Oregon.

And before the summer of 1846 arrived Great Britain had accepted the forty-ninth parallel as the demarcation line between her Far West possessions and those of the United States, on the precise terms which the United States had from the first been willing to accept. Polk had been "bluffing."—Detroit News.

Mimosa Plant Protects Itself in Odd Manner

The mimosa of Brazil is a plant which reveals more "intelligence," perhaps, than any other. A footfall, a light touch, or any sudden disturbance will cause the leaves to close together and hang as though they had suddenly withered.

Grazing animals are attracted by the light green leaves of the mimosa. At their approach the plant will begin to droop. The attractive fresh leaves of a moment before look dry and utterly unappetizing. The marauding animal does not fancy the dried-up dinner and so it moves on.

Should the animal, however, be particularly hungry, and inclined to investigate further, he gets some nasty pricks from the long sharp thorns with which the stems of the plant are studded. He is soon convinced that a meal in this spot would be accompanied by much pain, so he goes. A few minutes after the danger is past the mimosa will resume its usual appearance and look as green and fresh as ever.

ELECTION NOTICE

State of Texas, County of Terry, City of Brownfield:—

"An ordinance ordering a special election to be held in the City of Brownfield, Texas, under the provisions of Article 1016, Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, to determine whether or not said city shall accept the benefits of Chapter 11, Title 22 revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, providing that cities accepting its benefit shall have power to improve any street, avenue, alley, highway, public place or square, or any portion thereof, within the limits of such city, by filling, grading, raising, paving or re-paving the same in a permanent manner, or by the construction or re-construction of sidewalks, curbs and gutters, or by widening, narrowing or straightening the same, and to construct necessary appurtenances thereto, including sewers and drains, making provision for the holding of said election, and declaring an emergency."

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Brownfield, Texas, has determined the immediate advisability of holding an election to determine whether or not the said City shall adopt the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes (1914) of the State of Texas; and

Whereas, Article 1016 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas provide that in such instances a special election shall be called by said City Council for said purpose and that said election shall be held as nearly as possible in compliance with the law with reference with reference to regular city elections in said City, by empowering the governing body of said city, by resolution, to order said election and prescribe the time and manner of holding the same.

Therefore, be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Brownfield, Texas, that a special election be held in the City of Brownfield, Texas, at the Courthouse thereof, which is the regular polling place for said City, on the 24th day of February 1925, to determine whether said City shall adopt or reject the benefits of the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes (1914) of the State of Texas.

All resident property taxpayers who are qualified voters of said city shall be entitled to vote at said election. Said election shall be held in accordance with the general laws of the State of Texas, the provisions of the Charter of said City, and in accordance with ordinances which affect the manner of holding elections in said city.

The following officers are hereby appointed to conduct said election in accordance with law:

- A. M. Brownfield, Presiding Judge.
- S. H. Holgate, Judge.
- H. M. Pyeatt, Clerk, and
- J. E. Shelton, Clerk.

At such election those favoring the adoption of the benefits of the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the Adoption of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Statutes of Texas;" and those opposing the adoption of the benefits of Chapter 11, Title 22, revised Statutes of the State of Texas, shall have written or printed on their ballots: "Against the adoption of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas."

Notice of such election shall be given by publication of this ordinance for not less than 30 days immediately preceding the date designated for the holding of same in each issue of the Terry County Herald, a weekly newspaper published in the City of Brownfield, Texas, and a copy of this ordinance shall be posted in three public places in said City, one of which shall be posted at the Court house door for not less than 30 full days prior to the date of said election.

The officers holding said election shall make returns thereof in the manner prescribed by law.

The fact that certain streets within the City of Brownfield, Texas, are in a deplorable condition, and the laws of said City at this time are inadequate creates an emergency and imperative demand and public necessity that the rule requiring Ordinances to be read at more than one meeting be suspended, and that this ordinance take effect from and after its passage, and it is so ordained.

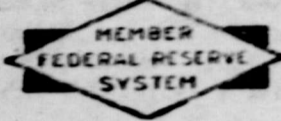
