





The following program will be LEA COUNTY, N. M. NOW HAS A REAL OIL WELL

Reports coming from the Maljamar well on the western side of Lea couny indicate that at last Lea county has a real oil well.

This test which is in Section 21, Township 17, Range 32, has been watched with considerable interest from the time that drilling was begun. The Maljamar people are among the largest operators in the field and have abundant capital to sink the well to any depth desired.

The rig used is one of the largest n the field and was erected with the intention of going 5,000 if necessary, with a view of making a thorough test of the structure in that locality.

The sand was encountered at depth of 2334 feet and the bit penetrated the sand two feet, when the oil rose about 300 feet in the well. The rig was shut down until a string of casing could be run, since about 700 feet of the hole was not cased and there was some caving from about 20 feet of the red beds.

The oil is of a high grade and those who have examined the well think hat it will prove one of the best in the field.

The formation is altogether different from that of the Artesia field and is very simular to that of the Big between the hours of 10 o'clock A. M. Lake field in Regan county, Texas. This leads many of the geologists to Courthouse door of Terry County, believe that the real oil pool of this part of the country lies east of the cap rock and is a continuation of the Texas oil pool.-Lovington (N. 

Dear Brother Stricklin:

If you will kindly grant me space in the Herald, which comes to me regularly, I wish to tell my many farmer friends in Terry County, something about our new Farmers' organization.

The Southern Farmers' Co-operative Marketing Association, was organized at Texarkana. Texas, on the 9th day of Jan. 1926.

This is an organization of producers of farm products. It was chartered under the laws of Texas, however Arkansas and Oklahoma come into the organization with us. This is strictly a business organization based on strict business principles. There have been many organizations of farmers in the past that have risen and flourished for a season, then wanned and past into history. There is never effect without cause, the prime cause for the failure of so many proding organizations is the fact that

farmers that attempts to "dabble" in politics will sooner or later become disrupted. Now the Southern Farmer's Co-operative Marketing Association is strictly what its name implies. It is not a secret organization, and has no purpose to serve except the pusiness of marketing. We will abolutely have nothing to do with politics as an organization. Every member is free to vote as he pleases and to belong to any organization he pleases. We have no fight to make on any existing farmers organization. If you are satisfied with the one you are in and getting the results you desire that is the one for you to stay with. If we cannot build the Southern Farmers Co-operative Marketing Association on its own merits, and not on the demerits of others, then it ought not to succeed.

The southern farmer is more interested in a market for his cotton than any other one product, so I will try to give you an outline of the plans of our organization for handling cotton. In the first place I wish to say that no Co-operative Marketing Association can succeed unless ample arrangements are made for financing its operation. In launching this organization, we chartered strictly under the intermediate credit law. We have secured ample arrangements with the Intermediate Credit Bank at Houston for \$50,000,000 if we need it with which to finance the sale of cotton. Every member is required to sign a ten year pledge to deliver his cotton to the Association to sell, however, it is stipulated in our constitution also in the pledge that he may withdraw at the end of any year he so desires, by giving 30 days notice prior to Jan. ist. However such withdrawal does not release him from delivering all that years crop. The cotton is all shipped to a concentration point at the port and there it is even run and sold by our agency to the spinners in just such grades and staples as they want, and in such quantiies as they want. The cotton is sold when the member says sell it or just is near that date as possible and when the cotton is sold settlement in full is made for the cotton then and he does not have to wait over a long period of months for a final settlement, as some other co-operative organizations of it as soon as he gets it under a of lading to the concentration point. In selling cotton this way we eliminate the profits that are going o the speculators between the pro-

lucer and the spnners. The big speculators are the ones hat are making their fortunes out the cotton game. All these little street buyers are buying for the big peculator. The first thing he does ifter he gets the cotton is ship it to they want it. He is the one that is getting the big rake off. Spinners do not buy cotton in mixed up grades

Now, in our organization we adopt he same identical plan of handling otton that the big speculator does. other words we make the plan work for the producer instead of the

Our members pay a small commision on each bale for handling, which ve guarantee will not exceed \$2.00 per ale.
