

John Morton was the grandson of 1654. He received a fair education and acquired some knowledge of law. from 1772-75.

Soon after his entrance into political life he attended the stamp act Congress in New York. He held the position of high sheriff of the county, judge in several courts, and was a member of the Continental Congress from its inception.

As to the question of separation ty, Texas. from Great Britian, opinions in the province differed greatly and in 1776 its delegation was divided on the subect. Taking his seat late in July. Morton showed high and disinterested courage in voting for the Declaration, thus committing his Province to the Revolution, and offending a number of his friends who were Loyalists or Conservatives.

He helped to frame the plan of Confederation, but did not live to see it adopted, dying of a fever at his birthplace near Philadelphia in April, 1777.

Morton was the only man of Sweedish birth to sign the Declaration. A memorial to his name will be erected by Sweedish-Americans all over the United States for the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition. The Ino. Morton memorial building will stand on the banks of the Delaware River near the United States Navy Yard, and will be used as headquarters of Sweedish-Americans during the Exposition.

#### BEAUTIFYING ANTIQUE OR MODERN FURNITURE

Many rare old Colonial Pieces have been rescued from the attic, refinished and now occupy an important their proud possessors.

Such pieces, of the pure Colonial vintage are too rare to be sacrificed to carelessness or indifference. Antique collectors have for several years been rummaging through the discarded furniture of thousands of old established homes. They have picked, up countless old relics of colonial days and bought them for a mere trifle and sold them at steep prices.

Any housewife still posseses one or more pieces of this charming old furniture. She is indeed fortunate and can do no better than to guard her prize carefully.

Refinishing such furniture is one of the first considerations, but before this can be done several things mus' be decided upon. The nature of the wood must be determined, likewise its original finish and the finish desired. Also the materials to be applied must be considered in connection with the preparation of the surface to

No one can lay down any set rules covering the refinishing of all old pieces of furniture. An individual study of each piece must be made. These are, however, readily available materials, paints, enamels stains and lacquers of all colors for all varieties. of wood, and in most every locality are to be found those competent to give advice in the matter of selection and the use of materials.

To varnish, stain or paint a table, chair or dresser, the surface should be gone over thoroughly with fine sandpaper or steel wool, which in the hand of ameteur is more satisfactory than a paint or varnish remover, and then brushed free of all dust. The first coat should then be applied, care being taken in mixing, thinning the number of coats, drying between coats, etc., in accordance with direc-

A glass surface can be secured by rubbing with linseed oil mixed with powdered pumice stone. After this, oil alone may be applied and the surface rubbed to the desired gloss. The use of varnish will produce a quicker







The last report of the Federal Reerve Bank of Dallas for the 11th District shows seventy-one commercial failures for the month. This is considered a low morality rate. Taking it as a monthly average, the year's commercial failures in the district would number 852. This figure represents the business men who were forced to go into courts of bankruptcy and to turn their assets over to their creditors. It does include the large number of business men who guit or who made private settlements with their creditors: Many farmers, laborers and a large


